* 1 Introduced by Rep. Porter, Sponsor -

The Commission on Deafness and Hard of Hearing has had a subcommittee on early learning that is working to see that children are on target with language learning. The Deaf Children's Bill of Rights has been adopted by some states. The purpose of the bill is to state what rights a deaf child has from birth on. It is modeled after those in Maine and Massachusetts. A bill of rights along with an advisory committee would be a step toward assuring children received the language learning services they need before entering school. From birth to age three, services are underneath Department of Health & Human Services and then become the responsibility of Dept of Education. Bill asks the departments to work together. Amendment 0107h adds the part about working together. Lines 18-24: Council shall determine number of children who are deaf....it mimics what the registry was set up to do. It would be another way to set up the registry.

Susan Wolf Downes, Northern Deaf and Hard of Hearing Services -

Supports the bill. Has been deaf all of her life. This is about her right to have an equal right to an education as every hearing child has. The advisory council would be made up of people with knowledge and experience.

Kristy Stellato -

Supports the bill. Advisory council would be a central place for people who have knowledge and experience to gather. She had gone to school with a deaf education team. Goal was to become a teacher of deaf.

Nancy Glynn -

Supports the bill. Bill speaks directly to her family. Her son is hard of hearing and received services through MICE program, which is no longer available. When transitioning to school, her family had to make the decision about where to live based on where services were available. Families are fighting for basic needs covered under bill of rights. This document would be useful to show to and by parents.

* 1 Sentina Thibedeau, Administrator Bureau of Student Support, Department of Education -

Takes no position. Collect information on students whose primary disability area is deafness/hard of hearing. Students who are homeschooled are not included in the data. Parents receive a handout "procedural safeguards" on procedures annually. NH has a state advisory committee charged with

identifying unmet needs; comment in on rules. Similar membership to advisory council proposed including a homeschooling representative. IDEA has procedures for dealing with disputes with parents. State is contracting with an organization to provide training in rights to school districts. The data provided is what the federal office requests.

Pam Lovejoy, NH Deaf and Hard of Hearing Services - Supports the bill.

Rep. Peter Schmidt -

This bill (DCBR for short) aims to expand on the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) with a focus on rights and roles for deaf and hard of hearing children (DHH for short) and their parents. Several states already have their own DCBR, including MA, RI, CT, and ME. This version includes a section on communication plans, and the advisory council is an added bonus.

The advisory council includes parents, teachers of the deaf, adults who are deaf and hard of hearing, department representatives, and service providers. They will meet to discuss issues and solutions, and make official recommendations. While we do have the Commission on Deafness and Hearing Loss, there's only so much the Commission members and guests can talk about.

There have been instances where departments made their own decisions without input from the community. For example, several years ago the certificate for Teachers of the Deaf was originally "Education of Children who are Accoustically Impaired." It took several years for teachers and community advocates to convince DOE to change the title to something more appropriate and common. Another example was that when DHHS redirected funding from a centralized service provider to area agencies, they decided it was a good idea to require the area agencies to appoint one of their employees as a "hearing champion" to work with the case load of deaf and hard of hearing children age 0-3. It also took some convincing to change the title to "hearing resource coordinator."

Having the advisory council puts the community on a level closer to the state departments for improved interactions and communications.

Hi Representative Porter,

I hope this email finds you well. I am writing to you about House Bill 631, relative to a deaf child's bill of rights and an advisory council on the education of deaf children. This is a very good piece of legislation and NEA-NH supports it enthusiastically. There were a couple changes we would ask you to consider.

The first is in Paragraph I under the definition of American Sign Language. This change was recommended by a member and at this time I am awaiting clarification from her as to why the change is needed. I thought I would pass it along to you pending hearing back from her. The change would be to the last few words under the definition of American Sign Language. The change would add the word "distinctly different" from English as opposed to how it now reads, "distinct" from English.

I'll get back to you with the rationale when I have it.

The second change is to the appointing authority for the two teacher members to the advisory council. The bill vests those appointments in the commissioner of education. Our concern is that the current commission is clearly hostile to public school educators. We feel it is important that these appointments come from the ranks of public school educators as they have to deal not only with teaching deaf children, but also all the other problems they experience as public school educators. They would bring a unique perspective to an important advisory council others may not. The bill currently does not provide the appointees must teach in a public school. Absent spelling out the appointees must be public school teachers, we are not confident either of the teachers who may be appointed by this commissioner would teach in public schools.

We would ask that you consider changing the appointing authority to the Speaker of the House and the Senate President for the teacher members. This is common and we feel their support for public education will guarantee the advisory council has the thoughtful input for educational professionals who face many different challenges each day in the classroom.

Thank you taking the time to consider these changes and I hope they are acceptable to you.

1 New Subdivision; Deaf Children's Bill of Rights. Amend RSA 186-C by inserting after section 1 2 30 the following new subdivision: 3 Deaf Children's Bill of Rights 4 186-C:31 Definitions. In this subdivision: 5 I. "American Sign Language" means the visual/gestural language used by deaf people in the United States and Canada, with semantic, syntactic, morphological, and phonological rules which 6 are distinct from English. 7 II. "Deaf student" means an individual who has a severe or complete absence of auditory 8 9 sensitivity which adversely affects educational performance and which is so severe that the student 10 is impaired in processing linguistic information through hearing, with or without amplification. 11 III. "English sign systems" means sign systems developed for educational purposes, which use manual signs in English word order, sometimes with added affixes which are not present in 12 13 American Sign Language. IV. "Hard of hearing student" means an individual who has some absence of auditory 14 sensitivity with residual hearing, whether permanent or fluctuating, which adversely affects a 15 child's educational performance but which is not included under the definition of "deaf student" in 16 this section. 17 V. "Individualized education plan (IEP)" means a written educational plan developed for a 18 student eligible for special education services pursuant to RSA 186-C and the federal Individual 19 with Disabilities Education Act, 20 U.S.C. section 1400, et seq. 20 21 VI, "Primary communication mode, style, and language" means the communication mode, 22 style, and language which is preferred by and most effective for a particular student, as determined by appropriate language assessment undertaken by individuals proficient in the communication 23 mode, style, or languages being assessed. Communication mode may include one or more of the 24 25 following systems or methods of communication applicable to deaf or hard of hearing children: (a) American Sign Language; 26 27 (b) Cued speech;

(c) English-based manual or sign systems; or

(d) Oral, aural, or speech-based training.

186-C:32 Deaf Children's Bill of Rights.

- II. Children who are deaf or hard of hearing have a right to early interventions to provide for the acquisition of a solid language base developed at the earliest possible age. Any infant with a documented hearing loss, prior to demonstration of any developmental delay, shall qualify for services as determined by the infant's individualized family service plan team.
- III. Children who are deaf or hard of hearing have the right to an education in which their parents or guardians have full informed participation in determining the extent, content, and purpose of all their educational planning and programs.
- IV. Children who are deaf or hard of hearing have the right to placement in the least restrictive educational environment and services based on their unique communication, language, and educational needs, consistent with the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, 20 U.S.C. section 1400, et seq.
- V. Children who are deaf or hard of hearing have the right to an education in which their communication mode, style, and language is respected, used, and developed to an appropriate level of proficiency.
- VI. Children who are deaf or hard of hearing have the right to a high-quality, ongoing and fluid means of communication, both inside and outside the classroom.
- VII. Children who are deaf or hard of hearing shall have the opportunity to choose from a variety of language modes and languages and technologies to enhance language learning. They have a right to teachers or interpreters proficient in appropriate language modes and certified in appropriate language modes if certification is available.
- VIII. Children who are deaf or hard of hearing have the right to an education in which teachers of the deaf and hard of hearing, related service providers, and assessors understand the unique nature of deafness, are specifically trained to work with deaf and hard of hearing students, and can communicate spontaneously and fluidly with these children.
- IX. Children who are deaf or hard of hearing have the right to contact with and to be exposed to adult role models who are deaf or hard of hearing in their educational programs.
- X. Children who are deaf or hard of hearing have the right to receive an education with a sufficient number of language mode peers with whom they can communicate directly and who are the same, or approximately the same, age and ability, whenever possible.
- XI. Children who are deaf or hard of hearing have the right to direct and appropriate access to all components of the educational process, including recess, lunch, and extracurricular, social, and athletic activities.
- XII. Children who are deaf or hard of hearing have the right to a placement best suited to their individual needs, including, but not limited to age, hearing loss, academic level, modes of

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- 1 communications, style of learning, motivational levels and family support.
- 2 186-C:33 Right of Parents or Guardians of Children Who Are Deaf or Hard of Hearing. The 3 parents or guardians of deaf or hard of hearing children have a right to balanced and complete 4 information regarding:
- 5 I. Their child's educational and communication needs.

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- II. Available programmatic, placement, and resource options.
- 7 III. Support services and advocacy resources from private and public agencies and 8 institutions.
- 9 IV. Available resources pertaining to hearing loss and the needs of children who are deaf or hard of hearing.
- 11 186-C:34 Rulemaking. The department of education shall adopt rules under RSA 541-A to 12 implement this chapter. At a minimum, such rules shall address:
- I. Qualifications of personnel providing professional services to deaf and hard-of-hearing children within the school system.
 - II. Composition of the individualized family service plan team and the individualized education plan team.
 - III. The individualized communication plan for every deaf and hard-of-hearing student.
 - IV. Procedures and materials for assessment and placement.
- 19 V. Psychological counseling and mental health services.
- VI. Evaluation of the effectiveness of programs for students who are deaf or hard of hearing.
 - 186-C:35 Advisory Council Established. There is hereby established an advisory council on the education of children who are deaf or hard of hearing.
 - I. Members of the council shall be as follows:
 - (a) One professional with experience in using assistive technology.
- 26 (b) Two teachers of the deaf, one of whom is a regular and effective user of American
 27 Sign language and one of whom is a regular and effective user of oral/aural or speech based
 28 English.
 - (c) Two parents of deaf or hard of hearing students, one of whom is a regular and effective user of American sign language and one of whom is a regular and effective user of oral/aural or speech based English.
 - (d) Two representatives of the deaf and hard of hearing community, one of whom is a user of American sign language and one of whom is a user of oral/aural or speech based English.
 - (e) One administrator of a college or university program in interpreter training.
 - (f) One director of special education in a public school system.
- 36 (g) One public school administrator.
- 37 (h) One speech and language pathologist.
- 38 (i) One representative of the department of health and human services familiar with

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services for children who are deaf or hard of hearing, appointed by the commissioner of the department of health and human services.

- (j) One representative of the early hearing detection and intervention program, in the department of health and human services, appointed by the commissioner of the department of health and human services.
- (k) One representative of the department of education, division of special education, appointed by the commissioner of the department of education.
- (I) One member of the New Hampshire Association or Audiologists, appointed by the association.
- (m) One member of the New Hampshire Association of the Deaf, appointed by the association.
- II. The commissioner of the department of education shall appoint the members under subparagraphs I(a)-I(c) and the commissioner of the department of health and human services shall appoint the members under subparagraphs I(d)-I(h). Each member shall serve a 2-year term.
- III. The members of the council shall elect a chairperson from among the members. The first meeting of the council shall be called by the member appointed under subparagraph I(a). The first meeting of the council shall be held within 45 days of the effective date of this section.
- IV. The council shall advise the department of education and the department of health and human services on the needs and services provided to deaf and hard of hearing children in New Hampshire. In addition to such duties as may be assigned by the departments, the council shall determine the number of children within the state who are identified as being deaf and hard of hearing, the number of those children currently receiving services from both public and private agencies, the types of services being received, the types of services requested by parents or guardians, and areas of need.
- V. On or before November 1, the council shall submit an annual report its findings and any recommendations for proposed legislation to the speaker of the house of representatives, the president of the senate, the education committees in the house and senate, the house clerk, the senate clerk, the governor, and the state library.
 - 2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect upon its passage.
