If the patient or legal guardian for the patient shall for reason of privacy or personal wishes refuse to have any upper and lower denture, removable partial dental prosthesis, or removable acrylic orthodontic appliance covered under this subdivision to be labeled, a signed and dated copy of a release to the effect shall accompany the denture to the laboratory fabricating the denture. The original signed and dated release shall be kept in the patient's dental record.

Testimony

Representative Dorothea Hooper, Strafford District 16, Dover

Good morning Mr. Chair and honorable members of this committee. Thank you for hearing this bill which would give patients the opportunity to mark their dentures for identification purposes.

File Copy H B205

The labeling of dentures is done in nations around the world. Sweden, the United Kingdom, India and Australia are but a few. Twenty one states in the United States have passed legislation making such labeling mandatory.

This bill would allow patients to opt for labeling dentures and orthodontic appliances but also contains an opt out clause for those patients concerned with privacy issues.

The Pennsylvania Dental Association supports a requirement that patient names or initials be placed on all dentures and most orthodontic appliances manufactured by a dentist's request. The association felt this requirement would help patients by:

1) Assisting forensic teams in human identification, particularly in the quick and efficient identification of victims of mass disaster. Actually it was the disaster of 9/11 that prompted my former dentist, Dr. Richard Scherf, to propose this bill for New Hampshire. Dr. Scherf left his practice for a short time in 2001 and traveled to New York City to identify bodies at the Twin Towers disaster. He is currently Director of the New Hampshire Dental Identification Team sponsored by the New Hampshire Dental Society.

This bill would require dentists to inform their patients that they can have their dentures or orthodontic appliances labeled for quick identification.

This bill mirrors one passed by the Pennsylvania legislature to help patients by:

1) Assisting forensic teams in human identification particularly victims of mass disasters

2) Aiding health-care professionals in identifying misplaced dentures in nursing homes and other long-term care facilities

3) Helping law enforcement identify missing children

4) Ensuring continuity of quality dental care for the elderly population

5) Assisting victims families in bringing closure to tragic events

6) In case of a loss of memory or unconsciousness the family can easily be notified of the issue

-7) In case of the misplacement of an orthodontic retainer by a young patient, particularly at school, the appliance can be easily returned and will not incur the expense of another retainer.

This bill contains an "opt out" provision. Any patient may elect not to have their name placed on their appliance if they have a privacy issue. The dentist merely informs the patient that he or she has that option.

The cost of labeling is truly incidental to the cost of the denture. While one denture is as much as two thousand dollars, the label is usually no more than \$25. In many cases it is provided by the lab free.

Dr. Scherf and I both feel this bill is a common sense approach to solving many of the problems of patients, our aging population, law enforcement, and athletes we do recognize the fact that the New Hampshire Dental Association, while $d \to \infty$ supporting labeling dentures, does not support the inclusion of Orthodontic

alliances. Their position is that there would be too much paper work involved, in keeping opt out records, for the doctors to handle. If this committee agrees with that position, I am prepared to submit an amendment to this bill that the dental association has indicated it supports. We do think, however, that the total bill has merit.

In addition to my words, you will be hearing from Representative June Frazer who has participated in the labeling process and Dr. Richard Scherf, retired Dentist from Dover. Dr. Scherf has flown in from Florida to testify today.

House Bill 205

Good Morning: my name is James Williamson and I am the Executive Director of the New Hampshire Dental Society, the professional association of dentists in NH with over 84% of licensed dentists as our members. Thank you to you, Mr. Chairman and the members of the committee for allowing the Dental Society to testify today on this Bill.

The Dental Society agrees with the premise of House Bill 205 as American Dental Association policy recommends that its state affiliates, like the NH Dental Society, support the use of uniform methods of marking dental prostheses for forensic identification purposes. It is our experience that many dentists already do this as a courtesy to their patients and as the norm in their practices and many dental labs do the same. We have also been told by some member dentists that some patients insist that they do not want identification in their full or partial dentures. The key here is that it must remain the patient's choice.

This bill was also introduced last year and the Dental Society opposed it because it was too overreaching and did not allow a patient to opt of the placement of identification in their removable appliances. We commend the sponsor of this bill for revising the bill this year and introducing a much more palatable bill, which does leave to the patient the option of opting out of this labeling. This year, while we still do not think this bill is necessary, we will support it if an amendment is made. This amendment will strike any reference to Orthodontic appliances in the bill and will just be limited to complete upper and lower dentures and removable partial denture prostheses. This is where this practice will benefit forensic identification and will help nursing home staff prevent the loss of unmarked dentures. On the other hand, orthodontic appliances are placed every day on almost all orthodontic patients. The difficulty of marking these appliances, the added costs, and the overly burdensome recordkeeping necessary makes the application of this bill to Orthodontics impossible. So we would propose an amendment to HB 205 that would strike any reference to orthodontic appliances. With this amendment, the Dental Society, while we would still argue that this bill is not necessary, would support this bill as amended. If this amendment is not accepted then we would have to oppose this bill.

My name is Richard Scherf. I am a dentist living in Dover. I direct the New Hampshire Dental Identification team, a group of dentists and auxiliary persons who perform dental examinations and determine victim identifications for the Chief Medical Examiner in Concord.

I am advocating passage of the bill for several reasons:

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1. A labeled denture can be useful as an aid in identification of disaster victims, that is, the label can quickly narrow the investigation to a certain individual and then lead to a positive identification.

2. In the case of an accident of any kind, a labeled denture can quickly lead to the individual's identification.

3. In the case of a loss of memory or unconsciousness, such as might be in a found individual who may have Alzheimer's or who has suffered a head injury, family can easily be notified of the discovery of the individual.

4. In the case of a denture misplaced in a hospital, nursing facility or assisted living community when a denture may be removed by the individual and misplaced, or by facility staff personnel. It can then quickly be returned to the resident. I believe that any dentist in this room can attest today that he or she has provided new dentures to individuals who have lost their unlabeled dentures in nursing or assisted living facilities.

5. In the case of the misplacement of an orthodontic retainer by a young patient, primarily at school. The appliance can easily be returned to the person, and the family will not incur the cost of a new retainer.

6. This bill contains an "opt out" provision. Any denture or retainer patient may elect to not have their name placed on their appliance. The dentist would merely inform the patient that he or she has this option.

7. The cost of label placement is truly incidental to the cost of the denture to the patient. Currently the cost of one denture can be as much as \$2000.00. The cost of labeling the denture is usually no more than \$25.00, and in many cases the labeling is provided free to the dentist by the dental laboratory that fabricates the appliance.

8. The owner's name is normally placed on or embedded in the inside surface of the denture or partial. The size of the label is usually one millimeter by five millimeters. It does not stick out from the surface of the denture.

9. There may be concern from dentists that this bill will create more paperwork. Paperwork would only occur if the patient elects not to have a name placed in the denture and they sign a sheet saying no to a label. In my entire professional career I have never had a patient object when I told them that they would receive their denture with their name in it. On the contrary, every person was very pleased. So, I've never had any paperwork.

STATEMENT OF INTENT

The bill would require dentists to mark all dental prosthetic and orthodontic appliances with the name of the patient. It was introduced to address concerns about identification of the wearers of dental appliances such as dentures and retainers for the purpose of recovery of lost appliances and forensic identification of the wearer of the devices. Experts in the field including the NH Dental Society and several orthodontists and dentists agreed that orthodontic appliances could not be reasonably marked with the wearer's name. In terms of identification of dentures, concerns were raised that this was better addressed as a best practice within the profession. Other concerns about the bill included the reliance in the legislation on technology that could become obsolete, the cost of the program, the additional record keeping required and privacy issues. Rep. Tom Sherman for Health, Human Services and Elderly Affairs. The bill would require dentists to mark all dental prosthetic and orthodontic appliances with the name of the patient. It was introduced to address concerns about identification of the wearers of dental appliances such as dentures and retainers for the purpose of recovery of lost appliances and forensic identification of the wearer of the devices. Experts in the field including the NH Dental Society and several orthodontists and dentists agreed that orthodontic appliances could not be reasonably marked with the wearer's name. In terms of identification of dentures, concerns were raised that this was better addressed as a best practice within the profession. Other concerns about the bill included the reliance in the legislation on technology that could become obsolete, the cost of the program, the additional record keeping required and privacy issues. However, the Committee agreed with the sponsors as to the utility of identification on dentures and will write a letter to the Dental Society urging them to promote this as a best practice.
