Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

16	database to assist in the deterrence or investigation of metal theft in New Hampshire.		
17	II. The members of the commission shall be as follows:		
18	(a) One member of the senate, appointed by the president of the senate.

IV. Members of the commission shall serve without compensation, except that legislative
members of the commission shall receive mileage at the legislative rate when attending to the duties
of the commission.
V. Members of the commission shall elect a chairperson from among the members. The first
meeting of the commission shall be called by the first-named house member. The first meeting of the
commission shall be held within 45 days of the effective date of this section. Seven members of the
commission shall constitute a quorum.

- VI. The commission shall report its findings and any recommendations for proposed legislation to the president of the senate, the speaker of the house of representatives, the senate clerk, the house clerk, the governor, and the state library on or before November 1, 2015.
- 2 Repeal. RSA 322-A, relative to the commission to study the regulation of pawnbrokers, secondhand dealers, and junk or scrap metal dealers, is repealed.
- 13 3 Effective Date.

- I. Section 2 of this act shall take effect December 1, 2015.
- 15 II. The remainder of this act shall take effect upon its passage.

Rep. Williams, prime sponsor, introduced the bill and testified in favor. He stated the history of this bill. A previous commission was concerned with issues of theft. The statute relative to pawnbrokers had not been updated since 1907. He said that pawnbroker in the sense of making a loan on pawned property was nearly archaic and that the business had evolved into that of a second hand dealer. He said that shoplifters now use pawnbrokers to sell their stolen merchandise. He said it was a complex problem, e.g. what are appropriate holding times for pawned goods.

Rep. Schmidt asked why scrap metal dealers were being treated in the same bill. Rep. Williams answered that the commonality was issue of theft and police notification, regardless of the size and exact nature of the merchandise.

Michael McLaughlin, a lobbyist representing Schwitzer Metals, testified in support. He said that the industry is ahead of the legislation. Thieves move from town to town without reporting. Also, the industry is seeking to prevent "cloning" of titles. He wants "everyone in the same room."

Bruce Crawford, lobbyist for the auto recyclers, supports the bill and is willing to serve on a sub-committee. He described the end of life of a vehicle, the theft alert system, and the present condition of recyclers.


Dear Honorable Members of the Committee:

I am Bruce Crawford, Executive Director of the Auto and Truck
Recyclers Association of New Hampshire. This bill is very similar to HB 343,
introduced in the 2013 session, which the House Commerce and Consumers Affairs Committee spent
countless hours working on, before coming to the conclusion the real theft problem is with jewelry and
similar items. I attended most of those meetings, so I know of which I speak.

Representative Kermit Williams, the sponsor of this bill, spent many hours serving on the HB 343 committee and work sessions, so I'm sure he can supply you with copies of the reams of testimony, work and findings concerning HB 343. It is unfortunate all the work of the House Commerce and Consumers Affairs Committee was derailed when HB 343 arrived in the Senate, but that is basically what happened..

I would like to point out there is a big difference between auto recyclers and "junk" or scrap metal recyclers. Auto recyclers are highly regulated, in that every vehicle coming through their business carries a paper trail consisting of a title or other paper work, for vehicles old enough to not require a title. It has been recognized many times by this Legislature, that auto recyclers are sufficiently regulated under present laws.

The Auto and Truck Recyclers Association of New Hampshire also counts several scrap metal and automotive core recyclers among its members. This part of the recycling industry has made a concerted effort in recent years to recognize and document those who are attempting to sell items which may be of questionable origin. Efforts are being made to not purchase stolen items and work with law enforcement to identify individuals who are committing crimes of theft.

The Auto and Truck Recyclers Association of New Hampshire looks forward to being part of the Study Commission created by HB 510. We are happy to assist in any way possible.

CHARGE OF THE STUDY:

The Commission to Study Regulatory Requirements for Pawnbrokers and Secondhand Dealers in New Hampshire (the "Commission") was charged to:

- (a) Study current laws and ordinances regulating pawnbrokers and secondhand dealers in New Hampshire.
- (b) Study issues surrounding recordkeeping, reporting, and retention periods, including privacy and constitutional questions.
- (c) Study the changes in recovery rates in municipalities that have mandated recordkeeping, reporting, and retention periods, and determine what caused the change and whether the amount of change justified the increase in regulation.
- (d) Consider the impact changes to state law would have on the industry, including any ethical concerns.
- (e) Study issues related to jurisdiction and law enforcement inspections.

- (f) Identify the type of items and transactions that should be regulated and those that should be excluded from regulation, including whether a minimum dollar value is appropriate.
- (g) Recommend statutory changes to reflect current business practices and address identified enforcement issues.
- (h) Solicit such information and testimony from individuals, agencies, and entities as may assist the commission in the performance of its duties.

ISSUE:

There has been an increasing influx of illegal drugs into the state of New Hampshire with a corresponding increase in theft committed by drug addicts desperate for money to fuel their addiction. One avenue available to thieves is to take stolen items to pawnbrokers and dealers in second hand goods to convert them to cash.

RSA 398, New Hampshire's law on pawnbrokers, was initially adopted in 1907. Sections of the law have been amended over the years but it has never been comprehensively updated. This law prohibits pawn purchases under certain circumstances and permits cities and towns in the state to license and regulate pawnbrokers. Because the regulation of pawn transactions is largely governed by municipal ordinance, some cites and towns have well-developed ordinances and others have no regulation at all. The resulting patchwork of regulation makes it difficult to investigate certain types of theft.

Rep. David O. Huot and Rep. Lisa DiMartino introduced HB 343 in the 2014 Legislative Session in an attempt to update the statute, clarify the types of businesses to which it applies, adopt a uniform 14-day hold period, and revise the recordkeeping requirements. The complexity of the issues raised in HB 343 led to the establishment of this study commission.

PROCESS AND PROCEDURES:

The membership of the commission was designed to provide all stakeholders – legislators, law enforcement personnel and business owners – an opportunity to share their mutual concerns and to develop an workable, equitable solution to the problem. The Commission met six times in the months of September and October and reviewed the Second Hand Dealer/Pawnbroker Ordinance adopted by the town of Salem, New Hampshire, a proposed amendment to HB 343, to regulate pawnbrokers and dealers in jewelry, power tools and electronics, and Maryland's statute on Secondhand Precious Metal Object Dealers and Pawnbrokers.
