HOUSE BILL **1362-FN**

AN ACT prohibiting enforcement of any federal law which bans certain firearms or limits firearm magazine size and establishing a criminal penalty for such enforcement.

ANALYSIS

This bill establishes a class B felony for a public servant or firearms dealer who enforces or attempts to enforce any federal restriction on firearms manufactured or owned exclusively in this state which remain within the borders of this state. The bill also declares any federal ban or other restriction on the ownership, possession, or registration of a firearm, firearm accessory, or magazine to be unenforceable.

AN ACT prohibiting enforcement of any federal law which bans certain firearms or limits firearm magazine size and establishing a criminal penalty for such enforcement.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

8	relating to a personal firearm, firearm accessory, or ammunition that is owned or manufactured
9	commercially or privately in this state and that remains exclusively within the borders of this state.
10	II. Any official, agent, or employee of the United States government who enforces or
11	attempts to enforce any statute, rule, regulation, or order of the United States government on an act
12	that is expressly allowed by New Hampshire law shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.
13	650-D:2 Defense of Citizen Prosecuted by Federal Government. The attorney general shall
14	defend a citizen of this state who is prosecuted by the United States government for violation of a
15	federal law relating to the manufacture, sale, transfer, or possession of a firearm, firearm accessory,
16	or ammunition owned or manufactured and retained exclusively within the borders of this state.
17	650-D:3 Federal Restrictions Unenforceable. Any statute, rule, regulation, or order of the
18	United States government created or effective on or after January 1, 2015 restricting the individual
19	possession, sale, or purchase of ammunition of any kind shall be unenforceable within the borders of
20	this state, and any agent of the United States government who attempts to enforce such a restriction
21	against an individual, including a federally-licensed firearms dealer, shall be guilty of a
22	misdemeanor.
23	2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect January 1, 2015.

HB 1362-FN - FISCAL NOTE

AN ACT prohibiting enforcement of any federal law which bans certain firearms or limits firearm magazine size and establishing a criminal penalty for such enforcement.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The Judicial Branch, Department of Justice, and New Hampshire Association of Counties state this bill, <u>as introduced</u>, may increase state and county expenditures by an indeterminable amount in FY 2015 and each year thereafter. There will be no fiscal impact on local expenditures, or state, county, and local revenue.

METHODOLOGY:

The Judicial Branch states this bill adds RSA 650-D to prohibit enforcement of any federal law which bans certain firearms or limits firearm magazine size. Violation of this proposed law would be an unspecified misdemeanor. The Branch has no information to estimate how many additional misdemeanor prosecutions may result but does have the average cost to process each type of case. An unspecified misdemeanor can be either class A or class B, with the presumption being a class B misdemeanor. The Branch estimates a class A misdemeanor will cost \$66.17 per case in FY 2015 and \$67.64 per case in FY 2016 and each year thereafter, and a class B misdemeanor will cost \$46.99 per case in FY 2015 and \$48.02 per case in FY 2016 and each year thereafter. Any appeals will result in an increase in expenditures. All costs are estimated based on case weight information from the last needs assessment completed in 2005. Since that timeframe there have been various changes that may impact the costs, such as the creation of the circuit court, the increase in self-represented litigants, and the change to presume that an unspecified misdemeanor can be treated as a class B misdemeanor.

The Department of Justice states this bill will have an indeterminable increase on state expenditures. The Department states its Public Integrity Unit investigates and prosecutes criminal conduct undertaken by certain public officials in their official capacity. This bill may result in an increase in the number of investigations and prosecutions by the Unit. This bill would require the Department to defend any New Hampshire citizen against charges for a violation of federal law relating to firearms, firearm accessories, and ammunition owned or manufactured in the state that remain exclusively within the state.

The New Hampshire Association of Counties states to the extent individuals are charged, convicted, and sentenced to incarceration in a county correctional facility, the counties will have

expenditures. The Association is unable to determine the number of individuals who may be charged, convicted or incarcerated as a result of this bill to determine an exact fiscal impact. The average annual cost to incarcerate an individual in a county correctional facility is approximately \$35,000. There is no impact on county revenue.

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The Judicial Council states that anyone prosecuted under this proposed law would be a government official acting in his or her official capacity. In the event of criminal prosecution, the government official would be defended and indemnified by his or her employer, and would not seek the assistance of appointed counsel. The Council states this bill will not have a fiscal impact on the indigent defense delivery system.

I. The Tenth Amendment to the United States Constitution guarantees to the states and 10 their people all powers not granted to the federal government elsewhere in the Constitution and 11 12reserves to the state and people of New Hampshire certain powers as they were understood at the 13 time that New Hampshire ratified the Bill of Rights, particularly the Tenth Amendment in 1790. 14 The guaranty of those powers is a matter of contract between the state and people of New Hampshire and the United States as of the time that the compact with the United States was agreed 15upon and adopted by New/Hampshire and the United States. 16

II. The Ninth Amendment to the United States Constitution guarantees to the people rights 1718 not granted in the Constitution and reserves to the people of New Hampshire certain rights as they 19 were understood at the time that New Hampshire ratified the Bill of Rights, particularly the Tenth Amendment in 1790. The guaranty of those rights is a matter of contract between the state and 20 people of New Hampshire and the United States as of the time that the compact with the 21 $\mathbf{22}$ United States was agreed upon and adopted by New Hampshire and the United States.

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III. The regulation of intrastate commerce is vested in the states under the Ninth and Tenth $\mathbf{24}$ amendments to the United States Constitution, particularly if not expressly preempted by federal law. Congress has not expressly preempted state regulation of intrastate commerce pertaining to 2526 the manufacture, on an intrastate basis, of firearms, firearms accessories, and ammunition.

27IV. The Second Amendment to the United States Constitution reserves to the people the 28 right to keep and bear arms as that right was understood at the time that New Hampshire ratified, 29 in 1790, the Bill of Rights, particularly the Second Amendment, and the guaranty of the right is a matter of contract between the state and people of New Hampshire and the United States as of the 30



time that the compact with the United States was agreed upon and adopted by New Hampshire and
 the United States, by that said ratification.

3 V. New Hampshire, having already established in 1784 its own constitution, with Articles 2 and 7 guaranteeing that New Hampshire citizens had the right to defend and protect life and 4 $\mathbf{5}$ property and that these rights would not be superseded by the powers granted to the Congress of the 6 United States of America, such that when New Hampshire ratified the United States Constitution 7 these rights were clearly understood to exist in the State of New Hampshire. Article 2 of the 8 New Hampshire Bill of Rights: Natural Rights, includes this statement that all men have certain 9 natural, essential, and inherent rights among which are, the enjoying and defending life and liberty; 10 acquiring, possessing, and protecting, property; and, in a word, of seeking and obtaining happiness. 11Article 7 of the New Hampshire Bill of Rights, effective June 2, 1784, clearly provides that the 12people of this state have the sole and exclusive right of governing themselves as a free, sovereign, 13and independent state; and do, and forever hereafter shall, exercise and enjoy every power, 14jurisdiction, and right, pertaining thereto, which is not, or may not hereafter be, by them expressly 15delegated to the United States of America in congress assembled.

VI. Article 2-a of the New Hampshire Bill of Rights: The Bearing of Arms, effective December 1, 1982, provides that all persons have the right to keep and bear arms in defense of themselves, their families, their property and the state. This article was an explicit recognition of the rights implicit in Article 2 as it was adopted in 1784.

2 New Chapter; Lawful Commerce in Firearms. Amend RSA by inserting after chapter 159-D
the following new chapter:

CHAPTER 159-E

LAWFUL COMMERCE IN FIREARMS

159-E:1 Definitions. As used in this chapter, the following definitions apply:

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I. "Firearm" means any weapon, including a starter gun, which will, or is designed to, or may readily be converted to expel a projectile by the action of an explosive. "Firearm" shall include the frame or receiver of any such weapon, or any firearm muffler or firearm silencer.

II. "Firearms accessories" means items that are used in conjunction with or mounted upon a firearm but are not essential to the basic function of a firearm, including but not limited to telescopic or laser sights, magazines, flash or sound suppressors, folding or aftermarket stocks and grips, speedloaders, ammunition carriers, optics for target identification, and lights for target illumination.

III. "Generic and insignificant parts" includes but is not limited to springs, screws, nuts, and
 pins.

34 IV. "Manufactured" means that a firearm, a firearm accessory, or ammunition has been 35 created from basic materials for functional usefulness, including but not limited to forging, casting, 36 machining, molding, or other processes for working materials.

37 159-E:2 Prohibitions. Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, a firearm, a firearm

accessory, or ammunition that is manufactured commercially or privately in New Hampshire and 1 2 that remains within the state of New Hampshire shall not be subject to federal law or taxation, or 3 federal regulation, including registration, under the authority of Congress to regulate interstate 4 commerce. It is declared by the legislature that those items have not traveled in interstate 5 commerce. This section applies to a firearm, a firearm accessory, or ammunition that is 6 manufactured in New Hampshire from basic materials and that can be manufactured without the 7 inclusion of any significant parts imported from another state. Generic and insignificant parts that 8 have other manufacturing or consumer product applications are not firearms, firearms accessories, 9 or ammunition, and their importation into New Hampshire and incorporation into a firearm, a 10 firearm accessory, or ammunition manufactured in New Hampshire does not subject the firearm, 11 firearm accessory, or ammunition to federal regulation. It is declared by the legislature that basic 12materials, such as, but not limited to, unmachined steel and unshaped wood, are not firearms, 13firearms accessories, or ammunition and are not subject to congressional authority to regulate 14 firearms, firearms accessories, and ammunition under interstate commerce as if they were actually 15firearms, firearms accessories, or ammunition. The authority of Congress to regulate interstate 16 commerce in basic materials does not include authority to regulate firearms, firearms accessories, 17and ammunition made in New Hampshire from those materials. Firearms accessories that are 18 imported into New Hampshire from another state and that are subject to federal regulation as being 19 in interstate commerce do not subject a firearm to federal regulation under interstate commerce because they are attached to or used in conjunction with a firearm in New Hampshire. 20

159-E:3 Marketing of Firearms. A firearm manufactured or sold in New Hampshire under this
 chapter shall have the words "Made in New Hampshire" clearly stamped, inscribed, or otherwise
 marked on a central part of the firearm, such as the receiver or frame.

24 159-E:4 Penalty.

I. Any public servant of the state of New Hampshire as defined in RSA 640:2 who enforces or attempts to enforce an act, order, law, statute, rule, or regulation of the government of the United States upon a firearm, a firearm accessory, or ammunition that is manufactured commercially or privately in New Hampshire and that remains within the state of New Hampshire shall be guilty of a class A misdemeanor.

II. Any official, agent, or employee of the government of the United States, or employee of a corporation providing services to the government of the United States who enforces or attempts to enforce an act, order, law, statute, rule, or regulation of the government of the United States upon a firearm, a firearm accessory, or ammunition that is manufactured commercially or privately in New Hampshire and that remains within the state of New Hampshire shall be guilty of a class B felony.

36 159-E:5 Applicability. This chapter shall apply to firearms, firearms accessories, and
 37 ammunition that are manufactured, as defined in this chapter, and retained in New Hampshire after



1 January 1, 2015.

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3 Effective Date. This act shall take effect January 1, 2015.

HB 1362: Prohibiting enforcement of federal gun laws

Position: Information Only

Dear Honorable Members of the Committee:

The title of this bill refers to "felonious" enforcement of federal firearms restrictions but the text of the bill makes it a misdemeanor.

The bill seeks to prohibit any public servant *selling any firearm in this state* from enforcing or attempting to enforce any statute, rule, regulation or order of the U.S. government relating to a firearm, firearm accessory, or ammunition that is owned or manufactured commercially or privately in this state and that remains exclusively in this state. This on its face is pretty silly since we cannot imagine any public servant who would be <u>selling</u> a firearm and in the process, enforcing a federal firearms law.

Perhaps the intent was to exempt firearms manufactured commercially or privately in New Hampshire from the federal firearms laws, under the impression that the federal firearms laws only apply to this state through the Commerce Clause of the U.S. Constitution. This is a legal argument that might or might not withstand a court test. Arguments would no doubt include that not every single part of a firearm would have originated in the State of New Hampshire and thus the Commerce Clause would be applicable, or the difficulty in proving or disproving that such a firearm or ammunition never left the state. We leave that issue for the lawyers to debate, but if the bill is to pass it should be amended to clarify this apparent drafting error in paragraph I.

The bill goes on to make it a misdemeanor for any official, agent or employee of the U.S. Government who attempts to enforce any federal law, rule, regulation, or order of the government on an act that is expressly allowed by New Hampshire, a misdemeanor. It would also require the NH Attorney General to defend any NH citizen who is prosecuted by the federal government for violation of any federal firearm law pertaining to a firearm, accessory, or ammunition that was manufactured, sold, transferred, owned or possessed and retained exclusively within the borders of this state. This would make an interesting case for any New Hampshire law enforcement officer who arrested a federal agent for attempting to enforce federal law. He or she would certainly be charged with interfering with a federal officer or perhaps false imprisonment of a federal officer.

The bill then states that any new statute, rule, regulation or order of the U.S. government restricting the sale, or possession of ammunition of any kind, enacted on or after January 1, 2015 would be unenforceable within the borders of this state and any agent who attempts to enforce such a restriction against anyone including a federally licensed firearms dealer would also be guilty of a misdemeanor. This again would depend on the interaction of the second amendment and the commerce clause and we express no opinion on that legal argument.

The Department of Safety takes no position on the bill but appears before you to point out the drafting error in paragraph I and to explain the quandary that any state law enforcement officer would be in if they attempted to arrest a federal official for enforcing federal law. They would be faced with a decision of whether to risk not enforcing a state law which they are obligated to enforce, or to enforce it and be committing a federal crime, remembering that when they took their oath of office they had to swear allegiance to both the state and the federal constitutions, each of which is subject to different interpretations in this case.

STATEMENT OF INTENT

This bill establishes a class B felony for a public servant or firearms dealer who enforces or attempts to enforce any federal restriction on firearms manufactured or owned exclusively in this state which remain within the borders of this state and also declares that any federal ban or other restriction on the ownership, possession, or registration of a firearm, firearm accessory, or magazine to be unenforceable. HB 1362 Majority Report ITL (15-1)

This bill establishes a class B felony for a public servant or firearms dealer who enforces or attempts to enforce any federal restriction on firearms manufactured or owned exclusively in this state which remain within the borders of this state and also declares that any federal ban or other restriction on the ownership, possession, or registration of a firearm, firearm accessory, or magazine to be unenforceable. At the public hearing, the sponsor presented the committee with an amendment which would exempt firearms, firearms accessories, and ammunition manufactured in New Hampshire from federal law and regulation.
