Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

- 1 Student Information Protection and Privacy. Amend RSA 189:68, IV to read as follows:
- IV. No school shall record in any way a school classroom for [any] the purpose of teacher evaluations without school board approval after a public hearing, and without written consent of the teacher and the parent or legal guardian of each affected student.
- V.(a) Nothing in this section shall preclude the use of audio or video recordings for use with or by a child with a disability, or by such child's teacher or service provider when the child's individualized education program or accommodation plan includes audio or video recording as part of the child's special education, related services, assistive technology service, or methodology, so long as such audio or video recordings are made, used, and maintained in accordance with the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act, 20 U.S.C. section 1232g, and applicable state law.
- (b) Nothing in this section shall preclude the use of audio or video recordings for student instructional purposes.
- 2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

Summary of testimony presented in support: Representative Cordelli

- This is a follow up to HB507 because last summer there was discussion about unintended consequences
- This bill will clarify those issues concerns
- V(a) clarifies that recording devices may be used by students with IEPs, as the intent of HB507 was not to prevent students with IEPs from using recording devices
- V(b) clarifies that recordings may be used for teaching and this language was worked on with the School Board Association
- V(c) simply requires notification of the parent or legal guardian of a recording and does not require written approval. It is the result of working with USNH and the Community College system in terms of

- recording student teachers and teacher interns for teaching purposes
- This will hopefully clarify any issues and prevent any disruptions in the classroom
- Senator Stiles asked if it is outlined in the bill that this will not be used for teacher evaluation
 - o Correct
- Senator Reagan asked if there were any privacy concerns
 - o That was originally the concern. We notify the parents that these student teachers/interns are being recorded for teaching purposes and nothing else, and that alleviated their concerns
- Senator Watters asked if 'affected student' means anyone who is going to be there
 - o Correct
- Senator Watters asked if there is going to be student intern, does that notification go out at the start of the semester.
 - o Yes

Bonnie Dunham

- · This is very helpful to children who need this resource
- Every recording has to be maintained in terms of privacy and special education laws
- Senator Reagan asked what happens to the recording after the student is done with it
 - o Generally, it is the staff making the recording or a student if they are doing the audio tape. Doesn't know if they destroy it, as they use it for study purposes

Dear Chairman Reagan and members of the Senate Education Committee,

I apologize that I could not be with you for today's hearing on House Bill 1372: Permitting a child with a disability to use audio or video recording devices in the classroom. I did however want to write express my support for the bill on behalf of my colleagues in the Education Departments at each of the University System of New Hampshire's (USNH) four institutions. I specifically want to voice our support for the provision on lines 14-17 of the bill that would allow interns in educator preparation programs, including student teachers, the opportunity to use the powerful tools of audio or video recording as long as parents have advanced written notification and the chance to opt out.

Most teacher preparation curricula require student teachers to submit video or audio recordings of their in-school internship experiences as a means of providing on-going feedback and evaluating competence. As currently written, RSA 189:68, IV creates a significant administrative burden for our school administrators and school boards, as well as for our pre-service students and Education Departments in order to obtain the necessary approvals to meet this requirement. If unchanged, the law may make it more difficult to place student teachers in certain districts, and could jeopardize the pipeline of new teachers entering the state's schools. In fact, we know of schools that have refused to take student teachers specifically because they fear they will not correctly respond to all of the nuances of the law as written.

USNH institutions already send notice home to families that a student teacher will be present in their child's classroom and that audio or video recording will occur in connection with that experience. This notice gives families the chance to opt their student out, and provides an opportunity for them to ask questions of administrators and teachers as to how this might impact their child's education. We believe this is important information for families to have and that such a notification requirement strikes an appropriate balance to ensure children, pre-service students, school administrators, and in-service teachers are protected.

As amended by this bill, RSA 189:68, IV provides important protections for teachers and students while ensuring the law works for all stakeholders, including in-service teachers and administrators, interns in pre-service educator preparation programs, families, school boards, and most importantly the children in our schools.

Thank you for the opportunity to express my support for this legislation.
