What the bill does: This bill requires the Connecticut River valley resource commission to be attached administratively to the department of environmental services.

Who supports the bill: Rep. Robert Randy Foose, Merrimack 1, Rep. Steven Cunningham, Sullivan 2, Doug Patch, TransCanada, Glenn English, Connecticut River Valley Resource Commission (CRVRC) and President of the Connecticut River Joint Commissions, Steve Couture, NH Department of Environmental Services, Jennifer Czysz, Office of Energy and Planning.

Who opposes the bill: No one.

Summary of testimony received:

The hearing on SB 25 was opened at 9:00 a.m. by Senator Carson, Chair of ED & A.

• Representative Robert Randy Foose, Merrimack #1, House Co-Sponsor of SB 25.

As House Co-Sponsor of this bill, it is my privilege to introduce this legislation to you. I worked with Senator Odell on this bill over the last two years.

The impact of the proposed legislation is to change the vocation in state government of this organization to the Department of Environmental Services (DES). The Connecticut River Joint Commission is part of a two state joint effort with colleagues from Vermont to focus on the development of the Connecticut River area. This is an absolutely essential component of the support system that needs to exist on the western-side of New Hampshire in order to continue the development of the Connecticut River Valley area.

Over the years much work has been done in the development of this critical and important area of New Hampshire. As work progressed, it was clear that 80% of the projects that the Commission engages in are directly related and administered by the DES, and they have paid attention to this fact. This is a case of the agency being in the right church, but in the wrong pew. On the other side of the River, the CRVRC reports to the DES in Vermont; approve the shifting of the reporting responsibility into the DES in New Hampshire.

There are no compelling issues in regards to the move from one agency to the other; no turf problems. There is no objection to this shift and, in fact, the Office of Energy and Planning is very comfortable with this change, given the direct connections of the programs. The DES thinks this is appropriate, administratively.

Senator Odell asked that I express his apologies for not being here today to introduce his prime sponsored bill, but he is Chairing his committee and asked that I introduce the legislation.

This is straightforward and improves the operation of the Commission, which is already engaged in DES, and this does not place any additional burden on this agency.

- Senator White indicated concern about the DES and asked if there were constituents that are affected by the CRVRC enforcement actions by this type of arrangement; something that he became familiar with on the campaign trail.
- Representative Foose indicated to Senator White that there would be no additional regulation or change in service through this

shift. The Commission has worked with the DES in a collaborative constructive way through the last 20 years.

I too have heard from constituents, stories about the DES because I sit on the House Finance Committee. I think that is a personal issue then what you and I have heard on the campaign trail.

- Steve Couture, Risk Coordinator from the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (DES) then spoke (and provided testimony from Commissioner Thomas S. Burack). The DES does support this legislation. What this legislation does is basically change in statute what we are already doing. The CRVRC regulation does not change anything relevant to regulatory authority, but, they are in fact, very supportive of the administrative change.
- Senator White then asked if funding was somewhat of an issue that drove this forward. The question was twofold: First, are there financial benefits to the DES by this change, and are there financial detriments to the State of New Hampshire by this arrangement?
- Mr. Couture indicated that there was no financial impact and no allocation being made, and that they have federal dollars that they have applied for and received. This does not change.
- Mr. Glenn English from the Connecticut River Valley resource commission then spoke. I have passed in testimony and I believe it speaks for itself. Senator White has asked some good questions.

The CRVRC was established in 1987; Vermont established a similar Commission, the Connecticut River Watershed Advisory Commission. In combination, this functions as a by-state organization. Appointees' are by government and some by where the individual works. Both states fund them. They report administratively to the New Hampshire Planning Office.

Initially, we were a planning commission and reported to the Office of State Planning, and its successor, the Office of Energy and Planning, but our main contact is with the DES due to the many concerns with environmental issues in the Connecticut Valley and River. We appreciate all that the Office of Energy and Planning has done over the years.

Senator White had question on the enforcement authority of the agency.

• Mr. English indicated that the Agency does not enforce anything. They aid regional towns and cities in their work.

Our charge in the legislation that created us is to identify, protect, and promote the historical resources of the Connecticut River Valley. We work on river flow, and we also publish lots of material.

We have downsized quite a bit. We now have two full timers and a part-timer; the business manager is part-time. We receive state money from New Hampshire and Vermont, which funds are used for a part-time position and matched money from federal grants are what we live off of (federal and state grants).

Jennifer Czysz from the Office of Energy and Planning (OEP) testified that the OEP has no objections of the transfer of the CRVRC from the OEP to the DES. As a matter of fact, we believe it is a good match, and so we are in favor of this legislation.

Senator Carson then noted that Representative Steve Cunningham, Sullivan 2, was in support; Doug Patch of TransCanada was in support; Senator Gallus was in support; Senator Kelly was in support, and Senator Odell was in support of this legislation

Hearing closed at 9:15 a.m.

Future Action: Senator Larsen motioned OTP, which was seconded by Senator White. The vote was 5-0 in favor, and Senator Luther will report SB 25 out of Committee.

Testimony in support of SB 25 relative to the Connecticut River Valley Resource Commission

By Glenn English, Chairman CRVRC and President Connecticut River Joint Commissions

To the Honorable Sharon M. Carson and members of the Executive Departments and Administration Committee

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in favor of SB 25 which is sponsored by Sen. Bob Odell and others at the request of the commissioners of the CRVRC.

I am Glenn English, from Haverhill New Hampshire, and I currently serve as the Chairman of the CRVRC and as President of the Connecticut River Joint Commissions, which is the joint operating entity of the CRVRC and its Vermont counterpart, the Connecticut River Watershed Advisory Commission. By authority of Chapter 227-E the CRVRC is charged to work with its Vermont counterpart in "...protecting and preserving the visual, ecological and agricultural integrity of the Connecticut River Valley while planning for and guiding the development of the recreational, tourist, commercial and residential uses of the Valley". The Commissions is also charged with "...identifying, protecting, and promoting the natural, recreational, cultural and historical resources of the Connecticut River Valley". We have been working on these goals since 1987, primarily through the development and promulgation of our Corridor Management Plan which is broken down into sections consistent with the statutory guidance. The original plan has been revised in conjunction with

our 5 local regional subcommittees, who represent geographic sections of the Valley. The Local River Subcommittees are made up of town selected representatives from both states. Their main tasks are to provide input into the management plan and to review and comment on permits on behalf of the River's interests. Neither the Commissions nor the LRS have any enforcement authority. The Commissions and the LRS operate with appointed volunteer members, assisted by a small professional staff. We pay our staff expenses primarily from annual appropriations from each state budget. Other specific projects are funded through federal and state grants. The state appropriations are also used to match federal grants.

Since its inception, the CRVRC has been administratively attached to the Office of State Planning and its successor, the Office of Energy and Planning. This may have been originally set up due to the planning nature of the work in which we were originally engaged. I'm really not sure, however for years our mission has been more in line with the objectives of the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services. We work very closely with the Department , particularly under the criteria established in the Rivers Management and Protection Program (RSA 483). In fact our 5 local river subcommittees are considered LAC's (local advisory committees) by the Department.

While the OEP has been supportive of our efforts, adequate state funding, through the Office has been an issue. We have been funded through the Targeted Block Grant which also provides funding to the regional planning commissions. We do not wish to compete with our partners, the rpc's for this limited source of funding and we also feel that being administratively attached to the DES will quite frankly provide us with a more stable state funding source which is essential to our continued survival. It is my understanding that both state agencies are in favor of this change in the administrative location of the CRVRC as outlined in the proposed legislation. On behalf of our commissioners, I urge the committee to support SB 25.


