HB 1441 FISCAL NOTE

AN ACT relative to claimant eligibility for victim's compensation.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The Department of Justice states this bill, <u>as amended by the House (Amendment #2010-0089h)</u>, may increase state restricted expenditures by an indeterminable amount in FY 2011 and each year thereafter. There is no fiscal impact on county and local expenditures or state, county, and local revenue.

METHODOLOGY:

The Department of Justice states this bill allows victims of a crime under investigation by the cold case homicide unit to be eligible, regardless of the date of the crime, for victim's compensation only for counseling expenses and expenses associated with the victim's participation in pre- and post-conviction proceedings. The Department states over 120 cold cases have been identified by the cold case homicide unit. The Department has no information to determine how many of the cases will be brought forward for prosecution or of those brought forward how many victims would apply for victim's compensation in order to determine any increased expenditures from the victim's assistance fund.

HEARING DATE: April 20, 2010

MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE PRESENT: Senators Reynolds, Lasky, Roberge, Letourneau and Houde

MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE ABSENT: No one

Sponsor(s): Representative Cushing

What the bill does: This bill provides that a victim of a crime under investigation by the Cold Case Homicide Unit shall be eligible for victim's compensation, regardless of the date of the crime, which are incurred after the effective date of this act. The bill also requires that the Victims' Assistance Commission submit a report on the number of claims and amount of compensation granted from the Victims' Assistance Fund and the balance of the fund at the end of each fiscal year.

Who supports the bill: Representative Chandley on behalf of Representative Cushing (who was "volcano bound in Italy"); Representative Frank Davis; Rosemary Faretra of the Department of Justice, Victim Compensation (on behalf of Sandra Mathis who is ill);

Who opposes the bill: No one

Summary of testimony received:

- Representative Chandley introduced the legislation on behalf of Representative Cushing and said that she also supports this bill.
- She explained that the Cold Case Unit has around 113 murder cases which are eligible for consideration. The victims' families would be eligible for assistance under this legislation. She explained that these benefits are not paid out of the General Fund.
- She said that moneys for this fund come through restitution moneys collected and the federal Victims of Crimes Act.
- Allocations from this fund can be used only for pre- and postconviction proceedings and for counseling.

• Representative Davis testified in support and explained the two small changes made in the House Ways & Means Committee. He said that they amended the bill so that only claims that happen after this bill is enacted would be covered.

- They also added the requirement for the annual status reports so that the impact can be monitored.
- He said that in 2009 the fund balance was around \$293,000.
- Rosemary Faretra of the Victim Compensation group in the Department of Justice testified on behalf of Sandra Mathis, who is ill today and unable to be present. She said that both Ms. Mathis and the Attorney General's office are in support of this legislation.
- Senator Reynolds asked why there wouldn't be a fiscal impact with this legislation. Ms. Faretra responded that there would be, because of the 113 cold cases, but that there is a \$3,000 mental health cap.
- Senator Houde followed up and asked if the number of people increases, and since there is a fixed amount in the fund, wouldn't each individual then receive a lesser amount. Ms. Faretra responded that the cap is now at \$25,000 for each claim and that she really does not see any of the cold cases going that high.
- Senator Houde asked what happens if the amounts needed exceed the fund balance. Ms. Faretra responded that the fund is comprised of both federal funds and other funds. She said that the federal funding is at 60% of their expenditures for two years earlier - so they always get paid back down the road.
- She said that they do always stay within their fund balance.
- Senator Reynolds remarked that she just wants to make sure that there is no fiscal impact. Ms. Faretra responded that the fund is balanced and that they do hope that the Committee will support the legislation.

Fiscal Impact: Not applicable.

Action: Senator Houde moved "Ought to Pass." Senator Letourneau seconded the motion. The Committee voted 5 to 0 in support. Senator Reynolds will report the bill out of Committee.

<u>ADDENDUM</u>: Representative Davis remarked following the hearing that in the past, victims have been turned down for requested funding – but not because of a lack of funds, but because the applicant had not met the criteria.

The Chair, Senator Deborah R. Reynolds, opened the hearing on HB 1441.

<u>Senator Deborah R. Reynolds, D. 2</u>: I will impose again on Representative Chandley if I can. I don't see Representative Cushing here. Was he planning on coming, do we know?

<u>Representative Chandley</u>: For the record, I am Shannon Chandley, representing Hillsborough County District 6. I am pinch hitting for Representative Cushing because he is volcano bound in Italy right now. He did send you an e-mail, I believe, expressing his support for this bill and asking your apologies because he was supposed to return over the weekend and right now, he will be lucky to get back, he is scheduled to return on Friday.

Please see Attachment #1 – e-mail from Representative Cushing.

I can speak to this bill because I really do support this. As you know, last year we established the cold case unit. It is really moving along quite nicely. There are approximately, I believe, 113 murder cases being, that are eligible to be considered by the cold case unit.

One of the things that happens, of course, is for the victims, if it is a murder victim, obviously, the victim's family is now again a lot of the old wounds are re-opened, needs reemerge and this would make the victim's family eligible for the victim's assistance compensation. And, as you know, that is not paid



for with tax dollars, but rather with local tax dollars. That is paid for through restitutions and federal dollars that were established through the Victims of Crime Act in the early '80s. And, I believe, these would be crimes that, prior to the establishment of the Victims Assistance, folks who would be eligible for these funds were not eligible because of the time that their crimes were committed.

It is limited. They can only, it can only be used for pre and post-conviction proceedings and counseling. It cannot be used for anything... We cannot go back now and say your funeral costs would be covered or anything like that. It is only for things that will be taking place at this time.

There are folks here from the Victims Assistance who can testify to the specifics.

<u>Senator Deborah R. Reynolds, D. 2</u>: Thank you very much, Representative Chandley. Any questions for Representative Chandley?

<u>Senator Robert J. Letourneau, D. 19</u>: I was going to ask a constitutional question, but I think she answered it.

<u>Senator Deborah R. Reynolds, D. 2</u>: Okay. Any other questions? Senator Houde?

Senator Matthew Houde, D. 5: No, thank you.

Senator Deborah R. Reynolds, D. 2: Thank you very much.

Representative Chandley: You're welcome.

Senator Deborah R. Reynolds, D. 2: You did a very good job.

Senator Robert J. Letourneau, D. 19: You did.

<u>Senator Deborah R. Reynolds, D. 2</u>: Representative David Welch is signed in in support, does not wish to speak. Representative Frank Davis is here and would like to testify. Welcome, Representative.

<u>Representative Frank Davis</u>: Thank you, Madam Chair. I'm here because the Ways & Means Committee had an amendment to this bill that passed the House and there were two small changes.

My name is Frank Davis, representing Merrimack 7, Pembroke and Chichester.

In section 1, the Committee adopted language that clearly indicates that newly eligible victims could only be compensated for certain expenses which occur after this legislation passes. In our committee, the question came up, could people come back and make a claim for the last year or two.

The second part is we are also requesting a yearly status report from the Victims Assistance funds beginning in September of this year. This report would go to your Committee, the House Criminal Justice Committee and the Ways & Means Committees of both the House and the Senate. The Ways & Means Committee in the House was concerned about the impact on the funds, both on HB 601 that was passed last year and also from this legislation. At the end of fiscal year 2009, the funds had a balance of under \$300,000. I think it was around \$293,000. The projected revenue and expenses for the next two years is estimated at around \$900,000 for each year.

I would like to thank you, Madam Chairman, for giving me the opportunity to testify here and I would also like to thank the members of your Committee who were on the committee of conference for HB 601 last year. There is someone here from the fund that can probably give you up-to-date information on that fund.

Thank you, Madam Chair.

<u>Senator Deborah R. Reynolds, D. 2</u>: Thank you very much, Representative. Senator Lasky?

Senator Bette R. Lasky, D. 13: Oh, I'm sorry. Thank you.

<u>Senator Deborah R. Reynolds, D. 2</u>: Senator Letourneau, did you have a question? Thank you very much, Representative. Let's have Betty Jane Riordan from the Department of Justice.

Bette Jane Riordan: If I may defer to my Director, Rosemary Faretra?

<u>Senator Deborah R. Reynolds, D. 2</u>: Yes. Thank you. Come forward. That would be great. Both of you can come together and testify. Thank you. Please just state your full name for the record. Are you Rosemary?

Rosemary Faretra: I am.

Senator Deborah R. Reynolds, D. 2: Okay. Thank you, Rosemary.

STON,

<u>Ms. Faretra</u>: For the record, my name is Rosemary Faretra and I am the Director of Administration for the Department of Justice. Victims' compensation comes under our responsibility. But, in addition to that, Sandy Mattheson, who is the Director of the Victim Witness Program is ill today; otherwise, she would be here testifying, hoping that you all would vote in favor of the bill. But, she did want me to share a few things with you in terms of the victims witness piece.

For the past twenty-two years, the Victim Witness Program has worked with all of the state's homicide cases, providing intensive services for families through the entire process. That was talked about previously in 2009 when the cold case unit was established. It was created by the AG's Office to work exclusively on unsolved homicide cases, many of them going back many years, decades. The purpose of the bill was to allow those cases when the crime was committed prior to the institution of the victims' compensation program, which was in November of 1989. So, those homicides that happened prior to that time, it would allow those people to apply for services specifically the mental health services and pre and post-conviction services. It was limited to that amount.

And, on behalf of the Attorney General's Office and Sandy, we would like to ask that you support the bill. In fact, we worked with Renny Cushing and our office put the bill together.

<u>Senator Deborah R. Reynolds, D. 2</u>: Thank you very much, Rosemary. I have a question. I think that is a really important bill and a good bill. I guess what I'm really confused about, and I apologize, but I was listening to Representative Davis. Wouldn't there have to be some fiscal impact if we are including additional cases to them?

<u>Ms. Faretra</u>: There would be, but we are talking about 113 cases at this time that they are looking at at this time. The mental health rehab we will be watching as they go through the process. They can apply for additional. I think it is about \$3,000. They can apply for additional if they need more, but it is being monitored as they go through the process. It is not just given to them and it is theirs. It is monitored. And, it has to be based on applications that come from them.

Senator Deborah R. Reynolds, D. 2: Senator Houde?

<u>Senator Matthew Houde, D. 5</u>: Thank you very much, Madam Chair. Thank you for taking the question. Is the number of people who are making claims upon the fund capped in some cases? Since there is a fixed amount, each of the claimants then get a reduced amount?



Ms. Faretra: Well, are you talking about the claims that we would get in?

<u>Senator Matthew Houde, D. 5</u>: Right. So, if you have a fixed pot of \$400,000, let's just say.

<u>Ms. Faretra</u>: Well, there is a cap right now of \$25,000 of reach claim. That was established last year. I think it was changed for the first time in many years. The cap went from 10 to 25. So, regardless of what happens, we can't go over the \$25,000. That's it. And, I don't see the cold cases going that high.

<u>Senator Matthew Houde, D. 5</u>: Thank you, Madam Chair. So, there is a cap for each individual claim. But, if the aggregate of all of those claims exceeds the amount of money in the pot, what happens then?

<u>Ms. Faretra</u>: You're talking one specific? The pot, you're talking about the whole fund?

Senator Matthew Houde, D. 5: The whole fund.

<u>Ms. Faretra</u>: The whole fund comes from two different sources. We have the victims' compensation fund, or the money that comes from penalty assessments. That is a part that comes into us. We also get federal funds and the federal funds are based on the amount of claims that we have in any one to two years. So, we get reimbursed 60% of that two years down the road. So, the higher our claims are in one year, like 2008, in fiscal year '10, we will get more federal funds. So, we are reimbursed based on what we spend in terms of state dollars. The more state dollars we spend, the more we get back in federal funds and the more we have to spend down the way.

But, we have to stay within the amount that we've got. We are always watching where we are and our appropriations and where we are going with the federal funds. So, it is balanced. So far, we have been lucky; it hasn't happened.

Ms. Riordan: Federal funds are very, very helpful.

<u>Senator Deborah R. Reynolds, D. 2</u>: But, Rosemary, I think what we're struggling with is, I think a lot of us want to support the bill and we just want to make sure that there isn't a fiscal impact to the state. What I'm hearing is that ...

Ms. Faretra: Balanced as you go through it.

Senator Deborah R. Reynolds, D. 2: Okay.

<u>Ms. Faretra</u>: Every claim that comes through has a cap of \$25,000. There are few that would actually put in claims for the total amount. It would be a rare instance. You always have that roll forward.

<u>Senator Deborah R. Reynolds, D. 2</u>: Senator Letourneau, did you have a follow up or any other questions?

<u>Senator Robert J. Letourneau, D. 19</u>: You have asked all of the questions I would have asked.

<u>Senator Deborah R. Reynolds, D. 2</u>: Thank you. Thank you very much for coming today. Thank you for your testimony.

Ms. Faretra: Thank you. We do hope you will support the bill.

Senator Deborah R. Reynolds, D. 2: Thank you.

I want to note that Claire Ebel has also signed in in support of the bill. I don't see that there is anybody else signed in either in support or opposition. Is there anyone here that wanted to testify? Seeing none, we are going to close the hearing on HB 1441.

Dear Senators,

Due to circumstances beyond my control I am unable to attend the hearing on HB 1441, relative to victims compensation. I apologize for my absence.

As you know last year the legislature passed a bill to establish a cold case homicide unit to work on solving the over 100 unresolved murder cases in the state. The unit is up and running and hopefully will be able to bring to justice some of the killers who have eluded identification and arrest for their crimes.

HB 1441 makes the families of those homicide victims whose cases are being investigated and solved by the Cold Case Unit eligible for assistance from the Victims Assistance Commission. Because a number of these murders pre-date the establishment of the Victims Compensation Program, they are not currently eligible for assistance. HB 1441 creates a narrow addition to those who may be eligible, and makes it applicable only to expenses incurred on a going forward basis. The language to the bill was drafted by Assistant Attorney General Ann Rice, and the bill is supported by the Victims Witness Assistant's Office and the Victims Assistance Commission.

I respectfully request that you support the bill.
