This bill would not apply to individuals currently subject to an order to pay cost of care reimbursement issued prior to the effective date. The Department of Corrections assumes the two individuals currently paying cost of care would continue to pay through fiscal year 2023, the period covered by this fiscal note. One of the individuals is serving a life sentence and the other is sentenced through 2022. The Department receives 59% of the cost of care reimbursement collected by the Department of Justice and the remaining 41% is deposited into the general fund. Summary of testimony presented in support:

Representative Welch

- Current law allows the government to go after current or former inmates for the cost of their incarceration, approximately \$40,000 a year.
- This fee is not imposed by a jury, but randomly imposed by the government.
- This is setting a high and random fee that does not help with rehabilitation and is unfair.
- The Department of Corrections does not even get this money.
- Senator Levesque asked how much is received from former inmates each year.
 - Thinks there are others that can speak to that. It has only been used randomly. Thinks the statute was originally created due to an inmate that had huge medical bills.
- Senator Levesque asked if the fear of those fees could encourage people to stay in jail.

- It is hard enough for felons to get a job and then to have this huge bill is an undue burden.
- Senator Hennessey pointed out the fiscal note indicates a decrease of \$102,000. Stated that there are many fees individuals are hit with when they get out of prison and would agree that this is an important issue.

Henry Klementowicz (ACLU) (provided written testimony)

- When a person is convicted of a felony there may be a sentence of incarceration, a fine, restitution paid to a victim, forfeiture, community service, and a term of parole.
- These are all contemplated by the criminal justice system and handed down by a judge after a conviction.
- For those sued by the state there is an additional fee not contemplated by the justice system.
- The cost of incarcerating an inmate is \$40,615 per year.
- This cost of care statute is two statutes, one for current inmates and one for former inmates.
- While a person is incarcerated at the state prison and for six years after their release the Department of Corrections can file a petition seeking to have the money paid back.
- This statute is rarely used.
- Currently, there are two inmates paying for their cost of care out of a population of about 2,500.
- Mr. Eric Cable was a former inmate who filed a medical negligence claim after his release due to the loss of his peripheral vision while incarcerated.
- In response, the state filed a counter claim that would be set off against any judgment he received on his negligence claim.
- Believes this counter claim was only brought in response to Mr. Cable's lawsuit.
- Since 2008, Mr. Cable is the first and only former inmate to be targeted by this statute.
- The vast majority of those that are incarcerated are going to be released and reintegrate back into society.
- It is in everyone's best interest that that integration goes as smoothly as possible.
- These individuals are already faced with many barriers to that reintegration and these barriers are only increased by the seemingly random possibility of being targeted for their cost of care.
- The fiscal note says that over the past four years the average annual debt is \$102,000. This is not a large number of people.
- When the law is applied this infrequently there is the possibility that it seemingly is an random or arbitrary action by the government.

Eric Cable

- While incarcerated he experienced loss of his peripheral vision and filed a medical negligence claim against the state and then the state counter sued him for the cost of his care for somewhere around \$120,000.
- Currently, works two jobs, about 60 hours a week and still lives pay check to

pay check.

- Finding better employment as a convicted felon is not easy.
- Is going to school and trying to reintegrate into society as best he can.
- Allowing the state to continue this practice is only going to make his and other's reintegration harder.
- We are doing our best to try to be productive members of society.

Statement by Henry Klementowicz, Staff Attorney, ACLU-NH
Senate Judiciary Committee
House Bill 518
April 2, 2019

I submit this testimony on behalf of the American Civil Liberties Union of New Hampshire (“ACLU-NH”)—a non-partisan, non-profit organization working to protect civil liberties throughout the state for over 50 years. House Bill 518 (HB 518) would remove the ability of the Department of Corrections to sue inmates and former inmates for the cost of their incarceration. We respectfully urge the Committee to vote HB 518 *Ought to Pass*.

Under current law, the Department of Corrections can sue a current or former inmate to recover the cost of that person’s incarceration, currently \$40,615 per year. These costs are not imposed by a jury or contemplated by the criminal justice system. Instead, the statutes, RSA 622:53- :58, allow the government to sue an inmate who *has already been sentenced to a term of incarceration*, and impose additional penalties beyond prison, fines, forfeiture and restitution.

The vast majority of state prisoners will be released into society, and it is in everybody’s interest to enable these people to reintegrate into society and become productive citizens. Adding a bill of tens of thousands of dollars makes it that much harder for that to occur. Former inmates already face felony convictions and gaps in their work histories that make finding employment difficult.

ACLU-NH represents Eric Cable in *Cable v. State of New Hampshire*, 217-2018-CV-00133 in Merrimack County Superior Court, and has challenged the statutes’ application to him as an unconstitutional violation of his Right to Remedy enshrined by Part I, Article 14 of the New Hampshire Constitution. His lawsuit remains pending. Laws that are bad policy and can be used unconstitutionally should not remain on the books.

These statutes are used infrequently. The fiscal note states that only two inmates pay cost-of-care. ACLU-NH is aware of only twelve times in the past ten years that the government has sought to recover this money. In addition to not being a large source of revenue, the fact that these cases are so rarely brought means that enforcement can be arbitrary and potentially retaliatory.
