TESTIMONY

Rep. Warren Groen - Prime sponsor. Speaks to benefit of raw milk. Raw milk can keep for 2-3 weeks. Farmers can get 4.00 gal. or more by selling raw milk from the farm. Increase income for state? Not necessarily... only 5 licensed producer-distributors. FISCAL NOTE \$10,000? That is number that Dept. of Ag. Uses but actual number now is \$1,600. 3 cows - 20 gallons a day approximately. About 50 farmers sell only raw milk. If not licensed, farmer does not test milk. If not licensed not possible to sell at farmer markets or stores.

Christopher Connolly, Connolly Bros. Dairy Farm — Opposes bill. Licensed raw milk retailer. Sell 75-100 gallon raw milk per day from the farm. Licensing fee is \$100.00 they can bottle up to 1,000 gallon per day with this license. Requirements for raw milk license — if use own bottles must wash and sanitize. If customer owns bottle it is their responsibility. State checks their milk once a month. Also tests milk in bottle. His milk is tested every other day by Hood when they pick up milk for processing. We need minimum standards for raw milk sales. One bad apple gives the whole raw milk industry a bad name. He has seen farms that are NOT clean and he worries about them selling more raw milk. Milk inspector inspects equipment — has to be up to standards, wear gloves when filling bottles, refrigerator commercial. Milk has to have a warning label. City health departments can disallow raw milk sales.

Walker Fetch – Supports the bill. Fetch Family Dairy Farm – Should be person's right to choose. If people come to your farm and it is dirty, they aren't going to buy your milk. The bacteria issue applies to any raw food i.e. tomatoes. Wants to be able to sell more raw milk at his farm stand. He is a commercial dairy farm and he has all the high tech equipment and the raw milk is a way to supplement their income. Buys sterile bottles and puts label on it.

Ruth Holmes – opposes bill. She and husband have raw milk license only. Milk 19 cows. They sell 140-150 gallons a week. The state tests our milk and looks over the farm once a month and it costs \$25.00 and they are there when we have a problem. With local movement, we have people jumping in to be a dairy farmer and they don't know how to do it properly and without licensing we are all in jeopardy. If you only have one or two cows, easy to keep careful watch over your cows but with 19 cows difficult to keep track.

Chance Anderson - Supports the bill. I drink raw milk and want to make it possible for farmers to still sell raw milk.

Alan Bartlett – Supports bill. Discusses how healthy raw milk is for children and babies in his experience with his kids and friends. He sees no value in putting a number on the amount gallons of milk sold.

Steve Almond, Hidden Wonders Farm in Canterbury – Supports bill. They have always been under 5 gallon limit so are not inspected. They had inspector come up and go through information to decide whether worth growing farm and getting licensed and they did not choose to do it.

Sheldon Sawyer, Former representative, Dairy farmer. Supports the bill. Nothing wrong with raw milk the question is 20 quarts or 80 quarts. Are we increasing risk when we go from 20 to 80 quarts? 20 quarts is one Jersey cow's milk.

Rob Johnson from Farm Bureau doesn't testify but he states that farm bureau supports bill.



There's little mention in the mainstream media these days, of traditional foods having healing properties. Sure, there's a ton of hype touting unfermented soy products, vegetable oils and supplements as modern saviors, but in reality, these items have risk-to-benefit ratios like many drugs do (1).

Few people are aware that clean, raw milk from grass-fed cows was actually used as a medicine in the



early part of the last century (2)(3). That's right. Milk straight from the udder, a sort of "stem cell" of foods, was used as medicine to treat, and frequently *cure* some serious chronic diseases (4). From the time of Hippocrates to until just after World War II, this "white blood" nourished and healed uncounted millions.

Clean raw milk from pastured cows is a complete and properly balanced food. You could live on it exclusively if you had to. Indeed, published accounts exist of people who have done just that (5)(6). What's in it that makes it so great? Let's look at the ingredients to see what makes it such a powerful food (7).

Proteins

Our bodies use amino acids as building blocks for protein. Depending on who you ask, we need 20-22 of them for this task. Eight of them are considered essential, in that we have to get them from our food. The remaining 12-14 we can make from the first eight via complex metabolic pathways in our cells.

Raw cow's milk has all 8 essential amino acids in varying amounts, depending on stage of lactation (8). About 80% of the proteins in milk are caseins- reasonably heat stable and, for most, easy to digest. The remaining 20% or so are classed as whey proteins, many of which have important physiological effects (bioactivity) (9). Also easy to digest, but very heat-sensitive (10), these include key enzymes (11) (specialized proteins) and enzyme inhibitors, immunoglobulins (antibodies) (12), metal-binding proteins, vitamin binding proteins and several growth factors.

Current research is now focusing on fragments of protein (peptide segments) hidden in casein molecules that exhibit anti-microbial activity (13).

<u>Lactoferrin</u> (14), an iron-binding protein, has numerous beneficial properties including (as you might guess) improved absorption and assimilation of iron, anti-cancer properties and anti-microbial action against several species of bacteria responsible for dental cavities (15). Recent studies also reveal that it has powerful antiviral properties as well (16).

Two other players in raw milk's antibiotic protein/enzyme arsenal are lysozyme and
