Summary of testimony received:

Senator Fuller Clark, Dist 24

- As a co-sponsor of SB 313, Senator Fuller Clark introduced the bill on behalf of Senator Odell. The State Park System Advisory Council has been doing a lot of valuable work advising DRED relative to the state park system.
- Senator Downing, who is also a member of the HB 2 Committee to study the list of non-regulatory boards, commissions, councils, advisory committees, and task forces, explained what that Committee has been working on. Among other things the HB 2 Committee has been studying what commissions, councils, etc. are still necessary and if they are, can the work they are doing be done outside of government.

Representative Webb, Merr 2

- Representative Webb is also a member of the Council. Explained that the Council worked hard on the 10 year state park strategic plan and would like to remain active to see that it is implemented and that they can help make any necessary changes to the plan moving forward. The Council meets approximately once every two months.

Director Ted Austin, Director of Parks and Recreations at DRED

- Recommended extending this Council through 2011 to the HB 2 Committee but would like the additional nine years through 2020 that is called for in the legislation. As the Director of Parks and Recreations at DRED, Director Austin benefits from the Councils input. In response to questions from the Committee, Director Austin believes that the benefits of keeping the Council active outweigh the costs associated with the Council.
- The Committee discussed the merit of putting all the separate "state park committees" under this Council as an "umbrella group" for all state parks.
- Director Austin commented that while he is unsure of how that would be done at the moment he believes it is a possibility.

Senator Fuller Clark, Dist 24

- Testified a second time to point out that it is important to develop local support to help raise money locally to support the parks because the park system is supposed to be self sufficient. The idea of a larger council could be too large to work effectively in the communities to garner the necessary support from the local communities surrounding a state park. The smaller, more specific state park committees are better designed to address the needs of the individual parks that are so important to the communities.

The Chair, Senator Jacalyn Cilley, opened the hearing on SB 313 and invited Senator Martha Fuller Clark to introduce the legislation.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Opening the hearing on Senate Bill 313 and recognizing as co-sponsor Senator Martha Fuller Clark.

Senator Martha Fuller Clark, D. 24: What this bill does is to extend the life of the State Parks Advisory Council to June 30, 2020. It currently was set to be repealed as of June 30, 2010.

I think many of you know the work of the State Parks Advisory System Council, that they have, in conjunction with the study that's been going forward, they have already begun to have a significant impact on how we are addressing our state parks going forward, and that is the reason for the extension that is requested here. It is a knotty problem. As you know, we are the only state park system in the country that is expected to be self supporting.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Are there questions for Senator Fuller Clark? Senator DeVries.

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: Thank you, Madam Chair and Senator Fuller Clark. I'm not sure if you or actually our Chair is best served to answer this.

But we know that in House Bill 2, the commission that was looking at commissions and/or councils for sunseting, do you happen to know if this was one of the bills that was reviewed, and do you happen to know if that commission has the ability to extend those that were set to be ...

Senator Martha Fuller Clark, D. 24: I frankly don't know if this Council is on that list. And it is my understanding that this bill was filed perhaps independent of that because of the work that is being done by that Council, and the long range study that is going forward. But that's my understanding.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Senator Downing.

Senator Michael W. Downing, D. 22: Madam Chairman.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Oh, did you have a follow up, Senator DeVries? I apologize.

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: I was just going to note for the record nods of agreement from the audience behind the Senator.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Okay, thank you. Senator Downing.

Senator Michael W. Downing, D. 22: Sitting on that commission along with yourself, looking at these different committees and commissions, I think the intent is to file legislation in order to extend them. So we're confident that they are meeting and they are following guidelines that are set in statute.

Eliminating them, well it's been a problem, as you know. But it's caused them to look at their committees when they come forward to get them extended. And I think that's the intent. So I think this is the appropriate way to do this.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Through this bill or through the process that we had?

Senator Michael W. Downing, D. 22: Through this particular bill for this particular commission.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Oh, alright.

Senator Michael W. Downing, D. 22: There are some that are automatically going to be continued. There's others, and I'm not sure where on the list this

one falls, but it's obvious that they need it and they're meeting, and it's productive, so this would be the appropriate way to do this.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Well, we can have that discussion then after this.

Senator Michael W. Downing, D. 22: And then it would go onto the keep list.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Okay, so did you have a question for Senator Fuller Clark?

Senator Michael W. Downing, D. 22: I don't.

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: Would you believe.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Yeah, so would you believe. Thank you, Senator Fuller Clark.

Senator Martha Fuller Clark, D. 24: You're welcome.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Let me call Representative Webb.

Representative Leigh Webb: Thank you, Madam Chair. For the record, I'm Representative Leigh Webb from Merrimack District 2, Franklin and Hill. And I'm here not just as a co-sponsor but also as a member of the State Parks Advisory Council.

And I believe you're correct in assuming that it may be on their list, but that committee on committees is, my understanding is that they're just recommending. I don't think they have the authority to actually unilaterally extend.

This is based on the simple premise that we worked very hard in the State Parks Advisory Council, in conjunction with Parks and Recreation and the Director, who's sitting behind me, Mr. Ted Austin, worked very hard on this 10 year strategic plan that is being put into action. And we'd very much like to stay around for the 10 years that it's in effect, to make sure that its tenets are adhered to. And if there are other items that come up that could be considered to improve even upon the strategic plan we've drafted, we'd like to be in a position to make those recommendations.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Okay. Questions for Representative Webb? Senator Downing.

Senator Michael W. Downing, D. 22: Thank you, Madam Speaker (sic). Representative, who currently sits on this commission?

Representative Webb: It's made up of public members. There are three Representatives, two from R, R & D. I'm the sort of at large representative. My committee is actually Environment and Agriculture, but I specifically requested to be on it. In my constituency of Franklin, we have the state park of Daniel Webster's birthplace that was unfortunately closed due to maintenance issues. So I've taken an interest and wanted to pursue it. And as well, as you know, Senator Odell was on that committee.

Senator Michael W. Downing, D. 22: And if I might, Madam Chair?

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Follow-up, Senator Downing.

Senator Michael W. Downing, D. 22: I know you've developed your strategic plan now. How often do you plan on meeting to go over the objectives and see if you've achieved them?

Representative Webb: I think we've had a record. And Director Austin can correct me, but I think we've been meeting at least once every two months and we continue to do so. There are ongoing issues and of course, the strategic plan identified the most critical, which our chair also did, and in fact is self-funding, which as it's been determined and that's another bill that's coming up. We will actually, I think, talk about that tomorrow in another committee, in that it was somewhat nebulous in RSAs as to exactly where that determination lay. And some thought it was more of a departmental policy and yet there are some references to it in statute. So we're just trying to clarify that.

Senator Michael W. Downing, D. 22: Thank you.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Okay. Senator Fuller Clark.

Senator Martha Fuller Clark, D. 24: Yes, it's my understanding, if you could just clarify this for me, that your 10 year plan is now up on the web? And that anyone can download that?

Representative Webb: Absolutely.

Senator Martha Fuller Clark, D. 24: And have it available to look at. There are some drafts that went before this, but this is now the final plan?

Representative Webb: Yes, and I think Director Austin would be more happy, if he's, are you, I believe Director Austin is going to be speaking and can address that issue directly.

Senator Martha Fuller Clark, D. 24: Terrific. Thank you very much.

Representative Webb: You're welcome.

Senator Martha Fuller Clark, D. 24: I wanted to get that information in the record.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Thank you. And just for your information, and Representative Harding who chairs that commission which both Senator Downing and I sit on, will be coming a little later because we have another bill that'll be fairly contentious. Just so that you know, although the State Park Advisory Council, and Patrick was kind enough to bring the whole list and make a note of it for me, is still on the under consideration list. The Department of Resources, Economic Development has suggested that it be extended until 2011, and I suspect that the Committee will take that fully under consideration.

We also, that committee also puts out surveys, that it would be very advisable for you as a member of the Council to fill out and to get back to Representative Harding. Do we have any in the office, Patrick? Do you know? We put them in everybody's mailbox. Did we keep at least one copy? You could stop by my office and pick up a copy of that, get it back to Patrick. He'll forward it over to Pam Smarling and you know, that will go into that record. There is a process established and my concern about taking each of these up individually is that we're going to be doing an awful lot of duplicative work. But that said, we'll take the testimony today and I think we'll share it with the commission, you know, in their deliberations.

Representative Webb: Madam Chair, I appreciate the suggestion. I did actually get that letter with one form, and because I'm also on a film commission I submitted that form for the film commission.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Oh, you got that saved, I read that one, yes.

Representative Webb: So I will be more than happy to run over to your office and get another form.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: And if there are any other committees or commissions that you sit on or that you're interested in or know about, pick up a few extras because we need to have that information on the record. You

know, as Senator Downing pointed out, it is not easy to repeal these. So with that, any further questions or comments or would you believe? Okay, thank you very much.

Representative Webb: Thank you.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Representative Susan ...

Senator Sharon M. Carson, D. 14: Kepner.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Kepner. Says, oh, not speaking, never mind. Thank you very much.

Representative Webb: She had to go to another committee.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Senator Hassan and then Director Austin. You don't indicate, you have supported it, you don't indicate a desire to speak. But would you, given that we taking, you were about to say that, weren't you, Senator Downing?

Why don't you come forward? Given that we are taking for the record and hopefully we can reduce the duplication for the other commission. We might as well get it all on the record now. So, Director Austin, you are the, also the chair of the Council. Or no, a member?

Director Ted Austin: No, Dick Ober is the Chair of State Parks Systems Advisory Council. I'm simply Director of Parks and Recreation at DRED.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Oh, okay. So for the record, would you state your name.

Director Austin: Ted Austin, Director of New Hampshire State Parks and Recreation.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Okay. As I mentioned, I see on this list that the Department of Resources and Economic Development, whatever I did with that list ...

Senator Martha Fuller Clark, D. 24: I have it, I stole it.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: ...has recommended the continuation of this particular one. Do you want to speak to that?

Director Austin: I will, that's correct that it was through 6/30/2011. We were asked back in August to start making these evaluations. I anticipated at the time, with Director, or Commissioner Bald that I would do well by having them in existence for an additional year. I would welcome an additional nine years beyond that if in fact it's approved, but the most imperative work we need to do in the next 12 months is the recodification of the legislation. It would be somewhat cumbersome, if not contradictory, to the premise.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Could you speak to the difference between, the bill actually asks to have this council extended to 2020. That's 10 years, and my understanding is that the Department actually recommended extension to 2011. You seemed in that comment to favor further? Could you explain why that would be important to the work of this body?

Director Austin: It's simply a benefit from the oversight. I'm only 12 months into the job, but feel as though we've identified and begun to address the issues. At the time the recommendation was made and driven by, we have lots of committees. And as I understood it, it was a question of whether administrative time and travel time and efficiencies could be achieved. DRED has the most committees of any of the agencies, as I understand it.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: I think Health and Human Services outnumbers you.

Senator Martha Fuller Clark, D. 24: DES too.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: DES, well, anyway. The three of you probably have the lion's share of everything that exists in the state.

But you raise an interesting question. And one of the considerations for the commission is the burden on our departments' time and so some of the questions that we've included in that, is not only what kind of time expenditure and sort of what are you getting back for that time expenditure, because most of these require your attendance. I know, I sit on a number of commissions related, that have a nexus with DES and we have staff there all the time. If they're there, they're not in their offices doing other jobs that they could be doing. So if you could speak to, sort of, the cost benefit relative to your time commitment. And also whether it is necessary that this be a state function or if it's a state function that it does require your participation all the time.

Director Austin: I will try to do that in that order. I receive far more benefit than time committed to it, or devoted to it, so that's well in favor of State Parks System Advisory Council.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: In what way, Director?

Director Austin: Well, it's certainly assisted me in my learning curve in the first 12 months. I arrived at what I'll say is an exciting time, which is taking a fast, hard look at the parks system as a function of SB 5 and SB 74. I guess with my take on the current, the state of the plan, which you may well know was extended itself an additional six months. I think we've come out with a better plan, so there was a richness of just discussion and detail that was provided by that 17 member State Park Systems Advisory Council. I guess that would be the broad answer to the first part of the question.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Okay.

Director Austin: I don't have strong feelings. I may not fully understand the state stipulation piece. The only concern we have at this point is are we geographically well represented. There is a discussion about some regional advisory councils, which we're opposed to. But with that thought floating, we thought perhaps we would add a member or two just to better represent the North Country.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Okay. I think that question comes from, you know, there are things that we believe are very worthwhile that we are less convinced belong under the umbrella of the state. Most of these councils, I'm assuming that you have legislative members?

Director Austin: We do, three.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: So they have to travel to this, they have to be appointed. One of the things that struck us in the early days of the formation of the committee and getting all of the, you know, background work done was the enormous amount of time commitment required by the Governor's Office and by the Speaker's Office and the Senate President's Office with making appointments to these bodies, you know. And often times, Patrick may recall, I think it was 3,200 appointments that the Governor's Office makes. And so, you can imagine that, you know, not every one of them jumps for joy and says, oh, I'll be delighted to serve on that council and use 30 hours of my time each week. You know, frequently, they get turned down and they have to go to the next person, you know, that would be considered.

So it's an enormous amount of time. So I guess the question becomes, could that body function outside of the framework of state government and produce, you know, a solid advisory role for your Department? Or is it necessary that it has statutory authority to actually be able to provide input?

Director Austin: I, in the short time I've been in this position, would suggest the latter, which is I do think it does require that statutory role. We have certainly hit a responsive nerve as it relates to funding. We've hit a responsive nerve as it relates to our legislative priorities and mandates. I think we continue to need that guidance. Those currently presiding members seem to be very invigorated by it and we've hit an issue that's very emotional across the state, whether it be elected officials or citizens.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Okay. Any further questions? Senator Downing.

Senator Michael W. Downing, D. 22: Thank you, Madam Chair. I think I heard the testimony earlier that one of the basic reasons for this commission is to oversee the 10 year plan that they just developed. Is this the only committee or commission that deals with state parks?

Director Austin: Yes, it is.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Follow-up.

Director Austin: Well, let me correct. There are advisory committees specific to state parks. This is the only advisory committee, commission that addresses the entire state park system.

Senator Michael W. Downing, D. 22: So we could actually take those other commissions and roll them into this commission as an overall oversight?

Director Austin: It's got some merit to it.

Senator Michael W. Downing, D. 22: Okay, thank you.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: I thank Senator Downing for that question, because that does intrigue me. We have a number, we're going to hear one on the Mount Washington Commission. We've got another one on Cannon Mountain. I mean, almost all of these, or at least there are quite a number of them that have individual councils or committees. And perhaps that would be the best time to pursue this.

But just from your perspective, and it sounds as though you're fairly new on all of this. Could this enfold other specific committees or commissions so that there is a comprehensive plan for all of them?

Director Austin: I believe it could. It would take some work. I mean, the Hampton Beach Area Commission, Monadnock Advisory Committee, Commission, to name a few. I think we have 13.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: All of that, if not more.

Director Austin: So it would take some engineering to just have those sort of perspectives become system-wide first and continue into that protector interest at the per park level.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: How many people serve on the Council?

Director Austin: Seventeen, I believe.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: So is it possible, with some understanding of the work that they're already doing, is it possible to have subcommittees of the overall Council that work specifically on Monadnock, on you know, Hampton Beach, those sorts of things?

Director Austin: I think so. In time, I see that as being more comprehensive and perhaps more effective.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Thank you. Are there any further questions? Thank you very much. That was particularly helpful.

Senator Martha Fuller Clark, D. 24: Jackie, I'd like to speak a second time, when the time comes.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Okay, I think it's here. He was the last speaker. Thank you, Senator Fuller Clark.

Senator Martha Fuller Clark, D. 24: Thank you very much, members of the Committee. Senator Martha Fuller Clark, requesting to speak a second time since this discussion has really moved beyond just the rationale for extending this particular council.

And I do think that you heard a very compelling reason that the Council has been very involved in developing this long range plan. That too often we have plans or proposals that have been developed and they end up sitting on a shelf and they're never implemented. And I think their request that they

should be allowed to continue in order to ensure the implementation of this plan and also perhaps to modify the plan as further information comes forward is extremely reasonable and I hope that this is quite different than just extending it for another year. So I hope that that would be taken into consideration.

Clearly, the state parks in New Hampshire present a formidable challenge because of the understanding, even if there's confusion in the statutes, that they should be self-supporting. And it's my understanding and I can speak specifically to the Wentworth Coolidge Commission, which was set up by an executive order of Governor, I believe it was Governor Gallen, to oversee that particular property, which was falling into enormous disrepair. We've had the same issues with the Daniel Webster House, or the Daniel Webster Homestead, for example. That one of the roles that these various commissions have played, whether it's for specific sites or for, you know, particular key parks is to be able to develop the local support to generate the income that is needed in order to invest in these particular parks, because there has not been the money available. So one of the things they oftentimes do is they provide fundraisers, they provide, drive openings or public relations promotions for these particular sites. They build local support and local stewardship.

And it's my concern is that that is not the role of the overall Advisory Council to do that, because they have enough just coordinating what's going on at these various state parks and these various sites. They don't really have the manpower at that level to be able to do the kind of work that I'm laying out for you that they have taken on, over the many years where there hasn't been adequate funding. If we lose these various commissions, we're going to lose one of the key components that has been able to raise private dollars to assist these sites. And also, in some cases to also provide labor for those sites when we're not able to get the various staff from the Department of Parks to come in and do the work that needs to be done.

We have a state park in New Castle, Fort Stark, which over the last several years, through a commitment at the local community level, has gone in and completely reformed that park, where the vegetation was overtaking the park, it was becoming, you know, more and more a problem with regard to vandalism. The one property, one building that was on that site was falling into disrepair. And through community volunteer work, they have completely dealt with the issue of overgrowth, they have saved that building and turned it into an interpretation center for the community. The community has developed a real attachment to this park and pride for what they have done to sort of return this park to a level of amenities that now makes it where people feel safe and they want to visit it.

The Wentworth Coolidge Mansion over years has created numerous opportunities to bring in revenue for the Wentworth Coolidge Mansion, which is one, you know, of a core of historic sites in this state that have national significance. Without them, I hate to think where this property would be today.

So I want to just put this in a larger context that it may make sense in some other areas to be combining some of the work of these various commissions, but I think it's very important to understand the role under the New Hampshire parks that these commissions play with regard to stewardship and funding.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: And thank you for that, Senator Fuller Clark, and I'm not insensitive to the fact that there are different mandates between them. One of the things that might be a good idea is to, and I invite Senator Downing to participate in this brief conversation. Because you're right, we've gone a little further, but we've done so in the hope that we can find a way to deal with some of these individual things that come up that are also part of our mandate for this without, as I said, having to duplicate and triplicate the work.

It might be a good idea to find representatives from all of those committees or commissions to determine just what exactly is it that they do, what does the State, you know, Advisory Council on the state park system do, and find a way, and I'll throw this out. It has no room for discussion today, but I just want folks in the room who have a stake in this to think about it. I asked the Director if it were possible with a board of 17 people to break it down into smaller groups that could focus on these things individually.

I don't think that there's anything that would preclude their ability to bring in people from the community to form that advisory board at the local level, to continue to do very much what they're doing and still get the best of everything that you're talking about while at the same time ensuring that their input coordinates with the strategic plan governing our entire system.

So it was just one of the thoughts that I had through, in my mind, we might ask that in instances like this where we are looking to at least explore the matter of combining and coordination, that we get all the stakeholders in the room and say, you know, let's have a brainstorming session. Let's see if it is possible without, because what we're finding, and you can imagine how difficult our job is. What we're finding is everybody's got their sacred cow. Nobody wants to let it go, and yet our mandate is to find a way to run state government more efficiently. So I hope you understand that.

Senator Martha Fuller Clark, D. 24: And I understand that, but I think that, you know, there's a very specific role here that I would also say with regard to statutory authority, that given the fact that these various properties in many cases have been given to the State and the State has now an obligation to oversee them. That not to create the statutory authorities will create some problems. And I would also suggest to you that one of the issues that you have with regard to these properties and the fact that they are state owned means in many cases it's more difficult to develop the support at the local level because the local level's response is, well, the State should be doing this.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Right.

Senator Martha Fuller Clark, D. 24: So I think that there has to be some real coordination and consideration and my concern is that if those local entities that have been created to build the support don't have some authoritative standing, that it will be more difficult for them to deal with that issue of, you know, private/public partnerships.


