#### Summary of testimony presented in support: Senator Fuller Clark

- Discussed the concerns citizens have regarding a small minority group funding the vast majority of campaigns. Explained that numerous states have supported the overturn of Citizens United.
- This committee will looks at potential constitutional amendments regarding Citizens United.
- There has been a large grassroots effort for this movement from both parties to stand against big money in politics.

#### Representative Bob Perry (provided written testimony)

- Raised some concerns about the lack qualifying language of the bill analysis.
- The Citizens United was a large misjudgment and the 2012 election holds the record for being the most expensive in history.
- This movement towards exorbitant funding for campaigns will prevent good candidates from running.
- The super wealthy are already announcing plans to use their personal fortunes to influence the elections.
- Class discrepancy the influx of private money in politics distorts our nation's politics and limits our electoral process. Spoke about class equality and the influence of it on politics.
- Money is not speech and corporations are not people.

#### John Friede (Worldview, Director) (provided written testimony)

- Citizens United has opened up the floodgates to unlimited corporate spending on elections. Has had a huge impact on influencing elections.
- In 2012, special interest groups, mostly from outside of NH, spent five times what state candidates did on their own campaigns.
- Most elected officials admit that they spend between 30-70% of their time fundraising instead of governing.
- 53 NH towns will be meeting in the near future in town meetings to vote on overturning Citizens United.

#### John Raby

- Spoke about his personal experience where big money is valued over anything else
- People demand democracy and we need to restore what we had. Whatever form of government we have now is not a democracy. One is about power and balance and to have freedom depends on competition and diversity.
- Media firms are consolidating and that combined Citizens United will result in a system for informal censorship.

#### Ellen Read (provided written testimony)

• Citizens United affects everyone across the spectrum and 3-4 people disagree with Citizens United. The spending in one election went up over 40 times. One person from NY spent \$5million on gun control ads here in NH.

- This prevents a citizen government because if you do not have the funding or ability to fight the attack ads you can't win.
- Pointed out how corporations are not like human beings. If you give power to a corporation then you are extending the power those few owners have. That violates the one person one voice.
- Corporations should have rights, but not constitutional rights.

#### Peter Bearse

- This bill is a baby step in the right direction, but a critical step and it is not a partisan issue.
- It is even more important in light of two major trends of big money corrupting the process and a fall in participation of people in the process.
- We have a constitutional issue because we no longer have the system that was called for under the original constitution; where all men were created equal that means equal under the law not outcomes. We no longer have equality under the law.
- The market economy is not an engine for equality and we as political leaders need to take that into account. The concentration of wealth leads to laws which favor the further concentration of wealth and decreases the power of the great American majority.
- Campaign finance reform has failed and there is no way to bring it back except through one or two constitutional amendments.

### Peter White (provided written testimony), Lynn Chong and Harlan Cheney (provided written testimony

- Spoke about personal experience with attempting to overturn Citizens United. There is widespread support to overturn it.
- People feel like they don't count anymore and we see a decrease in voter participation.
- This is damaging to our people and our democracy as it was intended by our founding fathers.

#### Chris Hanson

- Described metaphor between a town hall meeting being overrun by a truck with giant speakers blasting one person talking and Citizens United.
- With having the first in the nation primary, a lot of money is coming into the state. We need to be conscientious of our own rights to speak.

#### Rob Werner (Americans for Campaign Reform)

- Supports' meeting the challenges and the damages Citizens United has done.
- This is setting up a process for discussion with a multifaceted approach and transparency.

#### Pam Martin

• Pointed out how corporations want to be viewed as humans when it comes to free speech, but they do not grow old or die or go to jail when crimes are committed.

#### George Menos

• Described his personal experience with big money used against him in campaign and against others.

#### Bill Monroe

• Concerned with the Koch brothers and if they dismantle Social Security or Medicare.

Testimony in Support of S.B. 307 an Act Establishing a Committee to Review *Citizens United* Amendment to the United States Constitution.

#### Dear Senator Prescott:

I am writing to express my support for S.B. 307. Others have exhaustively addressed the legal and constitutional questions in commentary already directed to you regarding the need for this bill. I simply want to state first that I agree with those who contend that corporations and other artificial entities are not entitled to all of the same rights afforded to individuals, most notably interpretations of the First Amendment which equate money with speech.

I am a retired corporate executive and I can assure you that I never worked in any corporation where all my colleagues shared uniform political views. If for no other reason, CEO's or executive committees should not be able to dispense funds from the corporate treasury in order to support specific candidates, thereby falsely presenting employees and shareholders as a monolithic constituency. Further, the absence of disclosure requirements casts an even darker shadow over such donations and facilitates a pervasive and corrupting influence in the election system.

Equally as important as the legal argument is the impact of current law (as defined by the majority opinion in Citizens United v. FEC) on our body politic. We are by nearly all accounts a nation very divided on a partisan basis and I believe the political speech which is largely being fueled by the unprecedented infusion of special interest money into our electoral process is the single biggest factor behind this expanding divide. It is part of what prevents us from being able to solve problems and govern ourselves.

In the free market of commerce, it is up to companies who want to sell their goods and services to explain to consumers why what they offer is better. Rarely do you see someone build a successful business by demeaning their competitors. As a small business owner, you surely know this to be true. Shouldn't we want our politics to be the same way? Shouldn't we want candidates to convince voters to support them on the strength of their ideas or their performance, rather than by demeaning their opponents or allowing others to do it on their behalf?

Instead, we are subjected to large sums of special interest money (mostly from out-of-state, often anonymous funders) flooding our elections with mainly personal or character attacks on opponents, sometimes even within their own party. The effect of this legal, but arguably corrupt form of speech, is to amplify partisan rhetoric with a metaphorical megaphone and drown out individual voices and more factual, reasoned debate. We are not better for it

As I talk with many in my community, I find significant support from all voter segments (Republican, Democrat, and Independent) for the changes S.B. 307 would force us to consider, and that encourages me. These changes would help to free elected officials from the weight of special interests whose demands distract them from their role as the people's representatives. I strongly urge you to support this important legislation.

## Republicans losing their way on campaign finance reform

When I arrived in the U.S. Senate 30 years ago, I was a proud member of a Republican Party known for championing moderation in Congress, restraint in the courts and good-government reform.

In fact, the Republican tradition of campaign finance reform in which I stand dates to the trust-buster, Theodore Roosevelt. In his 1905 message to Congress. President Roosevelt proposed that "contributions by corporations to any political committee or for any political purpose should be forbidden by law." His logic was straightforward enough: "If [legislators] are extorted by any kind of pressure or promise, express or implied, direct or indirect, in the way of favor or immunity, then the giving or receiving becomes not only improper but criminal."

The resulting Tillman Act of 1907 and Federal Corrupt Practices Act of 1910 were the first laws limiting corporate money in federal elections and requiring strict disclosure of campaign funds. With the rise of organized labor in the 1930s, Republican Sen. Robert Taft and Republican Rep. Fred Hartley extended the ban on corporate contributions to unions. Those laws were dealt a serious blow by last month's Supreme Court decision in Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission. That such a rash and immoderate ruling could come from a chief justice once committed to respecting precedent, and win praise from leaders of my party, is beyond my comprehension.

It was congressional Republicans who led the 1971 effort to strengthen existing campaign finance law through the Federal Election Campaign Act. After the Watergate campaign finance scandal, Republicans in Congress joined with Democrats to pass far-reaching amendments to the 1971 law, limiting contributions and campaign spending and establishing a system of public financing for presidential campaigns.

In more recent years, my friend and former Senate colleague John McCain (R-Ariz.) took up the cause of reform with Sen. Russ Feingold (D-Wis.), leading a decade-long effort to stem the flow of unregulated "soft money" from special-interest groups to political parties and to curb spending by outside interests.

That history of Republican leadership on campaign finance reform should remind Republicans in Congress today that it is not in our true nature to side with the moneyed interests against the interests of the American people. The Supreme Court has taken that stand.

It's time to return to our roots and take up Teddy Roosevelt's challenge from over a century ago by enacting the only real and lasting solution I know: citizen-funded elections. Under the proposed <u>Fair Elections Now Act</u>, sponsored by more than 130 members of Congress, money from special interests would be replaced by small donations from constituents and matching federal funds. Matching funds, raised through a fee on large-scale government contracts, would go to serious, hardworking candidates who demonstrate a broad base of public support and who say no to large donations.

Republicans and Democrats in Congress must work together to expand political speech for all citizens by replacing special-interest money in politics with small donations and public matching funds. Supreme Court opinion notwithstanding, corporations are not defined as people under the Constitution, and free speech can hardly be called free when only the rich are heard.

My name is Harlan Cheney. I live in Atkinson, New Hampshire. I am in favor of this nonpartisan endeavor that seeks a Constitutional amendment to get uncontrolled political spending out of Presidential, Congressional and state elections.

On January 31, 2010 the US Supreme Court, in its Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission decision, overturned a section of the 2002 Bipartisan Campaign Reform Act, commonly referred to as McCain-Feingold, that prohibited unions and corporations from spending vast sums of money on political advertising in state and federal elections. We're all familiar with the incessant TV attack ads that spew innuendo, misinformation and disinformation about candidates, regardless of their party affiliation.

Now that the floodgates are open, in Washington, representatives from both parties spend 30 to 70% of each day on the phone to raise campaign funds, instead of attending to the country's affairs; and, in New Hampshire, I don't want to see my State Senator, Chuck Morse, primaried because a well-heeled, outside interest doesn't like his ideas for the future of this state.

Our founding fathers who wrote the Constitution were keenly aware of the negative effects posed by money that attempts to sway elections. In federalist Paper 39, James Madison stated, "We may define a republic to be a government that derives all its powers directly or indirectly from the people, not from an inconsiderable proportion of a favored class of it." In Federalist Paper 78, Alexander Hamilton wrote some prescient remarks about the courts. He said, "The courts must declare the sense of the law; and, if they should be disposed to exercise will instead of judgment, the consequences would be equally the substitution of their pleasure to that of the legislative body." That is exactly what the Citizens United decision did.

Nowadays, people feel subjected to their government, not that they control it; this is our opportunity to reestablish the belief of our founding fathers that elections are for "We the People."

SB 307 – establishing a committee to review Citizens United amendments to the United States Constitution.

Analysis: This bill establishes a committee to review constitutional amendments regarding the Citizens United decision and related cases that have been introduced in the United States Congress and make recommendations to the New Hampshire congressional delegation.

\* \* \* \* \*

I respectfully disagree with the conclusion in the analysis of the bill, which seems to confine consideration of potential amendment language only to language that has been introduced in the United States Congress.

In contrast, the bill's introductory language at Section 1, Line 1 reads "Committee Established. There is established a committee to review **all** proposed language and amendments to overturn the Citizens United ruling and related cases by the United States Supreme Court." There is no qualifying language in that sentence.

Additionally, language at Roman II. Line 15 indicates that it shall be the duty of the committee to "examine the different approaches and language being proposed for a constitutional amendment." There is no qualifier in that sentence, either.

I therefore conclude the committee is free to broadly consider any language it deems suitable to re-establish the rights of state legislatures to safeguard fair elections through clear and concise language authorizing regulation of corporate and union political spending.

The Citizens United ruling and the subsequent ruling in SpeechNew were terrible miscalculations of human behavior and the power of money. The consequences of the rulings were

immediate. By Election 2012, spending by outside groups rose 251% over the previous presidential election cycle, and Election 2012 holds the record as the most expensive in history, with political expenditures exceeding \$7 billion. And the usefulness of the Citizens United decision is only in its infancy. Money will find new and more novel ways to influence elections and produce more victories for those who spend the most or are most clever in its use. That includes last-minute advertising having no relationship to truth, and without challenge through disclosure and regulation will prevent good candidates from running for office and ruin the reputations of many others.

In Election 2012, 132 Americans funded 60 percent of SuperPac spending. That's .000042% of the population funded a super majority of SuperPac spending.

The SuperWealthy are already announcing plans to spend hundreds of millions of dollars from their personal fortunes to influence the next election. And those personal fortunes are growing: Forbes magazine recently reported that the richest 85 people in the world own as much wealth as the poorest 3.5 billion.

Daniel Weeks, himself a New Hampshire stalwart of campaign reform, recalls how the late Senator Warren Rudman said the influx of private money in politics 'distorts our nation's agenda, undermines our democratic values, drives voters away from the polls and limits electoral competition.'

Writing in the Washington Post in 2010, Rudman cited the warning of Theodore Roosevelt from 1904, that "contributions by corporations ... for any purpose should be forbidden by law," and asserted that the Supreme Court's decision in Citizens United ignored the best interests of the American people.

There is a growing consensus that the outcome of Election 2014 and subsequent elections will be determined by SuperPacs and the SuperWealthy wielding their political influence through unbridled political spending. I agree. I cite an example of why I agree:

Among three leaked, confidential memos sent by Citigroup in 2005 and 2006 to its best investors, it asserted with a sense of pride and arrogance that there are two classes of people in our country ... the plutonomy and the rest. The memos go on to advise CitiGroup's best investors how to remain on the "gravy train." It also acknowledged that the top 1 percent of American households account for more wealth than the bottom 95 percent, as if that's the way things ought to be.

Those statements should frighten all of us, that a 200 year old corporation, at the time of the leak having 357,000 employees, a corporation the government recognized during the Wall Street Recession as too big to fail, so blatantly dismisses what the founders created. We shall greatly disappoint the founders, that while we slept, we lost what they gave us, even after fair warning that what they crafted was a fragile experiment in self-government.

#### Another example:

"I think capitalism is a lot more important than democracy. I'm not even a big believer in democracy. I always say that democracy is -- can be two wolves and a sheep deciding what to have for dinner. Now, look, I'm in favor of people having the right to vote and things like that, but, you know, there are a lot of countries that have the right to vote and are still poor. Democracy doesn't always lead to a good economy or even a good political system. In capitalism, you are free to do what you want, to make whatever you want of yourself. It doesn't mean you're going to succeed. Remember, the United States Constitution does not guarantee happiness."

Steven Moore, columnist and member of the editorial board of the Wall Street Journal, the bible of corporate America, circa approximately 2009.

I suggest his remarks to be an affront to the founders. It certainly is to me.

And this Internet headline of February 25 from USA Today: "Federal super PACS spend big on <u>local</u> elections. Spending by super PACs threatens to overwhelm state and local elections, and experts predict a new flood of money before November's elections."

Big Money will now have a disproportionate influence on who is elected to such positions as selectmen, city charter, city council, school board, and sheriff. And in states where judges are elected, political spending will also determine who serves on the Bench, ending any notion of judicial impartiality.

Last week, two activists attended the U.S. Supreme Court's public session during its consideration of McCutcheon v FEC. McCutcheon would repeal regulation of individual political spending, opening the floodgates even further to an unprecedented era of money in politics. One activist held a camera while the other uttered these words to members on the Bench:

"I rise on behalf of the vast majority of the American people who believe that money is not speech, corporations are not people, and our democracy should not be for sale to the highest bidder. Overturn Citizens United. Keep the cap on McCutcheon. The people demand democracy."

Barely had he finished when he was silenced and removed from the court room. Think of it: Speech silenced in the U.S. Supreme Court, while the Bench was considering disproportionately broadening speech for those with money, power and position.

Restoring whatever it is we had begins with overturning Citizens United and the legal doctrine that corporations are people.

Restoring whatever it is we had must be the overarching goal of both parties. It is our duty as legislators to recognize this threat and act on our knowledge.

I do not hesitate in begging you to support this study committee.

#### Federal super PACs spend big on local elections

WASHINGTON — The campaign fliers landed in mailboxes last September and October, urging voters in Elizabeth, N.J., to toss out several members of the school board.

The source of the glossy mailers: the Committee for Economic Growth and Social Justice, an innocuously named super PAC registered in Washington to accept and spend unlimited amounts of campaign cash to influence politics — in this case, who would win three unpaid positions on a board that runs a 25,000-student school district.

By Election Day, the group — tied to a powerful New Jersey state senator and heavily funded by the bail bond industry — had spent more than \$150,000, federal campaign records show. The effort largely succeeded. Two of the targeted incumbents lost their seats.

"We've never experienced or expected that outside interest groups would come in and invest this kind of money into a local school board race," said Elizabeth School Board president Tony Monteiro, a political ally of the losing candidates. "It boggles the mind. ... The whole landscape has changed."

The torrent of outside money that has flooded presidential and congressional races in recent years is flowing into down-ballot contests coast to coast — driven by new, well-funded super PACs and court decisions easing restrictions on corporate and union spending in American elections. Outside political spending topped \$1 billion in the presidential and congressional races in 2012, more than three times what such groups spent in the previous election cycle.

The spending is moving to mayoral elections and school board contests in places such as Elizabeth, N.J., and Burbank, Calif., where a group started by former Washington schools chancellor and education activist Michelle Rhee outspent the candidates themselves last year to help people who share her views on school testing and accountability.

Another super PAC has pumped money into a constable race in Texas. Outside spending in the Boston mayoral race hit nearly \$4 million last year. In Nevada, a gun rights group launched a political action committee this month that will target a state senator who sponsored a bill to expand background checks for gun purchases.

Independent spending has been a fixture in politics for years. But super PACs, as many of these turbo-charged independent groups are known, first burst into politics in 2010 after a pair of federal court rulings, including the U.S. Supreme Court's *Citizens United* decision that allowed unlimited corporate and union donations to independent political groups. Super PACs can spend unlimited amounts as long as they don't coordinate with the favored candidates.

Even as outside groups spend unlimited amounts, candidates themselves face strict caps on the size of their donations. In places such as Connecticut and Michigan, individual donations to candidates for the state Legislature are capped at a few hundred dollars each.

"It seems as if the back door has gotten larger than the front door," said Kenneth Gross, a Washington lawyer and former Federal Election Commission official. "While the money may not be at the eye-popping level we've seen at the federal level, it can change the course of what seems like a small election."

There's more to come. Experts predict a bigger super PAC onslaught this year, when 36 governors' posts and more than 6,000 state legislative seats are

#### **SETTLING SCORES**

In New Jersey, outside groups spent a record \$41 million to influence state-level races and ballot initiatives last year — nearly three times what independent organizations spent in Garden State races four years earlier, according to a tally by state regulators. They swamped the \$14.7 million spent by Republican and Democratic Party committees.

In Elizabeth, Anthony Padlo, one of the two school board members ousted last year, said he expected a competitive race but was "surprised that a super PAC has such an interest in a local school board."

The Committee for Economic Growth and Social Justice is at the center of a long-running political feud. It was launched last August by allies of state Sen. Raymond Lesniak, an influential Democratic lawmaker whose district includes the city and who has battled for years with his political rivals on the Elizabeth Board of Education. A candidate backed by the school board tried unsuccessfully to oust Lesniak during the Democratic primary in 2011.

"My decision was to fight fire with fire," Lesniak said of authorizing the super PAC, which is run by his former campaign consultant.

(Lesniak said his goal is to clean up the school board, which has been the target of investigations — including a criminal probe into misuse of the federal school-lunch program. Monteiro, the board's president, said the allegations, which involve former members, have been overblown for political reasons.)

Lesniak has served in the state Legislature since 1978, is chairman of the Senate's economic growth committee and sits on a judiciary panel. In recent years, he spearheaded the legislation that legalized online gambling in the state.

Mark Tenner, a Nevada gambling consultant working to expand online poker, was among the super PAC's donors, giving a combined \$15,000, Federal Election Commission records show.

Other donors include development companies and Lesniak's law firm. The biggest donation came from the American Bail Coalition, which represents bail-bond companies. The Pennsylvania-based group contributed \$75,000 — more than 40% of the group's total receipts last year, the federal records show.

Nicholas Wachinski, the bail coalition's executive director, said the group had never contributed before to a super PAC but decided to do so after several bail agents who operate in Lesniak's legislative district encouraged the national group to get involved.

Despite last year's gains, Lesniak's foes still maintain the majority on the board. More school board positions are up again this fall, and Lesniak said he expects the super PAC will be active again to "finish the job."

#### FRESH FLOOD OF SPENDING

There's no central repository with data showing how much super PACs have shelled out in state and local races. There's growing evidence, however, that political strategists and deep-pocketed interests plan a fresh flood of spending this year.

In Connecticut, a law firm representing Democratic candidates and groups has urged regulators to write rules that pave the way for more super PAC activity in the state. In New York, where a federal appeals court struck down the state's \$150,000 cap on donations to outside political groups last year, two Republican consultants have started an independent group to help retain the GOP majority in the state's Senate. Early donors include two groups representing New York City landlords.

In Louisiana, a super PAC backing Sen. David Vitter, a Republican, filed a federal lawsuit last week to toss out the state's \$100,000 cap on donations to independent political action committees. Vitter is running for governor in the 2015 election.

The pro-Vitter super PAC has stockpiled \$1.5 million, most of which came from energy interests. Charles Spies, a prominent Republican election lawyer who started the super PAC, said the group operates independently of Vitter, making it harder for any industry to curry favor with Vitter through its super PAC donations.

In Texas, the Liberty for All super PAC is gearing up to support candidates in four legislative races in the state and two others in Maine and West Virginia, said Preston Gates, the group's executive director. It also plans to get involved in municipal races.

The goal is to bring accountability to politics at every level, said Gates and John Ramsey, 23, the PAC's founder, who runs a private-equity firm and has supported Libertarian candidates.

The super PAC has made a big splash. It pumped more than \$1.7 million into several congressional races in 2012, including a primary in northern Kentucky to help Republican Thomas Massie. Massie went on to win the general election. (Much of the money came from Ramsey, then a college-student, who funded his political activity with inherited money.)

In a little-noticed move, Liberty for All spent \$35,000 that year in a Democratic primary for constable in Travis County, Texas — exceeding the incumbent's fundraising. The ads targeted the officeholder over a 15-year-old charge of cocaine smuggling that was later dropped. The incumbent prevailed, but Gates said the spending was effective because it helped force a runoff.

\*Ramsey said local races offer the super PAC a "big-time" return on a relatively small investment. "We can incubate candidates who are committed to a better tomorrow," he said. "All politics is local at the end of the day."

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

The resulting Tillman Act of 1907 and Federal Corrupt Practices Act of 1910 were the first in a long series of commonsense legislation limiting corporate money in federal elections and requiring strict disclosure of campaign funds. With the rise of organized labor in the 1930s, Republican Senator Robert Taft and Republican Congressman Fred Hartley extended the ban on corporate contributions to unions.

A generation later in 1971, it was congressional Republicans who led a renewed effort to strengthen existing campaign finance law through the Federal Election Campaign Act. When the Watergate scandal thrust ethics and campaign finance abuses into the public spotlight, Republicans and Democrats joined together to pass sweeping amendments to the 1971 law, limiting contributions and campaign spending and establishing a system of public financing for presidential campaigns.

And in recent years, my friend and former Senate colleague John McCain took up the cause of campaign finance reform with Democratic Senator Russ Feingold in a decade-long effort to stem the flow of unregulated party "soft money" from special interest groups and curb spending

by outside interests.

Sen. McCain's rationale for reform echoed Teddy Roosevelt when he courageously declared on the Senate floor, "It is we (the Congress) who are the defenders of a campaign finance system that is nothing less than an elaborate influence peddling scheme in which both parties conspire to stay in office by selling the country to the highest bidder."

That history of Republican leadership on campaign finance reform should matter no more and no less than this: as a pressing reminder to Republicans in Congress today that it is not in our true nature to side with the moneyed interests against the interests of the American people. The Supreme Court majority has already taken that stand.

Instead, I challenge my party to return to our roots and take up Teddy Roosevelt's challenge from more than a century ago by enacting the only real and lasting solution I know: citizen-funded elections. Under the proposed Fair Elections Now Act, sponsored by more than 140 Members of Congress today, money from special interests would be replaced by small donations from ordinary constituents and matching federal funds. Raised through a fee on large-scale government contracts, those matching funds would only be provided to serious and hardworking candidates who demonstrate a broad base of public support and say no to large donations.

Thank you for your attention, Ladies and Gentlemen.

I am a private citizen residing in the beautiful Mt. Washington Valley town of Eaton, NH.

I am here today to urge support and passage of SB307.

A little over a year ago a group, including myself, met at the Conway library for a book discussion. The subject of the book concerned the corrupting influence of money in politics. The book, Lawrence Lessig's "Republic, Lost", which I would highly recommend, documents the damaging effects that huge amounts of corporate and special interest money have on our political process.

Many of us in the discussion group decided that we should try to do something about this issue, which we agreed was the root cause of most political problems in this country. Although many national groups are working toward solutions to the "money in politics" issue, we decided to work locally to get resolutions on our town warrants, urging our legislators to take exactly the type of action expressed in SB307; investigate and support a Constitutional amendment that would allow Congress to pass real campaign finance reform. We have gathered enough signatures to place such a resolution on several of the warrants in our Carroll County towns. Our website, www.WeThePeople-MWV.org, has additional information regarding our efforts.

We are taking this action because; according to legitimate polls, there is a general consensus from all sides of the political spectrum that government is becoming unresponsive to the people, and that unlimited special interest money leads to corruption.

In the 1788 Federalist No. 52, James Madison speaks about a legislature "dependent on the people alone," but because the founders could not have possibly foreseen the creation of corporations and other special interest "funders," the Constitution did not provide protections against their influence, and the erosion of the dependence on "people alone".

Campaign finance laws have been passed in abundance, but they have been largely ineffective; mainly because, when tested in the courts, the justices find no constitutional provision which allows Congress to pass limitations on corporations and other special interests. The only way to pass effective campaign finance reform is to pass a constitutional amendment spelling out that these special interests do not have the same rights as natural people.

In summary: I urge you to support and pass S8307, which expresses the will of the people to find ways to amend the Constitution in a manner that will allow real campaign finance reform, and make our legislature once again "dependent on the people alone."

Dear Senator Prescott--

I am contacting to ask that you please vote in favor of SB307. You may have heard many arguments for an amendment to overturn Citizens United, but I would like to tell you why the usual opposing arguments are wrong.

I have headed up the warrant article here in Madbury calling for a Constitutional amendment, and although I have experience very little opposition, one of the comments I have heard is reasoning that if individuals have individual Constitutional rights, why would they not have them when heading a corporation or labor union? The answer to this is obviously that individuals DO continue to have constitutional rights as usual, ALWAYS. It is only the corporation itself that should not have Constitutional rights, as it has no consciousness to be able to exercise free speech, religion, etc.

I have also heard people express concern that corporations should have rights...and I agree! We are not saying that corporations shouldn't have rights, we are saying that they do not have Constitutional Rights, as the Constitution outlines the fundamental basis of the government and citizenry, and the relationship between—something that an organization really has very little part in, as it is not the fundamental unit of citizenry. Corporations and other artificial entities should and do have rights, as established in normal law, like corporate law.

Finally, I have heard that denying first amendment rights to corporations is a slippery slope to the infringement of free speech for everyone. Slippery slopes are called that because there is no hard, defining limit between what is right and what is wrong. But there is an obvious hard line here—human beings have constitutional rights, and non-human beings do not. This is a sheer cliff with a brick wall rather than a slippery slope. A constitutional amendment would only affect artificial entities, not the natural persons the Constitution and Bill of Rights was written for. And although I am always the one arguing for the expansion of rights, in this case expanding rights to non-humans actually limits the rights of real people. Control over our government is a zero-sum game, so by giving artificial entities more influence, you take away the influence from the citizenry.

Rather, the slippery slope is in the opposite direction. If Constitutional rights are given to non-human entities such as corporations and other institutions, then why not the right to vote, for example? Or the right to run for office? We have already seen huge legal allowances given to entities whose sole function is not the general good, but to make a profit at any cost. Moreover, if these Constitutional rights are given to something as arbitrary as an institution, then why not my dog, or my ficus tree for that matter—both of which could be said to have more of the God-given rights that the Constitution speaks of than a manmade convention that exists only on paper. At least a dog literally has the same birth/death/reproduction as humans that corporate personhood advocates claim institutions have figuratively, arguing that those analogies entitle institutions to the same rights as people. And my dog actually has a mind and feelings to boot!

I appreciate your thoughtful support of protecting the rights of actual people!

I am contacting you in support of Senate Bill 307. One of the key concepts behind the egregious Citizens United decision is that artificial organizations like corporations are actually people under the constitution. This is laughable, and the everyday citizen has an innate understanding that obviously an organization is the same thing as a human being, and should not be treated that way.

A labor union or corporation, for example, is only a contract—wealth on paper—and can only do what the individuals who own it say to do, like some giant, mindless puppet. By giving these entities constitutional rights, you are disproportionately multiplying the rights of those few people in control, and therefore multiplying the representation they have.

The late Senator Warren Rudman (R, NH) put it plainly: "Supreme Court opinion notwithstanding, corporations are not defined as people under the Constitution, and free speech can hardly be called free when only the rich are heard." Corporations are not people and money is not speech.

There is a fundamental flaw in our Constitution: nowhere does it state that the rights and protections it bestows upon citizens are those of natural persons only. Yet how could the Founding Fathers have intended anything else? Corporations, labor unions, Super PACs — none of these are included in the Constitution. No Supreme Court decision has ever declared that corporations are people; not *Dartmouth v. Woodword* in 1819, not *Santa Clara County v. Southern Pacific Railroad* in 1886, not *Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission* in 2010. In the Dartmouth decision Chief Justice John Marshall wrote "A corporation is an artificial being, invisible, intangible, and existing only in contemplation of law. Being the mere creature of law, it possesses only those properties which the charter of creation confers upon it." Even the majority opinion in *Citizens United* acknowledges that corporations are not natural persons.

Money is not speech, but it can be a megaphone. Representative democracy cannot survive when only the voices of the wealthy and powerful can be heard. Modulating the volume deprives no person, natural or artificial, of the right of free speech. An amendment clarifying that the Constitution of the United States applies only to real people does not negate the free speech rights of the corporate executive, the union president, or the janitors who clean their offices. The First Amendment gives me the right to speak freely and indeed the right to offer this testimony. The First Amendment does not give me the right to use a bullhorn in town meeting.

In Federalist 52 James Madison asked his countrymen to adopt a government "dependent on the People alone". By passing SB 307, New Hampshire can join the growing national movement to restore such a government.

Dear Senator Prescott:

I write in support of SB 307. Big money is corrupting our government, buying our elections, and eroding our democracy. The Supreme Court's decision in Citizens United v. FEC allowed corporations and unions to spend unlimited amounts of money on elections, permitted the creation of Super PACs, and dealt a devastating blow to our republic.

The problem began long before Citizens United! For more than a century the courts have mistakenly treated corporations and other creations of law as though they were real people, yet no Supreme Court decision has ever declared that corporations are people. This doctrine of corporate personhood, which makes real campaign finance reform impossible, arose from a fundamental flaw in our Constitution: nowhere does it state that the rights and protections therein are those of natural persons only. Although the Founding Fathers could not foresee the obscenely expensive political campaigns of the twenty-first century, they did anticipate the need for occasional corrections to the Constitution. Article V provides clear instructions for necessary corrections.

This is not a partisan issue. A large majority of the American people, regardless of political affiliation, are outraged by the Court's ruling in Citizens United and want their elected representatives to reverse it. In a Granite State poll conducted in April, 61% of Republicans, 75% of Democrats and 73% of Independents supported an amendment to limit both campaign contributions and campaign spending. By an overwhelming margin (88%), small business owners agree that the effect of money in politics is negative. More than 500 towns and cities have passed resolutions calling for a Constitutional amendment to reverse Citizens United, as have 16 states including every state in New England except New Hampshire.

Several bills proposing a constitutional amendment to reverse Citizens United are pending before the U. S. House and Senate. The differences among these bills are worthy of discussion. SB 307 is common sense legislation that establishes a committee of our elected representatives to review and make recommendations to the New Hampshire Congressional delegation as to which amendment to support.

In Federalist 52, James Madison asked the citizens of a new nation to create a government "dependent on the People alone". I am asking you, Senator Prescott, and The State of New Hampshire, to join the growing national call to honor Madison's vision and restore elections that cannot be bought by special interests.

- Massachussetts July 2012: <u>S772</u>, introduced by State Senator Jamie Eldridge, passed the Senate on July 26, 2012, and the House on July 31, 2012. The resolution called for action to "restore the First Amendment and fair elections to the people."
- California July 2012: AJR 22, introduced on March 20, 2012 by Assemblyman Weikowski, passed in the California State Assembly in March and in the Senate in July. AJR 22 "calls upon the United States Congress to propose and send to the states for ratification a constitutional amendment to overturn Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission and to restore constitutional rights and fair elections to the people."
- Rhode Island May 2012: <u>H7899</u> was introduced by Speaker of the House Gordon Fox and passed on May 8th, 2012. S2656 was introduced by State Senate President Teresa Paiva-Weed and passed on May 24, 2012. Governor Lincoln Chafee signed the joint resolutions on May 30, 2012.
- Maryland April 2012: State Senator Jamie Raskin introduced a letter to the

- New Mexico January 2012: HM 4, introduced by Representative Stewart, passed in a 38-29 vote in the House on January 30, 2012. SM 3, introduced by Senator Fischmann, passed in a 20-9 vote in the Senate on February 7, 2012. The companion bills "express strong opposition to the United States supreme court's decision in Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission and call upon the United States congress to propose and send to the states for ratification an amendment to the United States constitution to restore republican democracy to the people of the United States."

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

Hello, my name is Peter White and I live in Nottingham NH. I am the sponsor of a petitioned Town Meeting article asking the State Legislature to pass a Resolution to Congress in support of the Constitutional amendment needed to overturn the Supreme Court's "Citizens United" decision of 2010.

I have been working for campaign finance reform for decades and many of us are following in the footsteps of "Granny D" Doris Haddock. My name is John Friede. I am a resident of Peterborough. As director of Worldview, a Peterborough-based non-profit organization that promotes local self-reliance, I strongly urge all of the members of the Rules, Enrolled Bills & Internal Affairs Committee Committee to support Senate Bill 307 calling for a constitutional amendment to overturn *Citizens United* and related cases.

The 2010 U.S. Supreme Court ruling in Citizens *United vs FEC* opened the floodgates to unlimited corporate spending on elections. In order to influence voters in 2012, special interest groups, mostly from outside NH, spent five times what our state candidates did on their own campaigns. Nationally, total 2012 election spending was 3 times the level seen in 2010, which itself was double the previous high.

A 2013 UNH poll conducted on behalf of several non-partisan groups (which included NH-based Coalition for Open Democracy), showed strong support for overturning *Citizens United* by big majorities of both parties, and among independents. Back in 2010 former NH Senator Warren Rudman writing in the Washington Post said, "Supreme Court opinion notwithstanding, corporations are not defined as people under the Constitution, and free speech can hardly be called free when only the rich are heard."

Most elected officials within both parties acknowledge that they spend between 30-70% of their time raising money instead of governing. Not only is this time not devoted to the people's business, it might also be fair to conclude that these large funders exert undue influence on the legislative process.

Just a few weeks ago, a group of New Hampshire residents marched across the state to rid elections of the corrupting influence of unlimited, secret donations. Currently, there are at least 53 New Hampshire towns that will soon vote at their town meetings on an amendment to overturn *Citizens United* and related cases.

Amending the Constitution to restore the power of the people over corporations will not be easy, but correcting the Supreme Court is imperative to the progress of New Hampshire and our nation. This bill is a positive step in that direction and receives my full support.

#### **Understanding SB 307**

"Recognizing the need for a constitutional amendment to overturn the *Citizens United* ruling and related cases," SB 307 creates a committee consisting of members of the New Hampshire House and Senate to examine the impact of the *Citizens United* ruling.

The committee will examine the different approaches and language being proposed for a constitutional amendment; it will examine the short term solutions to issues raised by the ruling, such as requiring disclosure of donors and shareholder approval of corporate election contributions; and it will make recommendations to the New Hampshire congressional delegation as to which approaches the delegation should support.

On January 21, 2010, the U.S. Supreme Court unleashed a flood of money into our political system by ruling that corporations, associations and labor unions have a right to spend unlimited amounts of money to promote or defeat candidates. The ruling also led to the determination that individuals also have a right to unlimited spending.

#### The impact in New Hampshire has been substantial.

For example, in the 2012 New Hampshire gubernatorial race, outside groups spent \$19 million - almost 5 times what the candidates spent themselves. This outside spending from the left and the right threatens New Hampshire's citizen legislature to influence from large donors.

New Hampshire residents across party lines are outraged by the ruling and support an amendment. 72% oppose the *Citizens United* ruling (81% Democrats, 70% Independents, 64% Republicans) and 69% of New Hampshire residents support a constitutional amendment that limits campaign contributions and spending (75% Democrats, 73 Independents, 61% Republicans). ii

### New Hampshire residents are taking action based upon their support for an amendment.

Residents in 53 towns have already placed the issue of a constitutional amendment before their town meetings this March and many more are still in the works.<sup>iii</sup> New Hampshire residents recently marched across the state in the dead of winter to call for campaign finance reform. Other states have shown that voters are willing to bring this passion to the polls. For example, an unknown state senate candidate in New York, Cecilia Tkaczyk was able to win an upset election in 2012 by running on the issue of campaign finance reform.<sup>iv</sup>

#### Why create a committee?

There is important and worthy disagreement about what a constitutional amendment to overturn *Citizens United* should state. Creating a committee allows informed actors to join together and determine which approaches are best, and does not limit support to one certain approach.

### Will campaign spending of unions and corporations be affected in the same way?

Yes. The amendments being discussed in congress enable regulation of campaign spending from all entities - individuals, corporations and unions. Some completely ban spending from all who are not natural persons, including unions and corporations.

#### Why New Hampshire?

16 other states, including all the other states in New England, have called for an amendment. New Hampshire would join the growing bipartisan chorus of legislators who support an amendment.

#### Is this a partisan issue?

No. Democrats, Republicans and Independents have supported similar legislation throughout the nation, including in Maine, where a similar measure passed 25 to 9 in its Senate and 111 to 33 in its House. Outside spending can have dramatic effects on races on both sides of the aisle. For example, in the recent Virginia governor race, the Republican candidate was outspent 2 to 1. This trend has been mirrored nationally this year, if and candidates on both sides are increasingly threatened by large outside spenders.

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### How does Citizens United affect our city?

The U.S. Supreme Court's ruling in *Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission* has transformed government in America, and the widespread consequences are already being felt at the federal, state, and local level. While City Council resolutions – like the ones that have already passed in over 150 towns and cities – call for a federal amendment, at the core they are a response to a crisis in our democracy that impacts each and every one of our communities.

The federal impact of *Citizens United* is well publicized, but it is also important to understand the effect this ruling has on local towns and cities throughout the nation.

#### Corporate Spending Can Have an Even Greater Impact Locally

The egregious levels of outside spending on the federal level are well documented. In the 2010 Congressional elections, spending by corporations and wealthy individuals totaled almost \$300 million. In the 2012 election, the largest super PAC spent an astounding \$142 million. Altogether, super PACs spent \$609 million during the 2012 election cycle. Overall outside spending topped \$1.29 billion. In comparison to these mammoth sums of money, it only takes a modest amount of money to have a transformative impact on a local election. If multi-million dollar Super-PACs can buy the victory of even presidential candidates, then what's stopping them from influencing local political elections?

Consider This: In the April 2012 elections for Oklahoma City Council the Super-PAC "Committee for Oklahoma City Momentum" spent \$400,000 on four candidates. <sup>iv</sup> The annual salary for an Oklahoma City Council member is \$12,000 annually. <sup>v</sup> Three of these four candidates won their campaigns. The only candidate who was able to defeat one of these Super Pac candidates noted deep concerns he saw with the democratic implications of a Super-PAC spending large sums on campaign ads without disclosing its donors. <sup>vi</sup>

Or This: Durham County in North Carolina is also experiencing the effects of SuperPACs. The SuperPAC "Durham Partnership for Progress" – funded by a developing firm – spent thousands of dollars on a mailer supporting four council people who support a controversial development project the that the firm, Southern Durham Development, plans to build. The SuperPAC's support helped elect two of those council people into office in elections held on May 8, 2012. VII

#### Small businesses oppose Citizens United

88 percent of small business owners believe that money in politics is having a negative impact and a vast majority are opposed to the *Citizens United* Supreme Court's ruling. Viii They are simply concerned that

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the very wealthiest will "set us back in our efforts to operate our businesses responsibly and promote a vibrant, equitable, and sustainable economy" ix.

Big corporations' ability to run small businesses out of town has significant effects on the health of the local economy, the employment rate and the diversity and survival of small businesses in a town. Elected officials generally understand this dynamic and are inclined to take actions to protect small businesses. However, when larger business interests can provide unlimited funds to influence elections, elected officials can no longer afford to make decisions they know are best for their community and those who do can be run out of office.

Further, *Citizens United* gives large corporations more ability to abuse tax loopholes and offshore tax havens. Currently this abuse results in each small business owner in America being shortchanged by an average of \$2,116.\* These practices, which also funnel money away from services essential to cities and towns, will only be exacerbated in a post *Citizens United* world.

#### Super-PACs decrease voter turnout

Recent polling conducted by the Brennan Center for Justice further demonstrates that *Citizens United* and the rise of Super PACs have harmed local democracy at its core by further sapping voter enthusiasm for the idea that their vote matters. It shows that people are in fact less likely to vote as a result of the ruling; this especially holds true among less wealthy individuals and among people of color. It

Corporations' and wealthy individuals' unparalleled ability to drown out the voices of ordinary people through unlimited spending in elections inevitably wears down an electorate. Citizens' disengagement from the democratic process is a huge threat to our representative democracy both on a local and federal level.

Communities nationwide must demand a constitutional amendment to overturn *Citizens United* and restore First Amendment rights to We the People

The movement for a constitutional amendment to redress *Citizens United* is, at its core, a grassroots one driven by very real concerns about challenges to our democracy that reverberate in each and every community. In fact, while Article V of the Constitution provides a legislative process for amending the constitution, traditionally the call for an amendment has begun at the ground level. This has certainly been the case in movements like Women's Suffrage, where citizens' actions, in the face of institutional complacency, forced the issue to be addressed.

The movement to overturn *Citizens* United and related cases continues in this proud tradition, addressing a crisis that impacts each and every citizen and community. Uniting to pass a local resolution in your town is a necessary step towards restoring free and fair elections rights to the people both locally and nationally.

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### The Case for Overturning Citizens United

In 2010, when the U.S. Supreme Court's ruling in *Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission* struck down laws restricting corporate and union spending in elections, Americans from all political backgrounds expressed outrage at the Court's disastrous decision. Today, when Americans are asked if they believe big money has a corrupting and undue influence on our political process, the answer is consistently a resounding yes.

Yet, a small band of corporate-backed commentators and advocacy groups, such as the original Citizens United, claim the Court's ruling was a "victory for free speech" and that overturning *Citizens United* is part of a "liberal" political agenda. Despite these claims, there are compelling reasons why conservatives should be concerned about the impact of the Court's ruling and should join fellow conservatives as well as Americans across the political spectrum in efforts to overturn *Citizens United*.

#### CITIZENS UNITED V. FEC - REPUBLICANS EXPRESS THEIR OUTRAGE

There has been a lot of noise from a small group of corporate-backed political organizations about how the *Citizens United* ruling was a "victory for free speech." Yet, in the wake of the Court's decision, poll after poll has shown that Americans of all political stripes believe the Court made a disastrous decision.

#### Most Republicans think Citizens United was bad for democracy:

- A survey conducted in April 2012 by the Opinion Research Corporation (ORC) found that overall, 69% of Americans agreed that "new rules that let corporations, unions and people give unlimited money to Super PACs will lead to corruption." Only 15% disagreed.
  - o Notably, three out of four Republicans (74%) agreed with this statement.ii
  - o A similar poll conducted in January 2012 by the Pew Research Center (PRC) showed that **Independent voters** were by far the group that felt the *Citizens United* ruling was negative **more than two out of three (67%)** of those polled said the ruling has a negative impact on political campaigns.<sup>iii</sup>

# Most Republicans think big campaign spenders, including corporations, can influence how a member of Congress votes:

 More than two-thirds of respondents (68%) in the ORC poll—including 71% of Republicans — also agreed that, "if a company spent \$100,000 to help elect a member of Congress, it could successfully pressure him or her to change a vote on proposed legislation." Only one in five respondents disagreed.

#### Most Republicans think that increased campaign spending erodes trust:

Over two out of three Republicans (67%) responding to the OCR poll said that "they
trust government less because big donors to Super PACs have more influence than
regular voters." v

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Most Republicans, including Tea Party supporters, think steps should be taken to curb this corrosive campaign spending:

- A March 2012 poll conducted by <u>ABC News/Washington Post</u>, showed that over two-thirds of Americans (69%) felt Super PACs should be illegal and over half of these people (52%) said they strongly supported such a move.<sup>vi</sup>
- Among Tea Party supporters, the number was the same: 69% of Tea Party supporters felt that super PACs should be outlawed.vii

CAMPAIGN FINANCE REFORM: PART OF THE CONSERVATIVE LEGACY

Campaign finance reform - including efforts to limit political spending by corporations, unions and the super-wealthy - has historically been part of the conservative legacy.

- The Court's decision rolled back nearly a century of laws federal and state passed by lawmakers from both sides of the aisle who, regardless of political affiliation, agreed that reasonable restrictions can and should be placed on campaign spending by powerful special interests in order to preserve our democracy. Bipartisan reform efforts included the original ban on direct corporate contributions in the 1907 Tillman Act, and both the 1971 Federal Election Campaign Act and its strong amendments passed in the aftermath of the Watergate scandal.
- Citizens United itself struck down key parts of the Bipartisan Campaign Reform Act of 2002 (BCRA), known as the McCain-Feingold Act. BCRA was introduced by Senator John McCain, and was signed into law in 2003 by Republican President George W. Bush.viii

#### Stalwart conservative statesmen have fought for campaign finance reform.

- No less a conservative movement icon than Republican Senator Barry Goldwater of
  Arizona uttered these words in support of bipartisan campaign finance reform in 1983:
  "[O]ur nation is facing a crisis of liberty if we do not control campaign expenditures. We
  must prove that elective office is not for sale. We must convince the public that elected
  officials are what James Madison intended us to be, agents of the sovereign people, not the
  hired hands of rich givers, or what Madison called factions."
- Arizona Senator John McCain, Goldwater's successor and the 2008 Republican
  presidential nominee, called the Supreme Court's ruling "a combination of arrogance,
  naiveté and stupidity, the likes of which I have never seen."
- Arguing that campaign finance and government waste are often connected, former Senator Alan Simpson of Wyoming notes that, "Public employee pensions, which far exceed their private-sector equivalents, and multibillion-dollar defense programs not requested by the Pentagon are but two examples of the very real price we pay when special interest groups are permitted to influence policies. Both parties are to blame."ix
- Decrying Citizens United and seeking to reinvigorate the tradition of pro-reform conservatives in Congress that he'd been a part of for decades, former Senator Warren Rudman of New Hampshire wrote that "Supreme Court opinion notwithstanding, corporations are not defined as people under the Constitution, and free speech can hardly be called free when only the rich are heard."x

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CITIZENS UNITED V FEC - BAD FOR CORE CONSERVATIVE POLITICAL CONCERNS

#### Protecting States' Rights

- This new influx of Citizens United enabled corporate and union political spending stands
  to have the greatest impact on the outcomes of state and local elections, where huge
  spending increases can dwarf local resources. This summer's recall elections in
  Wisconsin, where money from out-of-state corporations, unions, and millionaires is
  pouring in at record levels, shows how Citizens United has made local matters less
  determined by local voters than ever.
- In a Montana case, Western Tradition Partnership vs. Montana, an appointee of Republican Governor and RNC Chairman Marc Racicot, Justice James fiercely criticizes the Citizens United ruling. He states "I thoroughly disagree with the Supreme Court's decision in Citizens United. I agree, rather, with the eloquent and, in my view, betterreasoned dissent of Justice Stevens."xi

#### Supporting Small Business

- Small business owners oppose the Citizens United ruling: A recent survey in January 2012 of small business owners indicated that 66% of the small business owners polled felt that the Supreme Court's ruling has been bad for small business, compared to only 9% who felt that it has been good for small business.
- Additionally, 88% of those polled view money in politics negatively, including 68% who view it "very negatively." xii
- Why do small businesses feel this way? It's not hard to see why most political
  contributions given to SuperPACs and independent groups come from a very, very small
  pool of extremely wealthy donors and giant corporations.
- Though small businesses owners are now 'free' to make these unlimited political contributions, when it comes to political spending small business owners on Main St. can't compete with Big Banks on Wall Street.

#### Support is growing quickly for an amendment

- On Election Day of 2012, over 6 million voters had the opportunity to vote on ballot initiatives regarding a constitutional amendment. Voters approved every single initiative with approximately 75% support, including the states of Montana and Colorado
- So far, more than 2 million people have signed petitions in support of an amendment. And more than 135 members of Congress have expressed support for an amendment.
- More than 120 national organizations groups concerned about civil rights, the
  environment, climate change, open government and workers' rights have endorsed
  the United for the People collaborative's unified Call to Action for a constitutional
  amendment (www.United4ThePeople.org).

### ★★★★★★★★★ A Public Citizen project

- Nearly 500 municipalities have called for a constitutional amendment to overturn *Citizens United* and rein in corporate influence.
- Sixteen states: California, Connecticut, Colorado, Delaware, Hawaii, Illinois Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Montana, New Jersey, New Mexico, Oregon, Rhode Island, Vermont, West Virginia, and the District of Columbia have called for an amendment.

When local decision makers do away with partisan rhetoric and look at the facts on the ground, it's clear that Americans across the political spectrum are concerned about the impacts of the *Citizens United* on our democracy and our American way of life, and have a big opportunity to reach out – across the aisle or across town – to work with others to undo this ruling.

From the grassroots on up, the American people are mobilizing to take back local voters' right to hold sway over our elected decision-makers. By passing a local resolution calling for [a constitutional amendment to] overturn *Citizens United*, conservatives can play an integral part in protecting our democracy for the next generation.

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# Small Businesses Reject Role of Money in Politics; View *Citizens United* Decision as Bad for Business

On Jan. 21, 2010, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in its *Citizens United* decision that corporations are free to spend unlimited sums of money in elections. According to opinion polling released by the American Sustainable Business Council, Main Street Alliance and Small Business Majority, two-thirds of small business owners see this decision as bad for small business. The poll also shows small business owners overwhelmingly believe corporations have been given too much freedom to spend money that directly influences political campaigns.


### **Main Findings**

Small business owners view the Citizens United decision as bad for small business: 66% of those surveyed said the two-year-old ruling that gives corporations unlimited spending power in elections is bad for small businesses. Only 9% said it was good for small business.




Small business owners have a negative view of the role money plays in politics overall: 88% of respondents view the role money plays in politics negatively; 68% view it very negatively.

#### Conclusion

The latest poll results reveal that small business owners believe unlimited corporate political spending in elections is detrimental to small business success. The poll found small business owners across the country are in broad disagreement with the U.S. Supreme Court's *Citizens United* decision. With two-thirds of respondents believing this change is bad for small business and another 88% of them negatively viewing the role money plays in politics overall, small business owners' perspectives are clear: Unlimited corporate political spending in elections hurts the interests of small businesses, America's jobs engine.

#### Methodology

This poll reflects an Internet survey of 500 small business owners across the country, commissioned by the American Sustainable Business Council, Main Street Alliance and Small Business Majority and conducted by Lake Research. It has a margin of error of +/- 4.4%. The survey was conducted between December 8, 2011 and January 4, 2012.

Researchers used a random sample of small business owners obtained from Harris Interactive, with additional samples from InfoUSA.

OUR TURN: WE MUST CURB THE POWER OF BIG MONEY IN ELECTIONS

House Concurrent Resolution 2 calls for a constitutional amendment to overturn the U.S. Supreme Court's Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission ruling, which opened the floodgates of unlimited campaign spending. The resolution calls for an amendment that states, "Money is not speech, and therefore regulating the political contributions and spending is not equivalent to limiting political speech." New Hampshire adults support such a constitutional amendment by 3-to-1 margin in a recent poll.

There are several misconceptions that have circulated through the New Hampshire Legislature about this resolution that we hope to dispel.

The first misconception is that HCR 2 calls for an amendment that would enable limits to be placed only on corporate spending in elections. In fact, the amendment sought by HCR 2 would give Congress the power to regulate campaign expenditures from unions, individuals and corporations. Thus, the amendment would allow Congress and state legislatures to take away the power of wealthy entities and individuals to buy political influence; it would enable the leveling of the playing field so all voices can be heard.

The second misconception is that HCR 2 is a limitation on free speech. Campaign spending is a means of amplifying speech, but not speech in itself. As Supreme Court Justice John Paul Stevens stated, "Money is property; it is not speech." When a person speaks through a bullhorn, the bullhorn itself is not speech; it is a vehicle for amplifying speech. Similarly, HCR 2 does not seek to regulate the content of speech, but the money that well-endowed entities and individuals use to amplify their speech and drown out the rest of the population. As the late Warren Rudman, former U.S. senator from New Hampshire said, "Free speech can hardly be called free when only the rich are heard."

The current system sacrifices the free speech of the vast majority of Americans to protect the power of a few to buy our elections.

Even if spending money to influence the outcome of elections was speech, limitations on the extent that money can be used for that purpose should not be viewed as violating the First Amendment. There are, in fact, many limitations that are placed on the exercise of speech to protect other liberties. For example, I can schedule a meeting to discuss the importance of a constitutional amendment with my member of Congress. However, if I were to come into his or her office with a bullhorn and start shouting for her or his support, I would likely be escorted out, as my actions were not reasonable in their time, place and manner.

In the 2012 election, 47 wealthy individuals spent a total of more than \$130 million to attempt to influence the outcome. Enabling this type of spending on our elections gravely endangers idea of a government of, for and by all the people, and threatens to create a government that is run by a small group of wealthy individuals and entities. Limiting these campaign expenditures is necessary to protect our nation's democracy.

The New Hampshire Legislature should join the 14 other states that have called upon Congress to overrule Citizens United and join them in the fight to end the corrupting influence of big money in our elections.

Republicans Losing Their Way on Campaign Finance Reform

When I arrived in the U.S. Senate 30 years ago, I was a proud member of a Republican Party known for championing moderation in Congress, restraint in the courts and good-government reform.

In fact, the Republican tradition of campaign finance reform in which I stand dates to the trust-buster, Theodore Roosevelt. In his 1905 message to Congress, President Roosevelt proposed that "contributions by corporations to any political committee or for any political purpose should be forbidden by law." His logic was straightforward enough: "If [legislators] are extorted by any kind of pressure or promise, express or implied, direct or indirect, in the way of favor or immunity, then the giving or receiving becomes not only improper but criminal."

The resulting Tillman Act of 1907 and Federal Corrupt Practices Act of 1910 were the first laws limiting corporate money in federal elections and requiring strict disclosure of campaign funds. With the rise of organized labor in the 1930s, Republican Sen. Robert Taft and Republican Rep. Fred Hartley extended the ban on corporate contributions to unions. Those laws were dealt a serious blow by last month's Supreme Court decision in Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission. That such a rash and immoderate ruling could come from a chief justice once committed to respecting precedent, and win praise from leaders of my party, is beyond my comprehension.

It was congressional Republicans who led the 1971 effort to strengthen existing campaign finance law through the Federal Election Campaign Act. After the Watergate campaign finance scandal, Republicans in Congress joined with Democrats to pass far-reaching amendments to the 1971 law, limiting contributions and campaign spending and establishing a system of public financing for presidential campaigns.

In more recent years, my friend and former Senate colleague John McCain (R-Ariz.) took up the cause of reform with Sen. Russ Feingold (D-Wis.), leading a decade-long effort to stem the flow of unregulated "soft money" from special-interest groups to political parties and to curb spending by outside interests.

That history of Republican leadership on campaign finance reform should remind Republicans in Congress today that it is not in our true nature to side with the moneyed interests against the interests of the American people. The Supreme Court has taken that stand.

It's time to return to our roots and take up Teddy Roosevelt's challenge from over a century ago by enacting the only real and lasting solution I know: citizen-funded elections. Under the proposed Fair Elections Now Act, sponsored by more than 130 members of Congress, money from special interests would be replaced by small donations from constituents and matching federal funds. Matching funds, raised through a fee on large-scale government contracts, would go to serious, hardworking candidates who demonstrate a broad base of public support and who say no to large donations.

Republicans and Democrats in Congress must work together to expand political speech for all citizens by replacing special-interest money in politics with small donations and public matching funds. Supreme Court opinion notwithstanding, corporations are not defined as people under the Constitution, and free speech can hardly be called free when only the rich are heard.

It seems to me corporations want it both ways. When they want to influence elections by pouring unlimited amounts of money into a campaign, they're people and declare that money is speech. But when they do harm to the environment and cause human suffering, they're corporations so they don't have to personally take responsibility for their actions. If I poured hundreds of gallons of oil into a river or gave people a drug that killed them, I would go to jail because I'm a person. If a corporation does it, it pays back a small portion of its profits. Corporations shouldn't get to have it both ways. Corporations are not people. Real people die when they get old and go to jail when they break the law.

The U.S. Constitution says "We the people." It says nothing about corporations. The Constitution's framers were very clear that economic interests did not have the same rights as citizens. The Revolutionary War was fought against unfair and excessive economic exploitation by Great Britain. But over the years, the balance of power between individuals and corporations has swung away from average citizens to the richest and most powerful institutions. While people have many varied goals, corporations only have one goal and that is maximum profits for the stockholders.

Ninety-six percent of Americans believe there is too much money in politics. It's hard to get 96% of Americans to agree on anything, but they do agree on this. We all know there is something definitely wrong in this country and something must be done to correct it. Corporations, whether for-profit or non-profit, and that includes labor unions, should not be awarded the same rights as people under the Constitution.

One final thing, many of these multinational corporations have found ways to keep their profits offshore so that in many cases they pay very few, and in some cases, no taxes at all. And that includes Boeing, GE and Verizon which have paid no federal income taxes for the last five years, despite profits in the billions. I can't imagine any scenario in which you or I would be allowed to pay no federal taxes on our earned income. That's because we are people.
