The Senate Committee on Commerce, Labor and Consumer Protection held a hearing on the following:

HB1171 repealing the prohibitions on Sunday business activities.

The Chair, Senator Margaret Wood Hassan, opened the hearing on HB 1171 and in the absence of the prime sponsor, invited Representative Timothy Horrigan to introduce the legislation.

<u>Representative Timothy Horrigan:</u> I do have written testimony, which is probably maybe longer than it needs to be.

<u>Senator Margaret Wood Hassan, D. 23:</u> If you hand it over here, that would be great.

<u>Representative Horrigan:</u> So, my name is, I'm Representative Timothy Horrigan. I represent Strafford County, District 7. So, I'm the cosponsor of this bill. The prime sponsor, Representative McGuire, couldn't be here today.

So, it's a pretty simple bill. It's a one-liner. It deletes the entirety of RSA 322-D, which deals with Sunday business activities and consists of four sections regulating what can be done on "the first day of the week", called "The Lord's day". It deals primarily with retail stores, restaurants and similar public accommodations, one of which I just happen to point out because I was sitting next to Jim Demers who happens to be harness racing meets or dog racing meets, which are currently forbidden on Sunday after midday, unless the town opts out of it. So, I don't know whether you want to amend this or use this as a vehicle for a gambling bill.

Senator Margaret Wood Hassan, D. 23: What a good idea.

I'm joking, but unfortunately it seems you never know what's going to happen. But, it doesn't remove all the references to "The Lord's day" from the RSAs. It leaves alone RSA 275, which deals with labor regulations related to work on Sundays and holidays, and that guarantees workers a day off, per week, by stiffing workers who don't get Sunday off, get another day of week to make up for it, and that, actually that RSA might need to be updated and this is a Commerce and Labor Committee. But, once again, that's probably something you probably don't want to touch now. It also leaves alone a RSA 287-E:7 and E:13, which says you can't start a bingo game until noon on Sunday, as opposed to 11:00 a.m. on every other day. So, that's something this bill doesn't touch.

Something I'm going to probably do next year, should I be re-elected, there's a technical error in the law on daylight savings time, which is currently the first Sunday in March. Our law book still says it's the first Sunday of April. But anyway, we've actually, this is an archaic statute, which I think probably isn't really being, isn't being obeyed at all, and although we've actually amended it in 2007, we decided that public dancing should be allowed all day, not just after 2:00 p.m.

Also, in 1993, we changed it to reflect changes in municipal governance and also we downgraded the penalty to a violation after local uproar, I think mostly in Nashua, where they actually had several referendums on the blue laws and they tried to actually enforce and the stores just went ahead and paid the fines as a cost of doing business. Anyway, it certainly doesn't remove God from the law books. I certainly notice it says right there in the bill, it says, "In the Year of our Lord 2010."

Anyway, the reason why I think we should just strike RSA 332-D. First of all, it's an unnecessary religious reference. I know we, we're now a secular state, even though, like, in our history, we may have had an established religion. But of course, since we passed a Bill of Rights, since they passed the federal Bill or Rights, that's no longer the case. And that was a few years ago.

This is an outdated law which is never enforced, and it's so full of exceptions as to be meaningless and there's also no penalty for violating it. So, that's another reason to get rid of it.

And also, there's a long-running controversy amongst some religious groups about which day should be the Sabbath. You know, most people here in New

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Hampshire, if they observe a Sabbath at all, observe one on Sunday, which is when most Christians and churches do it. But, then there are some other groups that do it on Saturday.

Actually that was one of the things that got me started thinking about the issues is that back in September, I happened to be at the Rochester Fair and they stuck us out in a exhibition hall with the Adventist and the Adventist, that's the Seventh Day Adventists, they're one of the key tenets of the religion is that the Sabbath has to be on the seventh day of the week, which is Saturday and not on Sunday. In fact, they're very worried that there's going to be a federal law forbidding them from observing the Sabbath on a Saturday, which, I mean, I don't think that's going to happen. But, certainly they're a significant religious group and they're obviously worried about the issue. So, that's probably another good reason to pass the law. So, at the time, they actually asked me to pass a law, you know, like, making sure you could observe the Sabbath on any day you wanted. I didn't think much of it, but then a few weeks later, I happened to learn that Representative McGuire was sponsoring this bill, so that is how I came to be the co-sponsor.

Last thing I want to say is that there already is a consensus that stores should stay open on any days of the week they want to be open, including Sundays. And, I think this bill will change the law so that it will, like reflects what people are doing and what the consensus is and how they should do it. So, I'd be happy to take any questions if you want.

<u>Senator Margaret Wood Hassan, D. 23:</u> Great. Thank you. Senator DeVries.

<u>Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18</u>: Thank you. Thank you, Representative Horrigan for being here today. Have you been contacted by municipalities or cities? I see you represent Durham, but I know Manchester has done some outreach to maybe, because there will be a loss of revenue for them because they license for this type of activity on Sundays, and I would have to assume that many other municipalities and cities across the State are doing the same thing. Have you heard from them yet, or?

<u>Representative Horrigan:</u> No, I haven't heard from them. I think it might be, I don't know whether, I don't know whether fining people for a law that nobody really thinks should be a law. I don't know whether that's really a good way...

<u>Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18</u>: I suspect, because I see that nobody else has signed in, The Municipal Association hasn't noticed this.

<u>Representative Horrigan:</u> No, they haven't contacted me. We do, the stores in Durham are all open at least part of the day on Sundays, I believe. I don't think we're shaking them down for a fine to let them do it, as far as I know, Senator.

<u>Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18</u>: Well, would you believe from Manchester, it represents hundreds of thousands of dollars in lost revenue?

<u>Representative Horrigan:</u> I would believe that, yes.

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: Thank you.

<u>Senator Margaret Wood Hassan, D. 23:</u> Any other questions for Representative Horrigan?

<u>Representative Horrigan:</u> This bill did go through without a fiscal note, of course.

<u>Senator Margaret Wood Hassan, D. 23:</u> Any other questions for Representative Horrigan? Seeing none...Oh wait, Senator Cilley.

<u>Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6</u>: This is just, Madam Chair, just a comment. The testimony is delightful.

<u>Senator Peter E. Bragdon, D. 11:</u> Especially the closing paragraph. I dealt with the lady on the end of the world.

<u>Representative Horrigan:</u> Yes, I know. Although that seemed more, after the wind storm in February, that seems like more of a possibility than it did back in January.

<u>Senator Margaret Wood Hassan, D. 23:</u> Seeing no further questions, thank you very much for your testimony. Is there anybody else here who wanted to speak on House Bill 1171? Yes ma'am? Representative McGuire.

<u>Representative Carol McGuire:</u> Yes. Thank you, Senator. Good morning, Committee. My name is Carol McGuire, representing Merrimack District 8.

I put this in because I came across the statute when I was looking for something else, and said, "Gee, I didn't know that was still against the law." And, that was the predominant reaction when I told people I was repealing it, was, "Oh, is that still against the law? I thought we repealed that years ago."

And, most people don't realize that it is still on our books. Manchester, and I believe Salem, may increase their license fees in order to collect on Sunday, but the small towns don't. I mean, they don't bother to look it up and they don't realize it's still on the books either. And, it hasn't been enforced.

Since it is widely ignored throughout the State, I think we ought to just let Manchester increase its license fees overall and not worry about specific Sunday activities.

<u>Senator Margaret Wood Hassan, D. 23:</u> Thank you. Are there any other questions? Thank you very much. Anybody else that wanted to testify on 1171? Seeing no one else, we're going to close the hearing on House Bill 1171.

Written Testimony in Favor of HB 1171

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"An act repealing the prohibitions on Sunday business activities"

Rep. Timothy Horrigan (Strafford #7); April 20, 2010

This is a simple bill: it is essentially a one-liner which deletes the entirety of RSA 332-D, which is part of Title XXX. RSA 332-D deals with "Sunday Business Activities" and consists of four sections regulating what can be done "on the first day of the week, commonly called the Lord's Day." It deals strictly with retail stores, restaurants and similar public accommodations. New Hampshire's state government happens to itself be a major retailer: our state liquor stores do (with a few exceptions) stay open on Sundays, as authorized by RSA 177:5.

This bill does not remove all references to Sunday or "the Lord's Day" from the RSA's. In particular, this bill leaves alone RSA 275:28-35, dealing with labor regulations related to work on Sunday and on holidays. That section of the law book importantly guarantees (RSA 275:32) workers a day off per week by stipulating that workers who don't get Sunday off can take another day off later in the week. Updating RSA 275 might actually be a good idea— but that is beyond the scope of this bill (as introduced.)

As passed by the House, this bill also doesn't change RSA 21:36, which specifies the Sundays when daily saving time begins and end. (That RSA actually is out of date: daylight saving time now runs from the second Sunday in March to the first Sunday in November.) Nor does it effect 287-E:7 or 287-E:13, which currently stipulate that you can't conduct Bingo games until noon on Sunday (as opposed to 11 a.m. every other day.)

The Sunday closing issue has been addressed before by this legislature. The last change to this law was in 2007, when we decided that public dancing should be allowed all day (RSA 332-D:6), not just after 2:00 p.m. In 1993, we changed RSA 332-D:4 to reflect changes in municipal governance. In 1976 and 1977, there was a local uproar in Nashua, when local retailers defied the city's "blue laws." That controversy spilled over to the House Commerce Committee, and the General Court added Section 332-D:7 at that time (stating, "A person who violates any provision of this chapter is guilty of a violation.").

This bill certainly does not totally remove God from the law books. I note with a certain amusement the fact that the bill has been introduced in "In the Year of Our Lord Two Thousand Ten."

HB1171 ought to pass because

- → This bill removes an unnecessary religious reference from the law books. New Hampshire may have been founded as a Christian state, but it is now a secular state with no established religion.
- → This bill removes outdated laws which are never enforced and which are so full of exceptions and local options as to be meaningless. In practice, very few retail establishments are closed on Sunday: most choose to be open seven days a week. And, in any case, businesses ought to be able to decide for themselves what days they wish to be open, without interference from either state or municipal government.
- → The existing law does not impose any meaningful penalty on those who violate it. This was

apparently the sensible result of a series of compromises made several decades ago. This bill offers an even more sensible solution: take the law off the books altogether.

→ This bill takes the state out of a long running controversy over what day of week should be the sabbath. Most Christian churches observe a Sunday sabbath, but Seventh day Adventists and some other groups observe the original Jewish sabbath on Saturday. Muslims observe their sabbath on Friday, as do the members of the Baha'i faith. Other groups observe other schedules, and many people in New Hampshire observe no sabbath at all.

The Seventh Day Adventists got me thinking about this issue back in September. I represented the Strafford County Democrats one day (not anyone's sabbath, as far as I know) at the Rochester Fair. Our booth was in a rather remote and lightly-trafficked exhibition hall, right next to the Adventists. The Saturday sabbath (running from Friday night through Saturday afternoon) is the core of their religious practice, as the name "Seventh Day Adventist" implies. The Adventists are extremely worried about the possibility of a universal mandatory Sunday sabbath law: they view such a law as a sign of the End Times, and, like myself, they hope to put off the end of the world as long as possible. I was actually asked that day to consider sponsoring a bill repealing our state's existing Sunday sabbath laws. I frankly didn't give that issue much thought at the time, but when I learned a few weeks later that Rep. McGuire was sponsoring this bill, I signed on as a cosponsor.

I doubt that HB1171's passage will delay the end of the world, but this bill would take an outdated law off the books. HB1171 would bring Title XXX of the New Hampshire RSA's into compliance with the current consensus, which is that businesses should be free to remain open on any days of the week they want to be open.
