What the concurrent resolution does: Congratulates the Boy Scouts of America on the occasion of its 100th anniversary.

Who supports the resolution: Representative Major; Senator Reynolds; Senator Carson; Senator Gilmour; Senator Lasky; Senator Barnes, Jr.; Senator Downing; Paul C. Smith, BSA Troop 357, Rochester, NH

Who opposes the resolution: No one.

Summary of testimony received:

Senator John Barnes, Jr.

- Introduced the legislation on behalf of Senator Letourneau who was not able to attend the hearing.
- He gave a brief history of the origins of scouting in England and the Boy Scouts of America. He spoke of a businessman who became lost in the fog of London and was able to find his way thanks to a Scout and returned to the US to start the Boy Scouts of America on February 8, 1910.
- He cited that most Senators have had occasion to send forth commendations to Eagle Scouts/Boy Scouts/Cub Scouts troops in their districts over the years, many Senators are scouts themselves.
- He brought forth Amendment #0925 for consideration by the Committee, which expands the resolution to include the Yankee Clipper Council based in Haverhill, MA, representing Boy Scouts in 9 Southern New Hampshire towns.

- The legislation, as amended, would congratulate all Boy Scouts in New Hampshire on the 100th anniversary of the inception of the organization.
- It's a nice way for the Senate to acknowledge the organization and will be appreciated by the scouts, parents and volunteers.

Paul C. Smith

- Mr. Smith spoke in favor of SCR 3 and identified himself as co-author of the resolution along with Sen. Letourneau. He helped author the resolution that congratulated the Boy Scouts of America when it was their 95th anniversary.
- He is a volunteer and assistant scoutmaster with Troop 357 in Rochester, NH. He is particularly proud of the Scouts' Venturing program, a co-ed program that helps teens with socialization at an awkward time in their life.
- He will be attending the National Scout Jamboree this summer, celebrating Boy Scouts of America's 100th Anniversary and asks that the Committee support SCR 3.

Funding: Not applicable.

Future Action: Senator Lasky moved 'Ought to Pass with Amendment.' Senator Merrill seconded the motion. The Committee voted 3 to 0 in support of the motion. Senator Letourneau will report the bill out of Committee.

Incidentally, the Girl Scouts, I believe, are 95 years old this month. So five years from now they also will be a hundred years old. And there's quite a history of the Scouts and how it started. Fellow got lost in the fog over in London and he was helped by a fellow and came back to America and all the good things that have happened. And there have been a lot of folks who've been Scouts. I was a Boy Scout. I didn't get to be an Eagle Scout. I only had thirteen merit badges and you needed twenty-one. And one of the things that I wish I had been able to continue, but someday I'll tell you the story, which I don't think you want to hear here, because I think you're in a hurry to move on.

There is an amendment to this bill. And the amendment is if you go to the last page, the last, let's see, twenty-five, line 25, that copies of this resolution be transmitted by the Senate Clerk to the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America in Irving, Texas and to Daniel Webster Council, Boy Scouts of America in Manchester. And what Senator Letourneau would like to do is add, "and to the Yankee Clipper Council of Boy Scouts of America in Haverhill, Mass, which I believe is the council that handles the southern tier of the Boy Scouts here in New Hampshire. And that is, happens to be in Senator Letourneau's neighborhood.

So that is all that amendment does and I'll pass it on to you. And I'm going to pass on Senator Letourneau's testimony. It's just a nice thing for us to do for the Boy Scouts and I'm sure it will be appreciated.

As you all know if you've gone to these ceremonies it's a family affair, such as the Girl Scouts, also a family affair. The families get deeply involved with this. And if you haven't attended Eagle Scout ceremonies, I suggest that you do it. I think I've been to, maybe seventy-five of them in the last twenty years and the parents love it. And the cake they always have is delicious, too. They always have a cake at the end, and it's always very good. Go for an end piece, I always do. And they usually give me an end piece.

Senator Molly Kelly, D. 10: Okay.

Senator John S. Barnes, Jr., D. 17: With that, I will end my testimony and let's go Boy Scouts. And get this on the floor and get it moving along.

Senator Molly Kelly, D. 10: Thank you. Senator Lasky, do you have any questions for Senator Barnes?

Senator John S. Barnes, Jr., D. 17: Oh, she's dying to ask one.

Senator Bette R. Lasky, D. 13: No, I don't.

Senator John S. Barnes, Jr., D. 17: Thank you very much, Madam Chair, members of the Committee, and staff.

Senator Molly Kelly, D. 10: I have Senator Downing here to speak but I, maybe meant to sign in, in favor. Does anybody know? If he's, is he outside the door?

Paul Smith: Thank you, Madam Chair. For the record, my name is Paul Smith. I'm a Scout volunteer. I'm Assistant Scout Master in Rochester, New Hampshire. I'm also a docent at the Lawrence L. Lee Scout Museum at Camp Carpenter in Manchester. I'm actually the author of this Resolution. Senator Letourneau and I have been friends since we served together in the House many years ago. And I actually wrote the 95th Anniversary Resolution for him as well. This one is much better. I did quite a bit of research when writing it.

There's just a couple things I'd like to point out. And one of those is that in 1998, and you can see that right in the Resolution, Venturing was created. And that is a coed program for boys and girls from ages fourteen to twenty-one. And it is one of our crowning achievements in the Boy Scouts of America, because it does really help with socialization, especially in that awkward teenage phase. And that is, that is definitely one of the things that we're very proud of.

I did try to encompass many of the important factors in this Resolution. I didn't mention any specific names, such as Walter Cronkite or John F. Kennedy or anything like that because, you know, I wanted this to be more celebratory in nature given that this is the big 100th anniversary. I am fortunate enough to be going to Fort A.P. Hill for our 100th Anniversary National Jamboree this year which President Obama will be at to speak to our 130,000 Scouts that are projected to be there. So this is, this is quite a monumental feat for us.

Speaking on behalf of myself, I will not write a 105th Resolution for Senator Letourneau. So hopefully, this will be it. That's it, thank you.

Senator Molly Kelly, D. 10: Thank you so much.

Mr. Smith: Thank you.

Senator Molly Kelly, D. 10: And thank you for your good work on this and your work with the Boy Scouts as well.

Mr. Smith: Thank you.

Senator Molly Kelly, D. 10: Did you have a question for him?

Senator Bette R. Lasky, D. 13: I had a question.

Senator Molly Kelly, D. 10: Senator Lasky has a question.

Mr. Smith: I'm sorry, Senator.

Senator Bette R. Lasky, D. 13: No, not to you.

Mr. Smith: Okay.

Senator Molly Kelly, D. 10: Oh.

Senator Bette R. Lasky, D. 13: I'm sorry. I forgot to ask Senator Barnes a question.

Senator Molly Kelly, D. 10: Senator Barnes would you mind coming forward?

Senator John S. Barnes, Jr., D. 17: Can I turn it down? Or no?

Senator Bette R. Lasky, D. 13: You can, you might be better off.

Senator Bette R. Lasky, D. 13: Thank you very much for doing so.

Senator John S. Barnes, Jr., D. 17: He appreciated it. I showed him where the Big Ben was. He wanted to know where Big Ben, was so I showed him where Big Ben was.

Senator Bette R. Lasky, D. 13: Well, I certainly hope you'd help an old lady like myself if I was lost in a fog.

Senator John S. Barnes, Jr., D. 17: Senator Cilley won't let him out of the room.



Testimony for SCR 3
March 8, 2010
Senate Education Committee

Chairman Kelly and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony concerning SCR-3.

The Boy Scouts of America is one of this country's greatest treasures and a well respected training program for our young boys and men. Founded on February 8, 1910 the Boy Scouts of America have provided an educational, civic and person fitness programs for over 110 million of these young adults. Scouts enter the program through the Dens as Tigers and eventually take flights as Eagles...

Rooted in Victorian values Rooted in Victorian values, The Boy Scouts of America (BSA) is a 20th-century phenomenon and a powerful civic force. More than a million Boy Scouts and half a million adult volunteers contribute 50 million service hours a year. Locally in my district the Eagle Scout program alone has contributed to about one half a million dollars worth of community service in the past decade. The Boy Scouts of America is unique among the country's largest nonprofit groups in that volunteers at the local level are responsible for much of its planning.

Although many ideas were incorporated into the Boy Scouts of America, a chance encounter on a foggy London night in 1909 connected all the threads. Chicago publisher William D. Boyce as on his way to a safari in Africa, on a layover in London, he became lost and was rescued by a helpful Boy Scout who refused to take a tip for

his good deed. This inspired Boyce to set up a meeting with the man who had started the movement in 1907, Major General Robert S.S. Baden-Powell.

The vision statement of the Boy Scouts of America states that the organization will continue to offer young people responsible fun and adventure; instill in young people lifetime values and develop in them ethical character as expressed in the Scout Oath and Law; Train young people in citizenship, service, and leadership; serve America's communities and families with its quality, value based program.

As an example of Boy Scouts assisting their country during World War I, the range of tasks undertaken included distributing war bonds and propaganda, salvaging critical materials such as rubber, and helping medical and fire brigades.

After the war, BSA's World Friendship Fund gave money to help restore scouting in war-torn areas including the Philippines, which received \$10,000. Conservation education featured highly in the scouts' program at home.

The U.S. Post Office issued the first stamp honoring the Boy Scouts in 1950. The next year, the scouts collected two million pounds of clothing for various relief efforts. Another 'Good Turn' was hanging millions of 'Get-Out-the-Vote' reminders on doorknobs. Civil defense education was also on the agenda.

In the 1970s, the Scouts tried to Save Our American Resources (SOAR). An anti-drug campaign, Operation Reach, was also launched. In conjunction with the Bicentennial, Boy Scouts displayed a massive exhibition of scouting skills on the Mall in Washington, D.C. Twelve scouts gave the Report to the Nation to President Gerald Ford, himself a former Eagle Scout.

Scouts come from all walks of life and are exposed to diversity in Scouting that they may not otherwise experience. The BSA aims to allow youth to live and learn as children and enjoy scouting without immersing them in the politics of the day.

J Stephen Fossett, First to circumnavigate the earth solo in a balloon, and non-stop solo flight around the globe.

James Lovell Jr., Apollo Astronaut

Neil Armstrong, Apollo Astronaut

The Honorable Richard G. Luger US Senator

J Willard Marriott Jr., Chairman of the Board Marriott Corporation

Bill Gates - Life, founder of Microsoft Corp.

H Ross Perot

Jimmy Buffett - musician and singer
