Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

This subsection does not apply to damaged, 3 disabled, or abandoned vehicles or combinations of vehicles while being towed by a tow truck. 4 5 2 New Section; Exception for Vehicles Being Towed. Amend RSA 266 by inserting after section 6 21 the following new section: 7 266:21-a Exception for Vehicles Being Towed. The total weight of a tow truck and the towed 8 vehicle is exempt from the maximum total gross weight loads allowed under this subdivision if a 9 damaged, disabled, or abandoned vehicle is being towed.

 266:13-c Exception for Vehicles Being Towed. Notwithstanding any other provision of this subdivision, the following size restrictions shall apply to tow trucks and towed vehicles:

- I. When any portion of the weight of a disabled unit rests upon a tow truck, such weight shall not exceed 600 pounds per square inch of tire up to 25,000 pounds per single axle, or 50,000 pounds per tandem axle set, or the weight allowed for axle groups under RSA 266:18 or RSA 266:18-a. The tow truck steering axle shall carry sufficient weight to maintain safe operation.
- II. No disabled unit, including load, shall exceed 14 feet in height and 102 inches in width unless being towed under a special permit allowing a greater height or width or where an accident or collision has caused a disfigurement of the disabled unit resulting in a width greater than 102 inches but not exceeding 120 inches. During daylight hours the disabled unit shall carry warning flags indicating its maximum width. During the hours of darkness the maximum width shall be indicated by lighted clearance lamps that comply with 49 C.F.R. section 393.17. Rear view mirrors may extend to a point not in excess of that which affords the driver of the tow truck a view of the rear along both sides of the vehicle in conformance with 49 C.F.R. section 571.111. The combined overall length of the tow truck and disabled, damaged, or abandoned vehicles in tow shall not exceed 120 feet.
- III. No single unit tow truck shall exceed 43 feet in overall length. No disabled unit shall exceed the maximum length for such unit under this subdivision or by special permit.
- IV. A tractor truck and semi-trailer or full trailer, or a straight truck and full trailer combination shall only be towed in an emergency situation when a law enforcement officer or the department of transportation directs the disabled combination to be moved to the nearest safe location off the highway.
- V. Exceptions to the limits of this section shall be considered on an individual basis by special permit, after the disabled unit has been moved to the nearest safe location.
- VI. When towing occurs during the hours of darkness the towing vehicle and towed vehicles shall be subject to the lighting and reflector requirements in this chapter.

I Michael Lampert of Al's Automotive and Truck support House Bill 1195. I believe this is very important to our industry. We are asked daily by law enforcement to remove commercial vehicles from our roads that are damaged from accidents, broken down, or put out of service for mechanical defects. These vehicles operate at the max weight and length by themselves, and then when hooked to a tow truck we are overweight and over length. There is no reasonable solution to this dilemma. Unloading a cement truck, garbage truck, or tractor trailer on the side of the road is impracticable and time consuming. Currently law enforcement looks the other way but this bill would protect us. At the present time 23 states have similar laws on their books and there is House Bill HR1451 being considered by the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee in Washington. Currently, the law as it is, does the following:

As proposed, the Bill is intended to do the following:

This bill exempts from the weight and size requirements in Chapter 265 of the Motor Vehicle Code, damaged, disabled, or abandoned vehicles being towed by a tow truck. Section 1 exempts them from the height, width and length requirements and Section 2 exempts the total weight of the tow truck and the towed vehicle from the maximum total gross weight restrictions.

We can understand that it would be very difficult for certain types of commercial vehicles such as tractor/trailer combinations that were disabled, damaged, or abandoned to be removed from the highways if the total overall length of the units could not exceed the maximum length of a single tractor/trailer combination. However, we have a concern with this bill because it does away with any length requirement whatsoever for such a combination of wrecker and towed vehicle or vehicles, and we would like to see the bill amended to put in place a reasonable length limit.

Currently a single unit vehicle such as a tow truck is limited to 45 feet in length. A

tractor-trailer unit is limited to 53 feet. 53+45 feet is 98 feet. Most generally vehicles such as this are towed in what is called a saddle mount, where the front wheels of the towed vehicle are resting on the back of the tow truck. The current law for a saddle mount plus full mount combination of two vehicles plus the towed vehicle is 65 feet. We feel it would be dangerous for a single vehicle to tow a double tractor/trailer unit, and would never recommend such an operation. We also are concerned that the bill as written might become a way to avoid registering certain construction equipment by towing it and claiming it is "disabled or damaged." Further, we do not see any reason to exempt towed vehicles from the maximum width or maximum height restrictions. Allowing vehicles of any width could cause hazardous conditions for people meeting them on narrow roads, and a total exemption from the height requirements could result in taking down telephone wires, damage to highway overpasses, etc.

We suggest that section 1 of the bill be amended to read as follows:

266:13-c Exception for Vehicles Being Towed.

I. Notwithstanding other provisions of this subsection, the following size restrictions shall apply to tow trucks and towed vehicles:

I.a. When any portion of the weight of the disabled unit rests upon the tow truck, the weight must not exceed 600 pounds per square inch of tire up to 23;2500 pounds per single axle, or 43,000 pounds per tandem axle set, or the weight allowed for axle groups per the formula in RSA 266:18 on the interstate system or RSA 266:18-a on the non-interstate and general highway system, and the tow truck steering axle must carry sufficient weight to maintain safe operation.

II.b. No disabled unit including load shall exceed 13 feet 6 inches in height and 102 inches in width unless being towed under a special permit allowing a greater height or width or where an accident or collision has caused a disfigurement of the disabled unit resulting in a width greater than 102 inches but not exceeding 120 inches in width and the disabled unit in the daytime carries warning flags indicating its maximum width or during the hours of darkness the maximum width is indicated by lighted clearance lamps that comply with the Code of Federal Regulations. Rear view mirrors may extend to a point not in excess of that which affords the driver of the tow truck a view of the rear along both sides of the vehicle in conformance with Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standard 111 (49 CFR 571.111). The combined overall length of the tow truck and disabled, damaged, or abandoned vehicles in tow-shall not exceed 98 feet.

III.c. The overall length of a single unit tow truck shall not exceed 43 feet and the length of the disabled unit shall not exceed the maximum length for such unit allowed in this subdivision or as allowed by a special permit.

IV.d. The towing of a tractor truck and semi-trailer or full trailer, or a straight truck

and full trailer combination is only authorized during an emergent situation where directed by a law enforcement officer or the department of transportation to move the disabled combination to the nearest safe location off the highway.

V.e. Exceptions to the limits provided in this section shall be considered on an individual basis by special permit, after the disabled unit has been moved to the nearest safe location.

VI.f. When being moved during the hours of darkness the towing vehicle and towed vehicles shall be subject to the lighting and reflector requirements in this chapter.

We have no objection to the exemption from the total gross weight requirement.
