Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1 Sprinklers; Inadequate Water Supply. Amend RSA 153:5 to read as follows:

153:5 Rules. The state fire marshal shall adopt rules, with the approval of the commissioner of safety, to be known as the state fire code, pursuant to RSA 541-A, to further the purposes of this chapter and such applicable fire safety and building laws as he shall deem necessary for the protection from fire and fire hazards for people in the state and for the general welfare of property and people within the state. The rules may include, but not be limited to, the keeping, storage, use, manufacture, sale, handling, transportation, or disposal of highly flammable materials and rubbish, and of flammable fluids and compounds and flammable tablets and may include standards for the materials and construction of receptacles and buildings to be used for any of these purposes. The fire marshal may adopt the most recent edition of the provisions of the national fire protection association code or other recognized codes as rules, in whole or in part; however, such rules shall not require automatic suppressant or sprinkler systems in detached one- or 2-family dwelling units in a structure used only for residential purposes, in areas of buildings or additions in which the discharge of water would be undesirable as determined by the state fire marshal, in buildings where the fire marshal deems there is inadequate public water supply for a sprinkler system, or in rooms or areas containing either generators, transformers, telecommunications equipment or facilities, or electronic data processing equipment, or in telecommunications or electric utility company equipment buildings or areas occupied exclusively for telecommunications equipment, electrical transformation and switching equipment, associated electrical distribution equipment, batteries, and standby engines or generators, provided that those spaces or areas are equipped throughout with an automatic fire detection system. The rules shall apply to the construction and remodeling of buildings and structures for the containment of flammable liquids and to the new installation and replacement of equipment used in connection with flammable liquids. The rules shall apply to existing buildings, structures, or equipment. The fire marshal may exempt a building, structure, or equipment from such rules if he or she finds that such exemption does not constitute a hazard to the public welfare and safety. A reasonable time, as determined by the state fire marshal, shall be allowed to make necessary alterations. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent municipalities from adopting bylaws or ordinances relative to a subject area of rules adopted by the fire marshal in accordance with this section if such bylaws or ordinances are no less restrictive than those adopted by the fire marshal.

2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.

LSR 2411.0 Relative to the Installation of Sprinklers

POSITION: Opposed

Dear Honorable Members of the Committee:

This bill prevents the fire marshal from requiring sprinklers in a public building where there is inadequate water supply.

Section 1 of this bill inserts a phrase, "...in buildings where the fire marshal deems there is inadequate public water supply for a sprinkler system, ..." in a list of areas where the State Fire Code cannot require sprinkler systems.

This bill removes the ability to require sprinkler systems in those structures that would otherwise require such an installation, based solely upon the availability of a public water supply. This is directly contradictory to the proven philosophy that sprinkler systems save countless lives every day. With this language, the State would be establishing a different standard of safety and protection for those poorer communities that cannot afford a public water supply or that cannot justify one, based upon demand. Schools and hospitals in these communities will be at a higher risk of catastrophic fire, placing those occupants at a disproportionately higher risk of death and injury to those similar occupants in more densely populated towns and cities.

Further, it would be significantly more costly to these communities, since the State Building Code provides for substantial construction trade-offs for those properties that have sprinkler systems. These communities would be forced to build smaller buildings, as the Building Code limits unsprinklered structures in both height and area. Further, these unsprinklered structures would be required to have substantially increased fire separation measures, such as fire walls and fire partitions. It is unreasonable to require that some communities pay more for their schools and hospitals than others based solely upon the availability of a public water supply. This is especially true considering the vast advancements in technology in the area of stored water supplies.

The NH Department of Safety opposes this bill for the reasons stated.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide comment relative to the proposed House Bill 1286 and it's implications as we view them.

The New Hampshire Fire Prevention Society was organized in 1984 to perpetuate knowledge and excellence in the field of fire science and the advancement of technology in fire science related matters. Today our organizations membership boasts approximately 200 professionals including Fire Chiefs, Fire Marshals, Fire Inspectors, Fire Investigators, Building Inspectors, and Fire Protection Engineers throughout New Hampshire.

It is our belief that House Bill 1286 is a broad reaching bill with likely unintended consequences which ultimately leads to impair our ability as a government to meet our obligation for protection of property as outlined in Part 1 Article 12 of the New Hampshire Constitution.

The net result of this bill would make some buildings more expensive to build or possibly lead the planning board to deny a site plan application for lack of adequate provisions for fire safety, prevention, and control. This bill is another in a long line of bills relative to sprinklers currently or previously debated by the General Court. When House Bill 1486 was debated and residential sprinklers studied, the testimony and findings of the study committee indicated that sprinklers in residential property are appropriate in some situations and the most appropriate place for that determination would be the planning board level. This past session SB 91 and HB 109 were passed removing sprinklers from consideration for land use of all detached one and two family dwellings. It even went as far as prohibiting local control of such decisions for any community who did not already have a residential sprinkler requirement.

This decision has forced many developers to be faced with potential denial of their land use application as they would have preferred to install residential sprinklers in lieu of providing adequate water supply to the site. We feel House Bill 1286 will have a similar effect and could prevent land use boards from approving a site plan amendment for lack of adequate fire protection. In fact, this bill creates a situation where the areas that lack public water supply which present the greatest risk of fire, would be forced to accept lower protections standards than the communities most able to provide the protection because of adequate public water.

This bill would create an economic disparity for our communities and move us away from standardize minimum code concept requested by the development community and approved by the legislature with the creation of the State Building Code in RSA 155-A. In addition, by treating similar projects in the state with varying requirements we would create a concern for equal protection as guaranteed by the US Constitution.

The New Hampshire Fire Prevention Society, a statewide membership organization of municipal fire and building officials, cannot advocate for the removal of safety code provisions such as sprinklers without mitigating solutions to address the risks the sprinklers were to address. We believe this selective modification of code provisions leads our society in the dangerous direction away from respect for our legislative process and the laws or rules it adopts, to one which creates an infinite number of scenarios for code application.

We therefore oppose this bill and ask this committee to find it inexpedient to legislate.
