ANALYSIS

This bill requires commercial firearms sales or transfers in this state to be subject to a criminal background check and provides a criminal penalty for a violation. The bill excludes private, noncommercial sales or transfers between individuals, provided neither individual is prohibited from owning or possessing a firearm under state or federal law.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

- 1 Purpose. It is the purpose and intent of the general court in enacting RSA 159-E to require commercial firearm sales and transfers in New Hampshire to be processed through a licensed firearms dealer, who will conduct a background check and create a record of each sale. The general court believes this law will protect public safety by helping to keep firearms out of the hands of felons, domestic abusers, and the dangerously mentally ill.
- 2 New Chapter; Background Checks for Commercial Firearms Sales. Amend RSA by inserting after chapter 159-D the following new chapter:

CHAPTER 159-E

BACKGROUND CHECKS FOR COMMERCIAL FIREARMS SALES

159-E:1 Definitions. As used in this chapter:

- I. "Commercial sale" means a sale, transfer, or exchange of a firearm that takes place at, or on the curtilage of, a gun show or pursuant to an offer to sell buy, transfer, or exchange a firearm that took place at a gun show, or pursuant to an advertisement, posting, listing, or display.
- II. "Firearm" means any weapon or device designed to be used as a weapon, which will, is designed to, or may be readily converted to, expel a projectile by the action of an explosive, explosion, or other means of combustion, or the frame or receiver of such a device, provided the term "firearm" shall not include the term "antique firearm" as defined in 18 U.S.C. section 921(a)(16), or a weapon that has been rendered permanently inoperable and is incapable of being readily restored to a firing condition.
- III. "Individual" means a natural person.
- IV. "Law enforcement" means any person employed by the United States, or a state, county, city, or town, or other political subdivision as a police officer, peace officer, or another position involving the enforcement of the law and protection of the public interest.
- V. "Licensed firearms dealer," "licensed dealer," or "dealer" means a person who has a valid federal firearms dealer license under 18 U.S.C. section 923(a), and all additional licenses required by state or local law to engage in the business of selling or transferring firearms.
- VI. "Person" means any corporation, company, association, firm, partnership, club, organization, society, joint stock company or other entity, and shall include any entity that engages in business in this state, in whole or part, through Internet or mail order sales.
- VII. "Prohibited person" means any individual or person who is prohibited from owning or possessing a firearm pursuant to 18 U.S.C. section 922(d) or pursuant to state law.

2	I. No individual or person shall engage in the commercial sale of a firearm unless:

14	shall again deliver the firearm to the licensed dealer prior to completing the sale.
15	(b) Except as provided in subparagraph (a), the dealer shall comply with all
16	requirements of federal, state, and local law that would apply if the licensed dealer were selling the
17	firearm from his or her inventory to the purchaser, including but not limited to, conducting a
18	background check on the prospective purchaser, which shall include a check of the National Instant
19	Criminal Background Check System (NICS), and compliance with all federal, state, and local
20	recordkeeping requirements.
21	(c) If the transaction is not prohibited, the dealer shall deliver the firearm to the buyer
22	after all legal requirements are met.
23	(d) If the dealer cannot legally deliver the firearm to the buyer, the dealer shall return
24	the firearm to the seller without requiring a background check and the transfer to the buyer shall
25	not take place.
26	(e) The dealer may impose on the purchaser a reasonable fee to cover administrative
27	costs incurred by the dealer for facilitating the transfer of the firearm, plus any applicable fees
2 8	permitted under state or federal law.
29	159-E:3 Exception. This chapter shall not apply to a noncommercial, private sale, transfer, or
30	exchange of a firearm between individuals, provided neither party to the transaction is a prohibited
31	person. If the status of either party's eligibility to own or possess a firearm cannot be ascertained,
32	the transaction shall be completed through a licensed firearm dealer pursuant to RSA 159-E:2, II.
33	159-E:4 Penalties.
34	I. Any individual or person who violates any provision of this chapter shall be guilty of a class B
35	misdemeanor for a first offense, and a class A misdemeanor for a second or subsequent offense.
36	II. The local law enforcement agency shall report all violations of this chapter by a licensed

firearms dealer to the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives.

HB 650-FN - AS INTRODUCED - Page 3 -

159-E:5 Other Laws.

- I. Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to modify or change the duties of the department of safety pursuant to RSA 159-D.
- II. Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to require or authorize any state, county, or local law enforcement agency to establish or maintain a registry of firearms sold or transferred in accordance with this chapter.
- 3 Applicability. The provisions of section 2 of this act shall apply to the sale of a firearm on or after the effective date of this act and shall not apply to sales completed prior to the effective date of this act.
- 4 Effective Date. This act shall take effect January 1, 2016.

Rep. DiSesa - if firearm was tracked back this holds the prosecutor.

<u>Wayne Burton</u> – co-sponsor. Person in Vietnam, were killed by war. Police are not comfortable without knowing who is carrying guns. This could happen a person got illegal weapon. Some people are unbalanced.

<u>Rep. Cushing</u> – co-sponsors. I had my father-brother murdered by firearm. Guns don't kill people, people do. Need to stop those convicted felons, closing loop hole of gun shows.

<u>Rep. Baldasaro</u> – opposed – I shot weapons more than most. This is going after law abiding citizens, If I wanted to buy from my son? Where is the record for law abiding citizens.

Rep Pantelakos – you sell to your family, son, cousin.

Rep. Baldasaro – lets look where are the criminals being tried.

*Rep. Berrien – supports – we need to support this. 2013 national fire arms are a billion dollars for injuries. Every 4 days, death. NH has less but every life in important. Background checks won't solve all problems. I urge committee to help safety.

<u>Rep. Martin</u> – since 1969-1976 I have a security check every 4 years.. Why should I have another background check?

Rep. Berrien – I don't have an answer.

<u>Rep. Hoell, opposed</u> – this is violating any licensed dealer. A dealer may say lets go outside and sell illegal transactions of sales. Wouldn't know if his wife would be eligible. I should be able to give my wife a gun.

Rep. McConnell – we don't need this bill, this is a bad idea.

Rep. Barnes - would you feel the same about a vehicle or tractor?

Rep. McConnell - this wouldn't be ok.

<u>David Kelley</u> – state police – people that have guns, reasonable steps. This is not about good owners, its all about the background checks. Some denied shouldn't have guns.

*Harrison DeBree - = opposed bill - Line 23-34-25 of bill the dealer can get gun back.

<u>Amy Moore</u>, <u>Ascentria Care Alliance</u> – supports – 103 school shooting. I was brought up with guns. People we need this extra precautions -= care for chronically ill people. I was abused, Americans 20 more time than other countries.

<u>Susan Olsen, WDLNH</u> -- submitted some statues -- opposed. Submitted federal firearms new reference guide for record. New chapter for commercial, federally moved. License by local Police. This pretends law doesn't exist.

Rep. Pantelakos – why are gun shows not important. Would you believe

Olsen-yes, most people sell for money.

<u>Rep. Hirsch</u> – car shows for dealers, fed law prohibits gun dealers, like sale of gun items. <u>Orsen</u> – yes, need licenses.

Kimberly Morin, WDLNH, opposed – has a video of claims with facts. 40% sold by illegal sales. Only 251 not sure where they bought guns. Inmates 1.7 purchased gun at gun show or dealers. Can't sell to unlicensed dealer, 10 yrs in jail. If sold to unlicensed dealer or person, 62% of private sellers would sell guns. People who broke law were criminals. This was a push-pulling. 94% support in NH Law or everyone we have now. Have a gun registry, clips 10 shells. This is wrong. Universal background checks, against federal law already. State requires checks. Mass has private strict gun laws, most illegal guns come from Mass. Illegal maybe stolen or given out illegally. Guns came from mass 17 total. Mass = strict laws more murders with strict laws. Twice the crime per capita than NH. safest state . 2014 low crime rate. More people for gun rights then not. Opponents believe this will lead to gun registry in NH will send video to committee.

<u>Joel Weinrebe</u>, <u>Belmont</u>, <u>opposed</u>—I train gun owners. 1 Million 170 thousands stopped for violating laws. This bill will not protect anyone.

*Leonard Korn, MD – supports- NH Medical society. Adopted policy see testimony 2nd page, 3 reasons

<u>Anthony Colarusso, Supports</u> – This bill is a small piece to prevent wrong person from requiring weapons. Dover Police.

Anthony J. Nino, Jr. Amherst- opposed – believes people who offer testimony should swap to honesty, or footnote their sources. Believes bill is too broad, unintended consequences Believes this

bill is the beginning of registration & confiscation "NH OFA" is building a foundation for confiscation of firearms.

Sgt. Haggerty, DOS, supports — unit commander for permits & licensing. Many statutes exist covering "falsification" see 159:14 — "personally known" — believes is currently inadequate. NH is known as a state where purchase of a gun is relatively easy. ATF trace often leads back to NH Weekly/monthly occurrences of this when questioned, original owner claims theft or private sale. Significant number of denials via background checks. \$ of check? \$20-25 does not see the fee as an infringement on 2nd amendment. No records are kept of sales — only a number of concerns over what laws are enforced.

<u>Jay Simkin</u> – 03064 – Opposes – believes gun control is mathematical idiocy, given the #'s of guns in the US. – "prohibition" does not work. ? kits to assemble a gun? % of completion requires that the person must get ATF approval (if for interstate commerce)

Zandra Rice Hawkins - supports, Granite State progress.

<u>Darryl W. Perry, Keene</u> – Opposed – would we need background checks for buying knives in stores.

Mark Harwood - opposed.

<u>David Love</u>, <u>Derry</u> – opposed. I can go to any bar for bikers – get a gun. Any list government gets isn't good. We need anti crime problem doesn't exist.

<u>James Gaffney</u> – opposed – bill isn't good no control, for who takes care of registry address, the criminal? This doesn't help, we have enough laws now.

<u>Rep. Itse</u> – opposed – we shouldn't talk about the person sold gun illegal. It's faster, easier, then going legally which cost more.

*Penny Dean – opposed. – Huge problems with wording, their isn't a problem no info. on crimes, no breakdown of who get guns illegally. There are tons of laws regulating guns, what is the problem, show this. Laws are there, just look. Some people don't like guns, registry,

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



Thank You Mr Chairman and Members of the Criminal Justice Committee. For the record I am Representative Katherine Rogers and I represent Merrimack County District #28, the east side of the city of Concord.

I am joined today by 5 original Co-sponsors - 4 members of the House, 1 State Senator and 66 additional Members of the House who are signing on as House Rule 36(d) co-sponsors that I have submitted to the House Clerk, and I submit to the Criminal Justice Committee Clerk today.

Each Rule 36(d) Co-sponsor has signed a separate letter addressed to the Clerk of the New Hampshire House expressing their support for HB 650 and their desire to serve as a Co-sponsor of this Bill requiring background checks for commercial firearms sales. They want to not only **VOTE** to support this but also to **CO-SPONSOR** this important legislation.

I believe this demonstrates the broad bi-partisan support this legislation has gained across the state of New Hampshire.

I grew up with a family that hunted. I remember my grandmother going out into the back field shooting partridge and bringing the game back in, dressing it and then serving it for dinner that night.

My Dad's family was from NH and I watched every fall as the deer hung in the barn during hunting season.

I was brought up with guns in my house.

I was taught to respect them.

I was taught gun ownership was a right but I was also taught that with that right came some awesome responsibilities.

My grandparents also brought me up to respect the constitutional right to vote, another basic foundation of what makes this nation unique and the envy of the world.

I was also taught that with that right came some awesome responsibilities.

When I was a young girl in Junior High School I became enamored with the Presidential campaign of then US Senator Robert Kennedy. He talked about equality, he talked about lifting people out of poverty, he talked about ending the War in Vietnam, a war where my older brother was fighting for his country and where I feared he would die.

I watched as his campaign crossed the county and I was devastated when it ended when he killed by an assassin's bullet.

This is the first time the two things my family had taught me most about collided - guns and politics.

I never thought that in America we used guns to decide elections. I never thought in America we used guns to settle arguments. I thought here we were civilized people. We fought with words - we fought with ideas. We were better than that!

I decided that day that this had to stop.

That is why I have always been on the side of responsible gun ownership.

That is what background checks are all about.

HB 650 is a simple bill. It fills a loophole that currently exists by requiring commercial firearms sales or transfers in this state to be subject to a criminal background check. If that does not happen, the seller faces a misdemeanor penalty for each violation.

It makes an exception for private, noncommercial sales or transfers between friends and families.

This is not an over-reach by government, it is a public safety measure to keep more guns out of the hands of those who we all agree should not have them. People like felons and domestic abusers.

TESTIMONY OF REP KATHERINE ROGERS ON HB (1995) TO HOUSE CRIMINAL JUSTICE AND PUBLIC SAFETY COMMITTEE Thursday February 19, 2015

Based on estimates by the NH Department of Safety, 33,000 of the estimated 82,500 sales that will occur next year will not be required to have a background check.

The National Instant Criminal Background Check System (NCIS) has blocked over 2 million gun sales to people who are prohibited from possessing guns. But the current system's loophole is exploited by criminals who can avoid background checks by purchasing firearms from unlicensed "private sellers", often at gun shows or through anonymous online transactions.

There are some arguments you will hear today against this legislation;

Some will say "it is a solution in search of a problem". "You will be hard pressed to come up with any meaningful incidents of firearms sources in the situations outlined in the legislation being used in crimes in NH." But look at the statistics kept by law enforcement about our gun sales.

NH is a net exporter of guns and a substantial percentage of our firearms have a short time-to-crime. (The percentage of guns recovered in a crime within two years of original sale - a strong indicator of gun trafficking).

According to 2009 data collected from the gun trafficking statistics from the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms & Explosives, New Hampshire exported 18.3 guns per 100,000 inhabitants whereas the national average was 14.1 and that 29.3% of NH's firearms have a short time-to-crime. The national average was 22.6%.

Others today will probably tell you that HB 650 will only affect "law-abiding citizens" because criminals don't follow the law anyway. By that logic, we should all pack up and go home right now. What good is passing laws when criminals don't follow the law.

Looks like we're trapped in a paradox: Law-abiding citizens obey the law - Criminals are lawbreakers, and thus do not obey the law - Laws impose restrictions on the behavior of only those who follow them - Laws, therefore, only hurt law-abiding citizens.

Every law could be refuted with this paradox, and societies would swiftly descent into anarchy. Laws against rape, murder, and theft, for example, are rarely followed by rapists, murderers and thieves, but the fact that such people exist in society is the reason for these laws in the first place.

You will also be reminded that Article 2-A of the NH Constitution grants "all persons the right to keep and bear arms in defense of themselves, their families, their property and the state."

But you must also remember that Article 11 of that same NH Constitution allows that "All elections are to be free, and every inhabitant of the state of 18 years of age and upwards shall have an equal right to vote in any election."

Think about that. We ask people to identify themselves before casting a ballot, but we ask no questions when they want to buy a gun?

We require every voter in NH to register to vote and at that time they need to identify themselves and at least fill out an affidavit declaring that they are who they say they are.

Isn't the right to keep and bear arms equally sacred.

Members of the Committee, HB 650 is a simple bill it merely requires anyone selling a firearm at an in-state gun show, flea market, or via online solicitation or classified ads to get a background check on the buyer through a federally licensed firearms dealer.

It is constitutional, and is a regulation that fits in with the beliefs of a majority of our population.

I ask you to support this proposal.

I am a co-sponsor of this bill, and I support it as a person who not only owns several firearms but is a staunch believer in the Second Amendment. As you know, I was a police officer in New Hampshire for over 25 years, and as a retired law enforcement officer, a Vietnam Veteran, and a person who is qualified to carry a concealed firearm in all 50 states through the 2006 Cops Carry Federal statute, I am both comfortable around firearms and skilled in their use.

I know this is an emotional issue on both sides of the question, and I can appreciate the concern of people when they say they fear that the government is going to take away their right to own a firearm. This legislation will do no such thing. All it is attempting to do is to keep firearms out of the hands of the people who are dangerous to the community: convicted felons, people who are mentally challenged, people convicted of domestic abuse.

This legislation closes the loophole for private sales at gun shows and on the Internet. It does <u>not</u> prohibit the private sale of a firearm between individuals as long as the person purchasing the firearm is not in the designated prohibited ownership category.

Background checks on firearm purchases are a good thing. It keeps all of us safer. The arguments we hear about how this will restrict decent law-abiding citizens from acquiring firearms while the criminals face no such restrictions do not stand up under scrutiny. I agree that persons who want to acquire a firearm by any means, even if they are convicted felons, will do so. Just as people who want to drive drunk will do that, too. But we have laws that prohibit drunk driving. We took a stand by mandating stiff penalties when a person drives drunk. There are over 300 million firearms in the United States. We must do all we can to prevent their use by individuals who are dangerous.

I recently purchased a handgun in November and I waited a grand total of 20 minutes while a National Instant Criminal Background Check – known as NICS - was made for my purchase. According to the FBI, more than 100 million such checks have been made in the last decade leading to more than 700,000 legitimate denials.

Right now, if one wanted to purchase a firearm over the Internet from a sporting goods store or gun shop, the firearm would have to be delivered to a federally licensed firearms dealer so that a NICS check could be completed and the sale finalized. Shouldn't that same standard be applied to private firearms sales on the Internet? Or in the parking lot at an accredited gun show?

We must take a stand and keep firearms out of the hands of the people who would abuse them and do harm to innocent people. Please look favorably on this bill and send it to the House as OUGHT TO PASS.

HB 650 requiring background checks for commercial firearms sales Testimony House Criminal Justice and Public Safety Committee February 19, 2015

I am Representative Skip Berrien from Rockingham District 18. I am speaking in support of HB 650 requiring background checks for commercial sale of firearms.

I am a retired pediatrician who practiced in New Hampshire and Connecticut. I have been a longstanding member of the American Academy of Pediatrics, whose position on firearms sales is reflected in my remarks. As a practicing primary care pediatrician in community settings, I have regarded many of the issues families face as public health problems.

Fire arms are a public health issue. Firearms are used for many different purposes, some of which have benefit to the public such as in the realm of public safety, but there is also a public health risk when firearms are in the hands of individuals who are at risk of irresponsibly storing, using or handling firearms.

According to a study of firearm injuries presented in 2013 at the American Public Health Association, it is documented that nationally firearm injuries are responsible for 2 billion dollars annually in hospital costs.

The media are replete with stories where firearms are discharged unintentionally by children and others who should not have access to such weapons. And we have the tragic situations in which thought disordered individuals have a breakdown and create unimaginable mayhem.

NH statistics show that we have a gun related death approximately every 4 days. Yes, our death rates from guns are lower than the national average, and I am glad for that. But every life is important and we should as a State be taking all the steps we can to keep this loss of life as low as possible.

We know that background checks would certainly not have prevented all of these tragedies, just as age limitations on the sale of cigarettes and alcohol doesn't prevent all of their associated problems. As with many public health problems, reducing gun violence require a series of interventions and one of these is to be sure that a person purchasing firearms doesn't have a background which indicates he or she is likely to use or store firearms irresponsibly.

The goal of this legislation is to take one more step to reduce gun violence. Multiple surveys in NH show the overwhelming majority of residents support background checks. I urge this committee to respond to the wishes of the public and to carry out its responsibility to contribute to public safety by voting "ought to pass".

To the members of the House Criminal Justice and Public Safety Committee

I find it oddly curious that the anti-rights representatives that sponsored this bill would finally admit in the purpose of this bill the one thing they always publicly state a firearms bill is never intended to do: enact a gun registry. You see in the purpose of this bill, it states "and create a record of each sale." So yes, this bill is in fact a defacto "gun registration" bill since it requires all transfers to be made at a dealer and dealers are required to record both the buyer and seller information. The ATF has been caught illegally copying these records en-masse from current firearms dealers. It also leaves the door open for a New Hampshire department to make administrative rules concerning the requirement that the dealer record every transaction separately of their federally required "bound book."

This bill also requires that a firearms dealer break federal law. Every firearm brought into a dealer, either to be sold to the dealer outright, as part of a trade or as part of a transfer between two individuals is entered into that bound book mentioned earlier. In order for a firearm to leave the dealers bound book a background check must be performed. This is a requirement of federal law. This bill states that a dealer "shall return the firearm to the seller without requiring a background check" if the buyer fails the background check, which can happen even if the buyer is not a prohibited person. The FBI makes mistakes. Case in point: A friend was falsely arrested after failing a NICS check because the FBI and New Hampshire thought he was his father, who is a felon. Under this bill the dealer would be forced to choose between breaking federal law or New Hampshire law.

Lastly, this bill is an affront to the fifth amendment of the US Constitution. In the Supreme Court case Hale v. Henkel, the court held that the Fifth Amendment does not apply to corporations. In doing so the court affirmed that it does apply to individuals. The opinion noted that "The individual may stand upon his constitutional rights as a citizen. He is entitled to carry on his private business in his own way. His power to contract is unlimited." An agreement to sell a firearm to another person, also known as a "private sale," is an informal contract and in some cases, sellers make it a formal contract by creating a paper bill of sale. Sales of any item between two people are not regulated by the government because it is unconstitutional, which the court case above affirmed. Thus, this bill violates the Fifth Amendment to the US Constitution.

Vote ITL on HB650.

Testimony of the Women's Defense League of New Hampshire Before the House Committee on Criminal Justice and Public Safety February 19, 2015

Myname is Susan Olsen. I am the past chair and current Director of Legislation for the Women's Defense League of New Hampshire, a New Hampshire-based firearms safety, education and advocacy organization. I appear here before you in opposition to HB 650.

On December 27, 2014, Democrat Representative Katherine Rogers, prime sponsor of HB 650, retweeted on her state representative's Facebook page a posting from the National Gun Victims Action Council depicting an astonishingly demeaning drawing.

The drawing depicts a man with his hair sticking up like he jammed his finger in an electric socket, with eyes that appear to be bulging and bloodshot, his hands grasped together, shaped like a pop-tart pistol pointing at a man who appears to be leaning behind a counter containing firearms.

The caption seems to imply that the man behind the counter, despite the wild hair and eyes of the other man, would rather make money selling a firearm than question whether the potential buyer is or should be prohibited from that purchase.

For the life of me, I cannot understand why Representative Rogers would think this funny or informative but, I believe her re-tweeting it reveals a great deal.

With HB 650, Representative Rogers has resurrected last session's amended version of HB 1589, a spectacularly opposed and failed piece of legislation. Like the original and amended versions of HB 1589, HB 650, as introduced, appears not to address, understand or – worse – simply ignores the fact that federal law clearly prescribes who and how persons may buy and or sell firearms.

Like the original and amended HB 1589, HB 650 repeats the failed mantra that there exists some magical "loophole" where people with wild hair and crazy eyes can purchase firearms at gun shows with nothing more than cash and a pulse. Worse, HB 650 implies that no one can be trusted, that federal and state firearms laws and regulations do not exist and, even if they did, they are somehow insufficient.

Is it willful ignorance to believe that criminals follow firearms laws and regulations? Do the sponsors believe all persons are guilty until proven innocent? Or do sponsors of this type of legislation simply believe that if one repeats an untruth enough times, it finally becomes the truth?

I handed out a document comparison between the amended HB 1589 of last session and 2015's HB 650 as introduced. You will notice a few changes:

I am testifying in favor of HB 650.

<u>I am Dr. Leonard Korn. I am</u> a psychiatrist from Portsmouth, having practiced there since 1974. I am a member of New Castle Promise, a local group organized after the Newtown school massacre to advocate for responsible gun control measures. I am also on the Executive Council of the New Hampshire Medical Society, and serve as Chair of the NHMS Subcommittee on Violence as a Public Health Issue.

My testimony in particular represents the current policy position of the New Hampshire Medical Society on the issue of universal background checks and firearm safety in general.

If I may, let me share some perspective on the issue of violence as a public health issue. First of all, as physicians we are always looking at all aspects of illness and health. We look to the underlying causes as well of course as devising and using the best practices in treatment. Second, as physicians we are involved professionally with all aspects of *the results of violence*. In particular, we see the results of violence in our emergency rooms, our hospitals, our clinics and our offices, even our morgues.

Approximately two years ago the New Hampshire Medical Society began conversations regarding firearm violence. In order to determine the opinions of NH physicians regarding firearm safety we included specific questions about firearm safety in the NHMS 2013 Survey of physicians to help guide the direction of NHMS policy.

The NHMS Survey had a very positive response rate. Addressing gun violence was endorsed by 81% of responding physicians, with 66% encouraging NHMS to take a position and advocate for this crucial safety issue.

On March 12, 2014 the NHMS Executive Council approved the following policy position on firearm safety as public health issue:


- 1. Resolved, that the NHMS supports universal background checks on all firearm purchases.
- 2. Resolved, that the NHMS opposes firearm purchase by individuals who have been involuntarily committed for mental health services, with allowance for restoration of those rights by court petition.
- 3. That the NHMS supports the use of gun-locks and other safety devices that will reduce accidental injury and death from firearms.

As physicians we know there are many causes of violence and it is certainly important for the safety of our communities to reduce when we can some of the factors that can and do contribute to violence. Restricting access to firearms by individuals who are criminally or mentally unstable simply makes sense. The New Hampshire Medical Society encourages the focus for our legislature to be on the public safety aspects of violence.

We realize issues regarding gun regulations are often obscured by heavy political pressures on legislators. Public safety should really trump politics on this issue. The New Hampshire Medical Society urges you to consider this issue from a public safety perspective and support universal background checks on all NH firearm purchases.

Thank you for your attention to this important issue.

On Behalf of the New Hampshire Firearms Coalition HB 650

My name is Alan Rice and I appear before you today on behalf of the New Hampshire Firearms Coalition, a membership organization representing law abiding firearms manufacturers, dealers and thousands of firearms owners all over the state of New Hampshire. NHFC is strongly opposed to HB 650, a bill that will put New Hampshire citizens in prison for up to 7 years for selling a gun to a friend or neighbor. That is correct - under the provisions of HB 650, a law-abiding gun owner would not be allowed to dispose of his or her private personal property without going to and through a licensed firearms dealer.

This bill will criminalize commonplace activities about which you might not even think about. For example, have any of you ever loaned your rifle to a friend on a hunting trip? Perhaps one of you might have let a friend try out one of your guns at the shooting range? If HB 650 is passed, these are the kinds of things that could land an otherwise law abiding person in jail!

In fact, HB 650 is so broad that any transfer that is not completed by a licensed dealer subjects the transferor to criminal penalties.

House Bill 650-FN — would set the stage for putting the names of New Hampshire gun owners into a national gun registry by requiring that virtually any gun transaction in New Hampshire — private or commercial — be subject to a Brady Check.

Thus, if you lived in Stark or Fitzwilliam and wanted to sell your gun to your lifetime next door neighbor, you and he would have to take a day off and drive to a federal firearms licensee.

Once you got there, you might find out what frequent gun buyers already know: The system is frequently down for long periods of time — sometimes an entire weekend. And 8% of all Brady Law inquiries result in "false positives" — simply because your name is similar to that of someone else.

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New Hampshire Firearms Coalition, Inc. PO Box 7182 Milford, NH 03055-7182 Were this false positive to occur during a Brady Law inquiry, you and your neighbor could take a day off three days later, drive back to the firearms dealer hoping the false positive had been cleared by the Brady Law system. The problem is this: Most false positives never go "green." Most dealers won't sell a firearm unless the FBI transmits a "green." And most people who try to get the FBI to correct its records are given the brush-off.

But that's not all: Recently, the Bureau of Alcohol Tobacco and Firearms has gone into gun dealers in connection with its annual inspection and demanded to be allowed to copy all information from the dealer's bound book and ATF 4473 firearm transaction records — thus compiling a de facto gun registry.

So the drafters of House Bill 650-FN claim that they prohibit a state or local firearms registry? Well, BATF is not a "state or local agency." And it doesn't consider its list of all gun owners to be a "registry" so you will be making New Hampshire residents part of a federal gun registry.

Consider this, HB 650 would have failed to prevent Newtown (stolen guns), Aurora (passed a background check), Tucson (passed a background check), and practically every other modern American tragedy. This bill would not make anyone safer, it's just another cynical attempt by Bloomberg-backed gun-grabbers to marginalize gun-owners, stigmatize gun ownership, and pave the way for the elimination of your gun rights.

HB 650 sure looks like it is sponsored by people who hate freedom. Legislators might be contemplating support of HB 650 because it might make them "feel like they are doing something" but, in reality, nothing needs to be done. There is no proof anywhere that there have been any problems with allowing law-abiding, peaceable, state residents to sell or trade firearms that they lawfully own to one another.

Contrary to popular belief, private parties cannot order firearms through the mail or UPS, only licensed dealers can do that.

However, current federal and state laws provide that private parties are free – and should remain free - to dispose of their property as they see fit (as long as the buyer and seller are residents of the same state). HB 650 would make those transactions into Crimes.

On behalf of the New Hampshire Firearms Coalition, I strongly urge the members of this Committee to find HB 650 inexpedient to legislate.

LEGISLATIVE POSITION NH DEPARTMENT OF SAFETY

HB 650: Requiring background checks for commercial firearms sales

Position: In Favor

Dear Honorable Members of the Committee:

This bill requires commercial firearms sales or transfers in this state to be subject to a criminal background check, and makes it a crime to fail to do so. It exempts private, non-commercial sales or transfers between individuals, provided neither individual is prohibited from owning or possessing a firearm under State or Federal law. This bill would limit the number of State and or Federally prohibited persons from obtaining firearms and would reduce New Hampshire's role as a source state for illegal firearm transactions in New England.

Currently, when a federally licensed firearm dealer at a conventional gun shop or sporting goods store or similar establishment sells a firearm to a customer, the dealer is required to obtain a NICS check (National Instant Criminal Background Check System) operated by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The purpose of the check is to find out if the buyer is prohibited by State and or Federal law from owning or possessing firearms. If the buyer is seeking to purchase a long gun (a rifle or shotgun) the dealer calls an 800 number direct and speaks with an FBI employee. If the buyer is purchasing a handgun (pistol or revolver) the dealer calls the NH State Police Gun Line on a toll-free number and a Gun Line employee makes the inquiry by computer through State and Federal data bases including NICS and NCIC. The Gun Line is in operation from 8:00 am to 9:00 pm, 7 days a week, 363 days a year (closed on Christmas and Thanksgiving).

If the purchaser has no record that would warrant denial of the purchase, the gun dealer is informed and the record of the inquiry is deleted by the next business day, so the system cannot be used to establish any sort of registry of who does or does not own a firearm. If there is any question or confusion about the record, the purchase is temporarily delayed until the question is cleared up through research. If the purchaser's record indicates that he or she is prohibited by State and or Federal law from owning or possessing a firearm, the firearms dealer is notified of a denial, and cannot sell the gun to the individual. Since the inception of the Brady Firearms Law in 1998 more than 1,000,000 disqualified persons have been prevented access to firearms as a result of these record checks. Except during busy periods when the staff is overwhelmed with requests a NICS check can be completed in a little as a few minutes.

A major loophole in the system is the fact that only transactions with federally licensed firearms dealers are subjected to the NICS check. Almost every month there are one or more large gun shows taking place in the state, where firearms change hands between parties. If a federally licensed firearms dealer has a booth and sells firearms at the show, the dealer runs all his or her sales through NICS. However, this is not the case with most sales or transfers between individuals.

This bill defines a commercial sale as a sale, transfer, or exchange of a firearm that takes place at, or on the premises of, a gun show or as a result of an offer to buy, sell, transfer or exchange a firearm that took place at a gun show, or pursuant to an advertisement, posting, listing, or display. If the bill passes, every commercial sale of a firearm shall be either by or to a federally licensed firearms dealer or the parties to the transaction must complete the sale through a licensed firearms dealer, who presumably will charge either the seller or the buyer something to make up for their time and trouble in making the NICS check and do the same sort of recordkeeping as he or she would do if the sale was made from their own inventory. If the buyer passes the check, the gun dealer will deliver the gun to the buyer. If the prospective buyer is a prohibited person, the gun dealer will return the gun to the seller.

The only exception to this will be a non-commercial private sale, transfer, or exchange of a firearm between individuals, provided neither party is a prohibited person. If either party is not sure that the other party is eligible to own or possess a firearm, then they must go through a licensed firearms dealer.

As an example, if someone who owns a gun has a friend who offers to buy it from him, if neither is a prohibited party they do not have to go through this process. If a gun owner wishes to give one of his guns as a gift to a friend or relative, and neither is a prohibited party, they do not have to go through this process. If two people want to swap or exchange firearms and neither is a prohibited party they would not have to go through this process.

If anyone violates this statute, they would be guilty of a Class B misdemeanor for a first offense. The penalty for a Class B misdemeanor is only a fine – no possibility of incarceration, but it does result in the person having a criminal record. For a second or subsequent offense, the penalty is a Class A misdemeanor, which can result in a jail sentence of up to a year in a county jail or house of correction.

If the local police become aware of a violation of this process by a firearms dealer they are required to report it to the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms.

The bill cannot be used by any State, Local or County law enforcement agency to establish or maintain any registry of firearms sold or transferred.

To the extent that this bill will result in fewer sales of firearms to prohibited persons, the Department supports this bill.

What problem are we trying to solve?

Until that problem is clearly proven and identified then legislating a 'solution' does not make sense. We have <u>at least</u> several laws that can be used to punish the lawbreaker. There are currently many, many firearms laws on the books (both federal and state) that a lawbreaker can be charged with, so why punish 1.3 million New Hampshire citizens, spend countless as yet unknown taxpayer dollars to <u>attempt</u> to stop 175 firearm 'sales' at most¹?

✓ It is illegal under federal law and punishable by up to 10 years in prison for the following people to receive, possess, or transport any firearm or ammunition:

someone convicted of or under indictment for a felony punishable by more than one year in prison, someone convicted of a misdemeanor punishable by more than two years in prison, a fugitive from justice, an unlawful user of any controlled substance, someone who has been ruled by a court as mentally defective or has been committed to any mental institution, an illegal alien, someone dishonorably discharged from the military, someone who has renounced his or her U.S. citizenship, someone subject to certain restraining orders, or someone convicted of a domestic violence misdemeanor.

- ✓ Under federal law, it is illegal and punishable by up to 10 years in prison to sell or transfer any firearm or ammunition to someone while "knowing" or having "reasonable cause to believe" this person falls into any of the prohibited categories listed above.
- ✓ Under federal law, it is illegal to "engage in the business of importing, manufacturing, or dealing in firearms" without a federal license to do so.
- ✓ Under federal law, it is illegal for anyone except a federally licensed firearms business to sell, buy, trade, or transfer a firearm across state lines.
- ✓ Under federal law, private individuals are not required to a conduct a background check before selling or transferring a firearm to someone who lives in the same state, but it is illegal and punishable by up to 10 years in prison for a private individual to sell or transfer a firearm while "knowing" or having "reasonable cause to believe" that the recipient falls into one of the prohibited categories above. Total Number of Firearms Recovered and Traced in New Hampshire by Calendar Year




Firearm Types with a New Hampshire Recovery January 1, 2013 – December 31, 2013




Top Calibers Reported on Firearm Traces with a New Hampshire Recovery





Top 15 Source States for Firearms with a New Hampshire Recovery




Time-To-Crime Rates for Firearms with a New Hampshire Recovery January 1, 2013 – December 31, 2013



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


Total Number of Firearms Recovered and Traced in New Hampshire by Calendar Year



Firearm Types with a New Hampshire Recovery January 1, 2012 – December 31, 2012




Top Calibers Reported on Firearm Traces with a New Hampshire Recovery January 1, 2012 - December 31, 2012





Top Categories Reported on Firearm Traces with a New Hampshire Recovery January 1, 2012 - December 31, 2012





Top 15 Source States for Firearms with a New Hampshire Recovery





Time-To-Crime Rates for Firearms with a New Hampshire Recovery January 1, 2012 – December 31, 2012





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


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
Total Number of Firearms Recovered and Traced in New Hampshire by Calendar Year




Time-To-Crime Rates for Firearms with a New Hampshire Recovery January 1, 2011 – December 31, 2011 68


Total Number of Firearms Recovered and Traced in New Hampshire by Calendar Year



Firearm Types with a New Hampshire Recovery January 1, 2010 – December 31, 2010




