II. Changes the limitations on a candidate designating a name to be placed on the ballot.

III. Establishes a citizen-funded election task force.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

AN ACT relative to the procedure for listing candidates on election ballots and establishing a citizen-funded election task force.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1 1 Municipal Elections; City Charters; Preparation of Ballots. Amend RSA 49-C:6 to read as 2 follows:

49-C:6 Preparation of Ballots. The city clerk shall prepare the ballots to be used at the 3 municipal elections. Under charters providing for election by the Australian ballot system, the 4 ballots shall be prepared in accordance with the procedure provided for in general election laws 56 governing such system. Under charters providing for non-partisan elections, the ballot shall contain $\overline{7}$ the names in alphabetical order by surname according to the alphabetization and rotation 8 procedure established in RSA 656:5-a, with the city clerk acting in lieu of the secretary of 9 state, without party designation, of all who file with the city clerk as candidates for elective office. 10 In the alternative, the charter may provide for a random selection of the order of names on the ballot 11 or the city clerk may follow an alphabetization and rotation procedure specified by the 12secretary of state pursuant to RSA 656:5-a. The charter shall specify a filing period, the filing fee 13 to be paid for each office, and, as an alternative method of becoming a candidate on the ballot, the number of qualified voters which may be subscribed to a nominating petition in such form as the 14 15 charter may set out.

2 Nominations for Special State Elections; Order of Names on Ballot. Amend RSA 655:81, IX to
 read as follows:

18 IX. The names of all candidates for a party nomination at a special election primary shall be 19 printed in alphabetical order on the ballot [, and the same ballot listing shall be used at all polling 20 places where the special primary election is held] according to the alphabetization and rotation 21 procedure established in RSA 656:5-a; and

3 Preparation of State General Election Voting Materials; Party Columns. Amend RSA 656:5 to
 read as follows:

656:5 Party Columns. The names of all candidates nominated in accordance with the election laws shall be arranged upon the state general election ballot in successive party columns. Each separate column shall contain the names of the candidates of one party; except that, if only a part of a full list of candidates is nominated by a political party, 2 or more such lists may be arranged whenever practicable in the same column. The party columns that list the names of candidates for offices that elect more than one person shall stagger the names of the candidates so that they do not

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1 line up evenly in a horizontal direction. The left-most column shall begin one line below the column 2 to its right. The secretary of state shall determine the vertical location of any additional columns 3 that may appear on the ballot. The position of party columns shall be rotated on the ballots used so that each party column shall appear thereon, to the extent practicable, an 4 5 approximately equal number of times in the first, last, and each intermediate column position across the state, without requiring more than one unique column order or ballot 6 format for each town and city ward. The secretary of state shall develop a column rotation 78 order plan for each general election starting with a reasonably balanced rotation across. 9 each state representative district consisting of more than one town or ward. Only after 10 establishing a party column rotation order for all towns and wards shall the secretary of 11 state publicly select by lot the actual party column to be positioned in the first column and 12each subsequent column in the first rotation order. Such public selection shall be held after the close of the filing period for the state primary as specified in RSA 655:14 and after 13 14 giving at least 3 days written notice of the date, time, and location of such selection to the 15 governor, the state chairmen of the parties, the speaker of the house of representatives, the president of the senate, and the minority leaders of both houses of the general court. 16

17 4 New Section; Preparation of State General Election Voting Materials; Order of Candidate
 18 Names on Ballots. Amend RSA 656 by inserting after section 5 the following new section:

19 656:5-a Order of Candidate Names on Ballots. Whenever there are 2 or more candidates for the 20 same office whose names will appear within the same column or list on a ballot, the names of such 21 candidates shall be rotated on the ballots used so that each name shall appear thereon, to the extent 22 practicable, an equal number of times at or near the top, at or near the bottom, and in each 23 intermediate position, if any, of the list in which it belongs, without requiring more than one unique name order or ballot format for each town and city ward. The secretary of state shall randomly 24 25 select one candidate's name to appear at the top of each such list for the first name order rotation. Other candidates' names shall be arranged to follow in alphabetical order of their surnames with the 26 letter "a" following "z." The random selection of a candidate's name to go first in the first name order 27 rotation, which may be the only name order if there is only one unique ballot format for the office, 28 shall be made by lot or by another procedure in which each candidate has an equal probability of 29 30 being chosen first. Such random selection of names, and establishment of a random selection 31 procedure for the ordering of lists of names on ballots to be in effect until the next selection, shall be 32 done publicly and after the close of the filing period for the state primary as specified in RSA 655:14 and after giving at least 3 days written notice of the date, time, and location of such selection to the 33 34 governor, the state chairmen of the parties, the speaker of the house of representatives, the president of the senate, and the minority leaders of both houses of the general court. 35

36 5 Primary Election Voting Materials; Order of Names. Amend RSA 656:24 to read as follows:

37 656:24 Order of Names. With the exception of the office of state representative, whenever there

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are 2 or more candidates for nomination to the same office, the names of such candidates shall be alternated on the state primary election ballots used so that each name shall appear thereon as nearly as may be an equal number of times at the top, at the bottom, and in each intermediate place, if any, of the list in which it belongs. Names of candidates for nomination to the office of state representative shall be arranged in the alphabetical order of their surnames according to the alphabetization and rotation procedure established in RSA 656:5-a.

6 Presidential Primary Election Voting Materials; Order of Names. Amend RSA 656:32 to read
8 as follows:

9 656:32 Other Provisions. The provisions of RSA 656:24-656:28 relating to state primary election 10 ballots shall apply to presidential primary ballots, except that candidates on the presidential 11 primary ballot shall be listed in the alphabetical order of their surnames *according to the* 12 alphabetization and rotation procedure established in RSA 656:5-a.

7 Constitutional Convention Ballots; Form. Amend RSA 667:12 to read as follows:

667:12 Form. Every ballot for the election shall contain the name and domicile of each 14 candidate who has filed a declaration of candidacy for delegate. The names of candidates upon the 15 ballot shall be arranged in perpendicular columns under the title "For Delegate to the Constitutional 16 Convention." Below the title shall be printed in easily legible type the words "Vote for" followed by a 17 spelled number designating the number of persons to be elected to such office. At the right of the 18 name of each candidate and on the same line, there shall be a square. Following the names there 19 shall be as many blank lines as there are persons to be elected. Whenever there are 2 or more $\mathbf{20}$ candidates, the names shall be printed upon the ballot in alphabetical order of their surnames $\mathbf{21}$ according to the alphabetization and rotation procedure established in RSA 656:5-a. $\mathbf{22}$

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8 Town Elections; Official Ballot; Voting Materials. Amend RSA 669:23 to read as follows:

669:23 Preparation of Voting Materials. The town clerk shall prepare the official ballots for the 24 town and shall arrange the names of candidates upon said ballots in parallel columns. Immediately 25above the names of each block of candidates shall be printed the title of the office for which they are 26 candidates, such as "For Selectman." Below the title of each office shall be printed in small but 27easily legible type the words "Vote for not more than (here insert a number designating how many 28 persons are to be voted for)." Directly to the right of the name of each candidate there shall be a 29 square. Whenever there are 2 or more candidates for the same office the names shall be printed 30 upon the ballot in the alphabetical order of their surnames according to the alphabetization 31 procedure established in RSA 656:5-a, with the town clerk acting in lieu of the secretary of 32 state. In the alternative, the town clerk may follow an alphabetization procedure specified 33 by the secretary of state pursuant to RSA 656:5-a, or the governing body may provide for a 34 random selection of the order of names on the ballot. 3 I. Every candidate for state or federal office who intends to have his or her name printed 4 upon the ballot of any party for a primary shall designate in the declaration of candidacy, or on the 5 primary petitions and assents to candidacy, the form in which the candidate's name shall be printed 6 on the ballot. [The candidate may designate his or her given, first, and middle name, the initials of 7 hie or her given, first, and middle name, a nickname, or any combination thereof as the form in which the candidate's name-shall be printed-on the ballot, but the candidate shall not designate a 8 9 deceptive-name .- If the candidate-designates a nickname-in-place of or in-combination with the 10 candidate's given name or the initials thereof, the nickname shall be set off with quotation marks 11 and shall be placed immediately before his or her surname. If the candidate designates a nickname, 12the nickname shall be customarily related to the candidate's given name, or, if the nickname is not eustomarily related to the candidate's given name, the candidate shall submit clear and convincing 13 evidence that the candidate has been known by the nickname for at least the 5 years immediately 14 preceding the time of filing. If deemed sufficient by the appropriate official, 3 affidavits from voters 15 16 in-the district who are not related to the candidate stating that the candidate has been known by the 17 niekname for at least 5 years may constitute clear and convincing evidence. Nieknames shall be limited to one word, except for 2 word nicknames customarily-related to the candidate's given name.] 18 19 The designated name may include the candidate's given name or a shortened form of the candidate's given name or a one-word nickname customarily related to the candidate, and 20 21by which the candidate is commonly recognized. The designated name may also include an 22 initial for the first or middle name, or both. No candidate may designate a nickname that 23 implies that the candidate is some other person, that constitutes a slogan or otherwise associates the 24 candidate with a cause or issue, [or] that has an offensive or profane meaning[-], or that creates a perception of a professional or vocational affiliation, such as "Doc" or "Coach." A candidate 2526 shall include his or her surname in the designation of the form in which the candidate's name shall $\mathbf{27}$ be printed on the ballot.

 $\mathbf{28}$ II. Every candidate for state or federal office who intends to have his or her name placed on the ballot for the state general election by means other than nomination by party primary shall 29 30 designate in the declaration of intent the form in which the candidate's name shall be printed on the 31 ballot. [The candidate may designate his or her given, first, and middle name, the initials of his or 32 her given, first, and middle name, a nickname, or any combination thereof as the form in which the candidate's name shall-be printed on the ballot, but the candidate shall not designate a deceptive 33 34 name. If the candidate designates a nickname in-place of or in-combination with the candidate's given-name or the initials thereof, the nickname shall be set off with quotation marks and shall be 35 36 placed immediately before his or her surname. If the candidate designates a nickname, the 37 nickname-shall be-customarily related to the-candidate's given name, or, if the nickname is not

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customarily related to the candidate's given name, the candidate shall submit clear and convincing 1 evidence that the candidate has been known by the nickname for at least the 5 years immediately 2 preceding the time of filing. A candidate 13shall include his or her surname in the designation of the form in which the candidate's name shall 14 be printed on the ballot. 15 10 Citizen-Funded Election Task Force. 16 I. There is established a citizen-funded election task force. The members of the task force 1718 shall be as follows: (a) One member of the senate, appointed by the president of the senate. 19 (b) Three members of the house of representatives, appointed by the speaker of the 20 $\mathbf{21}$ house of representatives. (c) Two members representing organizations supporting public financing of campaigns, 22appointed jointly by the president of the senate and the speaker of the house of representatives. $\mathbf{23}$ (d) One member who served on the commission to study the feasibility of public funding 24 of state election campaigns established by 2008, 55, appointed jointly by the president of the senate 25and the speaker of the house of representatives. 26 II. Legislative members of the task force shall receive mileage at the legislative rate when 27 attending to the duties of the task force. 28 29 III. The task force shall: (a) Review the report of the commission to study the feasibility of public funding of state 30 election campaigns established by 2008, 55, and develop a detailed plan, including proposals for 31 specific legislation, to implement the recommendations of the report. 32 (b) Solicit input from senators, representatives, the governor, executive councilors, the 33 attorney general, the secretary of state, and any other persons deemed appropriate by the task force. 34 (c) Hold public hearings at times and at locations around the state that are likely to 35 elicit substantive input from the general public. 36 (d) Make the schedule and minutes of meetings of the task force, and all testimony and $\mathbf{37}$

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1 materials presented to the task force, available to the public on a website.

IV. The members of the task force shall elect a chairperson from among the members. The first meeting of the task force shall be called by the first-named senate member. The first meeting of the task force shall be held within 60 days of the effective date of this section. Four members of the task force shall constitute a quorum.

6 V. The task force shall submit an initial report on or before November 16, 2009 and a final 7 report on or before November' 15, 2010 of its findings and any recommendations for proposed 8 legislation to the president of the senate, the speaker of the house of representatives, the senate 9 clerk, the house clerk, the chairmen of the senate election law and veterans' affairs committee, the 10 chairmen of the house election law committee, the governor, and the state library.

11 11 Effective Date.

12 I. Sections 1-8 of this act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.

13 II. The remainder of this act shall take effect upon its passage.

SB 157 FISCAL NOTE

AN ACT relative to the procedure for listing candidates on election ballots and establishing a citizen-funded election task force.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The Secretary of State states this bill <u>as amended by the Senate (Amendment #2009-1002s)</u> will increase state expenditures by \$102,380 in FY 2010, \$131,900 in FY 2011, \$61,760 in FY 2012, and \$43,900 in FY 2013. There will be no fiscal impact on state, county and local revenue or county and local expenditures.

METHODOLOGY:

This bill establishes a procedure for the random drawing of a candidate's name for the ordering of names on election ballots, requires the rotation of candidate names and party columns on the ballots, changes the limitations on a candidate designating a name to be placed on the ballot, and establishes a citizen-funded election task force. The Secretary of State claims this bill would require the use of additional name order rotations and additional party column rotations in determining the order of names on state, local, and presidential primary ballots. The Secretary states the proposed legislation will increase the complexity of designing and organizing the ballot and will require automation of ballot design and configuration with a computerized election management system, which will mean startup costs of \$100,000 per year in FY 2010 and FY 2011, and \$12,000 per year thereafter for ongoing maintenance. The Secretary also states the assistance of a part-time Program Assistant I will be needed to help ensure the accuracy of the ballots at various stages of production. The Secretary states the proposed legislation will also require increased staff time for the programming of the AVS accessible voting system, at a cost of \$10,000 per election. Additionally, the Secretary claims the reinstatement of the name order rotation on the presidential primary ballot in calendar year 2012 will increase state expenditures in FY 2012 by an additional \$35,000. The total increase in state expenditures associated with the implementation of the proposed legislation is as follows:

Every candidate for state or federal office who intends to have his or her name placed on 29 the ballot for the state general election by means other than nomination by party primary shall 30 designate in the declaration of intent the form in which the candidate's name shall be printed on the 31 ballot. [The candidate may designate his or her given, first, and middle name, the initials of his or 32her given, first, and middle name, a nickname, or any combination thereof as the form in which the 33 eandidate's name shall be printed on the ballot, but the candidate shall not designate a deceptive 34 name. If the candidate designates a nickname in place of or in combination with the candidate's 35 given name or the initials thereof, the nickname shall be set off with quotation marks and shall-be 36 placed immediately before his or her surname. If the candidate designates a nickname, the 37

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nickname shall be customarily related to the candidate's given name, or, if the nickname is not 1 customarily related to the candidate's given name, the candidate shall submit clear and convincing 2 evidence-that the candidate has been known by the nickname for at least-the 5-years immediately 3 preceding the time of filing.-If deemed sufficient by the appropriate official, 3 affidavits from voters 4 in the district who are not related to the candidate stating that the candidate has been known by the 5 niekname for at-least-5-years may constitute-clear-and convincing evidence. Nieknames shall be 6 limited to one word, except for 2-word nicknames customarily related to the candidate's given name.] 7 The designated name may include the candidate's given name or a shortened form of the 8 candidate's given name or a one-word nickname customarily related to the candidate, and 9 by which the candidate is commonly recognized. The designated name may also include an 10 initial for the first or middle name, or both. No candidate may designate a nickname that 11 implies that the candidate is some other person, that constitutes a slogan or otherwise associates the 12candidate with a cause or issue, [or] that has an offensive or profane meaning[-], or that creates a 13 perception of a professional or vocational affiliation, such as "Doc" or "Coach." A candidate 14 shall include his or her surname in the designation of the form in which the candidate's name shall 15 be printed on the ballot. 16

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8 Election Fund. Amend RSA 5:6-d, III to read as follows:

18 III. The secretary of state is authorized to accept, budget, and, subject to the limitations of 19 this paragraph, expend monies in the election fund received from any party for the purposes of 20 conducting elections, voter and election official education, the purchase or lease of voting equipment 21 which complies with Help America Vote Act of 2002, Public Law 107-252, election law enforcement, 22 and improvements to related information technology, *including acquisition and operation of an*

23 automated election management system.

9 Rotation of Party Columns; 2010 General Election. Immediately following the filing deadline $\mathbf{24}$ for nomination papers for the 2010 general election pursuant to RSA 655:43, the secretary of state or 25designee shall publicly select by lot the actual party columns to be positioned on the 2010 general $\mathbf{26}$ election ballot according to the generic column rotation plan established in this section. The first $\mathbf{27}$ actual party column drawn by lot shall occupy all positions corresponding to the generic party 28 column "1" designation; the second actual party column drawn by lot shall occupy all positions 29 corresponding to the generic party column "2" designation and so forth until all actual party columns 30 31are assigned positions on all ballots. If more party columns are required, the secretary of state shall 32 establish such generic party column.

SB 157 FISCAL NOTE

AN ACT relative to the procedure for listing candidates on election ballots and establishing a citizen-funded election task force.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The Secretary of State states this bill <u>as amended by the Senate (Amendment #2009-1002s)</u> will increase state expenditures by \$102,380 in FY 2010, \$131,900 in FY 2011, \$61,760 in FY 2012, and \$43,900 in FY 2013. There will be no fiscal impact on state, county and local revenue or county and local expenditures.

METHODOLOGY:

This bill establishes a procedure for the random drawing of a candidate's name for the ordering of names on election ballots, requires the rotation of candidate names and party columns on the ballots, changes the limitations on a candidate designating a name to be placed on the ballot, and establishes a citizen-funded election task force. The Secretary of State claims this bill would require the use of additional name order rotations and additional party column rotations in determining the order of names on state, local, and presidential primary ballots. The Secretary states the proposed legislation will increase the complexity of designing and organizing the ballot and will require automation of ballot design and configuration with a computerized election management system, which will mean startup costs of \$100,000 per year in FY 2010 and FY 2011, and \$12,000 per year thereafter for ongoing maintenance. The Secretary also states the assistance of a part-time Program Assistant I will be needed to help ensure the accuracy of the ballots at various stages of production. The Secretary states the proposed legislation will also require increased staff time for the programming of the AVS accessible voting system, at a cost of \$10,000 per election. Additionally, the Secretary claims the reinstatement of the name order rotation on the presidential primary ballot in calendar year 2012 will increase state expenditures in FY 2012 by an additional \$35,000. The total increase in state expenditures associated with the implementation of the proposed legislation is as follows:

SB 157 FISCAL NOTE

AN ACT relative to the procedure for listing candidates on election ballots.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The Department of State states this bill, <u>as amended by the House (Amendment # 2009-2539h)</u>, will increase state restricted expenditures by \$20,000 in FY 2011 and in FY 2013. There is no fiscal impact on state, county, and local revenue or on county and local expenditures.

METHODOLOGY:

The Department of State states this bill requires the use of additional name order rotations and party column rotations in determining the order of names on state and local ballots. The Department assumes this bill will increase the amount of ballot proof reading and the amount of staff time to program and proof the AVS accessible voting system. The Department estimates the cost of the increased ballot proofreading can be absorbed in its current operating budget, however it also assumes the additional staff time to program and proof the AVS accessible voting system will require the hiring of part-time staff for about \$10,000 for each primary and general election. This translates to increased expenditures of \$20,000 per election year. The Department states this increase in expenditures would be eligible to be covered by federal HAVA funds. The Department also states this bill, in conjunction with other recently passed legislation, is moving the Department towards the acquisition of a computerized election management system, with an implementation date in 2016. The Department states it is still too early to predict the cost of such a system, or if federal funds would be available to pay for it.

The New Hampshire Municipal Association could not identify a local impact as a result of this bill.

If the number of party columns expected on the general election ballot changes 21such that one or more additional generic column rotation plans are needed, the secretary $\mathbf{22}$ of state shall, from time to time, prepare such additional plans as are needed for any 23 general election.

 $\mathbf{24}$ III. The generic column rotation plans shall start with a reasonably balanced 25rotation of party columns within and across all non-floterial state representative districts, 26 being the smallest representative district to which each voting place is apportioned pursuant to part I, article 11 of the New Hampshire constitution. 27This shall be accomplished by first sorting all of the non-floterial representative districts in descending 28 29 order from largest to smallest based on the number of voting places constituting each 30 district. Within each group of representative districts consisting of the same number of 31voting places, districts shall be arranged in descending order based on population according to the last decennial federal census. Then the voting places within each district 3233 shall be sorted by population in descending order, resulting in a list of all the voting places $\mathbf{34}$ in the state.

35 IV. The secretary of state shall assign whole numbers representing generic party 36 columns to each voting place for the first column position in that voting place by assigning 37 the number "1" to the largest voting place in the largest representative district with the

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most number of voting places. The number "2" shall be assigned to the largest voting place in the next largest district; the number "3" to the largest voting place in the next largest district and so forth up to the number of party columns expected, repeating the pattern through the largest voting place in the first district in the list that has fewer voting places than the number of party columns expected. Then the pattern of number assignments shall continue in sequence through each voting place in each district remaining on the list with fewer voting places than the number of party columns expected.

8 V. For each district consisting of a number voting places equal to the number of 9 party columns expected, the pattern of sequential number assignment begun in paragraph 10 IV shall be completed. For example, for a rotation plan expecting 4 columns, in a district 11 consisting of 4 voting places where the largest voting place was assigned the number "3" 12 pursuant to paragraph IV, the remaining voting places would be assigned, in sequence "4," 13 "1," and "2."

VI. For districts consisting of a number of voting places greater than the number of 14 party columns expected, the pattern of sequential number assignment begun in paragraph 15 IV shall be completed once up to the number of expected columns, then each remaining 16 voting place shall be assigned, in turn, the number already assigned to voting places 17 within each such district that have the least total population compared with voting places 18 with other number assignments, with the goal of more nearly equalizing the party column 19 20rotation within each such district. For example in a rotation plan for 3 party columns, in a district with 5 towns with the following populations, Town A = 2,400, Town B = 2,200, 21Town C = 2,000, Town D = 250, and Town E = 100, assuming Town A was assigned column 22"1" for the first column position, then Town B would be assigned "2;" Town C would be 23assigned "3;" Town D would be assigned "3;" and Town E would be assigned "2." Thus 24 party column "1" would appear first in voting places with a population of 2,400 (Town A); 25party column "2" would appear first in voting places with a total population of 2,300 26 (Towns B and E); and party column "3" would appear first in voting places with a total 27 $\mathbf{28}$ population of 2,250 (Towns C and D).

VII. After initially assigning all voting places a generic party column for the first $\mathbf{29}$ position on the ballot, the secretary of state shall examine the balance of party column 30 31 rotations in each state senate district. The secretary of state may make minor adjustments to the party column rotation plan established pursuant to paragraphs III through VI for 32any obvious, substantial, and avoidable imbalances in senate districts, such as districts 33 that have a number of voting places equal to or greater than the number of expected party 34 columns, but one or more generic party columns are not assigned the first position in any 35 such voting places. The aim of such minor adjustments should be to reduce the average 36 deviation of generic first column positions within all senate districts while also decreasing $\mathbf{37}$

the average deviation of first party column positions across the state as whole and
 maintaining a substantially comparable party column rotation balance within
 representative districts as initially established pursuant to paragraphs III through VI.

4 VIII. After finalizing the generic party column rotation plan for first column position pursuant to paragraphs III through VII, the secretary of state shall establish 5 subsequent column positions by alternating in sequence the remaining generic party 6 7 columns that follow. For example, if 3 party columns are expected, then for the first voting place assigned "1" as the first party column position, the second column position will go to 8 party "2" and the third position to party "3." However for the next voting place in the list 9 that is assigned "1" as the first party column position, the second column position will go 10 to party "3" and the third position to party "2." Likewise for the first voting place assigned 11 "2" as the first party column position, the second column position will go to party "3" and 12 the third position to party "I." He feels current law may not be constitutional.

*Sen. Fuller Clark, co sponsor. Spoke of primacy affect and Obama/Clinton primary results being so close in NH. Will submit written material. Spoke of citizen funded election task force and need for, in order to lower costs of elections. See line 16, page 5. It would serve to extend work of HB 794 commission and would address shortcomings of that commission. Explained functioning of public funding, in general, in response to committee member's question. Free media coverage is one element of lower costs to candidate. New methods would allow more people to run for office. Objective of this bill is to continue work of previous commission, not to start over. She has no objection to increasing membership in task force. Says cost of task force to taxpayers would be mileage.

<u>Sen. Cilley</u>, co sponsor. Addresses primacy affect and supports this bill. Aids in constitutionality. Addressed use of nicknames – supports same. *David Scanlan, Dep. Sec. of State. Strongly supports inclusive language in bill. No position on task force. Ballots must be accurate to prevent future problems including recounts. Voters prefer candidates in alphabetical order. Voters also prefer color coding of ballot columns. Said recent court decision by Judge Conboy infers constitutionality of present ballot order. Says secretary of state does not want discretion in bill. Suggests bill be amended to dictate policy of secretary of state. Reference to handout provided. The League study in 1971 did not consider the escalating costs of a gubernatorial campaign. Now, the cost for a statewide campaign are so extensive, it requires significant effort to raise the funds and can take real time away from the role and responsibilities of the Governor.

New Hampshire residents expect our Governors to serve at least four years. Since 1941, New Hampshire has had 16 Governors, 3 who served for 6 years, 10 who served for 4 years and only 2 who served just one term. Governor Lynch is now in his third term.

In 1964 the legislature was given the power and responsibility to propose constitutional amendments to be placed as a referendum to voters. In 1970, 1981 and 1983 the legislature placed a constitutional amendment for a 4 year term for Governor on the ballot. Not only was the term of the Governor increased to 4 years but there was also a 2 term limit included in the proposed amendment. The proposed amendment gained increasing support in each of those elections. In 1983 the issue garnered 63.61% of the required 66% needed for passage.

It's time now for the voters to decide whether the Governor of New Hampshire should serve for a 4 year term. The League of Women Voters respectfully requests support for placing this issue in the capable hands of New Hampshire voters.

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The League of Women Voters of New Hampshire supports legislation only if it fits within stringent guidelines established after intensive study, research and then agreement by our members. In the late 1960's Leagues all over New Hampshire studied the structure of the New Hampshire state government. In 1971 the League developed a position that New Hampshire would be best served with a 4 year term for the Governor.

Forty eight states have 4 year terms for their Governors, only New Hampshire and Vermont have 2 year terms and it is again under consideration in the Vermont legislature. In this case, perhaps setting ourselves apart from other states does not lead to efficiency and effectiveness.

We believe that two years does not give the Governor enough opportunity to determine long term goals, identify long term problems and strategies to alleviate them, consider investments in New Hampshire's growth and development and then to implement long term solutions. Governors who want to serve more than two years tend not to take on major issues, preferring instead to maintain a status quo. The first year of a Governor's term is spent learning about the role and preparing the 2 year budget within 2 months of taking office. At the beginning of the second year, it's already time to initiate a campaign for re-election although some might argue that the re-election campaign has to start on inauguration day.

When Governor Lynch, upon winning his third term, wisely decided to hold a reception in the State House rather than an inaugural ball due to the economic crisis facing our state and nation, it again

"FUN" SHOOT BY WINTERS

4 New Section; Preparation of State General Election Voting Materials; Order of Candidate Names on Ballots.

Amend RSA 656 by inserting after section 5 the following new section:

656:5-a Order of Candidate Names on Ballots.

(I) Definitions:

"Seed number" means the number chosen in the following manner: On the Thursday following the expiration of the period for filing declarations of candidacy as provided in RSA 655:14, the secretary of state or designee shall hold a public drawing in the secretary of state's office to choose randomly a number greater than zero but less than one, carried to four decimal places. This seed number shall remain in effect for two years. The drawing shall be attended by the governor, the chairmen of the parties, the speaker of the house of representatives, the president of the senate, and the minority leaders of both houses of the general court, or their designees.

"Rotational number" means the greater of the following quotients, carried to four decimal places:

(i) One divided by the number of candidates in a district, or;

(ii) One divided by the number of towns and/or city wards in a district.

For example, if there are 8 candidates in a district with 3 city wards, the rotational number would be .3333, the greater of 1 divided by 8 (.1250) and 1 divided by $3_1(.3333)$

"Town number" means the temporary number assigned to a town or city ward in manner according to the method in (a), unless the number of candidates for an office is greater then the number of towns or city wards in the district, in which case the procdure in (b) shall be used.

(a) In each district, the secretary of state will organize the list of towns or city wards in ascending order based on the number of total registered voters and temporarily number them in ascending order. If any towns or city wards have the same number of registered voters, alphabetical order will determine the order of those towns or city wards. For example, in a district of five towns with the following totals of registered voters, A=150, B=120, C=130, D=200, and E=100, the secretary of state shall number them in the following order - E=1, B=2, C=3, A=4, D=5.

(b) In each district, the secretary of state shall divide the towns or city wards into as many groups as there are candidates, making each group as equal as possible in the total number of registered voters. The groups shall be numberd in ascending order based on the number of total registered voters, and each town or city ward within the group shall be assigned the number of the group. If any group of towns or city wards has the same number of registered voters, the group with the smallest town or city ward shall be numbered before the other. For example, when there are three candidates in a district of five towns with the following totals of registered voters, A=150, B=120, C=130, D=200, and E=100, the secretary of state shall group and number them as follows - D-1, B-2, C-2, A-3, E-3.

(II) Whenever there are 2 or more candidates for the same office whose names will appear within the same column or list on a ballot, the names of such candidates shall be rotated on the ballots used so that each name shall appear thereon, to the extent practicable, an equal number of times at or near the top, at or near the bottom, and in each intermediate position, if any, of the list in which it belongs, without requiring more than one unique name order or ballot format for each town and city ward.

(III). The first candidate on the ballot in each town or city ward shall be determined as follows: The candidates for each office shall be temporarily listed alphabetically according to their surnames within each party column and temporarily numbered in ascending order. The seed number shall be added to the product of the rotational number and the town number, and the digits to the right of the decimal place in this sum shall be multiplied by the number of candidates. If the product is not a whole number it shall be rounded up to the next whole number; the candidate who was temporarily assigned the same number shall be first on the ballot. The order of candidates shall follow alphabetically from the picked candidate's name forward to the candidate's name immediately preceding the candidate's name picked. For example, if the seed number .6789 is chosen in a district with 2 city wards and 3 candidates, alphabetization shall proceed as follows: In the ward with the least registered voters, (town number = 1) alphabetization shall proceed from the first candidate's name to the third candidate's name (.6789+(1 x .5) =1.1789, .1789 x 3 = .5367, rounded up to 1). In the ward with the next least registered voters, (town number =2) alphabetization shall begin with the third candidates's name, and then from the first candidate's name to the second candidate's name. (.6789 + (2 x .5) = .6789, .6789 x 3 = 2.0367, rounded up to three.)



Ballot Changes Cited in Vote's Discrepancy With Polls

Clinton's Favorable Placement on Ballots May Account for Part of Poll Mistakes

Without a doubt, a big source of the discrepancy between the pre-election surveys and the election outcome in New Hampshire is the order of candidates' names on the ballot and in the surveys.

Our analysis of all recent primaries in New Hampshire showed that there was always a big primacy effect \mathbb{E} big-name, big-vote-getting candidates got 3 percent or more votes more when listed first on the ballot than when listed last.

Until this year, New Hampshire rotated candidate name order from precinct to precinct, which allowed us to do that analysis.

This year, the secretary of state changed the procedure so the names were alphabetical starting with a randomly selected letter, in all precincts.

The randomly selected letter this year was Z.

As a result, Joe Biden was first on every ballot, Hillary Clinton was near the top of the list (and the first serious contender listed) and Barack Obama was close to last of the 21 candidates listed.

Thus, I'll bet that Clinton got at least 3 percent more votes than Obama simply because she was listed close to the top.

Most, if not all, of the pre-election telephone polls rotated name order from respondent to respondent, which meant name order did not distort their overall results. Failing to incorporate the name order effect that probably happened in the voting booth is therefore probably partly responsible for the polls' inaccuracy.

More importantly, if New Hampshire had rotated name order in the voting booth as it has always done in the past, the race would probably have been too close to call without a recount and might even have been an Obama victory.

In the Voting Booth, Bias Starts at the Top

PEOPLE who are first in line at a movie know they have the best chance of getting the seats they want. When students answer multiple-choice questions incorrectly, they usually choose one of the first options offered. When people taste-test four brands of beer, they tend to prefer the one they try first.

And so it is with voting. Candidates listed first on the ballot get about two percentage points more votes on average than they would have if they had been listed later (flipping a 49 to 51 defeat into a 51 to 49 victory). In fact, in about half the races I have studied, the advantage of first place is even bigger — certainly big enough to win some elections these days.

When do voters gravitate to the first name they see? Based on the more than 100 elections in Ohio that a colleague and I studied, it's when voters know little or nothing about the candidates, or when the candidates' party affiliations are not listed on the ballot, or when the incumbent (whom voters typically know at least somewhat) is not running for re-election. Thus, some voters apparently feel an obligation or desire to vote even when they have no basis for choosing a candidate and are drawn to the first name they read.

But even in well-publicized major national races, being listed first can help. Some people walk into the voting booth feeling ambivalent and in the end just grab the name on top so they can get out of the booth.

How do we know this? Well, consider this: In California's 80 Assembly districts, candidate name order is randomly assigned. In 1996, Bill Clinton's vote tally was 4 percentage points higher in the Assembly districts where he was listed first than in the ones where he was listed last — a difference that persisted even after we took into account pre-existing Democratic registration levels in the districts.

In 2000, George W. Bush's vote tally was 9 percentage points higher in the districts where he was listed first than in the districts where he was listed last — again, persisting with registration taken into account.

Of course, these issues are not confined to California. My research team spent a year reading statutes and contacting secretaries of state and county boards of elections to learn about their naming

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procedures. We found an array of idiosyncratic — and disturbing — rules governing the placement of names on the ballot.

In Florida, for instance, candidates from the governor's party get top billing, which is why in 2000 and 2004 George W. Bush was listed first on every ballot. (His brother, Jeb, was governor.) In Delaware and Tennessee, by contrast, Democrats always come first.

Some states — like Alabama and North Carolina — list candidates alphabetically by party (meaning that Democrats always precede Republicans); others, like Hawaii and Vermont, list candidates alphabetically by name. Massachusetts always puts incumbents first; others simply allow elections officials to list names in whatever order they please. (Surprise: research by Robert Darcy of Oklahoma State University shows that when given the choice, election officials tend to list their own party's candidates first.)

Perhaps the most endearing procedure is in Minnesota, where candidates from the party that received the fewest votes in the most recent election are listed first.

Thankfully, the question of bias and name placement on ballots is finally beginning to get the attention it deserves. In August, the Supreme Court of New Hampshire declared unconstitutional the state's procedure for listing first the names of candidates whose party had received the most votes in the preceding state general election.

Other states should solve this problem — particularly because an effective technique for name placement exists.

Ohio uses a system that is the model of fairness and accountability. Candidate names are rotated from precinct to precinct, so every candidate is listed first an equal number of times, and observers can inspect ballots on Election Day to be sure the rotation was done properly. Idaho, North Dakota, Wyoming and a few other states use versions of this system.

That's not to say that Ohio executes this system perfectly. For example, in 2004, with the permission of Secretary of State Kenneth Blackwell, a Republican, many Ohio counties ignored the rotation law and listed John Kerry last twice as often as the law allowed. And also with Mr. Blackwell's approval, Mahoning County's touch-screen voting machines supposedly rotated candidate name order from voter to voter.

For too long, the placement of names on ballots has been in the shadows. In fact, the government commissions formed since 2000 to improve election procedures barely mention candidate name order. And while it's too late to do anything about name placement for Tuesday's elections, we can eliminate this brand of bias in the 2008 elections.

We should acknowledge the wisdom of the New Hampshire Supreme Court and adopt the rotating name-ordering procedures throughout the country. When it comes to our ballots, and our elections, integrity has to come first on the list.

I'm Cathy Silber, representing the Coalition for Open Democracy, a group of organizations and individuals dedicated to strengthening democracy in New Hampshire. Our members include League of Women Voters of New Hampshire, New Hampshire Citizens Alliance, PACE: Public Action for Clean Elections, and many individuals across the state, including Doris Granny D Haddock--who is here with us now--former governor Walter Peterson, as well as many legislators. Altogether, our organizations represent about 12,000 people.

Coaliton for Open Democracy supports SB157 because making our ballots fair and constitutional will improve our democracy. The Citizen Funded Election Task Force in the amendment to SB157 will help move our state one step closer to campaign finance reforms that will help break the link between large campaign contributions and public policy, thus helping restore the electorate's faith in the integrity of our democracy.

Our coalition is convinced that because the primacy effect can and does change election outcomes, it is a priority problem that must be addressed in the manner SB157 proposes. Yet we also take the secretary of state's concerns about the bill very seriously. Two of us met with David Scanlan and Anthony Stevens for over an hour to hear and understand those concerns. We believe that none of them should be insurmountable, and can provide the committee with written testimony on these points if it would be useful.

As many of you know, Coalition for Open Democracy's priority issue has been public funding of state elections in New Hampshire. We all can imagine the benefits of a system of campaign financing that will enable any qualified candidate to run a competitive campaign for elected office, not just those with access to money. Voters get more choice, elections become contests of ideas not fundraising, and we get a wider diversity of talent and perspective at the policy table. Once elected, officials are accountable only to voters, not donors; no longer distracted from the people's business by the endless need to raise money, public servants can focus on the job they were elected to do.

Last year, HB794 established a bipartisan commission of public funding advocates to recommend a way for publicly funded elections to be implemented in our state. The public-private hybrid model recommended by the commission takes into account lessons learned in other states like Maine and Arizona, and improves upon their models by recognizing the democratic value of the latest advances in small dollar fundraising over the internet. For example, senate candidates who qualify for the program and agree to accept no contributions over \$25, and only from New Hampshire voters, would receive a limited amount of public matching funds, enough for an unknown candidate to run a competitive race. COD has spoken with many policymakers here in NH and this model is well-received because it limits the cost to the state, allows a role for people's contributions to the candidates they like, while taking the big money – the money that carries undue influence – out of politics.

We know there is broad and growing support, here in New Hampshire, and nationally, for such a system. A majority of our legislators claim to support it, the secretary of state strongly supports it, and the governor has shown some support. Three quarters of New Hampshire voters support public funding of elections. A new national poll shows that a vast majority of American voters from all political parties

see the connection between our broken campaign finance system and our current economic crisis--and see a hybrid public-private elections financing system as the solution. Nearly 3/4--76% of Democrats and 74% of Republicans--believe that campaign contributions to members of Congress were a major factor in the current financial crisis on Wall Street. Roughly 4 out of 5 voter see large campaign contributions as a roadblock to solving our most pressing economic issues. 67% of voters nationally support a solution just like the one recommended by the commission for New Hampshire. I'm happy to email anyone a copy of these poll results--pass around sheet for email.

Just a few months ago, I imagined I would be testifying here today in support of a pilot program of publicly funded elections for state senate races. With a very modest investment of \$400,000 a year, we'd be on the way to joining Maine, Arizona and Connecticut in getting big special interest money out of politics, and making votes, not dollars, the currency of our democracy. We'd be on the way to joining the many other states and cities that have some form of public funding or that are also working to establish it. Think Illinois. But then the recession hit and even the most ardent advocates of reform said we must wait.

Though not the pilot program we'd hoped for, creating this task force will be a solid step forward this year. The task force will take up where the commission left off. Unlike the commission, the task force includes legislators—in fact, a majority of legislators—who can translate policy recommendations into proposals for actual legislation. Unlike the commission, which operated last fall, when everyone—especially legislators—was concentrating on the election, the task force will be able to get necessary information and input from legislators, the secretary of state and the public. Having these conversations in meetings and public hearings around the state will result in a strong proposal for viable legislation, because all interested parties have contributed. The task force process will make this issue a real priority—which means not some utopian concept easy to support in principle, but a real system with real funding, working in our state by 2012.

It's time for this. It's past time. New Hampshire has been ready and waiting for this for over ten years. People want to believe in the integrity of the political process, but they know they have good reason not to. People are disgusted and disillusioned by the role of money in our politics and want change. This transcends partisan politics--one of the most telling findings of that new national poll is that, on question after question, only five points separate the views of Democrats, Republicans and Independents--and this up in the range of three quarters of the electorate. This is not a partisan issue. When 67% of voters nationally support public funding of elections, when more than 85% of the Maine legislature is elected this way, when the system is popular and working in other states, this was the year for New Hampshire to step up. Let's a least take a step in the right direction.

Finally, one quick note on the other bills you're hearing today. We support CACR9 for all the reasons mentioned, but especially because it will make public funding of gubernatorial elections more affordable and it night help place some divide between governing and fundraising. On SB116, we accept the fairness rationale, but note that there was surely a good reason for the ban it overturns, and that Citizen Funded Elections will help solve that problem.

I thank the members of this committee who have led the way on campaign finance reform, year-in and year-out, and urge your support for the Citizen Funded Election Task Force and for the ballot fairness measures in SB157.



SB 157 FISCAL NOTE

AN ACT relative to the procedure for listing candidates on election ballots and establishing a citizen-funded election task force.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The Secretary of State states this bill <u>as amended by the Senate (Amendment #2009-1002s)</u> will increase state expenditures by \$102,380 in FY 2010, \$131,900 in FY 2011, \$61,760 in FY 2012, and \$43,900 in FY 2013. There will be no fiscal impact on state, county and local revenue or county and local expenditures.

METHODOLOGY:

This bill establishes a procedure for the random drawing of a candidate's name for the ordering of names on election ballots, requires the rotation of candidate names and party columns on the ballots, changes the limitations on a candidate designating a name to be placed on the ballot, and establishes a citizen-funded election task force. The Secretary of State claims this bill would require the use of additional name order rotations and additional party column rotations in determining the order of names on state, local, and presidential primary ballots. The Secretary states the proposed legislation will increase the complexity of designing and organizing the ballot and will require automation of ballot design and configuration with a computerized election management system, which will mean startup costs of \$100,000 per year in FY 2010 and FY 2011, and \$12,000 per year thereafter for ongoing maintenance. The Secretary also states the assistance of a part-time Program Assistant I will be needed to help ensure the accuracy of the ballots at various stages of production. The Secretary states the proposed legislation will also require increased staff time for the programming of the AVS accessible voting system, at a cost of \$10,000 per election. Additionally, the Secretary claims the reinstatement of the name order rotation on the presidential primary ballot in calendar year 2012 will increase state expenditures in FY 2012 by an additional \$35,000. The total increase in state expenditures associated with the implementation of the proposed legislation is as follows:
