Summary of testimony presented in support:

Senator Reagan

- Is a member of the Cannabis Advisory Council and the original sponsor of the therapeutic cannabis bill.
- Due to the tremendous restrictions placed on therapeutic cannabis, issues have arisen.
- NH is very restrictive on who can be a caregiver.
- Many elderly patients have their equally elderly spouses as their caregivers, who have a decreasing ability to travel long distances.
- This bill enables the Department of Health and Human Services to analyze the need for an additional satellite dispensary.
- It does require local approval and it is severely limited in number.
- Currently, NH has four Alternative Treatment Centers (ATCs) and this would only allow for four satellites.
- Would not be 24 hour operations, but allow patients to pick up their recommended product needs.
- Senator French asked if these satellites would be owned by those current ATCs.
 - Allows each current ATC to have one satellite.
- Senator Gannon asked if there is dispensing done at doctors' offices.
 - No. A doctor writes a letter of recommendation that the patient takes to DHHS, where they get a card that allows them to purchase therapeutic cannabis.

- Senator Lasky asked about the local control aspect.
 - That is already in the Therapeutic Cannabis Law.
- Senator Lasky asked if that needs be spelled out in this legislation.
 - The construction of this came from those who are most familiar with the current law. They did not find that necessary.
- Senator Gannon asked if towns could object to dispensaries.
 - Yes.

Phillip Poierer (Temescal Wellness)

- Temescal Wellness is one of the three ATCs in the State. Has one location in Dover and another in Lebanon.
- This bill will allow the ATCs to achieve the main goal of the program, which is to reduce symptoms and improve the quality of life of patients.
- The main issue patients have is travel.
- Many patients drive 40-50mins one way, and some even 1-2hrs one way to get to a dispensary.
- That amount of time for any individual would be challenging and it is especially challenging for those who are in pain.
- That stress can compound a lot of the issues.
- Allowing a satellite will allow patients to come more frequently and will allow the operators to provide better education and review options.
- This would not only help patients in terms of the cost of traveling, but also allow them to purchase in smaller, more affordable amounts.
- Senator Gannon asked if the people working at these ATCs are trained on concentration and dosing.
 - Yes. Everyone gets a different window of relief because each person has different endocannabinoid systems. Educates patients on starting low and slow to find the least amount of medication for symptom relief.
- Senator Gannon asked if doctors prescribe amounts or levels.
 - It varies across the state, as some providers are more educated than others. Patients are becoming more educated, but they always defer to physician notes. A lot of providers don't give a lot of guidelines because they are not educated.
- Senator Carson raised a concern that the ATCs are not looking for true satellite locations that simply dispense, but actually smaller treatment centers that diagnose and consult.
 - Every interaction with a patient is essentially a consultation. A satellite location may very well have consultation rooms. Would continue to work with patients as they would in a regular facility.
- Senator Carson requested more information regarding what these satellite operations would look like.

Rep. Larry Laflamme (provided written testimony)

- Provided data regarding the geographic spread of therapeutic cannabis patients across the State based off of DHHS' Therapeutic Cannabis Data Report
- The northern most counties make up 1/3 of the number of patients.
- There are 4 ATCs, located in Dover, Lebanon, Merrimack, and Plymouth
- Plymouth is the furthest north and roughly 1/3 of the patients go there
- Patients in the North Country are required to travel what can be great distances to

essentially go to a pharmacy.

- Allowing satellite dispensaries would likely result in one being placed in the North Country.

Summary of testimony presented in opposition:

Rick Naya (NH Normal)

- Was a leader on the medical cannabis law in NH
- There are no certified medical providers at those ATCs.
- It is all speculation as to how a patient gets the right medication.
- Many people choose to not purchase at dispensaries and instead purchase on the black market because they cannot afford it at the dispensaries.
- These ATCs are not making positive revenues.
- Their products are inferior to the products he produces.
- The data being provided is not sound.
- Opposes this until data and research prove that it is necessary to expand these locations.
- They are trying to expand in order to prepare for a commercial market
- Senator Gannon asked how Mr. Naya knows the products are inferior.
 - Patients call and tell him. Some of the quality is inferior and they do not have enough variety.

Kate Frye (New Futures) (provided written testimony)

- Opposed as written because of technical concerns with DHHS not enforcing regulations regarding advertising.
- Believes that if there is a need some kind of assessment, led by DHHS, it should occur to determine where the need is.
- This bill does not spell out that assessment process.
- Would suggest changing the existing definition of ATCs to be inclusive of the satellites.
- There are public hearings required, but they are focused on zoning issues and don't take into account public input as much.
- It might be helpful to flesh it out so that those hearings to not just be based on zoning.
- The major concern is the lack of oversight.
- There is an Advisory Council that does not meet.
- Working with stakeholders to put in legislation to create a medical oversight board that could look at issues like this.
- Has had great discussions lately as this has moved to the Public Health Department.
- Provided a study out of Dartmouth that found that adolescents living in medical marijuana states with a plethora of dispensaries are more likely to have tried new methods of cannabis use such as, edibles and vaping at a younger age than those in states with a fewer number of dispensaries.
- Also , concerned about the Department enforcing advertising regulations. By law it is prohibited to advertise to induce the use of cannabis.
- Social Media is not allowed by rule, but the Department has interpreted it as being allowed. They are in the process of revising their rules.
- Provided screen shots of the Facebook postings of one ATC which advertised things like " Lots of changes and news items...We are excited to announce our very own

strain Banana Bread hybrid...Gorilla Bomb crossed with Cornbread...Lastly, we have restocked on our mints, cookies, PB cups, and we now have 5 different flavors of fruit chews." "Come on in on Shatterday Saturdays and Wax Wednesdays" They also advertise a lot of sales

- Concerned about this and the fact that this is allowed on Facebook pages.
- Believes that should be taken into consideration with this bill.

Legal cannabis laws impact teen use

Summary: A new study has found that adolescents living in medical marijuana states with a plethora of dispensaries are more likely to have tried new methods of cannabis use, such as edibles and vaping, at a younger age than those living in states with fewer dispensaries.

A new study by researchers at Dartmouth has found that adolescents living in medical marijuana states with a plethora of dispensaries are more likely to have tried new methods of cannabis use, such as edibles and vaping, at a younger age than those living in states with fewer dispensaries. The study will appear in the August issue of *Drug and Alcohol Dependence*.

"This study was driven by two motivations – the need to understand if and how the shifting legal landscape of cannabis may affect kids, and the potential utility of social media as an epidemiological sampling method," says Jacob Borodovsky, a PhD candidate at The Dartmouth Institute for Health Policy and Clinical Practice and the Center for Technology and Behavioral Health, and the lead author of the study. "If it is true that certain components of legalization change the way young people use cannabis, then we need to devote more resources to understanding the important consequences (good or bad) of the specific provisions included in the diverse cannabis laws that are emerging across the country."

Borodovsky and colleagues examined associations between provisions of legal cannabis laws (such as allowing dispensaries, home cultivation, etc.) and cannabis consumption patterns among youth using online surveys distributed through Facebook, which proved to be a reliable method for generating geographically diverse samples of specific subgroups of cannabis-using youth.

"Our data suggest a relationship between the degree of regulatory oversight of legal cannabis and kids' propensity for trying new ways of using cannabis," Borodovsky says. "I think we need to start having a broader national conversation about how best to design the production and distribution regulations for legal cannabis to mitigate potential public health harms."

As cannabis legalization rapidly evolves, in both medical and recreational usage, understanding the laws' effect on young people is crucial because this group is particularly vulnerable to the adverse effects of marijuana and possesses an inherent elevated risk of developing a cannabis disorder.

"Using social media to disseminate web surveys is a useful epidemiological research method. It allows us to quickly collect geographically diverse data on cannabis-related questions that aren't asked in the traditional federally-sponsored drug use surveys," Borodovsky says. "My hope is that we can use these and other types of results to create rational legal cannabis laws that are based on data rather than anecdotes."

Dear Chair Carson and Members of the Committee:

New Futures opposes SB 388, Relative to Satellite Dispensaries for Therapeutic Cannabis as written. SB 388 allows the Department of Health and Human Services to authorize alternative treatment centers to establish a satellite dispensary for therapeutic cannabis. New Futures is not opposed to addressing barriers such as distance of alternative treatment centers to those in need of therapeutic cannabis. However, there should be clarifying language regarding the definition of and process to establish a satellite dispensary.

New Futures recommends satellite dispensaries are specifically defined in RSA 126-X to clarify that the Department has regulatory control of these entities. The Department should also conduct a needs assessment based on patient need and distance to current ATC locations. Suggested language as follows:

New Paragraph; Use of Cannabis for Therapeutic Purposes; Satellite Dispensaries. Amend RSA 126-X:7 by inserting after paragraph IX the following new paragraph:

X. If *after conducting a needs assessment based on patient need and distance to current alternative treatment centers*, the department determines that having additional locations for the dispensing of therapeutic cannabis is necessary to adequately and effectively meet the needs of qualifying patients and designated caregivers, the department may authorize one or more alternative treatment centers to establish a satellite dispensary. No alternative treatment center shall be authorized to establish more than one satellite dispensary. Satellite dispensaries shall only be established in geographic locations approved by the department, shall be limited solely to the dispensing of cannabis and educational efforts, and shall not be used for cultivation or other activities relative to the production of cannabis. Such satellite dispensaries shall be subject to rules adopted by the department.

In addition to the clarifying language in the bill, New Futures feel there needs to be tighter regulations regarding advertising by alternative treatment centers. A new study by researchers at Dartmouth has found that adolescents living in medical marijuana states with dispensaries are more likely to have tried new methods of cannabis use, such as edibles and vaping, at a younger age than those living in states with fewer dispensaries.¹ Advertising targeted to youth use contributes to increased use. Attached are sample advertisements by a New Hampshire alternative treatment center which New Futures argues is targeted to youth and likely to induce, directly or indirectly, the purchase of cannabis or cannabis infused products. New Futures recommends strengthening language in the statute which includes establishing advertising restrictions within Department's



rulemaking authority. The Department currently has similar language in its rules and New Futures recommends that language is also included in the statute.

Amend RSA 126-X:6 Departmental Rules, III, (12) -Advertising restrictions, including a prohibition *on advertising for the purpose of inducing, or which are likely to induce, directly or indirectly, the purchase of cannabis or cannabis infused products,* misrepresentation and unfair practices.
