Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

- 1 1 New Paragraph; Qualifications of Marital Masters; Residency. Amend RSA 490-D:8 by 2 inserting after paragraph II the following new paragraph:
- 3 III. Each marital master shall be a resident of this state upon appointment and throughout
- 4 each term of appointment.
- 5 2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.

MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE PRESENT: Senators Houde, Carson, Groen and Luther

MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE ABSENT: No one

Sponsor(s): Representatives Rowe, Itse and Kappler

What the bill does: This bill requires marital masters to be New Hampshire residents.

Who supports the bill: Representative Rowe; Representative M. Kappler;

Who opposes the bill: No one

Others testifying: Attorney Howard Zibel, Legal Counsel for the Supreme Court and the Judicial Branch

Summary of testimony received:

- Senator Houde opened the hearing at 1:01 p.m.
- **Representative Rowe** testified that the bill had been on the consent calendar in the House and is very simple that Marital Masters must be residents of New Hampshire.
- He explained that the reason that they want this is because Marital Masters are as close as they can be to being judicial officers.
- **Representative Rowe** noted that Masters hear cases between our citizens and the House feels that these folks should be New Hampshire residents. He commented that they make recommendations, very few of which are not accepted by the Judge who must sign them.
- He noted that there currently is one Master who lives out of state and about 8 years ago, he had indicated that he would move to New Hampshire, but he subsequently did not do so.

- Attorney Zibel testified for background purposes but said that he is taking no position on the legislation. He said that the reason for this is if this is the policy for newly appointed Masters, then the court would support the legislation. However, Master Cross does live in the State of Maine and that they cannot support the legislation if it affects current Masters in their current or any possible subsequent terms.
- Attorney Zibel acknowledged that in the summer of 2004 at the public hearing on Master Cross' nomination, he did agree to move to New Hampshire and this was in the public record. However, Attorney Zibel noted that in a conversation (with perhaps former Executive Councilor Griffin or Councilor Burton, he was not sure) Master Cross was told after the hearing that the Councilors had discussed this and that he did not have to move to NH.
- Attorney Zibel testified that this policy would single out one specific position in state government. He noted for the record that 2.7% of the Judicial Branch employees live out-of-state and noted further that many within the Executive and Legislative branches also live out-of-state. He remarked that one former Judge lived in Massachusetts, though he has since resigned.
- He remarked again that this is singling out one "job" for no apparent reason. He commented that House Resolution 7 has now passed the House and other issues will be dealt with - but passing this in its current form is singling out one individual. He urged the committee to please vote ITL if the bill is for current Masters.
- Senator Houde closed the hearing at 1:11 p.m.
