ANALYSIS

This bill establishes the New Hampshire college graduate retention incentive partnership (NH GRIP) which provides financial incentives to college graduates who are hired by participating employers and makes an appropriation to the department of business and economic affairs for that purpose.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

- 1 New Subdivision; New Hampshire College Graduate Retention Incentive Partnership (NH GRIP). Amend RSA 12-O by inserting after section 45 the following new subdivision:
 - New Hampshire College Graduate Retention Incentive Partnership (NH GRIP)
- 4 12-0:46 Definitions. In this subdivision:
- I. "Commissioner" means the commissioner of the department of business and economic affairs.
 - II. "Department" means the department of business and economic affairs.
 - III. "Eligible institution of higher education" means any public or private institution of higher education authorized to grant 2-year or 4-year degrees in this state by the higher education commission pursuant to RSA 21-N:8-a.
 - IV. "Graduate" means a student who graduates from an eligible institution of higher education in May 2019 or thereafter.
 - V. "Incentive" means a monetary award given each year for not more than 4 years by a participating employer to a graduate which the graduate may elect to be paid to the graduate or to an entity servicing the graduate's student loans.
 - VI. "Participating employer" means any person, firm, corporation, partnership, association, the state, any political subdivision of the state, or any other entity which is engaged in a business or in providing services and which employs employees in connection with such business or services who enters into a participating employer agreement to provide an incentive to a graduate.
 - VII. "Participating employer agreement" or "agreement" means an agreement prepared jointly by the department of business and economic affairs in consultation with the New Hampshire College and University Council and the Business and Industry Association of New Hampshire.
 - 12-0:47 New Hampshire College Graduate Retention Incentive Partnership Established. There is established the New Hampshire college graduate retention incentive partnership (NH GRIP) which shall be administered by the department. The purpose of NH GRIP is to recruit and retain graduates from eligible institutions of higher education and provide incentives to those graduates to work in New Hampshire.
 - 12-O:48 Requirements and Procedure. A graduate, who obtains employment with a participating employer who executes an agreement, shall receive an incentive of not less than \$1,000 each year for the first 4 years of the graduate's employment with the participating employer.

SB 12-FN-A - AS INTRODUCED - Page 2 -

The agreement shall be signed by an authorized agent of the participating employer. The participating employer shall retain a copy of each signed agreement in its files.

12-O:49 Advertising. The department shall, in cooperation with the Business and Industry Association of New Hampshire, the New Hampshire College and University Council, the New Hampshire Higher Educations Assistance Fund, the New Hampshire Coalition for Business and Education, and Stay, Work, Play NH, advertise to New Hampshire employers and New Hampshire college students the details of NH GRIP, through print and electronic media. The department shall maintain a list of employers who have a valid participating employer agreement and shall make the list available on the department's public Internet site as well as in writing.

12-0:50 Funding. For the biennium beginning July 1, 2021, and each biennium thereafter, the commissioner shall include any requests for appropriations related to NH GRIP in the biennial agency budget requests pursuant to RSA 9:4.

2 Appropriation. The sum of \$1 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020 and the sum of \$1 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2021, are hereby appropriated to the department of business and economic affairs for the purpose of advertising and disseminating information to New Hampshire college students and graduates regarding the New Hampshire college graduate retention and incentive partnership (NH GRIP) established in RSA 12-0:47. The governor is authorized to draw a warrant for said sums out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated.

3 Effective Date. This act shall take effect July 1, 2019.

METHODOLOGY:

This bill establishes the New Hampshire College Graduate Retention Incentive Partnership (NH GRIP) to be administered by the Department of Business and Economic Affairs (DBEA). The purpose of NH GRIP is to recruit and retain graduates from eligible institutions of higher education and provide incentives of not less than \$1,000 each year for the first four years of the graduate's employment with a participating employer. The graduate may elect to receive the money directly or have it remitted to the entity servicing the graduate's student loans. The DBEA indicates it will create a list of eligible employers and an agreement document template to be signed by the employer and graduate. Participating employers will be required to pay students once an agreement is signed, so the DBEA assumes it will need to create a reporting mechanism to verify that the employer is complying with the agreement and to verify the number of students and interest in the program. DBEA states that it will work with other entities to promote the program as specified.

There is a \$1 appropriation to the DBEA for the FY 2020 and FY 2021 budgets. The DBEA states the program can be absorbed within the current staff workflow and budget and any additional program needs for future years will be included in the agency biennial budget request pursuant to RSA 9:4.

Summary of testimony presented in support:

Senator Kahn

- This is a new concept for New Hampshire Employers.
- New Hampshire has a lack of workforce problem.
- 60% of New Hampshire High School students leave the state because there are not many incentives for them to stay.
- If New Hampshire High School students do stay in New Hampshire for college, 70% of them will remain in New Hampshire afterwards.
- 41 other states provide an income tax deduction for students, New Hampshire has

- nothing of this sort.
- This bill intends to provide incentives.
- This process is a simple opt-in agreement with employers who agree to provide New Hampshire graduates \$1000 to them or their loan lender for their first 4 years of employment.
- The business website Live Free would display the GRIP link on their page. Live Free would define the program and link potential employees and applicants to companies that offer the incentive.
- The New Hampshire College Council additionally could send a letter to all college juniors to make them aware of this incentive.
- The \$1000 amount is the floor and can be raised.
- Senator Starr asked if \$1000 is enough of an incentive for students to stay.
 - 51000 may not be enough, but it is enough for a college student to consider staying in the state. The ability to say New Hampshire has incentives is a great start to retaining students.

Will Arvelo - State of New Hampshire Division of Economic Development

- As a department, they are in support of this bill.
- The huge problems in New Hampshire's workforce is seen every day.
- This will not solve the problem, but it will be a tool they can utilize to get students to stay here after college.
- Senator Kahn asked what is the number one concern his department faces.
 - O Workforce is the immediate concern of companies across the state. Numerous companies are having trouble expanding because they cannot find the work force. As a department, they focus work across the state to bring attention to this problem. They have begun working on a program matching mature employees, who are close to retirement, with younger employees to pass on their expertise.
 - If nothing is done in 20 years, the state will be short about 60 thousand workers.
- Senator Kahn asked if he could summarize the fiscal note.
 - The department is hoping it will not be a significant financial burden to the department. The department will have to build the website and recruit businesses to participate.

David Juvet - Business and Industry Association

- The Business and Industry Association is in support of this bill.
- The Business and Industry Association has 425 employers as members.
- Every two years the association engages in a discussion to determine what their main concerns are.
- Last summer the association identified the lack of workforce and quality of workforce as the most significant concerns.

- Those who participate in these discussions are both older mature workers and emerging leaders. The emerging leaders identified school debt as their most important concern.
- That is why BIA is supporting this bill, it will assist in bridging the gap.
- This bill will help with the communication breakdown which now occurs between students who are looking for employment and businesses that need them.

Will Stewart - Stay, Work, Play

- Stay, Work, Play is in support of this bill.
- New Hampshire needs all the educated young people they can get.
- This bill is one tool that can help to increase the state's workforce.

Mike Vlacich - New Hampshire College & University Council

- The NHCUC is in support of this bill.
- It is an important tool to attract students to our schools by letting them know there are pathways to employment.
- Senator Kahn asked if his 21 institutions will promote and work together on this program.
 - The NHCUC has many partnerships that can move this forward.
 - The state tourism department can make NH an attractive place to learn. A number of internet-based systems and the largest career fair in the state can help to get the word out about these incentives.

On behalf of Stay Work Play New Hampshire, a statewide nonprofit whose mission is to attract and retain more young people in the Granite State, please accept this letter in support of Senate Bill 12.

Senate Bill 12 would establish the New Hampshire College Graduate Retention Incentive Partnership (NH GRIP) which would provide financial incentives to college graduates who are hired by participating employers.

And as the state with the second oldest average age in the country with one of the lowest unemployment rates, New Hampshire's economy needs every young, educated person we can get. As such, we must explore all potential options to address the state's student debt crisis. The NH GRIP program is one such way of addressing this issue.

As a state with one of the lowest per capita expenditures on higher education, it is no coincidence that New Hampshire has one of the highest average per capita student debt loads in the nation. And this student debt load is not just a major burden to many young New Hampshire residents; it has the potential to further negatively impact the entire state's economy as the years progress.

While other states can offer income tax breaks for student loan repayment, New Hampshire can offer no such benefit and is currently at a competitive disadvantage in this area. However, with only a very minimal investment from the State, NH GRIP would leverage and encourage the private sector's creation and expansion of student debt repayment benefits for their employees.

For these reasons, Stay Work Play asks your support of Senate Bill 12. Thank you for your consideration.

New Hampshire College Graduate Retention Incentive Partnership - SB 12

What we know:

- If in-state high school graduates attend a NH two or four-year college and graduates from that college, 70% will remain in state for employment.
- A majority of NH college students graduated from out-of-state high schools, and of those graduating from a NH college, only around 15% remain in-state.
- 41 states offer incentives for college graduates to remain in-state mostly because they can
 offer income-tax breaks for loan repayment that mirror federal tax returns. NH, with no
 income tax and lacking state funded retention incentives, doesn't even appear on the map.
- NH public colleges and universities have the highest or 2nd highest price in the nation and its college graduates have the highest debt at graduation of any state in the nation.
- Graduates from in-state two and four-year college colleges, once employed in-state, have a higher employee retention rate.

Goal: Retain more college students in NH after graduation.

- NH GRIP is a unique business, education and government collaboration to fill the lack of state retention incentives.
- Demonstrate NH government as a partner in workforce recruiting.
- Create a NH advantage that distinguishes NH from other states.

Means:

- Produce a simple opt-in statement for NH employers to agree to pay recent NH college graduates a \$1,000 incentive at the end of each year of employment for four years. The incentive can be a bonus or a direct payment to a lender. NH Department of Economic Development, New Hampshire College and University Council, and NH Business and Industry Association collaborate on designing the agreement.
- Department of Business and Economic Affairs advertises on its Live Free website all employers participating in NH GRIP, including hot links to employer websites and markets to high school and college students. NH Stay, Work, Play will also market this on their website. DRED's fiscal note shows no additional administrative cost.
- New Hampshire College and University Council members, 21 colleges and universities, market the incentives and GRIP employers to NH high school and college juniors.
- NH GRIP is an on-switch, to help high school juniors include NH Colleges and NH employers in their school to career planning and transitions.
