Bill Analysis: This bill prohibits the New Hampshire veterans' home from denying admission to a veteran solely because the veteran is a smoker and is not willing to give up smoking on a voluntary basis.

Summary of testimony presented in support: Representative Howard Moffett:

- July 1, 2013 the New Hampshire Veterans' home in Tilton became a "smoke free" campus. At that time, eight veterans at the home smoked. These eight veterans were grandfathered, so they could continue to smoke in two designated outside areas.
- Typically a veteran comes in to the home at age 82. Presently, there are 190 residents.
- To date, of the eight veterans who were grandfathered, six remain.
- This legislation is trying to strike a balance between two principles. Would like to see veterans encouraged to stop smoking, hopefully voluntarily.
- Residents who served their country honorably, were taught to smoke in the armed forces.

- Application into the Veterans' home is because there is nowhere else.
- Today, if they do not give up smoking, they cannot apply to the Veterans' home.
- These men and women are owed the dignity to decide what they want to enjoy for the last years of their lives.
- This bill took two terms to get through the House.
- Operative language in bill represents a compromise by the House ED & A Committee.
- Changes from the original bill are lines 15, 16, and 17 where the Committee inserted, "smoking veterans shall be offered smoking cessation assistance by the home, shall be required to agree to participate in such a program as a condition of admission, but shall not be required to complete such a program successfully as a condition of continued residence. Smoking veterans who refuse smoking cessation assistance or fail the voluntary smoking cessation program shall be permitted to smoke only in the home's designated smoking areas". The Committee thought this was a reasonable compromise and can be accepted. The preference would be a stronger provision, i.e., "if a veteran really does not want to engage in a smoking cessation policy, it should be his or her choice."

Senator Cataldo stated that his dad was a WW I veteran, his brother a WW II veteran, both smoked. It is a veterans right if they want to smoke.

- Senator Carson said the bill, as amended by the House, line 15 reads, "shall be required to agree to participate in such a program as a condition of admission." There are medical conditions of individuals that would preclude them from taking part in such a program, e.g. a problem with the interaction with drugs, nicotine, etc. She stated that a medical clause should be inserted within this legislation to address this. She also believes that the legislation should be effective upon passage and not 60 days after passage.
- Another matter needing to be addressed is that of the medical marijuana law, and if a physician recommends medical marijuana as a medical therapy, then rulemaking authority needs to be authorized for the development of a policy on its use. Representative Moffett was in agreement with Senator Carson.

Testimony before the Senate Committee on Executive Departments & Administration HB 473 - re Smoking Policy at Veterans Home Rep. Howard Moffett, April 1, 2015

Madame Chair and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to appear before you this morning on HB 473, which deals with the smoking and admissions policies at the New Hampshire Veterans Home in Tilton.

For the record, I am Rep. Howard Moffett, of Merrimack District 9, which includes Loudon and Canterbury. Although I'm the prime sponsor of this bill, the list of cosponsors will tell you that the bill had broad bi-partisan support in the House. It passed unanimously on the Consent Calendar on March 11, three weeks ago.

First, some relevant facts. There are roughly 190 New Hampshire veterans at the Home. The average age on admission is 82. As of July 1 2013, the Home became a "smoke-free campus" for residents, staff and visitors. I put 'smoke-free' in quotes because the campus is still not smoke-free, strictly speaking: at the time of the policy change, there were eight grand-fathered smoking residents who were permitted to continue smoking in the Home's designated outdoor smoking areas. Two have since passed away, but six remain. The non-smoking policy was instituted by the Home itself, on its own authority, and not because it is required by any state or federal law or regulation. Smoking veterans may still apply for admission, but are admitted only if they agree to participate in the Home's "voluntary" smoking cessation program.

So, if you are a New Hampshire veteran who otherwise qualifies for admission but does not agree to participate in the Home's smoking cessation program, you will not be admitted to the Home — and if you drop out of the smoking cessation program, you are at risk of being asked to leave. You will not be allowed to use the designated outdoor smoking areas available to the six grand-fathered residents who still smoke.

There are two important principles at odds with each other here. On the one hand, we would all agree that smoking is not good for your health, and I suspect we would all like to see smoking residents **voluntarily** participate in a smoking cessation program. I'm sure the Veterans Home staff who recommended this policy, and the Board of Managers who adopted it, had the best interests of the majority of residents at heart, and that they were sincerely concerned about minimizing the risk of fire at the Home. I also understand that the new policy is supported by a majority of the residents. I applaud the Home's program to encourage smoking residents to learn to stop smoking, as long as it is **voluntary**.

But there's a second important principle here, and it needs to be recognized. The men and women that this new "smoke-free" policy discriminates against are New Hampshire veterans -- just like the residents of the Home who don't smoke. They put

themselves in harm's way for our sake -- just like the residents of the Home who don't smoke. In many cases they actually learned to smoke in the military because free cigarettes were distributed with combat rations, in order to quiet battle-jangled nerves and boost morale. These New Hampshire men and women – veterans who smoke -- have counted on the fact, at least until now, that the NH Veterans Home is the one place they can go to spend their final years in dignity when no other place is available or affordable -- just like the residents of the Home who don't smoke.

And now we're saying to these New Hampshire veterans that actually this Home is **not** for them, unless they "voluntarily" agree to quit smoking. The House does not agree to tell them that, and I hope the Senate will not either. This non-smoking policy was well-intentioned, and its emphasis on promoting healthy behavior is laudable--but its discriminatory aspect is shameful, and I hope the Senate will not be a party to it.

This is a situation that calls for a compromise. The six grand-fathered residents who smoke have two designated outdoor smoking areas, where their smoking poses virtually no risk of fire or injury to themselves or others, and where non-smoking residents are not exposed to second-hand smoke. Why shouldn't those outdoor smoking areas be available to newly-admitted residents who - for whatever reason - are not prepared to give up smoking voluntarily? Why should we tell <u>any</u> New Hampshire veteran that there is no room for him or her at the New Hampshire Veterans Home - unless they agree to give up this one small source of pleasure in their declining years?

George Orwell said, "We sleep safely in our beds because rough men stand ready in the night to visit violence on those who would do us harm". He might well have added, "and some of them, God forbid, smoke cigarettes". Let's not treat any group of New Hampshire veterans as pariahs - they are the last class of people we should be discriminating against.
