Introduced By: Sen. Sherman, Sponsor -

This is essentially HB 736. The commission needs to be reconstituted. Intent is to be able to create a map and overlay. Has discussed this with the department. Looking at four major commissions. The department is being asked to staff a total of six commissions. It's the purview of the commission to recognize that there may be limitations of time and personnel. The commission should ask for funding for those positions. Would like to work with the committee to change the language to have the commission to have the ability to say they need additional funding to handle the request. Wants to identify which personnel are critical.

Question - Rep. Woods: Can the commission appoint non-members of the commission to a subcommittee?

Answer - Typically the language is that the commission can invite others to participate. Non-members would be non-voting.

Question - Rep. Woods: Would the time lag hinder the function of having the commission ask for funds?

Answer - No, since the request could go to the Fiscal Committee.

Question - Rep. Campion: Inquired about a specific person who was identified to be on the commission.

Answer - This was removed by the House. Would be open to requiring one person with specific qualifications.

Question - Rep. Weber: Why was the choice on page 2, line 1-4, given solely to the senators on the commission?

Answer - Presumption is that the people appointed will be people who work actively in this area. Makes sure the community members have experience in this area. Willing to go with more standard language, having nominations made by the Senate President and Speaker of the House.

John Williams and Kathleen Bush, Department of Health and Human Services – Support the underlying goals and initiatives. Bush: You have the commitment from the department that I will be the member from the department.

Question - Rep. McMahon: There is a cost function. Should this also require a knowledge of department costs?

Answer - Williams: We did our best to identify these on a previous similar bill. Sen. Sherman's

approach of having it in the commission's hands is a good idea.

Question - Rep. McMahon: Is there going to be a procedure for that in the applicable budget?

Answer - Williams: There is nothing in the budget that reflects this.

Question - Rep. Guthrie: Would it do any harm to have one or two people without expertise in science?

Answer - Williams: In a previous bill we made a case for reducing it to one member from DHHS.

Answer - Bush: The membership includes people with non-science specific expertise.

Environmental health is a broad field.

Rep. Murphy -

Supports the bill. Recognizes the challenges state agencies have in meeting the requests for assistance with commissions. Another bill allocates additional resources to DHHS. Supports non-voting for non-commission members. Asks that environmental tracking position be added back in.

1 Statement of Intent. The general court recognizes that nearly half of adults in the United States have at least one chronic health condition and chronic diseases are responsible for increased health care costs. Seventy percent of health care costs in the United States are for chronic diseases. Some chronic diseases are known or thought to be associated with environmental causes. According to the Centers for Disease Control, the state of New Hampshire has the highest rates of people with bladder, breast, esophageal, and pediatric cancer in the country. In addition, a double pediatric cancer cluster was identified in the seacoast of New Hampshire in 2014. Therefore, the general court hereby establishes the commission to study environmentally-triggered chronic illness.	1 Statement of Intent.
