#### Amendment to HB 326

Amend RSA 482-A:15, I-a as inserted by section 1 of the bill by replacing it with the following:

 I-a. For the purposes of this chapter, "prime wetlands" shall mean any contiguous areas falling within the jurisdictional definitions of RSA 482-A:2, X and RSA 482-A:4 that, because of their size, unspoiled character, fragile condition, or other relevant factors, make them of substantial significance. A prime wetland shall be at least 2 acres in size, shall not consist of a water body only, shall have at least 4 primary wetland functions, one of which shall be wildlife habitat. A prime wetland [,—and] shall have a width of at least 50 feet at its narrowest point across and perpendicular to its longitudinal axis, unless it can be demonstrated by the municipality that its narrower portions provide a significant contribution to the primary wetland functions of the prime wetland. Otherwise the boundary of a prime wetland shall coincide, where present, with the upland edge of any wetland, as defined in RSA 482-A:2, X, that is part of the prime wetland. On-site verification of proposed prime wetland boundaries shall be performed where landowner permission is provided. "Prime wetlands" shall not include existing state highway right-of-ways or other jurisdictional areas relating to prime wetlands, including adjacent buffers.

#### **TESTIMONY**

  - 1. \*Rep. Chuck Grassie introduced the bill as the main sponsor and yielded to Dr. Rick Van de Poll. An "unofficial" amendment was distributed.
  - 2. Dr. Rick Van de Poll presented slides explaining prime wetlands and their existence in NH.
  - 3. Terry Silverman of the Fitzwilliam Planning Board spoke in favor of the bill and explained how Fitzwilliam has benefitted from its wetlands protection policies.
  - 4. Kevin Nyhan from the NH Department of Transportation did not take a position of the bill. He explained some of the wetlands practices they employ and suggested an amendment.
  - 5. Susan Silverman of Fitzwilliam Conservation Commission spoke in favor of the bill.
  - 6. Cindy Balcios from the NH Association of Natural Resource Scientists spoke in opposition to the bill. She spoke that not all parts of a prime wetland ("fingers and toes") have the same functions and values.
  - 7. Kevin Woollee of the Fitzwilliam Conservation Commission spoke in favor of the bill and provided written testimony.
  - 8. Robin Peard Blais spoke in favor of the bill.
  - 9. Gary Abbott of Associated General Contractors spoke in opposition of the bill as it doesn't clearly define the boundaries of a prime wetland.
  - 10. Bill Klubben of the NH Planners Association spoke in favor of the bill because of the present exclusion of prime wetland because of the 50 ft. minimum width.
  - 11. Barbara Richter of the NH Association of Conservation Commissions testified in favor of the bill.
  - 12. Rep. Grassie commented further about the importance of the "fingers and toes," particularly during high water events (big storms, floods).

- 13. Cindy Balcios spoke again about how the municipality identifies a wetland using aerial photography and GPS and that the final map may not be verified by site specific data so the boundary of prime wetland may not be accurate.
- 14. Dr. Rick Van de Poll spoke again about how this is about providing protection to a valuable ecosystem and that NH has been chipping away at protections (e.g., dredge and fill that have not been mitigated).
- 15. Susan Fitzwilliam spoke again.

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

In the Year of Our Lord Two Thousand Nineteen

AN ACT relative to the definition of prime wetland.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1 Prime Wetlands; Definition. Amend RSA 482-A:15, I-a to read as follows:

I-a. For the purposes of this chapter, "prime wetlands" shall mean any contiguous areas falling within the jurisdictional definitions of RSA 482-A:2, X and RSA 482-A:4 that, because of their size, unspoiled character, fragile condition, or other relevant factors, make them of substantial significance. A prime wetland shall be at least 2 acres in size, shall not consist of a water body only, shall have at least 4 primary wetland functions, one of which shall be wildlife habitat. A prime wetland [-and] shall have a width of at least 50 feet at its narrowest point across and perpendicular to its longitudinal axis, unless it can be demonstrated by the municipality that its narrower portions provide a significant contribution to the primary wetland functions of the prime wetland. Otherwise the boundary of a prime wetland shall coincide, where present, with the upland edge of any wetland, as defined in RSA 482-A:2, X, that is part of the prime wetland. On-site verification of proposed prime wetland boundaries shall be performed where landowner permission is provided. For purposes of this definition, the existing state highway right-of-way does not include prime wetlands, or other jurisdictional areas relating to prime wetlands, including adjacent buffers.

Dear members of the Resources, Recreation and Development Committee,

I am speaking today in favor of HB326 "relative to the definition of prime wetland". My appreciation of the importance of wetlands, especially of prime wetlands which are of particularly unique, fragile and/or unspoiled was found while attending public hearings for the 2016 Prime Wetland study completed for the town of Fitzwilliam. I found out during the hearings Fitzwilliam has many wetlands of high value which by designating them as prime would give the additional protections they deserve.

Beginning also in 2016 I received training in finding and documenting Vernal Pools. While exploring for Vernal Pools on Fitzwilliam public lands I saw firsthand the beauty and importance of the wetland complexes on these lands. Because of this experience, my love of the outdoors and the knowledge acquired from attending the Prime Wetland public hearings when asked to become a member of the Fitzwilliam Conservation Commission I accepted the appointment.

I was disappointed to learn that because of technical definitions and changes in legal language the six wetlands approved as prime by the voters of Fitzwilliam were not accepted by the DES. Passage of HB 326 will give Fitzwilliam and other towns the opportunity to demonstrate why wetlands approved as prime by voters but initially rejected by DES should now be accepted.

I request committee members to vote yes on HB326 with an "Ought To Pass" recommendation.

Thank you, Kevin Woolley Fitzwilliam Conservation Commission Fitzwilliam, NH Prime wetlands have high value functions, which is why they are more carefully regulated. It is important to note that often the highest value lies in the poorly drained edges, where the narrow fingers stretch out into the landscape. The existing law does not take into account wetlands that are less than 50 wide, and may cut off the fingers of a wetland complex. HB 326 would further define the law to include "its narrower portions provide a significant contribution to the primary wetland functions of the prime wetland." This change to the definition of prime wetlands would allow for protection of the larger wetland complex, better protecting the water resources as a whole.

Wetlands provide critical functions including flood control, water quality maintenance through filtering pollution, wildlife habitat, groundwater recharge and shore land stabilization. These functions and values in turn provide a multitude of benefits to the public good. Wetlands perform critical functions best when they are hydrologically connected across the landscape. Allowing for the flow of water between wetland areas is a basic concept in the protection of water resources. Impacts to a wetland complex are felt downstream and may eventually limit the overall function of the ecosystem.

Please help conservation commissions continue to protect NH's water resources. Vote yes on HB 326 to allow for narrow portions of wetlands to be included in the definition of prime wetlands.

Dear Chair Smith and Members of the Committee:

The Lakes Management Advisory Committee (LMAC) is writing to express its support for House Bill 326, which further defines prime wetland for local protection in fill and dredge permits.

The proposed expanded definition of prime wetland would allow municipalities to include narrower portions, or "fingers" of wetlands in their designation. These narrower portions could be fringe wetlands, low-gradient feeder stream systems, or connectors between two larger wetland systems and provide significant habitat for macroinvertebrate, fish, birds, and wildlife. As such, these narrower portions can provide a significant contribution to the wetland functions and values of the prime wetland. The LMAC believes the current exclusion of these narrower portions is arbitrary and not based upon science. Thus, the LMAC supports HB 326 to allow these narrower portions to be included as prime wetlands.

The LMAC is a legislatively created body charged to work with the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) to administer RSA 483-A, the Lakes Management and Protection Program. The Governor and Council appointed Committee is comprised of 19 members representing academia, business, conservation organizations, lake associations, tourism, fish and game commission, marine trades, realtors, municipal government as well as several state agencies. Among its other responsibilities, the LMAC reviews legislation relevant to the Program and the state's lakes and ponds, and advises the NHDES Commissioner on the merits of such legislation.

In conclusion, the LMAC supports HB 326 relative to the definition of a prime wetland because it would include sensitive narrower portions of these wetlands which can be as significant as the larger wetland itself in their functions and values.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1 Prime Wetlands; Definition. Amend RSA 482-A:15, I-a to read as follows:

I-a. For the purposes of this chapter, "prime wetlands" shall mean any contiguous areas falling within the jurisdictional definitions of RSA 482-A:2, X and RSA 482-A:4 that, because of their size, unspoiled character, fragile condition, or other relevant factors, make them of substantial significance. A prime wetland shall be at least 2 acres in size, shall not consist of a water body only, shall have at least 4 primary wetland functions, one of which shall be wildlife habitat. A prime wetland [--and] shall have a width of at least 50 feet at its narrowest point across and perpendicular to its longitudinal axis, unless it can be demonstrated by the municipality that its narrower portions provide a significant contribution to the primary wetland functions of the prime wetland. Otherwise the boundary of a prime wetland shall coincide, where present, with the upland edge of any wetland, as defined in RSA 482-A:2, X, that is part of the prime wetland. On-site verification of proposed prime wetland boundaries shall be performed where landowner permission is provided.

2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.
