STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

In the Year of Our Lord Two Thousand Thirteen

AN ACT

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relative to the selection of members of the conservation commission.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

- 1 Conservation Commission. Amend RSA 36-A:3 to read as follows:
- 36-A:3 Composition of Commission.
- I. The commission shall consist of not less than 3 nor more than 7 members. In a town which has a planning board, one member of the commission may also be on the planning board. In a city which has a planning board, one member of the commission may be on the planning board. In cities, the members of the commission [shall] may be either elected or appointed by the mayor subject to the provisions of the city charter, and in towns the members of the commission [shall] may be elected or appointed by the selectmen. Alternate members may be elected or appointed in a like manner and when the alternate serves in the absence or disqualification of a regular member, the alternate shall have full voting powers. When a commission is first established, terms of the members shall be for one, 2, or 3 years, and so arranged that the terms of approximately 1/3 of the members will expire each year, and their successors shall be elected or appointed for terms of 3 years each. Any member of a commission so appointed may, after a public hearing, if requested, be removed for cause by the appointing authority. A vacancy occurring otherwise than by expiration of a term shall be filled for the unexpired term in the same manner as an original election or appointment. Members of a conservation commission shall be residents of the city or town which they represent. Members of a conservation commission also may serve on other municipal boards and commissions, including, but not limited to a historic district commission established under RSA 673:4, and a heritage commission established under RSA 673:4-a.
- II. A local legislative body which has previously provided for the appointment of conservation commission members may rescind that action by majority vote and choose to elect commission members.
- III. A local legislative body's decision to change from an elected to an appointed conservation commission or from an appointed to an elected conservation commission may be made by the following:
- (a) In a town operating under the town meeting form of government, the decision may be made at any annual or special town meeting.
- (b) If a town has adopted the official ballot for the election of town officers, the question may be, but is not required to be, placed on the official ballot. If the question is not placed on the official ballot, the question shall be placed in the warrant and shall be voted on as a separate article at the town meeting.

SB 102 -- An Act relative to the selection of members of the conservation commission.

Bill Analysis: Enables members of the conservation commission to be elected.

Sponsors: Senator Bradley; Representatives McConkey and Butler.

Who supports the bill: Senator Bradley; Representative McConkey; Jack Rose, Albany Select Board; Rob Nadler, Albany Conservation Commission; Jasen Stock, NH Timberland Owners Association.

Who opposes the bill: Representative Suzanne Smith; Carol Andrews, NH Association of Conservation Commissions; Bruce Kantner, Temple Conservation Committee; Harrison Bourne, Lebanon; Linda Walsh.

Summary of testimony presented in support:

Senator Bradley:

- The Select Board of Albany requested the Legislature consider allowing towns, at their option, to elect their conservation commission. In the spirit of local control, please pass this enabling legislation.
- Senator Forrester stated she had received many emails opposing this bill. Because it is enabling legislation, perhaps that message isn't getting through?
- There is some angst about the bill. There is a belief that electing members would politicize the commission.
- Some individuals don't want to have to run for office in order to serve.

Representative McConkey:

- Albany is one of the towns Representative McConkey represents.
- He has served as both an appointed official and an elected official for the town of Ossipee.
- The state of New Hampshire is in love with elected officials. We elect everyone, i.e., cemetery trustees. It's not all that important to most people.
- People are always apprehensive to run. But good people always rise to the occasion.
- Many folks end up running unopposed.

Rob Nadler, Chair, Albany Conservation Commission:

- It is the town's option whether to choose or elect conservation commission members. It would be nice to have it more representative of the people to be able to elect them. It would make the commission independent.
- This is not being forced upon any town.
- If no individual ran for election, the town would continue to appoint the commission.
- None of Albany's commission members are concerned about having to run for office.

Jack Rose, Albany Selectman:

- Mr. Rose presented a letter of support from the Albany Board of Selectmen, endorsing the legislation.
- If SB 102 was enacted, the town would develop a warrant article to approve the change.

Summary of testimony presented in opposition:

Carol Andrews, Executive Director, NH Association of Conservation Commissions:

- The association works with the 215 conservation commissions throughout the state.
- One of their greatest concerns is that people will not want to volunteer for these positions. People simply serve on these types of commissions because they want to help with managing lands and clearing trails. They have no real interest in standing for election; they only want to volunteer for the town.
- In some commissions it will cost people money to run for these seats.
- We don't want people placed on conservation commissions because of name recognition, or because they are popular in town.
- There is no guarantee or evidence that elections would result in a more capable group of volunteers for conservation commissions.
- Ms. Andrews doesn't believe there are any other states who allow for municipal conservation commissions to be elected.
- The association would need a compelling reason to change the way things are done currently.
- Conservation commissions in some towns are concerned this legislation may be imposed onto them, even though the bill is proposed as enabling. The enabling portion of the bill doesn't appear to appease those who are in opposition.

Harrison Bourne, Lebanon (submitted testimony, not in attendance):

• The Lebanon Conservation Commission frequently experiences an empty seat on the commission. This bill would only exacerbate the situation.

Bruce Kantner, Temple Conservation Committee (submitted testimony, not in attendance):

• Opening the selection process to a town vote could politicize the conservation commission's role, make it more vulnerable to special interests and discourage new members from applying.

Action: By a vote of 3-2 the bill was found inexpedient to legislate.

Dear Senator Boutin,

I'm writing about SB 102 which proposes to change the election process for Conservation Committee members. Our Temple Conservation Committee discussed this bill at our meeting last Monday and unanimously decided to oppose it. They asked me, as Secretary, to convey their decision to the Public and Municipal Affairs Committee, but I could not find an email address on the Committee's website. I left a phone message for the aide, Debra Martone, and asked her to pass along this message to the Committee.

Our members feel that SB 102 would discourage volunteers from joining the Conservation Commission if they had to go through an election process rather than the current, straightforward appointment by the Select Board. The present method has worked well for forty years.

Opening the selection process to a town vote could politicize the Con Com's role, make it more vulnerable to special interests, and discourage new members from applying.

Please convey our position to the rest of the Committee. We hope SB 102 will go no farther than your Committee.
