LEGISLATIVE POSITION PAPER

HB_453__ SB__ AS INTRODUCED (x) AMENDMENT NO. ____

In 2010 the Legislature enacted Chapter 208 of the Laws of 2010, which established an Information and Analysis Center at the Department of Safety, and enacted RSA Chapter 651-F, which set forth how the Center would be operated and the procedures that should be taken to ensure that people's civil rights were not violated by the data the Center would be collecting and analyzing.

In the wake of the 9/11 tragedy, a Commission was set up by Congress to study how the nation's intelligence, security, law enforcement, and defense agencies managed to miss the fact that the so-called "9/11 terrorists" had entered this country on fake credentials, traveled across the country including extensively in New England, even passing through New Hampshire, taken lessons on how to fly jetliners, conducted surveillance of airports and public buildings in various parts of the nation including Boston, and ultimately hijacked 2 huge jetliners and crashed the, one into the Twin Trade Towers in New York City and one into the Pentagon in Arlington, Virginia, killing hundreds of people including everyone on the two airliners, all in the name of Al Qaeda, and never been discovered by the FBI, the CIA, or the military. One of them had even received a traffic ticket in New Jersey. Moreover, using false credentials they had obtained driver license from several states.

The Commission issued an extensive report, and Congress funded many of their recommendations through direct appropriations to federal agencies and anti-terrorism grants to states, and local governments. The Committee concluded among other things, that federal agencies were not in the best position to gather intelligence on terrorist organizations and terrorists <u>within</u> the country itself, and that local, state and county law enforcement, being closer to the people, was the first line of defense. They encouraged each state and each of the major cities such as New York, Los Angeles and Chicago, to establish what they called, "Fusion Center" to gather data and information from a variety of classified and open sources, analyze it and exchange any information or data that led to reasonable suspicion of terrorist activities and terrorist "sleeper cells" with other states and the FBI.

New Hampshire was one of the last states to act on this recommendation. We decided to go a different way. We believed that the best way to manage and organization - any organization, whether it is a private business or a government agency – is to collect data and information and use it to streamline your operation and increase its efficiency and effectiveness. We believed that there certainly is a possibility for international terrorists to hide in a rural state such as New Hampshire, and that tips from

alert citizens, business people, and police officers could lead to their discovery, and we have subsequently found, without elaborating on it, that our state and certain locations within our state have been, and continue to be of interest to known terrorists. However, we also have problems with drug smuggling, Ponzi schemes, gangs or sophisticated shoplifter from Massachusetts and New York that victimize our retail stores, identity thieves, and many other criminal activities. We know that by collecting information on these criminal activities, it is sometimes possible to track them as they move up and down or back and forth within the state, detect patterns of activity, and pass information along quickly from one town or city to another and to Troopers statewide and to increase the chances of apprehending these perpetrators. For one thing, we identify cases where more than one police agency is investigating the same group and neither knew what the other was doing until we told them. Then, the agencies got their heads together and through a joint effort, were able to identify specific suspects and make arrests. This is called, "de-confliction" and averts cases where for example, undercover drug investigators from more than one agency have targeted the same drug dealer and in other parts of the country police officers have died from "friendly fire" when two armed groups bumped into one another and each mistook the other for the bad guys. Our IAC, as our Center is called, has de-conflicted case and helped avoid scenarios such as this.

We also felt that by tracking motor vehicle crashes, computer mapping and locating them precisely and determining the time of day, day of the week, season of the year, and the cause of the crash — which usually turns out to be some violation of the rules of the road by one or more vehicles, we can predict where crashes are likely to happen in the future. And by comparing the time of day, day of the week, offenses for which tickets are written, and precise location of the place where the violation that led to the ticket occurred, we can tell whether our Troopers are enforcing the traffic laws when and where and for the type of violation that is most likely to prevent crashes from occurring.

We didn't stop there, however. There are a lot of businesses, public institutions such as schools and colleges, government buildings, defense contractors, electric power plants, municipal water supplies and others whose operation is critical to the health and welfare of the state and its people and which, if severely damaged, would endanger the health and welfare or the economy of the state. A robust data collection system can help us identify what and who those places are and to help warn them, not only of terrorist or criminal activity, but of such natural disaster as hurricanes and floods. By monitoring the depth and speed of melting of the snow pack in the spring we can work with the DES Bureau of Dams and prevent flooding, and we can "lean forward" and proactively place sandbags and other resources in low lying areas in advance of coastal flooding. By participating in social media such as Facebook and Twitter, we can get the word out to the citizenry and prepare them for approaching weather events and other possible disasters.

So what New Hampshire did, which is fairly unique among the states, is to set up what we call and "all crimes/all hazards" center, which is our IAC. We don't just gather and share data on terrorism, or on crimes, but we look at natural hazards as well and try to prepare the state for them, and to prevent them whenever we can.

We also recognized that whenever you collect data, especially data on people, you must have a stringent set of rules and a robust system of oversight in order to avoid unnecessarily and illegally prying into the lives of honest citizens or spying on them. To help us write the laws that would ensure the operation of the Center appreciated and observed the need to ensure that civil rights were not violated, we reached out to, without question the foremost advocate of personal privacy in the Legislature, Rep. Neal Kurk, and he helped us write the legislation, critiqued it for us and even sponsored the bill in 2010. He and the Legislature also wrote into the bill that the IAC would cease to function on December 31, 2014 unless the Legislature renewed its authority.

The Center has been in operation for nearly two years now. It is managed by two co-directors, a State Police Sergeant and a civilian employee of the Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management. The Assistant Commissioner of Safety has final oversight of its operations and is required to perform an annual Performance Evaluation to determine if it is following all the state and federal laws and rules and operating in a legal and ethical manner. The Assistant Commissioner and the IAC staff meets periodically, reports to and meets with a member of the Legislature, at this time Rep. Kurk, a representative of the Attorney General's Office, and an official of the NH Civil Liberties Union, and they also get a copy of and are briefed on the Assistant Commissioner's Performance Evaluation. The Center's budget is in a separate section of the Department of Safety's budget and subjected to the same scrutiny as the rest of the State budget — nothing is hidden.

This fall, we asked Rep. Kurk if, rather than waiting until December 2014 and possibly missing a Legislative deadline, if he felt comfortable enough with how the Center is being operated, to sponsor a bill to repeal the December 2014 repeal legislation and give the Center continued life, and he very kindly agreed to do so. We thank him for that, and would be happy for the Committee to tour the Center at any time or to answer any questions you may have before voting on the bill.
