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Testimony

Sex Education is one of the most controversial subjects taught in public schools today. Some believe offering sex education is needed in order to ensure children are receiving information that could help when making important decisions. Others would argue that this information should be given to children only by the parents or in some cases, a close family member or friend.

However you feel, the fact is, schools are now offering sex education to children. The question becomes, should parents have the option to remove their child from these classes?

Currently parents who feel their children should not be part of a sex education presentation are permitted to remove their children from this instruction only if they exercise their religious exemption.

HB 161 and HB 201 will offer this privilege to other non-religious families. I believe opening this up to all parents is the right thing to do, however I feel both Bills move us in the right direction. I will leave it up to the Committee to work out the details.

There have been situations where school districts have had to face angry and hostile parents when these subjects were discussed with their children.

In Helena, Montana, the sex education proposed drew an angry response from many parents as it extended to children as young as kindergarten. The draft proposal would begin teaching children in kindergarten, via the school nurse, the proper terms such as: nipple, breast, penis, scrotum and uterus. Students who are 10 years old would be taught the various ways people can have intercourse: vaginally, orally or through anal penetration. These were the "Competencies" set for public school

A little closer to home, parents in Keene were outraged when a presentation on AIDS prevention included a gift bag of condoms, flavored lubricants and candy. Some students reported that the freshman were laughing and saying how they were going to go home and try the lubricant out with their boyfriend/girlfriend. http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=la-UEdoWVwl&feature=relmfu

I talked to one parent who believed this approach encouraged sexual activity instead of offering facts that could prevent the transmission of STD's among students. This was a parent who seemed to support sex education in the school but felt this presentation crossed a line and actually put children in a more risky situation.

This was confirmed when students acknowledged the presentation actually encouraged students to begin engaging in sexual activity.

For many parents who support sex education in the school and for their children, even they have found instances when they would appreciate opting their children out of a class that encourages sexual activity.

The school district has banned this organization from making any more presentations at the school however the damage had already been done.

While there will always be debate and differences on how schools should approach subjects like HIV, AIDS and STDs, offering an "opt out" to all parents should be required of schools who may be actually causing more harm to the students than "good".
