Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

Summary of testimony received:

Senator Downing, Dist 22

- Senate Bill 494 is a result of the committee to study the list of non-regulatory boards, commissions, councils, advisory committees, and task forces. This bill will establish a clear repeal date of either the filing of a final report or on November 1 in the even numbered year prior to the beginning of the subsequent legislative session, whichever is earlier. This is the first step in addressing the problem of legislative study committees that have no end.
- This would apply to study committees that are created after the effective date of this legislation.
- “study committee” means a committee, commission, task force, council, or any other similar entity established by the general court in chapter law to study or otherwise address a specified issue, and shall not include any similar entities that are codified in statute.

David Frydman, House Legal Counsel

- Clarified that this legislation would apply only to chapter law, not statute. Also commented on the new House rule of this year that addresses study committees. The House rule does not apply to statutory committees.

The Chair, Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, opened the hearing on SB 494 and invited the prime sponsor, Senator Michael Downing, to introduce the legislation.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: I'd like to open up the hearing on Senate Bill 494 and recognize the prime sponsor, Senator Downing. Welcome.

Senator Michael W. Downing, D. 22: Thank you, Madam Chairman, members of the Committee. For the record, my name is Michael Downing and I represent Senate District 22, the towns of Salem, Pelham, Atkinson and Plaistow.

I'm here today to introduce Senate Bill 494. This is at the request of the committee that is studying the list of non-regulatory boards, commissions, councils, advisory committees and task forces, which was established in HB 2. This bill puts a clear end time on all chaptered study committees so that they do not hang around forever. The study committees will always end with the final report or on the first Wednesday in November for the even year, whichever comes first.

Right now, we have chapter study committees surviving because a committee has never submitted a final report. The same language has passed for House Rules in this past session. This legislation is only one step in addressing the current committee/commission quagmire. And if you have any questions, I'd

be happy to answer them. Senator Cilley and I serve on this particular committee.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Senator DeVries.

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: Thank you, Madam Chair, and thank you, Senator, for the legislation. Can you tell me, because the bill addresses councils as well as study committees, things such as the Unemployment Advisory Council and the Workmen's Comp Advisory Council. Will they, since they do not generate a yearly report, will they automatically terminate in the odd year?

Senator Michael W. Downing, D. 22: There are some ...

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: I'm watching Pam go ... I didn't quite get that one.

Senator Michael W. Downing, D. 22: There are several people in back of me that have been following this legislation and the committee work. But there are some that will go away because they simply don't meet and they're not productive at all. There are others that are meeting, but they're not supposed to be. They're supposed to have completed their work and moved on.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Senator DeVries, follow-up.

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: Follow-up if I might. I guess I'm not seeing a requirement to meet. So am I hearing from you that if a council or other entity is meeting frequently and has ongoing business, they won't have to be concerned?

Senator Michael W. Downing, D. 22: This particular bill only deals with things that are going to be created going forward, to give them clear cut rules that it's going to expire and it's going to expire at the end of the session, or whenever they submit their final report, whichever comes first. So it gives them some ...

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: I see that, and that would be on lines 18, follow-up if I would, lines 18 and 19 of the legislation is what makes it only prospective.

Senator Michael W. Downing, D. 22: Right.

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: Okay, thank you.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Any further questions? Senator Downing, I ended up having quite a conversation with Representative Harding about this. As you know, this Committee has passed out a number of, we've called them study commissions or study committees. For example, the one on procurement and I said, oh my God, that simply cannot be done by this November, which is what would happen. Anything we create this year would go away in November. And she said, that needs to be and I, and after all this time you'd think I'd know the difference, but I don't. And I see House counsel, so if you can't answer this, we're going to get him up here. But she said that would have to be a statutory committee or commission, because we really do, I think, want other entities on that and we absolutely have to have that, procurement is such a huge issue. It's not going to get done in a year or two years. I think this is something that would have to, you know, have time, a considerable amount of time to work on the entire procurement system of the State.

And of course, Senator DeVries put forward something that would report to that commission, yet to be created, in 2013. So, can you speak to that?

Senator Michael W. Downing, D. 22: I'd rather let the counsel speak to that.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Okay, we're going to get House counsel up here.

Senator Michael W. Downing, D. 22: So I don't make a mistake.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Put him on the spot. And Pam Smarling may want to come up. I see, she clearly has studied this as well.

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: Well done, Pam.

Representative Pam Smarling: I'd be happy to.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Well, but I know that you've spent a great deal of time studying this issue as well. So you'll correct us.

Attorney David Frydman: Please feel free.

Representative Smarling: Thank you. I absolutely will.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: So for the record, if you would.

Attorney Frydman: For the record, my name is David Frydman, I'm the House legal counsel.

This bill only deals with study committees as defined in the bill, and I don't have the line number version. But the last provision under section 1 of the bills reads: in this section, study committee shall mean a committee, commission, task force, council or any other similar entity established by the General Court in chapter law to study or otherwise address a specified issue and shall not include any similar entities that are codified in statute.

And the difference there is a chapter law is a, is the laws of whatever year, 2010. It's produced every year, they tend to be a beige colored book and it starts with, you know, Chapter 1 through Chapter whatever of what's passed that year. That's a chapter law.

A statutory law is passed in the laws of that year, but it's also codified in the RSAs, the red volumes that get updated with the pocket parts. So this provision would only apply to those committees or commissions that are not codified in the RSAs. So in answer to Senator DeVries' question before about the Advisory Committee for Worker's Comp or the Advisory Committee for Medicaid State Plan, those are statutory committees that are in the RSAs and would not expire, even if they were adopted after the effective date of this section.

If a chaptered law, if a bill that's before you passes after this act takes effect and only provides for that committee to be in the chaptered law but not in the codified RSAs, then the deadline would apply.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: So, if I understand correctly, we're going to have to be careful with the procurement, you know, committee, for example. Knowing that that was going to take some time, knowing that we'd really like to have other members on that that are integrally involved with the procurement. We want them there ongoingly, we don't them to just testify before the committee. Then we would want to write that as a statutory, we need to be very careful about how we craft it.

Attorney Frydman: This bill only deals with the date upon which the committee terminates. There is, I think what you're referring to, is a new House rule that basically specifies that for purposes of study committees or similar entities that are in chaptered law, that the members on it shall only be legislators.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Right.

Attorney Frydman: So, there are two reasons to consider in the future if a bill is before you that establishes a study committee or commission or something similar in name or function. Whether you want to keep it in chapter law or codify it in the RSAs. If this bill passes, it would automatically terminate at the end of the biennium.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Right.

Attorney Frydman: Upon the final report or the December date in the biennium, or I guess it's November 1 in the biennium. And if you want that entity to exist beyond that deadline, you would want to then create it as a statutory entity that's in the RSAs.

Also, while it's not addressed in this bill, House rules now prohibit, unless they're waived by, suspended by a two-thirds majority, the passage of a bill that creates a chartered study committee that has outside members on it other than legislators. That prohibition does not apply to statutory committees.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Okay, thank you. Senator DeVries, you had a question?

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: Thank you, Madam Chair. And I'm just looking at the effective date of the bill, upon passage. And wondering about the comment that this is purely prospective, only applicable to items that are passed by study, etc., after passage of this bill. And wondering if the effective date needs to be adjusted to be sure that this is after any other legislation is, you know, if you're trying to make this for future legislative years, not for bills that may be in the hopper this year.

Attorney Frydman: That's a policy consideration on your part. You're right, if your goal is not to catch any bills that pass this term, you would probably want it to be, you know, some date in the future, July 1, 2010, 2011, for instance. But if you wanted to catch the bills in the current hop, that are in the hopper now, you might even want it to be, you'd want it to be upon passage or July 1, whichever's earlier. But that's really a policy question and I defer to the sponsor as to what the intent was in the bill, to what would be wanted to apply.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: And I think Senator Downing has something that he'd like to, do you want to wait until executive session?

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: Thank you, Madam Chair.

Senator Michael W. Downing, D. 22: I might be able to clarify this. The bills that this, the study committees that this refers to actually has a reporting date, that they have to file a report, you know, by November 1st, December 1st, whatever. Those are the ones that this applies to. It's not the ones, the committees that are in statute and they meet and they may have a yearly report. This is, the final report is due at the end of the session and those are the ones that have to understand, they either have to file their report or they're going to expire, or they have to file additional legislation to continue their work.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Okay. Are there any further questions of Attorney Frydman? Thank you very much.

Attorney Frydman: You're welcome.


Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: I'm not sure that this was the bill you were here for, but that was very ...
