HB 168 – AS INTRODUCED

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

In the Year of Our Lord Two Thousand Eleven

AN ACT establishing a committee to study the juvenile delinquency and child in need of services statutes.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1 1 Committee Established. There is established a committee to study the juvenile delinquency 2 and child in need of services statutes.

3 2 Membership and Compensation.

4

I. The members of the committee shall be as follows:

- 5 (a) Three members of the house of representatives, appointed by the speaker of the 6 house of representatives.
- 7

(b) One member of the senate, appointed by the president of the senate.

8 II. Members of the committee shall receive mileage at the legislative rate when attending to 9 the duties of the committee.

3 Duties. The committee shall study RSA 169-B, relative to juvenile delinquency, and RSA 169-D, relative to children in need of services, including the need to revise or amend the statutes in order to resolve conflicts between the 2 chapters of law. The committee shall consult with the department of health and human services, division for juvenile justice services and division for children, youth, and families, the department of education, the law enforcement community, and others with information and testimony relevant to the study.

4 Chairperson; Quorum. The members of the study committee shall elect a chairperson from among the members. The first meeting of the committee shall be called by the first-named house member. The first meeting of the committee shall be held within 45 days of the effective date of this section. Three members of the committee shall constitute a quorum.

5 Report. The committee shall report its findings and any recommendations for proposed legislation to the speaker of the house of representatives, the president of the senate, the house clerk, the senate clerk, the governor, and the state library on or before November 1, 2011.

What the bill does: This bill establishes a committee to study the juvenile delinquency and child in need of services statutes.

Summary of testimony received:

Hearing opened at 1:03 PM

Rep. Patricia Dowling, Rock 5

•Prime Sponsor, having served in the Children and Family Law committee several times and on the State Advisory Group for Juvenile Justice Rep. Dowling is very familiar with juvenile delinquency and Children in Need of Services.

•The statutes regarding juvenile delinquency and Children in Need of Services (CHINS) have not been reviewed or amended since their inception many years ago.

•With the cuts to CHINS proposed in the budget there is a serious need to study these issues now.

•Senator De Blois asked: Are the for juvenile delinquents and CHINS rules governed by JLCAR?

-Response: These statutes have primarily been made through statute. There have been very few rules enacted by JLCAR.

•Senator Kelly asked: What is your priority in bringing forward this bill? Is it that you are concerned with the elimination of funds for these services or are you concerned with the statutes?

-Response: I am concerned with the statute first and we will have to deal with it within the constraints of the budget.

•Senator Kelly: I believe we need to start by looking into the needs of our juvenile delinquents and it sounds like you agree, thank you.

David Villiotti, Executive Director, Nashua Children's Home •In support, Sen. Lambert suggested he attend the hearing to address the Home's concerns. The Nashua Children's Home has concerns regarding financing and the statute itself.

•Many of the Home's kids are in CHINS. Without CHINS funding these children will be forced to return either to an abusive home they left or the streets. The kids who run away and commit crimes, such as breaking and entering will receive funds as delinquents, but those who run away from a bad home life and do not commit crimes will be left without any assistance and likely resort to performing acts of delinquency.

•These statutes should be studied and the age until which an individual is eligible for CHINS should be returned to 18 years old and the lower age should be reviewed.

•We are now seeing the unintended consequences of the law passed in the early 1990s that lowered the age of trying an individual as an adult from 18 years old to 17 years old. Now children doing well in CHINS no longer receive funding as of their 17th birthday; some of these kids are just months away from graduating high school and then are forced back into a negative and detrimental situation.

•Another concern of the CHIN statute is the low end of the age of individuals in CHINS. Younger siblings of CHINS recipients displaying erratic behavior are unable to receive services.

•Currently there are three ways in which children come to receive services at the Nashua Children's Home: (1) the commit an act of delinquency (2) their parent charges them with being uncontrollable through CHINS or (3) the parent is charged with neglect or abuse. If CHINS is removed, there are only two very narrow channels through which these children may come to receive services.

Sheelu Joshi Flegal, Residential Director, Nashua Children's Home •In support, provided an example of why the CHINS eligibility age should return to 18 years of age: a young man at Nashua Children's Home under a CHINS petition just turned 17 years old. His mother hasn't been in his life since he was two years old, his father is a violent alcohol, and his legal guardian recently relinquished custody. With the removal of CHINS his options are now to live with his mother, who has never wanted to be part of his life or to live with his father who is abusive and has substance abuse problems; these are both negative options.

•An example of younger individuals needing CHINS: there is a 10 year old girl whose sister is in the Home on a CHINS petition who had been abused. It is believed the 10 year old girl was as well and she struggles with mental health issues. Many young people suffer with this issue and both they and their parents need assistance.

•Senator Kelly asked: How many individuals reside in the Nashua Children's Home?

-Mr. Villiotti: We have a capacity for 46 and currently have 34 in placement.

•Senator Kelly asked: How many are there on a CHINS petition? -Mr. Villiotti: 18. They generally make up about half.

•Senator Kelly asked: Without CHINS funding, will these residents have to leave the next day?

-Mr. Villiotti: We are not sure of when they will leave the facility yet. The services to these individuals will end and they will likely go back home; if being home was a good situation they would have been their already, so this will likely be detrimental.

•Senator De Blois asked: Do you refer some of these children to other private facilities in the state such as the YMCA, the Boys and Girls Club, Easter Seals, etc?

-Mr. Villiotti: We work in conjunction with other service providers. We focus our services on local kids and provide them with community services that they can continue to be a part of when they leave. We do not interact with other centers that provide the same services as we do, but we do work with Gateways that would provide services to individuals with behavioral disabilities.

•Senator De Blois asked: If CHINS is eliminated, would those centers be able to fill the void?

-Mr. Villiotti: I do not believe that the centers that do provide the residential setting could properly fulfill the needs of these children. Since we provide a place to live, the residents obtain services reliably, when living in their home setting, there is no way to determine if they receive all necessary services.

-Ms. Joshi Flegal: Often times the other services you mentioned have been tried already. We are typically a last resort.

Hearing closed at 1:21 PM Funding: N/A

Action: The committee went into executive session. Senator De Blois made a motion of "Ought to Pass", seconded by Senator Kelly. The committee voted 4-0 OTP. Senator De Blois will report the bill out of committee.
