## **ANALYSIS**

This bill requires the department of environmental services to develop criteria for classifying wetlands as contributing or noncontributing and makes noncontributing wetlands exempt from regulation.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1 New Subdivision; Classification of Wetlands. Amend RSA 482-A by inserting after section 33 the following new subdivision:

#### Classification of Wetlands

482-A:34 Classification. The department shall classify the non-tidal wetlands of the state as contributing or noncontributing. Contributing wetlands shall be wetlands that have considerable environmental value and that provide a positive environmental benefit. Noncontributing wetlands shall have little or no environmental value.

482-A:35 Method. The department shall prepare a comprehensive method for classifying the state's wetlands within 6 months of the effective date of this subdivision. Wetlands shall be classified as either contributing or noncontributing. The department shall present its method and criteria for classifying wetlands to the house of representatives and senate standing policy committees to which the legislation creating this subdivision was originally referred. The committees shall consider whether the methodology and criteria conform to the legislative intent of this subdivision and shall affirm the methodology and criteria. The department shall not proceed with wetlands classification without affirmation of the house of representatives and senate policy committees.

482-A:36 Rulemaking. After receiving affirmation from the house of representatives and senate standing policy committees under RSA 482-A:35, the commissioner shall proceed to adopt rules under RSA 541-A for classifying wetlands according to the methodology and criteria presented to the committees. The commissioner shall also adopt rules for qualifying individuals by training or experience to classify wetlands.

482-A:37 Noncontributing Wetlands Unregulated. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, noncontributing wetlands shall not be regulated by the state of New Hampshire nor its political subdivisions.

2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.

#### **HB 321-FN - FISCAL NOTE**

AN ACT

relative to the classification of wetlands as contributing or noncontributing.

#### FISCAL IMPACT:

The Department of Environmental Services states this bill will decrease state restricted revenues and may decrease state restricted expenditures by indeterminable amounts in FY 2012 and each fiscal year thereafter. There will be no fiscal impact on county and local revenues or expenditures.

#### **METHODOLOGY:**

The Department states this bill would establish a classification for wetlands, which would exempt certain wetlands from regulation. The Department states this bill would decrease state revenues as some existing wetlands would become exempt from the regulation fees currently assessed and collected. The Department states they are unable to estimate the fiscal impact to state revenues as the definition of noncontributing wetlands has not been established and a determination of wetlands becoming exempt under this bill has not been made.

The Department states this bill could also result in a decrease in state expenditures, as the Department may have reduced regulatory responsibilities. The Department is unable to estimate a potential decrease to state expenditures as it is unclear if exempting certain wetlands from regulation would decrease the Department's costs and by how much.



Dear Rep. Renzullo and Members of the Committee:

The NH Association of Natural Resource Scientists ("NHANRS") is a state-wide non-profit professional organization whose membership includes wetland scientists, soil scientists, and wildlife biologists from the consulting community, as well as from the academic and public sectors. Our Legislative Committee has considered HB 321-FN, and wishes to offer our comments.

HB 321-FN directs the NH Department of Environmental Services ("NHDES") to classify the non-tidal wetlands of the state as "contributing" or "noncontributing" under the supervision of the legislature, and would then exempt non-contributing wetlands from protection under state and local regulations.

NHANRS is supportive of efforts to clarify the reasonable limits of wetlands jurisdiction. We have worked over the years to improve the standards by which wetland scientists and NHDES make jurisdictional determinations. Under the current system, nearly all of the wetlands which are regulated by the NHDES and municipalities provide important wetland functions which justify regulatory protection. There remains some confusion as to the jurisdictional status of areas such as man-made drainage ditches and basins, wash ponds, farm ponds and similar areas. NHANRS would support a system that exempts these types of man-made areas from regulation, so long as it can be accomplished clearly and simply without providing additional work to the NHDES.

However, NHANRS is concerned that the system proposed by HB 321-FN is more complex than is needed to clarify the limits of jurisdiction. We do not support adding yet another task to NHDES's current list of responsibilities (i.e., development a new wetland classification system). We have no doubt that such an effort would create controversy and consume many hours of the Department's time – time that would be better spent serving the public by reviewing and processing existing permit applications. Further, we do not believe that a new classification system is necessary to improve the current system and ensure balance between environmental protection and property rights.

We are also concerned that a new system of "contributing" and "non-contributing wetlands could impact New Hampshire's existing streamlined permitting program with the US Army Corps of Engineers. The current RSA 482-A wetland definition is purposefully consistent with the definition

used by the Corps in administering the federal Clean Water Act. Currently, most projects in New Hampshire are permitted by the US Army Corps of Engineers at the federal level through a "Statewide Programmatic General Permit" ("SPGP") – a process that is greatly expedited and simplified over the alternative "Individual Permit." This federal SPGP is directly related to the fact that the NHDES has historically maintained an effective state wetlands regulatory program. Changing the state's jurisdictional definitions could lead to inconsistencies between the state and federal programs, which could ultimately lead the Corps to determine that fewer and fewer NH projects will qualify for the simplified federal SPGP process, which would cost project proponents additional time and money.

Currently, NHANRS is working with the sponsors of SB 21 to better define the limits of wetland jurisdiction in NH. SB 21 takes a simple and clear approach which we believe will successfully address the issues that Rep. Mirski and his co-sponsors intend to deal with in HB 321-FN.

If the bill is to move forward, NHANRS is prepared to work with the Committee, the bill's sponsors and its proponents to help provide reasonable and clear language to address the policy and technical issues related to wetlands jurisdiction. In the meantime, we can be contacted through our lobbyist, Dana Bisbee, Devine Millimet & Branch, at 226-1000.

Dear Chairman Renzullo:

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on HB 321, which would require the Department of Environmental Services (DES) to develop criteria for classifying wetlands as contributing or noncontributing and would make noncontributing wetlands exempt from state regulation. DES does not support this legislation for the reasons described below.

HB 321 would require DES to classify non-tidal wetlands as either "contributing" or "noncontributing." "Contributing wetlands" are defined in the bill as "wetlands that have considerable environmental value or that provide a positive environmental benefit." The bill requires that DES develop a comprehensive method for classifying wetlands as either contributing or noncontributing, present this method to the legislature for affirmation of compliance with legislative intent and then, upon affirmation, to adopt regulations. The bill then establishes that activities in "noncontributing wetlands" would be unregulated. This would result in a state wetlands classification system that is less stringent than the federal wetlands classification system. The development of noncontributing wetlands would be unregulated under state law, but would still be regulated under federal law, which does not recognize a distinction between contributing and noncontributing wetlands.

If this change were to occur, it would cause a dramatic change in wetlands permitting processes in New Hampshire because the benefits of the United States Army Corps of Engineers State Programmatic General Permit (SPGP) would likely be invalidated for most projects. The SPGP is a permit issued by the US Army Corps of Engineers to the State of New Hampshire to enable streamlined permitting processes. Under the SPGP, DES performs reviews for most projects with wetlands impacts of less than three acres, then issues permits that cover both the state and federal requirements. If the state program were to become less stringent, individual permit applications to the Corps of Engineers would be required for all proposed impacts in federally-regulated wetlands. This would result in substantial delays (often 6 to 9 months) for applicants to receive federal wetlands permits, as well as additional costs for applicants. By way of contrast, DES is currently issuing standard wetlands permits within 30 to 60 days from the date that a complete application is received, well ahead of the maximum 105 day statutory deadline.

DES believes that the existing state wetlands program, in conjunction with the Army Corps of Engineers SPGP for New Hampshire, provides substantial benefit to New Hampshire's

valued wetlands resources. The issuance of a state wetlands permit allows citizens and businesses to avoid the additional regulatory burden of obtaining a federal wetlands permit in all but the largest projects. If enacted, HB 321 would reduce the scope of environmental protection for New Hampshire's wetland resources, and it would likely increase the overall regulatory burden on New Hampshire citizens.

#### SB 19

This bill seeks to correct agreed upon flaws in the Prime Wetlands statutes, which have both stalled its utilization and unfairly restricted the rights of land owners to use their own land. The Bill provides for greater notification and input from landowners, before important local wetlands are enrolled in the program. It also addresses a more accurate delineation of the poorly drained and very poorly drained soil, which comprises the Prime wetland, while leaving the issue of upland buffer to the local voters. The bill received widespread support from property owners, wetlands scientists, local government officials, developers, loggers, farmers, the NH Department of Environmental Services and the environmental community. With the changes in this bill any future Prime Wetland designations by local communities will be fairer, more accurate and more in keeping with the wishes of the people of local communities
