**Bill Analysis:** This bill includes animals as tangible property in a divorce settlement.

Sponsors: Rep. DeSimone

Who supports the bill: Representative DeSimone; Jay Markell; Julia Seeley, The Humane Society of the United States

#### Who opposes the bill: None

#### Summary of testimony presented in support: Representative DeSimone

- We are in a society where many couples have four legged children.
- Alaska and Illinois are the only states that have something similar to this.
- Shared a story where two parties divorced, and animals were involved. One of the animals had cancer and the two parties were both paying the medical bills and agreed to visitation. The owner with visitation did not want to pay the medical bills and took the dog to be put down without speaking with the other party.
- Another instance occurred where two parties each kept two dogs a piece. One of the dogs had problems walking and the owner that had custody said they didn't have time to care for the animal. The other party took the dog.

• There are no laws currently that consider the animals care and wellbeing.

#### Jay Markell

- This bill mimics the Alaska law, which was the first to recognize that animals are sentient beings.
- Under NH law an animal is considered the same as an end table.
- The courts need further guidance on this.
- Is directing this towards pets because they can be weaponized in a divorce or child custody proceedings.

- The dog's loss of a human is real, and a person's loss of a pet is real.
- There are approximately 27-28 statutes in NH law that deal with animals.
- The only thing that comes close to addressing this is RSA 173-B which is the domestic violence statute on animal cruelty.
- There is no companion statute to deal with this in the marital/civil context.
- This is broadly crafted for the courts to use discretion.
- This has worked well in Alaska.
- The Humane Society testified in the House that this is good language.
- California has also jumped on board with a bill this year.
- This does not give pets rights or treats them as humans.
- Illinois has a statute that went into effect earlier this year that is narrowly crafted to only cover service animals. Thinks this bill is a better approach.
- Senator Chandley asked why pets are not currently considered tangible property.
  - o They are considered tangible property, but nothing currently differentiates them from a chair. Does not want to elevate animal rights to another level because they are property, but this recognizes their welfare.
- Senator Chandley asked if the important part of the bill is that the animal's care in ownership should be taken into consideration during these proceedings.
  - Their 'wellbeing' should be considered which is necessarily broad to give the courts discretion with some needed guidance.
