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

Statement by Henry Klementowicz, Staff Attorney, ACLU-NH House Criminal Justice and Public Safety Committee House Bill 518 January 24, 2019

I submit this testimony on behalf of the American Civil Liberties Union of New Hampshire ("ACLU-NH")—a non-partisan, non-profit organization working to protect civil liberties throughout the state for over 50 years. House Bill 518 (HB 518) would remove the ability of the Department of Corrections to sue inmates and former inmates for the cost of their incarceration. We respectfully urge the Committee to vote HB 518 *Ought to Pass*.

Under current law, the Department of Corrections can sue a current or former inmate to recover the cost of that person's incarceration, currently estimated to be in excess of \$36,000 per year. These costs are not imposed by a jury or contemplated by the criminal justice system. Instead, the statutes, RSA 622:53-:58, allow the government to sue an inmate who *has already been sentenced to a term of incarceration*, and impose additional penalties beyond prison, fines, forfeiture and restitution.

The vast majority of state prisoners will be released into society, and it is in everybody's interest to enable these people to reintegrate into society and become productive citizens. Adding a bill of tens of thousands of dollars makes it that much harder for that to occur. Former inmates already face felony convictions and gaps in their work histories that make finding employment difficult.

ACLU-NH represents Eric Cable in *Cable v. State of New Hampshire*, 217-2018-CV-00133 in Merrimack County Superior Court, and has challenged the statutes' application to him as an unconstitutional violation of his Right to Remedy enshrined by Part I, Article 14 of the New Hampshire Constitution. That challenge remains pending. Laws that are bad policy and can be used unconstitutionally should not remain on the books.

These statutes used infrequently. The fiscal note states that only two inmates pay cost-of-care. ACLU-NH is aware of only twelve times in the past ten years that the government has sought to recover this money. In addition to not being a large source of revenue, the fact that these cases are so rarely brought means that enforcement can be arbitrary and potentially retaliatory.

METHODOLOGY:

This bill repeals the statute relating to reimbursement of the cost of care by inmates. The Department of Corrections indicates this bill would reduce general fund unrestricted revenue by an estimated \$81,230 in FY 2020 and each year thereafter. The Department estimated the revenue loss for FY 2020 based on the FY 2018 average annual cost of incarceration for one person of \$40,615. Currently, two individuals pay cost of care. The Department receives 59% of the cost of care reimbursement collected by the Department of Justice and the remaining 41% is deposited into the general fund. The Department states it received \$43,910 in FY 2016, \$65,783 in FY 2017 and \$65,419 in FY 2018. The Department assumes loss of this revenue would be made up with general funds.

The Department of Justice indicates it currently seeks reimbursement through the court process for the cost of care while the inmate is at the Department of Corrections. The average annual debt collected on behalf of the Department of Corrections over the past 4 years is \$102,000. Of this amount \$60,200 is disbursed to the Department of Corrections and \$41,800 is used to fund the Department of Justice unit responsible for debt collection for other agencies. If the statute relating to reimbursement of the cost of care by inmates is repealed, annual revenue to the State would decrease by \$102,000 on average.

METHODOLOGY:

This bill repeals the statute relating to reimbursement of the cost of care by inmates. The Department of Corrections indicates this bill would reduce general fund unrestricted revenue by an estimated \$81,230 in FY 2020 and each year thereafter. The Department estimated the revenue loss for FY 2020 based on the FY 2018 average annual cost of incarceration for one person of \$40,615. Currently, two individuals pay cost of care. The Department receives 59% of the cost of care reimbursement collected by the Department of Justice and the remaining 41% is deposited into the general fund. The Department states it received \$43,910 in FY 2016, \$65,783 in FY 2017 and \$65,419 in FY 2018. The Department assumes loss of this revenue would be made up with general funds.

The Department of Justice indicates it currently seeks reimbursement through the court process for the cost of care while the inmate is at the Department of Corrections. The Department states it seeks reimbursement infrequently and repeal of these statutory subdivisions would have no fiscal impact on the Department of Justice.
