Universal Background Checks For Gun Purchases

Allowing dangerous people such as convicted felons and domestic abusers to buy guns from unlicensed sellers without a background check threatens the safety of our families and communities. Our national gun policy should be: no background check, no gun, no excuses.

Current law requires criminal background checks of gun buyers at federally licensed dealers, but there is a loophole at gun shows and other venues where unlicensed dealers operate.

In most states, convicted felons, domestic violence abusers, and those who are dangerously mentally ill
can walk into any gun show, flea market, or even log on to the internet and buy weapons from unlicensed
sellers, no questions asked.

Allowing dangerous people such as convicted felons and domestic abusers to buy guns from unlicensed sellers without a criminal background check threatens the safety of our families and communities.

• It is estimated that over forty percent of gun acquisitions occur in the secondary market. That means that they happen without a background check.

Gun shows provide a huge market for gun sales completed without background checks.

- Gun shows are a major trafficking channel according to the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, with an average of 130 guns trafficked per investigation, and over 25,000 firearms trafficked over one 17-month period alone.
- In Littleton, CO, Eric Harris and Dylan Klebold used two shotguns, an assault rifle and a TEC-9 assault pistol to shoot 26 students at Columbine High School, killing 13. All four guns came from gun show sales. Their friend, Robyn Anderson, bought three of the guns for them from unlicensed sellers, After the massacre, Ms. Anderson stated that had she been required to undergo a background check, she would not have purchased the guns.

Background checks for every sale, no matter where it takes place, would make a difference.

- California has strong gun laws that require all sales to go through retail dealers, including those at gun shows. Studies show an associated decreased incidences of anonymous, undocumented gun sales and illegal purchases. California's gun shows also had more attendees per vendor than shows in other states with weaker laws.
- Another study based on data from 54 cities found that requiring state background checks for private sales reduced gun trafficking within a state by 48 percent.

Gun owners support background checks for all gun sales.

• 67% of gun owners favor background checks for every sale, regardless of the location. 84% of people who live in a house with a gun (but are not the owner of the gun) favor background checks for every sale, and 80% of non-gun owners support this policy.

Preventing Gun Violence

Since 1979, when data were first collected, guns have taken the lives of nearly 120,000 American children and teenagers. Only a multi-pronged approach can end the slaughter.

Limit access to weapons of war

- Assault weapons and high-capacity magazines should only be used by military and law enforcement personnel.
- Strengthen background checks and require them for guns bought in stores, online or at gun shows anywhere.
- Make gun trafficking a federal crime.
- Use "amnesty" and "buy-back" days to encourage owners of banned weapons to give them up.

Expand and improve mental health services

- Close insurance loopholes provide true parity in coverage for mental and physical illnesses.
- Increase funding for school-based health centers and their staffs.
- Use financial incentives such as forgiving student loans to encourage students to enter psychiatry, psychology, and other mental health professions.
- Encourage states to participate in Medicaid expansion under the Affordable Care Act 4.4 million American under age 21 are eligible but not covered by the program.

Enhance school safety

- Allow Qualified Zone Academy Bonds (QZAB) to be used to make school entrances and exits more secure, access to classrooms more difficult, and strengthen security systems.
- Protect against inappropriate uses of the criminal justice system.

Encourage professional development

- Provide training for educators in cultural competence and conflict management.
- Develop and implement programs to prevent bullying.



General Information

Generally, it is unlawful for any individual to knowingly possess a firearm within a school zone. A school zone is defined as being within a distance of 1,000 feet from the grounds of a public, parochial, or private school. This prohibition does not apply to the possession of a firearm on private property not part of school grounds such as an FFL's business premise (e.g., commercial storefront, residence, or driveway)

Once a customer leaves private property located within 1.000 feet of a school with a firearm, they may be in violation of Federal Law. However, in the following situations an individual would not be possessing a firearm in violation of 922(q)(A):

- 1. The individual is licensed by the State or political subdivision to possess the firearm, and the license was issued after law enforcement officials verified that the individual is qualified to receive the license;
- 2. The firearm is unloaded and is contained within a locked container or a locked firearms rack that is on a motor vehicle;
- 3. The firearm is possessed by an individual for use in a school-approved program;
- 4. The individual or his/her employer is doing so in accordance with a contract between the individual and the school;
- 5. The individual is a law enforcement officer acting in their official capacity; or
- 6. The individual is crossing school grounds to reach a public or private way. Their firearm is unloaded, and they have permission from the school.

ATF realizes that not all persons who enter or exit an FFL's premises in such case may fall under one of the above-described statutory exemptions. Therefore, ATF advises that in those States where a permit is not needed, the FFL should ensure that prior to a purchaser leaving the business premise with a firearm that it is unloaded and placed in a locked container.

Federal Law

The Gun Control Act of 1968, 18 U.S.C. Chapter 44, provides in pertinent parts as follows:

18 U.S.C. 922(q)(1)

- (q)(1) The Congress finds and declares that—
 - (A) crime, particularly crime involving drugs and guns, is a pervasive, nationwide problem;
 - **(B)** crime at the local level is exacerbated by the interstate movement of drugs, guns, and criminal
 - (C) firearms and ammunition move easily in interstate commerce and have been found in increasing numbers in and around schools, as documented in numerous hearings in both the Committee on the Judiciary of the House of Representatives and the Committee on the Judiciary of the Senate: Control of the Contro
 - (D) in fact, even before the sale of a firearm, the gun, its component parts, ammunition, and the raw materials from which they are made have considerably moved in interstate commerce:
 - (E) while criminals freely move from State to State, ordinary citizens and foreign visitors may fear to travel to or through certain parts of the country due to concern about violent crime and gun violence, and parents may decline to send their children to school for the same reason;
 - (F) the occurrence of violent crime in school zones has resulted in a decline in the quality of education in our country;
 - (G) this decline in the quality of education has an adverse impact on interstate commerce and the foreign commerce of the United States:
 - (H) States, localities, and school systems find it almost impossible to handle gun-related crime by themselves—even States, localities, and school systems that have made strong efforts to prevent. detect, and punish gun-related crime find their efforts unavailing due in part to the failure or inability of other States or localities to take strong measures; and

(I) the Congress has the power, under the interstate commerce clause and other provisions of the Constitution, to enact measures to ensure the integrity and safety of the Nation's schools by enactment of this subsection.

My Testimony before the New Hampshire House Criminal Justice and Public Safety Committee on HB 609

This bill weakens public gun safety by allowing school districts to force local school boards to vote on a policy that would permit school employees with a concealed weapon license to carry firearms on school property. It conflicts with current federal regulations establishing gun-free zones in and around public school buildings.

Guns in school is a bad idea. Schools already have security measures in place. Police have the necessary training to use firearms in a stressful situation. School employees do not have that training. Let the police do their job and the teachers teach.

I disagree with those who claim that the presence of a gun will automatically ensure a successful outcome. Nothing could be further from the truth.

My own combat experience as a Marine Corps Officer in Santo Domingo and Viet Nam is relevant here. In those days I was an excellent shot. I practiced a lot with my handgun. We were required to re-qualify with our weapons annually. At one time I set a record high score at my base during re-qualification.

After all that practice and training, in the confusion of combat I did poorly. I wasted a lot of ammunition.

Another officer, an outstanding officer, killed 6 other Marines in a friendly fire accident. The last I heard of him, he had a nasty drinking problem.

These things will happen to good people with the best of intentions.

I wish to remind the Committee that The Lone Ranger is the only guy who shoots straight every time. The rest of us miss -a lot.

Having a carry permit is no guarantee of public safety especially in the chaos of a school shooting.

I urge the Committee to vote against this bill.
