Public Hearing on HB 413

Rep. John Mann, prime sponsor- Rep. Mann stated that this bill was extraordinarily simple. It only changes one word: that being the number of representatives from not-for-profit groups representing energy, environmental, consumer or public health issues and knowledgeable in energy conservation policies and programs on the Energy Efficiency and Sustainable Energy Board (EESE Board). The bill would raise that number from 3 to 5.

Q: Why would you want more?

A: The sponsor argued that there was increased interest in participation; and that there was more work to be done. It would also increase the representation and power of average citizens, thinning out the larger number of legislators.

Chairman Robert Backus - The chair suggested that the Consumer Advocate would be very interested in this proposal and suggested that the sponsor should consult with him.

Rebecca Ohler, Chair of EESE Board, DES - Ms. Ohler thanked the sponsor for bringing forward this legislation. She stated that it had provided the impetus for the Board to take a look at its enabling statute and investigate what else could be updated. Unfortunately the EESE Board will only be hearing the report on the update from its working group this Friday, so none of the results of its work could be presented today. The EESE Board took no position on the bill, but wanted to apprise us of the fact that they were undertaking this update and would be coming to us with recommendations.

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Melissa Birchard, Conservation Law Foundation - Supports. Ms. Birchard clarified that the EESE Board was made up of many stakeholders, and that it has direct input into the statewide energy efficiency programs administered by the utilities. NH has just concluded its first year with its first EERS. The EERS takes advantage of the cleanest and cheapest energy measures, those that don't use any energy at all. The EERS began functioning on January 1, 2018, and the program is now beginning the second year of its first three year term. The EERS' three year plans will incrementally improve year over year by adding increasingly higher standards. In keeping with the PUC settlement order, the EESE Board will increasingly serve as a forum for stakeholder input into the EERS' three year plans. This will increase its profile in the energy planning process. The EESE Board will be taking on increasing responsibility in the future, taking on a new role as a full stakeholder participant in PUC dockets. Its proven record in achieving stakeholder consensus is being leveraged by the PUC to diminish the need for contested adjudicatory proceedings. The members of the EESE Board appreciate the new legislative language being put forward and see it as supporting the new and enhanced role of the EESE Board under the most recent PUC orders. They understand that there may be additional new language soon from the EESE Board's working group, and they look forward to that.

Don Kreis - Consumer Advocate - Supports. According to Mr. Kreis, the principal task of the enhanced stakeholder EESE Board is what the PUC has already committed to - the achievement of all cost-effective energy efficiency. This goal has been thrashed out in robust discussion among the Board's stakeholders. The PUC hopes that the EESE Board can take on, and resolve, as many issues as possible, leaving the fewest possible issues to be resolved via lengthy and expensive contested adjudicatory proceedings. The EERS concept was developed in 2016, and the first Energy Efficiency 3 year plan was developed by stakeholder consensus. It was subsequently updated via a PUC settlement agreement. Mr. Kreis argued that the main reason it was already working so well was because the EESE Board had already worked so hard to get to consensus at the get go. He added that adding additional seats on the Board would be very useful. Other improvements would be coming forth shortly from the EESE Board's working group. As but one example, language was proposed to be reinserted in the enabling statute to specify that the Board would provide recommendations at least annually on the allocation and distribution of energy efficiency funds. Finally, he stated that his own top recommendation for statutory language change would be that we place in statute the requirement for all cost-effective energy efficiency measures.

Q: If we vote to set up a Department of Energy, it's going to change a lot of this, isn't it?

A: It could, yes.

Q: Will these other recommendations for language changes be brought in as amendments to this bill?

A: Yes. My amendment will. That one proposes achieving all cost-effective energy efficiency measures, was just presented here. The other amendments will be coming forward from the working group.

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Q: I suggest we put off voting on this bill until after we receive the working group's recommendations.

Chairman Backus - Yes, that is my plan.



- (c) A representative of a business or association of businesses selling or installing sustainable or renewable energy systems, appointed by the chairman of the public utilities commission.
- (d) A representative from the investment, financial services, or lending community with expertise in efficiency and/or renewable energy investments and financing, appointed by the chairman of the public utilities commission.
