- 1 Improper Use of Evidence of Registration or Title. Amend RSA 261:61, I-II to read as follows:

No person shall lend to another any certificate of title, registration certificate, number plate, temporary permit, or other permit issued to him or her if the person desiring to borrow the same would not be entitled to the use thereof, nor shall any person knowingly permit the use of any of the same by one not entitled thereto, nor shall any person display upon a vehicle any registration certificate, number plate, or permit assigned by the director or authority of any other jurisdiction not issued to such vehicle or otherwise lawfully used under this chapter, or knowingly obscure or permit to be obscured so that they become unreadable the figures or letters on any number plate attached to any motor vehicle.

Any person who knowingly attaches or permits to be attached to a vehicle a number plate assigned by the department, or authority of any other jurisdiction, to another vehicle or who knowingly obscures or permits to be obscured so that they become unreadable the figures or letters on any number plate attached to any vehicle or who knowingly and deliberately fails to display on a vehicle the number plates and the registration number duly issued therefor shall be guilty of a violation.
- II. The fine for a violation of this section shall be \$150. For a first offense involving obscured figures or letters other than the plate number and numbered decals, the fine shall be waived if the person removes the obstruction within 10 days of the offense.

Testimony

Dear Transportation Committee Member:

I know many of you wanted to know the outcome of my son's court date last week as it relates to the license plate issue. Please also understand that this bill, while brought forward when the issue became apparent to me, is NOT about my son but about the tens of thousands of our citizens who are now vulnerable to over zealous interpretation of this law.

The judge conceded in court that the law is a very gray area. That the work "obscured" is not defined in law. When I mentioned the legislation before you, the judge said "perhaps it would be good for the court to have clarity on this issue; you have every right to move forward". This was when he asked if I was happy with his resolution to the issue---which I said I was but that I intended to pursue it to protect others.

I would also like you to know that the officer testified that my son was very cordial during the stop. But he also objected to my going to the table with my son (all other people were allowed to have someone with them---friends, parents, etc), he objected to me being a witness, he objected to me giving the pictures of other tag problems, and he objected to me outlining the legislative history of the statute. The judge over-ruled him on all but the tag pictures.

I would also like to point out to you that in 1957 the subchapter title of this section (168:1) was "INTENT TO CONCEAL IDENTITY". The laws of 1942 chapter 118 listed under "procedure" section 24 says "Except as herein otherwise provided, a complaint against a person for the violation of any provision of this title may be placed on file at the discretion of the court, if the violation appears to have been unintentional, OR if no person or property could have been endangered thereby. THIS SHOWS clear legislative intent that there was no intent to capture people who were not trying to "conceal their identity". This chapter was later rolled into 262 and the word "knowingly" added..... I believe a further indication of actual intent to conceal identity.

The final resolution, since my son said he had placed the surround he bought at Wal-Mart on the tag five years ago, the judge found him "guilty" since he knowingly put it on. He then said that ,as I pointed out, he could place it on file as the 1922 statute points out, which is what he did. It will sit there for one year and unless he covers his tag again (he no longer owns the care) or commits a "MAJOR" traffic moving violation—it will go away as if it never existed, no fine. In a way, this was the wisest for the court because something placed on file can not be appealed.

From the NH Supreme Court "We are the final arbiters of the legislative intent as expressed in the words of the statute considered as a whole. We begin by examining the language of the statute, and ascribe the Plain and ordinary meaning to the words used. We interpret legislative intent from the statute as written and will neither consider what the legislature might have said nor add language the legislature did not see fit to include. We also interpret a statute in the context of the overall statutory scheme and not in isolation. If a statute is ambiguous, however, we consider legislative history to aid our analysis. Our goal is to apply statues in light of the legislature's intended in enacting them, and in light of the policy sought to be advanced by the entire statutory scheme. (NH v Lamy)

I hope you will simply have the DOS draft amendment done at Leg Services and amend my bill and pass it. Thank you for your attention to this problem. While their language does not "FIX" the problem, it certainly takes away the financial incentive for over zealous officers to write \$150 tickets on something unintentional.

Currently, the law as it is, does the following:

As proposed, the Bill is intended to do the following:

This bill modifies the penalties for obscuring figures or letters on number plates attached to motor vehicles.

The present law prohibits knowingly obscuring or permitting to be obscured the figures of letters on any number plate attached to a motor vehicle, and establishes a fine of \$150 for any violation of this statute. HB 1498 seeks to amend this by stating that the figures and letters on a plate are only considered to be obscured if they are "unreadable" and states that the fine shall be waived if the obstruction is only to the figures or letters other than the plate number and numbered decals, and the person removes the obstruction within 10 days of the offense. The prohibition appears in two places in the Motor Vehicle Code, RSA 261:61, improper use; and RSA 261:176, failure to display plates, and HB 1498 would amend both places.

It is important to law enforcement and the victims of crimes that license plates on vehicles be easily readable from ordinary distances. Having the validation decal readable is important for enforcing the periodic registration requirements and ensuring that the

State receives the money it is due from registrations. Persons out to commit a crime such as a bank robbery, a child abduction or a string of burglaries frequently deliberately smear mud or make some other attempt to obscure the plate to avoid detection by witnesses.

The Department of Safety is not opposed to this bill, provided a slight amendment is made to the text. The bill leaves the present prohibitions and penalties in place for switching plates on vehicles (misuse of plates), obscuring the plate number or the validation decals, and in the case of someone who has something such as a license plate holder or an E-Z Pass transponder in such a way that it covers up "New Hampshire" or the plate type, such as Veteran, Handicap, Commercial, etc., it gives them a chance to rectify the problem within 10 days to avoid a fine. This is not unreasonable, in our view.

We would prefer that instead of the language that says the plate must be "unreadable" before the statute is violated, we suggest using the term "more difficult to read". The other problem with the bill as written is that there is no way to ensure that the individual has in fact rectified the problem, and we recommend requiring them to bring the vehicle to a state, county or local police officer and having that officer check the vehicle and sign a paper indicating that the problem was rectified. Forms for this purpose can be made available by the Department of Safety to law enforcement and available on line to motorists. Finally, as a housekeeping measure in line with the recommendations of the Legislatives Commission studying the state's fine structure we recommend inserting after the amount of the fine the words, "plus penalty assessment" to be consistent with RSA 188-F. With those amendments, we are in support of the bill.

Since we believe adding these to the bill would not violate the sponsor's intent of giving someone a chance to rectify the problem rather than paying a fine, we suggest the following:
