Summary of testimony presented:

Rep. Suzanne Smith

- Wake boats have a deeper draft than a typical water ski boat. They ride deeper in the water.
- There are concerns about invasive species and erosion on shorelines because of the large wakes.
- This commission is attempting to bring stakeholders to the table to research this and find out if there is something the legislature should be doing. There is a need to balance rights of property owners with rights of folks to enjoy their boats and not spread aquatic invasives from lake to lake. Some members were added to the commission in the House committee.

Sen. Watters asked if it will take a while to get everyone appointed to the commission and if Rep. Smith thinks the reporting date is enough time.

She said no. She would rather extend it to the end of the biennium.

Sen. Watters suggested July 1.

Rebecca Hanson (Squam Lakes Association)

- Ms. Hanson is the director of conservation and they support the bill.
- The SLA is dedicated to protecting the lake and the surrounding watershed as well as the safety of wildlife, like loons, who are not doing well on Squam Lake primarily because of water quality and impacts of erosion on shoreline. Wave action also brings sediment up.

Larry Sunderland (NH Audubon and Loon Preservation Committee)

- The NH Audubon is dedicated to protecting the environment. The larger more intense wave generated by wake boats impact shoreline erosion more than traditional motor boats.
- He is familiar with Deering Lake in Deering NH, because of the layout around the channel, there has been a lot of erosion of the shoreline of his property.

 Trees have fallen into the channel as a result, which is a hazard to boaters.
- The strong wake impacts aquatic life and disturbs bottom sediment. He hopes the commission will look into the impact on loons and other wildlife. Loon nests are vulnerable to flooding or destruction by wave action.

Kelly Buchanan (NH LAKES)

• The primary concern with these boats is their ability to transport species in their ballast water. Some states have banned these watercraft, while other states have mandatory decontamination of the watercraft.

Benjamin McMahon (USA Water Ski and Wake Sports Association)

- Mr. McMahon fosters the development and competition of water sports. He is president of Pawtuckaway Lake Water Ski Club. Their members are active in lake preservation activities.
- The association appreciates being named to the commission and they look forward to discussing potential impacts. These issues can be addressed through education and enforcement.

Peter MacCallum - (MacCallum's Boathouse)

He owns a boathouse on Northwood Lake and they sell and service multiple
lines of boats, including wake boats. The wake boats are very versatile. Some
create zero wake for barefoot water skiing. The prop is under the boat. Portable
ballast bags are used to increase the weight of the boat and some models can fill
and empty with the push of a button. Wakeboarding is best performed in deep
water.

Jodi Grimbilas (Water Sports Industry Association)

• The association appreciates being on the commission and will bring forward information. They are happy with the membership of the commission as in the bill currently.

Dear Chair Watters and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on HB137. NH LAKES strongly supports HB137, relative to establishing a commission to examine the effects of wake boats in the state of New Hampshire. As a statewide non-profit organization dedicated to keeping New Hampshire's lakes clean and healthy, NH LAKES advocates for laws and other public policies and programs designed to achieve this mission. We work with partners, promote clean water policies and responsible use, and inspire the public to care for our lakes. Over the last few years, we have received many inquiries and complaints regarding wake (ballast) boats from our members and non-profit partners. We also know that these watercraft are quite repular with many boaters.

Wake boats (sometimes called wakeboard boats) are designed or modified to create a large, specifically-shaped wake for a wakeboarder to surf or jump the wake from side to side while doing aerial tricks. One way that these boats create larger waves behind them is to take on ballast water, which lowers the rear of the boat and displaces more water. This displacement of water changes the wake from one that is long and relatively low (a typical wake such as a water skier would use) to one that is much higher and more powerful (as high as 6 feet). Wakeboarders surf this wave as they travel behind the boat with or without a tow line.

With growing popularity, we are concerned that these boats introduce new variables and new threats to the public waters of New Hampshire. Our primary concerns with the use of wake boats are:

- Wake board boats often utilize ballast tanks/bags that may harbor aquatic invasive species (AIS). The tanks/bags are filled with lake or river water when in use and then emptied whenever they are trailered or moved from one waterbody to another. Even though they are "empty" the tanks/bags could contain invasive plant fragments and animal larvae, spreading them from one waterbody to another. Ballast tanks/bags are nearly impossible to clean and drain completely without professional decontamination services. There are optional filters to use on ballast tanks to prevent aquatic invasive species from entering, but we are still learning about the effectiveness of these filters.
- The impact of larger than average waves (sometimes 4 to 6 feet) on shoreline erosion.
- The danger of the waves generated by wake boats for other boaters, swimmers, and shoreline structures, such as docks, etc.

In response to receiving dozens of inquiries and complaints about these boats over the last few years from around the ate and associated with lakes of all sizes, NH LAKES has begun gathering information about the apparent or potential impacts from these boats. We have spoken with national industry groups that promote these craft and we are looking at

the efforts of environmental and safety agencies throughout North America to educate wake boat operators and try various rules changes to reduce the impacts of these watercraft. The possible solutions to the problems caused, or potentially caused by these boats, do not appear to be simple or without their own unintended consequences. Therefore NH LAKES supports further study with all interested parties. We should work together in New Hampshire to better understand the problems, and the enjoyment that these boats provide to some boaters, before proposing specific remedies to the environmental and safety issues these boats appear to be causing or making worse.

We are confident that with good data and the input of all affected and interested parties, we can gain a clearer understanding of the problem to allow us to implement common sense solutions to those problems—solutions that work for New Hampshire. To achieve that outcome, NH LAKES urges the Senate Transportation Committee to vote "ought to pass" on HB137, relative to establishing a commission to examine the effects of wake boats in the state of New Hampshire.

Dear Chairperson Watters and committee members,

Thank you for the opportunity to voice the Loon Preservation Committee (LPC)'s support for House Bill 137. LPC works to restore and protect a healthy loon population in New Hampshire, through monitoring, management, research, and education. With respect to potential impacts to loons, we emphasize the following reasons that wake boat use deserves study:

1. Nest destruction. Loon nests are exceptionally vulnerable to flooding or destruction by wave action. Because loons are adapted to swimming and diving rather than walking they move with difficulty on land, and therefore always nest close to the water's edge. Waves from boat wakes can wash over loon nests, causing them to fail in some cases. In fact, LPC field observations have been refined in the last two years to record wave action as a separate cause of nest failure, distinct from flooding with increased lake level, so that we can better track the impact of storm- or boat-induced waves. Nest failures have been attributed to boat wakes on bigger lakes where small islands favored for nesting are close to busy boating channels, for example at Plum, Gun, or Little Mile Islands on Winnipesaukee, or islands on Balch and Pine River Pond in Wakefield. These same lakes are places where wake boat use may increase the risk to vulnerable nests, and a close assessment of the potential impact is needed. Over 40% of loon nest attempts in New Hampshire fail each year, on average, from various causes. Intensive annual management of many nest sites has been needed throughout the state to aid the gradual, ongoing recovery of loons, which remain a threatened species in New Hampshire. The proposed wake boat commission would help the wider effort to identify and mitigate risks to loon nesting success.

2. Shoreline erosion and water quality. Suitable loon habitat depends in part on water clarity and other water quality parameters that can be degraded by shoreline erosion. The potential for wake boats to increase shoreline erosion is a concern for loons and other lake wildlife and deserves study.

Dear Chairman Watters and Members of the Senate Transportation Committee:

I am writing on behalf of the Audubon Society of New Hampshire in support of House Bill 137. We are a statewide non-governmental organization dedicated to protecting New Hampshire's environment for wildlife and for people.

HB 137 proposes to establish a commission to examine the effects of wake boats in the state of New Hampshire. Wake boats are a relatively new type of watercraft that contain high volume ballast systems which cause them to ride lower in the water than traditional speed boats and throw a large, high-energy wake. While these boats are very popular for wakeboarding and wake surfing, they create a number of problems.

The energy in waves generated by wake boats is substantially greater than the energy in waves that occur during intense summer thunderstorms or other high wind events on inland lakes. Lakeshore landowners (or "riparians," as they are sometimes called) will doubtless testify to the property damage and safety issues these boats can cause. I will focus on the environmental impacts.

Shoreline erosion

The larger, more intense waves generated by wake boats impact shorelines with much greater force than waves generated by conventional motorboats. This energy causes erosion of "soft" shorelines, damaging the upland through loss of soil and vegetation and damaging the waterbody through addition of sediment. In some areas this energy may be sufficient to dislodge smaller rocks along "hard" shorelines and expose the adjacent soil to erosion.

Disturbance of bottom sediments

The wake boat propulsion system generates turbulence to a much greater depth and degree than conventional boats. This strong turbulence impacts aquatic life from plankton, plants and insects to fish, turtles, and birds. This turbulence also disturbs bottom sediments, re-suspending nutrients that can increase algal blooms and growth of submerged aquatic vegetation.

Disturbed bottom sediments can be slow to settle back to the bottom, decreasing water clarity for variable periods of time.

Overwash of loon nests

The Common Loon is an iconic resident of many New Hampshire lakes and is on the New Hampshire list of Threatened Species. Loons are proficient swimmers and divers, but their anatomy makes it a challenge to walk on land. As a result, they build their nests on the water's edge, where they can easily slide into and out of the water. The intense, high waves from wake boats can flood loon nests, chilling the eggs, and even washing them from the nest. While the charge to the commission does not specifically address risks to threatened and endangered wildlife, we hope that the commission will address this issue in their discussion of shoreline erosion.

Ballast water

Wake boat ballast is stored in bags and tanks, which hold on the order of 220 to 360 gallons of water and are filled and emptied by pumps. While no one would trailer a boat without emptying the ballast, the intakes, pumps, valves, hoses, and bags or tanks cannot be expected to drain completely, and provide ample opportunity for invasive aquatic organisms to lurk. Transporting wake boats between waterbodies creates a potential avenue for the spread of invasive aquatic plants and animals that no Lake Host or boat washing program can mitigate.

We appreciate your consideration of the above recommendations and urge that you vote HB 137 Ought to Pass.

The Lakes Management Advisory Committee (LMAC) appreciates the opportunity to comment on House Bill 137, which establishes a commission to study the potential impacts of wake boats in New Hampshire. The LMAC supports this bill.

The LMAC is aware that wake boarding is one of the fastest growing water sports in New Hampshire, if not the fastest growing one. As a committee with representatives from all areas of lake interests, including marine trades, real estate, municipalities, marine patrol, and conservation, the LMAC is aware of both the economic benefit triggered by the popularity of wake boats as well as the property and environmental damage, especially erosion resulting from wave action and aquatic invasive species infestations from ballast water brought in from infected lakes, that could result from unwise use and management of these boats. The committee appreciates the reasoned approach to this issue proposed by the bill sponsors, and offers any support to the study commission that might be necessary. The LMAC looks forward to reading the final report of the Commission to Study Wake Boats.

The LMAC is a legislatively created body charged to work with the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) to administer RSA 483-A, the Lakes Management and Protection Program. The Governor and Council appointed Committee is comprised of 19 members representing academia, business, conservation organizations, lake associations, tourism, fish and game commission, marine trades, realtors, municipal government as well as several state agencies. Among its other responsibilities, the LMAC reviews legislation relevant to the Program and the state's lakes and ponds, and advises the NHDES Commissioner on the merits of such legislation.

In conclusion, the LMAC supports HB 137 because it would allow the effects of wake boats, including potential shoreline erosion and invasive species infestations caused by these boats, to be studied in more detail. This ensures that any regulations placed on these boats are effective, reasonable, and enforceable.

Dear Chair Watters and Members of the Committee:

The Rivers Management Advisory Committee (RMAC) appreciates the opportunity to comment on House Bill 137, which establishes a commission to examine the effects of wake boats in New Hampshire. The RMAC supports this bill but requests an amendment.

The RMAC believes that the issue of wake boats and their impact on lakes and rivers, including erosion and the spread of aquatic invasive species, should be examined. These water resources are in the public trust and are vital to the state's economic sectors that depend on them. The impact of wake boats should be studied with findings and recommendations for further actions, including legislation. Wake boats are operated on New Hampshire's lakes as well as impounded sections of rivers such as the Merrimack and Connecticut. These impounded portions of rivers function similarly to lakes and as such are subject to wave action from wake boats and susceptible to shoreline erosion. The RMAC requests that the bill be amended to include a representative from the New Hampshire Rivers Council, appointed by that organization.

The RMAC is a legislatively created body charged to work with the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) to administer RSA 483, the Rivers Management and Protection Program. The Governor and Council appointed Committee is comprised of members from business, agriculture, hydroelectric, municipal government, water supply, conservation, recreation, fish and game, and historical interests. Among its other responsibilities, the RMAC is charged with reviewing legislation relevant to the Program and with advising the NHDES Commissioner on the merits of such legislation.

In conclusion, the RMAC supports HB 137 establishing a commission to examine the effects of wake boats, but requests the bill be amended to include a representative appointed by the New Hampshire Rivers Council.

Dear Chair Watters and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on HB137, The Squam Lakes Association strongly supports this legislation. The Squam Lakes Association is dedicated to conserving for public benefit the natural beauty, peaceful character and resources of the watershed. In collaboration with local and state partners the SLA promotes the protection, careful use and shared enjoyment of the lakes, mountains, forests, open spaces and wildlife of the Squam Lakes region. In recent years, through comments from our membership, our community members, and through our own observations, we have become concerned about the impacts of wake boats on the Squam Lakes.

With growing use around the state and in the Squam Lakes, we are concerned that wake boats have negative impacts and threaten lake ecosystems, specifically to water quality and wildlife. Our specific concerns are:

- Water quality—turbidity: Propeller action from wake boats have the potential to reach the
 bottom sediment and cause it to resuspend in the water column. This decreases water clarity
 and can add nutrients in the water, which can fuel algal blooms. It has been documented in
 scientific studies that a decrease in water clarity can result in a decrease in lakefront property
 values.
- 2. Water quality—shoreline erosion: The larger wake created by wake boats can increase shoreline erosion. Damage to the shoreline can increase sedimentation in the water, decrease water clarity, and contribute nutrients, all impacting water quality. More erosion along the shoreline also removes the buffer. Without the buffer, stormwater can erode the shoreline further and contribute more nutrients to the lake.
- 3. Aquatic invasive species: Wake boats use ballast tanks and bags that could harbor aquatic invasive species, specifically invasive animals that are most mobile when they are in their larval stage. Ballast tanks and bags must be cleaned, drained, and dried to eliminate this threat.
- 4. Wildlife: Increased wave activity and larger wake from wake boats can negatively impact wildlife. Common loons, a threatened species in New Hampshire, nest at the water's edge in lakes throughout the state. Increased wave action threatens their ability to nest successfully. Wake boat wave action that occurs during times when the lake is at its fullest can further

- threaten nesting loons. Loons on Squam have struggled with reproductive success, and it is important we protect the habitat they require for survival.
- 5. Recreation: We have received comments and complaints that increased wave action from wake boats is impacting the recreation experience of other lake users. This unsafe wake is knocking children off of docks and rocks around the shoreline Kayakers, canoers, and paddleboarders might find it difficult to paddle through big waves. Large waves from wake boats can also damage property along the lakeshore.

With these concerns in mind, we are in full support of HB137. To manage this issue, we need to understand the impacts of wake boats in New Hampshire further. With further study and with the input of all stakeholders, we can fully understand the impacts of wake boats in our state and work to create a solution to both protect the lake ecosystems while allowing people to enjoy the recreation opportunities on the lakes. To achieve that outcome, the Squam Lakes Association urges the Senate Transportation Committee to vote "ought to pass" on HB137, relative to establishing a commission to examine the effects of wake boats in the state of New Hampshire.
