Summary of testimony presented in support:

Senator Rausch

• Started out as allowing marine deals to inspect trailers and everyone he knew did not realize that they had to have their boats inspected. He brought that to the attention of the Asst. Commissioner and DOS decided to change the requirement to 10,000lbs or more.

Rick Bailey (DMV, presented position paper)

- This cleans up of the regulations of the Department in that there are references to the Highway Enforcement Officers, which was disbanded in 2007. All of its duties have been taken on by other divisions.
- Trailers that weigh or carry less than 10,000lbs (small boats, utility trailers, and snowmobiles, non-commercial) do not cause a large safety risk and most are unaware that they need to be inspected.
- The Department met with the Marine Trades Association and they learned that the dealers give you a form that says your trailer is unsafe because it has not been inspected.
- There are not clear processes for how to inspect a trailer and it is not being enforced.
- Larger trailers/commercial truckers are aware that they need to have inspections and some federal requirements come into play, so there are no problems there.
- This will allow mechanics to have the authority to inspect the trailers and people will be able to have it inspected on the dealer lot.

Ryan Crawford (NH Marine Trades)

• They have worked with Director Bailey and this seemed to be best for everyone. Want to keep boat sells in NH strong and abide by the rules. Senator Boutin asked Director Bailey if when they have to get it inspected is

addressed in rules.

- The requirement is there for annual inspections and this would make for only over 10,000lbs and this would allow us to implement it in rules.
- Senator Boutin asked where it says it is an annual requirement.
 - o It is in a different section.

Senator Stiles asked how we would let boat owners know about this.

• Director Bailey said that they already required by law to have it done. With commercial drivers they have no problems. They have not envisioned a type of information dispersal, but could pass it out in their annual promotional information.

LEGISLATIVE POSITION PAPER

HB____ SB_22__ AS INTRODUCED () AMENDMENT NO. ___

This bill was introduced at the request of the Department of Safety to address a problem that was brought to our attention by the Marine Dealers, but it also contains a provision about Highway Enforcement Officers that we requested to be included in the bill.

Section 1 of the bill deals with Highway Enforcement Officers. They no longer exist. The Bureau of Highway Enforcement at DMV was disbanded in 2007 and the Highway Enforcement Officers were transferred into State Police and became Troop G, the commercial vehicle enforcement troop and the troop that provides liaison to support the DMV. When the force of Highway Patrol and Enforcement Officers was disbanded in 2007 nobody thought to change RSA 266:1-a, which still requires the Commissioner of Safety to delegate Highway Enforcement Officers to assist the DMV Director in operating the motor vehicle safety inspection program. Obviously this law is no longer needed, but there is a need to ensure that someone from State Police carries on the duties that these people had. Therefore this bill amends RSA 261:1-a to delete the references to Highway Patrol and Enforcement Officers and provides that the Director of State Police with approval of the Commissioner of Safety will assign and equip a suitable complement of State Troopers (which is what we did with Troop G) to assist the DMV Director in enforcing the motor vehicle inspection regulations.

The second section of the bill addresses the problem of the marine dealers. Most people do not even realize that the law requires trailers, even small utility trailers to be inspected. Lots of people unknowingly violate this law every year. There is no indication that a significant number of trailers are causing accidents due to having faulty safety equipment. However, when a marine dealer sells a boat it usually comes with a trailer. The marine dealer has to tell his new customer that he or she must bring the boat to a regular car and truck inspection station and get it inspected. Many regular car and truck inspection stations do not want to be bothered with inspecting a trailer and if they are busy they may refuse to do so and the new boat owner has to hunt around to find someone who will inspect his trailer.

Most small boat trailers have a gross vehicle weight rating of 10,000 lbs. or less. This bill exempts trailers with 10,000 lbs. or less gross vehicle weight rating from the periodic vehicle inspection requirements provided they are not used in interstate commerce but still allows a police officer to pull them over and check them to be sure they are safe. The bill also allows properly qualified marine dealers holding utility dealer plates to inspect trailers of more than 10,000 lbs. gross vehicle weight rating, but not the large semi-trailers that are part of a tractor/trailer rig. This will allow the mechanics that work for a boat dealer to be trained and when a marine dealer sells a large boat and trailer, the customer will be able to get it inspected before he or she drives it off the dealer's lot, and will not have to spend time hunting around for someone who will inspect the trailer.

We believe this is a pro-business and pro-consumer bill that creates a "win/win" situation for everyone.
