Stevens, and known as the "Pratt Cemetery;" the cemetery near the Stillman Swallow place, and known as the "Gilson's Road Cemetery;" and the cemetery situated on the easterly side of Amherst Road, so called, bounded on the north by land of Roby, on the south by land of Roby and known as the "Roby Cemetery." Said cemeteries are generally classed and known as Suburban Cemeteries, and shall thereafter be known and called as Suburban Cemeteries. Two members of such board shall retire from office each year, and two members shall be elected by ballot, annually, in the month of March, by the board of mayor and aldermen of said city, in convention with said board of trustees, by majority vote, to hold their office for 5 years, retiring trustees having no vote therein, the first of which elections shall take place in March, 2010; and the term for which the members herein appointed shall hold their office shall be determined by lot, 2 to hold their office for 5 years, 2 for 4 years, 2 for 3 years, 2 for 2 years, and 2 for one year. The mayor of said city shall be ex-officio a member of said board. Said trustees shall receive no compensation for their services as such. No person shall be eligible as such trustee who is not a resident and taxpayer in said city and a lot owner in said cemetery. Said board shall meet annually on the first Monday in April for organization, and shall elect a chairman and secretary from their own number and 6 members shall constitute a quorum for the exercise of the powers and the performance of the duties of said board. Any vacancy occurring in said board, by death, removal, resignation, or otherwise, shall be filled by said board of mayor and aldermen in convention with said board of trustees for the remainder of the term.

243:3 Authority to Convey Rights and Privileges. The said board of trustees shall have authority to grant and convey to any person or persons, by deeds duly executed, the sole and exclusive right of burial, and of erecting tombs, cenotaphs, tablets, and other monuments, in any of the designated lots or subdivisions of such cemeteries, upon such terms and conditions as they by their rules and regulations shall prescribe.

243:4 How Money Disposed. The proceeds of sales of lots or rights of burial, appropriations by the city councils, or other moneys, except as provided, received for such cemeteries, shall be paid into the city treasury to be kept separate from any other funds of the city and subject to the order of said trustees, and shall be devoted to the care, improvement, embellishment, and enlargement of said cemetery under the direction of said trustees.

243:5 Bequests. The board of trustees are authorized to take and hold any grant, donation, or bequest of property; upon trust, to apply the same, or the income thereof, for the improvement or embellishment of such cemeteries, or for the erection, repair, preservation, or renewal of any monument or other erection, or for the planting and cultivation of trees, shrubs, or plants in or around any lot, or for improving the premises in any other manner or form consistent with the purposes for which such cemeteries are established, according to the terms of such grant, donation, or bequest; and whenever any such grant, donation, or bequest, or any deposit, shall be made by the owner of any lot in such cemetery, for the annual repair, preservation, or embellishment of such lot and the erection thereon, the trustees may give to such owner, or his or her representative, an

The board of trustees, as constituted under this chapter, are hereby authorized and empowered to establish and create a perpetual care fund for the Edgewood Cemetery, additional to that authorized by the original act, by setting aside such sum or sums as the board may deem best and to take, receive and place therein any donation, legacy or bequest specifically made therefore and which shall be known as the fund for the perpetual care of the paths, walks, drives and avenues of such cemetery, as well as for the fences enclosing the grounds thereof; that such fund created as aforesaid shall be invested, treated, considered, and held and the liability of the city of Nashua shall be the same as other perpetual care funds, as set forth in the original act; that the interest or income only of such fund shall be used and applied by said board of trustees for the construction, care, and maintenance of such paths, walks, drives, avenues, and fences of such cemetery.

243:6 Disposal of Gifts. Any sums of money so received by the trustees shall be invested by the city treasurer of Nashua, under the direction of the trustees, in savings banks, or in any securities in which savings banks are authorized to invest, and all such property received under the provisions of the foregoing section, unless other provision is made by the terms of any such grant, donation, or bequest, shall be invested under the charge of said city treasurer, but shall always remain separate from and independent of any other moneys or property belonging to said city of Nashua and free from all control of the city council; and the income of such fund or funds shall be received by said treasurer, subject to the order of said trustees, and shall be appropriated by them in such manner as shall in their opinion best promote the purposes for which said grants, donations, bequests, or deposits are made.

243:7 City Responsible for Trustees. The city of Nashua shall be responsible for the good faith of said trustees and the treasurer of said city in the execution of any trust which they may assume pursuant to the foregoing provisions; but said trustees shall not be liable to make any renewal or reconstruction of any monument or other erection, on any lot in such cemeteries, unless such liability shall be expressed in the agreement given them as aforesaid, or in the terms and conditions under which they accept any grant, donation, or bequest.

243:8 Report. The board of trustees shall annually, in the month of December, make a detailed report in writing to the city councils of their acts and proceedings and of the condition of the cemeteries, and an account of the receipts and expenditures for the same, and funds subject to their order.

The initial members of 20 the Edgewood Cemetery Board of Trustees and the Woodlawn Cemetery Board of Trustees shall be 21 constituted by the mayor in convention with the board of trustees in office at the date of enactment 22 23 of this act. II. Each board shall appoint a chair, a vice chair, and a secretary. The secretary of each board shall keep the minutes of the board, post meetings, and prepare an annual report. The city treasurer shall keep the books and prepare the books for audit. The city treasurer and the trustees of the trust fund shall prepare an annual report for the mayor and the office of the attorney general.

243:2 Powers and Duties.

- I. The Edgewood Cemetery Board of Trustees and the Woodlawn Cemetery Board of Trustees shall:
- (a) Adopt bylaws and regulations for their transaction of business and for the establishment and management of all municipal cemeteries within their responsibility.
- (b) Prepare an annual budget indicating what support and maintenance shall be required out of public funds for submission to the appropriate agency of the city. A separate budget request shall be submitted for planning and establishment of a new public cemetery and for capital improvements or expansion of an existing public cemetery.
- (c) Authorize the expenditure of all moneys raised and appropriated by the city for cemetery purposes. Such funds shall be maintained in the general fund and paid in the same manner that funds of other city departments are paid.
- (d) Authorize the expenditure of income from all trust funds for cemetery purposes in accordance with the conditions of each donation or bequest accepted by the city. Such trust funds shall be held in the custody and under the management of the boards of cemetery trustees. The trust income shall be transferred to the city of Nashua by the boards of cemetery trustees and the city treasurer who shall disburse the same in response to vouchers executed by the Edgewood and Woodlawn boards of trustees, if the requested funds are available. Such trust fund income shall not be commingled with the moneys raised and appropriated by the city.
 - (e) Prepare deeds of cemetery lots for the mayor to sign.
- (f) Set apart and lay out a portion of the Edgewood Cemetery and a portion of the Woodlawn Cemetery; not exceeding one tenth of their area, as a public burial-place for the use of the inhabitants of Nashua, free of any charge, and they shall lay out the balance of said cemeteries in suitable lots or other subdivisions for family or other burying-places with all the necessary paths, avenues, and drives, and may plant and embellish the same with trees, shrubs, flowers, and other ornaments, and may enclose the same with proper and suitable fences or hedges, and erect or annex thereto such suitable edifices, appendages, and conveniences from time to time as expedient.

What the bill does: This bill consolidates the boards of the Edgewood, Woodlawn, and Suburban Cemeteries in Nashua.

Who supports the bill: Rep. David Campbell Hills 24, Senator Bette Lasky Dist.13, and Donnalee Lozeau, Mayor of Nashua.

Who opposes the bill: No one appeared in opposition.

Summary of testimony received:

Prime Sponsor: Senator Lasky

The Chair, Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, opened the hearing on Senate Bill 72-FN-L and invited the prime sponsor, Senator Bette Lasky, to introduce the legislation.

Senator Bette R. Lasky, D. 13: Thank you, Madam Chair. For the record, I'm Senator Bette Lasky from District 13 in Nashua. I'm here today on behalf of the City of Nashua to present to you a bill to consolidate the local Cemetery Boards of Trustees in the City of Nashua.

We have three cemeteries, I believe, in the City and of which right now they all need trustees and Boards of Trustees that have to be appointed by the Mayor. As you know, it's difficult to find good people to do anything these days without pay.

So, it makes much more sense to and will probably better serve the cemeteries to consolidate them and have one board. I have the Mayor here who has been dealing with this and who requested that this be done and who's much more capable to speak to it than I.

So, I would appreciate it that we bring her forth after our Representative Campbell. Thank you for hearing this.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Thank you, Senator Lasky. I do have one question. I noticed that there's a fiscal note on it that says total impact of less than ten thousand dollars. Could you explain that?



Senator Bette R. Lasky, D. 13: Particularly no, but evidently...

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: And one would think it would be less than more.

Senator Bette R. Lasky, D. 13: Exactly. I would think it is less and probably the Mayor can enlighten you on that and the other thing is I wonder why it had a fiscal note to begin with. But, maybe someone can shed some light on that, I'm afraid I can't, sorry.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Are there any other questions for Senator Lasky? Thank you.

Senator Bette R. Lasky, D. 13: Thank you.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: And with that, I'm not seeing, thank you very much. The Chair recognizes Representative Campbell.

Representative David Campbell, Hills/24: Thank you, Madam Chairman and honorable Senators. I will be very brief, I too am here at the request of the City and representing many members of the House delegation who are in favor of this.

It's basically an efficiency matter. Hopefully there will be some costs savings as well and dare I say I've been dying to say this all day...

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: No pun intended, I'm sure.

Representative Campbell: Volunteers are not dying to take these jobs. So, with that...

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: In this business, one has to get their chuckles any where you can.

Representative Campbell: Any where you can.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Exactly. Are there any questions for, Representative Campbell? Thank you very much.

Representative Campbell: Thank you all.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Now I only see, not only, I see also Donnalee Lozeau of Nashua. Are you the Mayor?



Mayor Donnalee Lozeau: Yes.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Okay and is there anybody else that has not signed up to speak or in support or opposition? So, Ms. Lozeau, if you would come forward?

Mayor Lozeau: Thank you, Madam Chairman. For the record, my name is Donnalee Lozeau. I serve as the Mayor for the City of Nashua and this issue is before you because as I started my term about a year ago, looking at the different responsibilities I had, one of them was to collect all of the boards and commissions and task forces that exist in Nashua and determine whether or not we had vacancies and if we did where were they and how would we fill them and at the same time, taking a look at any that maybe don't need to exist anymore, or just taking a look overall.

One of the things I quickly discovered was that we had three Cemetery Boards of Trustees and we had difficulty filling any of the positions on all of them, never mind three separate ones. In addition, I was really excited to learn that I was a member of each of them and they had meetings when they thought they should or shouldn't and there was really no way to support them and provide any of the administrative support they needed.

I had a meeting with each of the members that were on a Board of Trustees and have one right now that has no members at all, which was a real problem. So, instead of trying to find members for that other group, it seemed to make sense for any number of reasons to have a single Cemetery Board of Trustees in the City of Nashua and give them responsibility for the three separate. One is a cemetery Woodlawn and one is a cemetery Edgewood and then the suburban cemeteries kind of all those other ones that aren't Woodlawn or Edgewood.

We have also had an offer of late to take ownership of the Lutheran Cemetery in Nashua and I'm not in a position to really make a determination on whether that's a good idea or a bad idea and really don't have a Board of Trustees in place that I could go to and say, could you take a look at this and tell me whether it makes sense.

When I took a look at this, I thought, well, I'll just look at the city ordinance, see what we can do to change it and discovered that really the only way to change it was through state legislation.

So, that's why I'm here today asking you to grant this change in the state law so that we can take care of the cemeteries in Nashua the way the law



intended us to take care of it and not in the manner in which I discovered we are taking care of it.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Thank you very much. Are there any questions for Mayor Lozeau? Senator DeVries.

<u>Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18</u>: Thank you, Madam Chair and your Honor, welcome back to the Legislature.

Mayor Lozeau: Thank you.

<u>Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18</u>: I have a couple of questions for you. First, has this been before the Board of Mayor and Aldermen? I assume you brought it forward at the local level and they approved this action or do they not need to?

Mayor Lozeau: They don't need to necessarily. There may be some charter changes that we'll have to do after, but I have found unlike me, they don't have a whole lot of faith oftentimes. I'll often get, well, you know you have to change the state law and I say, okay, well, that's a big deal. Actually, it's not. So, I really wanted to be able to come back and say, they're letting us do this, let's get it done.

All my appointments go through the Board of Aldermen, so they have to approve that and they know that I've made a concerted effort since I've been there. I've had almost a hundred appointments now in a year to our different boards and commissions and we're almost at full compliment citywide.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Follow up, Senator DeVries?

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: Follow up if I might? I'm not sure that this is enabling legislation; I believe that our action will be the final action. So I'm hoping that your board is in agreement with you, that they would like to see this action taken. But, that being said, I see within the legislation, there is a separation of existing trusts, so there will be the continuation of maintenance of funds dedicated for that purpose of certain gravesites? I guess is the proper term. Do you believe in this you have the ability to separate future grants or receipts of dollars that and dedicate them either to specific gravesites or specific cemeteries?

Mayor Lozeau: Yes.

<u>Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18</u>: So, you can go forward with a grant just for one of the three?



Mayor Lozeau: Absolutely.

<u>Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18</u>: And keep those funds dedicated? That is your intent?

Mayor Lozeau: That's my intent. We're going to keep them separate now. As a matter of fact, I grabbed my folder before I came up here and I found that I have the trust fund information for this suburban cemetery, which is Whitman Fund and there's like two or three for each of the different cemeteries. We've been able to, we have an investment management group and I should also, because you gave me the opportunity, all of the Alderman know that I'm interested in doing this. As a matter of fact, Representative Clemons who's on this, her son is an Aldermen-at-Large, so they're very well aware that I've been talking about doing this. I would not be here asking for this if I thought that when I got back, they were going to say, I don't know why you did it, you shouldn't have.

So, I think, that we're in good stead there and our financial department also is on board, because they're the ones that manage these trusts. Well, the Trustees oversee them, the funds are actually in an account that the City is responsible to oversee.

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: Thank you, your Honor.

Mayor Lozeau: You're welcome.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Are there further questions? Mayor Lozeau, as I read this bill, this isn't simply enabling, this is directive in terms of this is the way things will be if this passes both Chambers. I'm wondering, I personally would feel a little bit more comfortable to know that the Council... Is it the Council or the Selectmen?

Mayor Lozeau: Board of Aldermen in Nashua.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Board of Aldermen, okay. I come from an SB2 town, so, I would feel a little more comfortable knowing that there was support. Did they know this hearing was today?

Mayor Lozeau: No. Well, I guess no. I don't see why they would. Nashua and Manchester are your two towns where you have a full-time Mayor. This, from our legal counsel perspective, fell under the administration of the City and so, I felt comfortable in coming here and doing this.



Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Oh, okay. I don't want to imply, it seems to make an awful lot of sense to me, but...

Mayor Lozeau: I'm just saying that the next steps to this are going to require action by both myself and the Board of Aldermen.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Okay. Also, is there any concern whatsoever. You've now had three Boards of Trustees, one of which is vacant in its entirety and then you've had two others. Is there any question or concern that the trustees and I'm assuming if you have trustees who have been willing to serve given how difficult it is to attract very many others, Is there any danger that they would be more favorable to one of the cemeteries than the other? I guess I'm just trying to anticipate whether there would be an outcry from families of residents of the other cemetery. I don't know how to ask that delicately.

Mayor Lozeau: I know exactly what you're asking.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Thank you.

Mayor Lozeau: All of the funds that exist for all of our cemeteries right now are long-time trusts and many of them do not have family that's in a position to raise any concerns. But, it has been quite some time that those funds have existed and they are specifically within the trust dedicated to, this is for the Pratt Cemetery, this is for Edgewood. So, there wouldn't be an opportunity, I think, for favoritism to be one way or the other. We have been providing city resources for a very long time to do what needs to be done in the cemeteries, with all due respect to the trustees, without much of their involvement. We oversee the purchase of the equipment necessary. We provide fuel for the vehicles. We employ the staff that provides the work. Right now, we have one staff person that is responsible for the Edgewood Cemetery and all the suburban cemeteries. Just because the trustees at Edgewood said, okay, why don't you do it. The Woodlawn Cemetery is larger than Edgewood, so, they take care of just that one. The only pushback I've had, was from the two staff members who said, who's going to be in charge? Thinking that one of them would become the assistant to the other and that's...

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: That was part of my question.

Mayor Lozeau: And most of the trustees know that. Many of our trustees are older and more interested and/or funeral directors that sort of thing. I...

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Sorry.



Mayor Lozeau: And I do understand that after I leave here, I have to make sure that they are all onboard with it and I have to appoint in a manner that brings them to the table so that when we choose the trustees for the one Board, that they are all on board. I could take every single trustee that's in place right now, put them on this new Board and still have vacancies and that's my intention. My intention is take all the existing trustees and simply move them into here and then fill the remaining slots.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Thank you very much. Any further questions? Senator DeVries.

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: Thank you, Madam Chair. I just want to be clear that I understand the intent of what you think is happening with the legislation. On page two, I don't know if you have a copy of the bill?

Mayor Lozeau: I do.

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: I know you know the process. On page two, lines twenty-four to thirty, talk about how the money can be disposed. My understanding is that the funds from the sale of lots will be now co-mingled, rather than separately into three as they exist today? Co-mingled into one account that will flow into the City and be appropriated in any way the Board and Mayor and Aldermen feel appropriate for repair of the, any of the three. So, it's not like the funds will remain segregated to any one cemetery. Sale of lots will flow into one column and then can possibly be used to repair one of the other cemeteries. Is that correct?

Mayor Lozeau: Actually, let me just tell you a little bit of the process. When I had this discussion with our legal department and some of the trustees and staff and folks involved and I said here's the goal. We provided to Legislative Services all of the information that we could find that was related to this. The money is divided this way. There is the money that is dedicated through trust funds that has to do whatever that says. The other money that you're referring to, doesn't come into the city general fund. The City, although it may not lay out in the State legislation, the City has a dedicated fund right now in place for those cemeteries.

So, it's not like the money might come in and the City is short of funds for something else, so they take those funds and they use them for a new plow truck. That can't happen. This is still to give the authority to the trustees to designate how the funds might come in. So, if you buy a plot in one cemetery and you pay for it, those funds go into that cemetery. Just how we set it up structurally within that fund, we haven't talked about.

But, I just wanted to make sure that you understood that it's not part of our general fund and if they say, for instance, the cemetery trustees decide that our suburban cemetery needs more funds, they could take money out of the cemetery general fund or designated fund and maybe move things around. This does not preclude that from happening.

<u>Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6</u>: Okay, thank you. Senator DeVries, follow up?

<u>Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18</u>: Because I see that I do understand that it's falling into some sort of a dedicated fund, but no longer dedicated to the cemetery that the sale of lots occurred at?

Mayor Lozeau: Doesn't have to be. Right.

<u>Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18</u>: You could have a new cemetery and sell a lot of lots there and the proceeds from that can be used from an older filled...

Mayor Lozeau: Right.

<u>Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18</u>: ...completely full cemetery. There is a proper term for that.

Mayor Lozeau: I know.

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: And that's your understanding of what you wanted to happen?

Mayor Lozeau: Yes, because I wanted the control to still rest with the trustees and that's what this does.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Thank you. Seeing no other questions and no other speakers, I'll close the hearing.

In addition, I was really excited to learn that I was a member of each of them and they had meetings when they thought they should or shouldn't and there was really no way to support them and provide any of the administrative support they needed.

I had a meeting with each of the members that were on a Board of Trustees and have one right now that has no members at all, which was a real problem. So, instead of trying to find members for that other group, it seemed to make sense for any number of reasons to have a single Cemetery Board of Trustees in the City of Nashua and give them responsibility for the three separate. One is a cemetery Woodlawn and one is a cemetery Edgewood and then the suburban cemeteries kind of all those other ones that aren't Woodlawn or Edgewood.

We have also had an offer of late to take ownership of the Lutheran Cemetery in Nashua and I'm not in a position to really make a determination on whether that's a good idea or a bad idea and really don't have a Board of Trustees in place that I could go to and say, could you take a look at this and tell me whether it makes sense.

When I took a look at this, I thought, well, I'll just look at the city ordinance, see what we can do to change it and discovered that really the only way to change it was through state legislation.

So, that's why I'm here today asking you to grant this change in the state law so that we can take care of the cemeteries in Nashua the way the law



intended us to take care of it and not in the manner in which I discovered we are taking care of it.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Thank you very much. Are there any questions for Mayor Lozeau? Senator DeVries.

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: Thank you, Madam Chair and your Honor, welcome back to the Legislature.

Mayor Lozeau: Thank you.

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: I have a couple of questions for you. First, has this been before the Board of Mayor and Aldermen? I assume you brought it forward at the local level and they approved this action or do they not need to?

Mayor Lozeau: They don't need to necessarily. There may be some charter changes that we'll have to do after, but I have found unlike me, they don't have a whole lot of faith oftentimes. I'll often get, well, you know you have to change the state law and I say, okay, well, that's a big deal. Actually, it's not. So, I really wanted to be able to come back and say, they're letting us do this, let's get it done.

All my appointments go through the Board of Aldermen, so they have to approve that and they know that I've made a concerted effort since I've been there. I've had almost a hundred appointments now in a year to our different boards and commissions and we're almost at full compliment citywide.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Follow up, Senator DeVries?

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: Follow up if I might? I'm not sure that this is enabling legislation; I believe that our action will be the final action. So I'm hoping that your board is in agreement with you, that they would like to see this action taken. But, that being said, I see within the legislation, there is a separation of existing trusts, so there will be the continuation of maintenance of funds dedicated for that purpose of certain gravesites? I guess is the proper term. Do you believe in this you have the ability to separate future grants or receipts of dollars that and dedicate them either to specific gravesites or specific cemeteries?

Mayor Lozeau: Yes.

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: So, you can go forward with a grant just for one of the three?



Mayor Lozeau: Absolutely.

<u>Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18</u>: And keep those funds dedicated? That is your intent?

Mayor Lozeau: That's my intent. We're going to keep them separate now. As a matter of fact, I grabbed my folder before I came up here and I found that I have the trust fund information for this suburban cemetery, which is Whitman Fund and there's like two or three for each of the different cemeteries. We've been able to, we have an investment management group and I should also, because you gave me the opportunity, all of the Alderman know that I'm interested in doing this. As a matter of fact, Representative Clemons who's on this, her son is an Aldermen-at-Large, so they're very well aware that I've been talking about doing this. I would not be here asking for this if I thought that when I got back, they were going to say, I don't know why you did it, you shouldn't have.

So, I think, that we're in good stead there and our financial department also is on board, because they're the ones that manage these trusts. Well, the Trustees oversee them, the funds are actually in an account that the City is responsible to oversee.

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: Thank you, your Honor.

Mayor Lozeau: You're welcome.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Are there further questions? Mayor Lozeau, as I read this bill, this isn't simply enabling, this is directive in terms of this is the way things will be if this passes both Chambers. I'm wondering, I personally would feel a little bit more comfortable to know that the Council... Is it the Council or the Selectmen?

Mayor Lozeau: Board of Aldermen in Nashua.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Board of Aldermen, okay. I come from an SB2 town, so, I would feel a little more comfortable knowing that there was support. Did they know this hearing was today?

Mayor Lozeau: No. Well, I guess no. I don't see why they would. Nashua and Manchester are your two towns where you have a full-time Mayor. This, from our legal counsel perspective, fell under the administration of the City and so, I felt comfortable in coming here and doing this.



Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Oh, okay. I don't want to imply, it seems to make an awful lot of sense to me, but...

Mayor Lozeau: I'm just saying that the next steps to this are going to require action by both myself and the Board of Aldermen.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Okay. Also, is there any concern whatsoever. You've now had three Boards of Trustees, one of which is vacant in its entirety and then you've had two others. Is there any question or concern that the trustees and I'm assuming if you have trustees who have been willing to serve given how difficult it is to attract very many others, Is there any danger that they would be more favorable to one of the cemeteries than the other? I guess I'm just trying to anticipate whether there would be an outcry from families of residents of the other cemetery. I don't know how to ask that delicately.

Mayor Lozeau: I know exactly what you're asking.

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Thank you.

All of the funds that exist for all of our cemeteries right now Mavor Lozeau: are long-time trusts and many of them do not have family that's in a position to raise any concerns. But, it has been quite some time that those funds have existed and they are specifically within the trust dedicated to, this is for the Pratt Cemetery, this is for Edgewood. So, there wouldn't be an opportunity, I think, for favoritism to be one way or the other. We have been providing city resources for a very long time to do what needs to be done in the cemeteries, with all due respect to the trustees, without much of their involvement. We oversee the purchase of the equipment necessary. We provide fuel for the vehicles. We employ the staff that provides the work. Right now, we have one staff person that is responsible for the Edgewood Cemetery and all the suburban cemeteries. Just because the trustees at Edgewood said, okay, why don't vou do it. The Woodlawn Cemetery is larger than Edgewood, so, they take care of just that one. The only pushback I've had, was from the two staff members who said, who's going to be in charge? Thinking that one of them would become the assistant to the other and that's...

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: That was part of my question.

Mayor Lozeau: And most of the trustees know that. Many of our trustees are older and more interested and/or funeral directors that sort of thing. I...

Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6: Sorry.



Mayor Lozeau: And I do understand that after I leave here, I have to make sure that they are all onboard with it and I have to appoint in a manner that brings them to the table so that when we choose the trustees for the one Board, that they are all on board. I could take every single trustee that's in place right now, put them on this new Board and still have vacancies and that's my intention. My intention is take all the existing trustees and simply move them into here and then fill the remaining slots.

<u>Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6</u>: Thank you very much. Any further questions? Senator DeVries.

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: Thank you, Madam Chair. I just want to be clear that I understand the intent of what you think is happening with the legislation. On page two, I don't know if you have a copy of the bill?

Mayor Lozeau: I do.

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: I know you know the process. On page two, lines twenty-four to thirty, talk about how the money can be disposed. My understanding is that the funds from the sale of lots will be now co-mingled, rather than separately into three as they exist today? Co-mingled into one account that will flow into the City and be appropriated in any way the Board and Mayor and Aldermen feel appropriate for repair of the, any of the three. So, it's not like the funds will remain segregated to any one cemetery. Sale of lots will flow into one column and then can possibly be used to repair one of the other cemeteries. Is that correct?

Mayor Lozeau: Actually, let me just tell you a little bit of the process. When I had this discussion with our legal department and some of the trustees and staff and folks involved and I said here's the goal. We provided to Legislative Services all of the information that we could find that was related to this. The money is divided this way. There is the money that is dedicated through trust funds that has to do whatever that says. The other money that you're referring to, doesn't come into the city general fund. The City, although it may not lay out in the State legislation, the City has a dedicated fund right now in place for those cemeteries.

So, it's not like the money might come in and the City is short of funds for something else, so they take those funds and they use them for a new plow truck. That can't happen. This is still to give the authority to the trustees to designate how the funds might come in. So, if you buy a plot in one cemetery and you pay for it, those funds go into that cemetery. Just how we set it up structurally within that fund, we haven't talked about.



But, I just wanted to make sure that you understood that it's not part of our general fund and if they say, for instance, the cemetery trustees decide that our suburban cemetery needs more funds, they could take money out of the cemetery general fund or designated fund and maybe move things around. This does not preclude that from happening.

<u>Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6</u>: Okay, thank you. Senator DeVries, follow up?

<u>Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18</u>: Because I see that I do understand that it's falling into some sort of a dedicated fund, but no longer dedicated to the cemetery that the sale of lots occurred at?

Mayor Lozeau: Doesn't have to be. Right.

<u>Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18</u>: You could have a new cemetery and sell a lot of lots there and the proceeds from that can be used from an older filled...

Mayor Lozeau: Right.

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: ...completely full cemetery. There is a proper term for that.

Mayor Lozeau: I know.

Senator Betsi DeVries, D. 18: And that's your understanding of what you wanted to happen?

Mayor Lozeau: Yes, because I wanted the control to still rest with the trustees and that's what this does.

<u>Senator Jacalyn L. Cilley, D. 6</u>: Thank you. Seeing no other questions and no other speakers, I'll close the hearing.

Friday February 6, 2009 is the first time we at Woodlawn Cemetery learned through the grapevine that a bill (SB72) was filed to eliminate our Board of Trustees. We received no communication about this bill from The City of Nashua.

SB72 - Cemetery Consolidation in Nashua.

Facts you may not know when considering this bill.

There are no savings in this bill. There are much higher taxpayer costs. This bill is going to cost the Taxpayers of Nashua, NH a <u>lot</u> more money than the way it is now.

Since 1995 Woodlawn Cemetery in Nashua has been showing a profit. The income from the cemetery exceeds our budget. It costs the City of Nashua \$0.00 for our budget which is not true of any other cemetery. Edgewood requires taxpayers dollars to support their budget. Woodlawn's Perpetual Portfolio is one the best performing cemetery portfolios in the State of New Hampshire.

Woodlawn has an active board. Board meets regularly. We have a 5 trustee investment committee which meets every month. The Perpetual Care Portfolio is monitored daily with a consistent goal of growth and income.

Woodlawn manages its own Perpetual Care Portfolio. There is no cost to the City of Nashua. Edgewood Cemetery, on the other hand, is managed (administered) by the City's bank at an annual cost to the City of Nashua of \$ 27,823.83. (fiscal 2008) Over the last 4 years, Woodlawn has saved the City of Nashua over \$ 97,000.00 in bank administration costs.

And, Woodlawn's perpetual portfolio earns twice as much as Edgewood's. Below I have laid out the investment numbers for you to review. It shows clearly that Woodlawn's performance is far better than Edgewood's. This bill would invest Woodlawn's perpetual trust the same way as Edgewood's, costing the City of Nashua more than \$ 27,000 in annual administration fees because Woodlawn's perpetual trust is larger than Edgewood's. Woodlawn's

perpetual portfolio would also earn a lower yield (return) than it does now if administered by the City's bank. In current percentage terms, the new consolidation plan would reduce Woodlawn's investment income by more than \$50,000.00. if invested by the City's bank.

Woodlawn's investment income is double that of Edgewood's. Edgewood's bank costs are 26% of their total investment income. The City is paying \$ 27,823 to earn \$106,645 for Edgewood.

Consistent with a strategy of growth and income Woodlawn has outperformed Edgewood in growth as well as income.

Woodlawn is taking care of non perpetual care lots out of it's budget. That accounts for one third of the lots at the cemetery. RSA 289 says the City of Nashua is responsible for the cost of maintaining the non perpetual care lots, but we do it.

Edgewood is much smaller in size than Woodlawn, but Edgewood costs more to run. Prices are much higher at Edgewood than Woodlawn. 2 grave lots cost \$1200.00 at Woodlawn and \$2,000.00 at Edgewood. Burial fees are \$450.00 at Woodlawn and \$525.00 at Edgewood. We try to keep the costs down for the taxpayers and families of Nashua.

Our commitment under the Legislative Enactment of 1895, as trustees, is to perpetuate and embellish Woodlawn Cemetery. We do it well. SB72 is fiscally irresponsible. At this difficult economic time please do not end what our Board does so well, and place a larger burden on the taxpayers of Nashua.

Hi Shannon,

Thank you so much for assisting me with SB 72. There are two areas of concern as follows:

243:5 Bequests. The board of trustees are authorized to take and hold any grant, donation, or bequest of property; upon trust, to apply the same, or the income thereof, for the improvement or embellishment of such cemeteries, or for the erection, repair, preservation, or renewal of any monument or other erection, or for the planting and cultivation of trees, shrubs, or plants in or around any lot, or for improving the premises in any other manner or form consistent with the purposes for which such cemeteries are established, according to the terms of such grant, donation, or bequest; and whenever any such grant, donation, or bequest, or any deposit, shall be made by the owner of any lot in such cemetery, for the annual repair, preservation, or embellishment of such lot and the erection thereon, the trustees may give to such owner, or his or her representative. an agreement or obligation, in such form and upon such terms and conditions as they may establish, binding themselves and their successors to preserve and keep in repair said lot forever, or for such period as may be agreed on; and any legacy, bequest, donation, grant, or deposit heretofore made to said city for like purposes in such cemetery, and now in force, shall be placed under the control of the board of trustees. The board of trustees, as constituted under this chapter, are hereby authorized and empowered to establish and create a perpetual care fund for the Edgewood Cemetery, additional to that authorized by the original act, by setting aside such sum or sums as the board may deem best and to take, receive and place therein any donation, legacy or bequest specifically made therefore and which shall be known as the fund for the perpetual care of the paths, walks, drives and avenues of such cemetery, as well as for the fences enclosing the grounds thereof; that such fund created as aforesaid shall be invested, treated, considered, and held and the liability of the city of Nashua shall be the same as other perpetual care funds, as set forth in the original act; that the interest or income only of such fund shall be used and applied by said board of trustees for the construction, care, and maintenance of such paths, walks, drives, avenues, and fences of such cemetery.

The words "perpetual care" have been classified by the NH Supreme Court as creating a valid charitable trust. This means if John Smith gives \$10,000 in trust for the perpetual care of his lot the fund must be accounted for separately and the income can be used for his lot and his lot only and not for general cemetery maintenance or capital improvement. Therefore John Smith's fund could not be placed in a common "perpetual care fund", it must be reported and expended separately. Additionally, the instrument of creation - the will, trust, etc., controls the purpose for which the fund may be expended and the language highlighted above may be problematic if the donor has not given the Trustees the authority to "set aside such sum or sums as the board may deem best" for the purposes specified.

243:8 Report. The board of trustees shall annually, in the month of December, make a detailed report in writing to the city councils of their acts and proceedings and of the

condition of the cemeteries, and an account of the receipts and expenditures for the same, and funds subject to their order.
