AN ACT relative to nonresident registration of motor vehicles.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1 1 Nonresident Registration. Amend RSA 261:46 to read as follows:

261:46 Nonresident Registration. Notwithstanding RSA 261:45, a nonresident who garages a 2 vehicle [primarily] exclusively in this state may register such vehicle in this state as a nonresident. 3 [A vehicle is garaged primarily in this state if it is garaged in this state for at least 350 days of the 4 registration year.] No exemption from the payment of a permit fee shall be granted by reason of 5 nonresidence except by the director, who shall in all cases require proof satisfactory to him or her of 6 residence elsewhere, and of the liability of a nonresident owner, otherwise entitled to such 7 exemption, to pay a property tax on the vehicle for the current year in the state of his or her 8 9. residence.

10 2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.

MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE PRESENT: Sen. Rausch, Sen. Boutin, Sen. Kelly and Sen. Stiles

MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE ABSENT: Sen. Forsythe

Sponsor(s): Rep. Major, Rock 8

What the bill does: This bill limits nonresident registration of motor vehicles to vehicles garaged exclusively in this state.

Who supports the bill: Rep. Major

Who opposes the bill: No one

Summary of testimony received:

Senator Rausch opened the public hearing on House Bill 399 and recognized Representative Major to introduce the bill.

Representative Major, the prime sponsor, explained he sponsored the bill at the request of the Town Clerks Association. He told the Committee the current law was passed in 2007 and when it was passed the Town Clerks Association was not aware of the language. He explained the current bill would put the law back to where it was prior to its change in 2007, which is what the Town Clerks Association wants. Representative Major presented and read a letter from the Town Clerks Association. The letter summarized the fact the Town Clerks Association believes the current law opens up the door for fraud. He told the Committee essentially the current law is very complicated for town clerks to enforce.

Senator Boutin commented that he remembered seeing this language before, but does not remember the Town Clerks Association testifying. Senator Kelly remembered the verbiage was where the confusion came because there was a misunderstanding in the definitions of "exclusive" and "primary". Senator Kelly said the intent of the 2007 change was to clarify something that was vague. The intent was to use "primary", which would mean 350 days. She asked Representative Major if the State went back to the word "exclusive," how many days that would be.

Representative Major explains he was not part of this bill the last time. He said he did know that they were happy with the word exclusive. He told the Committee his town clerk feels it is a problem.

Senator Stiles gave a hypothetical saying if she lived in Pennsylvania and she had a home here at a lake that she used three months a year and left her vehicle there would she be able to register that vehicle in New Hampshire even though she lived in Pennsylvania and whether or not that was what this bill was trying to do.

Representative Major answered yes she could. He said the problem is that nonresidents register their car here, but then they take it with them when they go back to their home state. Therefore, the current law is not meeting the intent of the original law. He commented that the reason nonresidents register their car here is because it is less expensive. He said there is really no way to prove this so they are worried about the abuse of the system.

Senator Stiles asked if in that hypothetical she left her car here would she be in compliance with the law.

Representative Major said yes.

Senator Rausch asked about a nonresident registration and whether it is more expensive and what the difference between a citizen and a legal resident was.

Representative Major said anyone can register a car as if they were a resident, but the car cannot leave the State to be stored or used elsewhere.

Senator Rausch asked how anyone would ever know if the car left the State.

Representative Major said that was the problem.

Senator Rausch further commented that does not solve the problem with the words "primary" and "exclusive".

Senator Kelly stated "primary" actually defines 350 days and "exclusive" does not define anything.

Senator Boutin asked Representative Major if he would be able to represent on behalf of the Town Clerks Association that they believe going back to the 2007 language would make the law enforceable in court.

Representative Major answered yes that that was his sense.

With no one else wishing to speak Senator Rausch closed the public hearing.

Action: No action was taken at this time.

Honorable Chairman Packard and Members of the Committee:

My name is Debra Cornett, and I serve as Co-Chair for the Lakes Region on the New Hampshire City & Town Clerks' Executive Board and I submit this testimony in support of HB 399 on behalf of the New Hampshire City & Town Clerks Association (NHCTCA).

The RSA, 261:46. Non Resident Registration was changed in 2007 to include the language, "...A vehicle is garaged primarily in this state if it is garaged in this state for at least 350 days of the registration year..." The NHCTCA was unaware of this legislative change until after its passage and had we known we would not have supported it.

This law as it currently reads, in effect opens a large loophole for those looking to commit fraud in our state as well as their state(s) and with insurance companies. Due to the fifteen days currently allowed by RSA 261:46 for non-residents to garage their vehicles out of state, it makes it virtually impossible to prove and enforce how many days the vehicle is actually out of state. Every one of the 15 days allowed could be *"day one."* This is prominently a problem for our Municipalities which boarder surrounding states as well as vacation areas where there are many vacation homes owned by non-residents, and finds its way even into the smaller communities impacting every town and city to some degree.

Not all non-residents purposely commit fraud; some are simply ignorant to the laws. Those that *do* knowingly commit fraud of vehicle registrations and insurance are costing <u>all New Hampshire residents</u> in what we pay for our insurance rates as well as the costs of investigations and prosecution of these cases. It is not within the budgetary constraints of the state or municipalities to enforce this law as it is now written.

We ask for your support in the passage of HB 399 to continue to allow non-residents to register vehicles so they may continue to enjoy their New Hampshire investments; but also to amend RSA 261:46 with the language "*exclusively garaged*" to make it tangible and practical by giving this law some "teeth" for enforcement agencies and so

that the non-resident registration law is clear to those who choose to register vehicles, those who must administrate and for those who must enforce Non-Resident Registrations.

Honorable Chairman Rausch and Members of the Committee:

The New Hampshire City & Town Clerks' Association supports House Bill 399. Our Association submitted this legislation to change the language in RSA 261:46 Non-Resident Registrations to require a vehicle to be "exclusively garaged" within the state.

In 2007, RSA 261:46 was changed to include the language, "....a vehicle is garaged primarily in this state if it is garaged in this state for at least 350 days of the registration year..." The Association was unaware of this change until after its passage and had we known, we would not have supported it.

The current language in the law allows non-residents to garage their vehicle out of state for up to fifteen days. It is virtually impossible to prove and enforce how many days the vehicle is actually out of state, as every one of the fifteen days allowed could be considered "day one". This opens up a large loophole to those looking to commit fraud in our state. This is prominently a problem for our municipalities which boarder surrounding states as well as vacation areas where there are many vacation homes owned by non-residents. Non-residents that knowingly commit motor vehicle and insurance fraud are costing all New Hampshire residents. Increased insurance rates as well as the cost of investigations and prosecutions of fraud cases cost the residents of New Hampshire money.

We ask for your support in the passage of HB 399 to allow non-residents to continue to register vehicles as non-residents while continuing to enjoy their New Hampshire investments; but also to amend RSA 261:46 with the language "*exclusively garaged*" to give this law some "teeth" for enforcement agencies and to make the language clear to those who are required to register vehicles as non-residents.
