Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

The Department indicates there would be no revenue generated as a result of the bill and estimated the cost of the positions would be \$220,000 in FY 2020 and \$224,000 in FY 2021.

The Judicial Council reports this bill will increase state expenditures for the indigent defense system under two conditions: 1) the additional attorneys established in this bill result in more prosecutions of the approximately 128 cold cases in NH; and 2) the defendants being prosecuted cannot afford an attorney. The Council reports an average homicide takes approximately 635 total attorney hours in the public defense system. Some elasticity exists in the Public Defender Program to absorb additional cases without an increase in state appropriations. However, the Council reports cold cases are significantly more labor intensive due to: witnesses being difficult to locate; memories are not as fresh; the quality of physical evidence may have deteriorated, which may require expert services; and cases are more likely to go to trail due to issues within the Public Defender Program, a prosecution with multiple co-defendants would be appointed under the assigned council program. The assigned counsel is reimbursed at a rate of \$100 an hour for homicides and other serious felonies. The Council has limited examples of cold cases paid within assigned council program. However, two recent cases with assigned counsel, which were not technically cold cases but had delayed prosecutions, cost approximately \$200,000 per

case in legal representation and expert services.

In addition to impacts on the Judicial Council, this bill contains penalties that may have an impact on other aspects of the New Hampshire judicial and correctional systems. There is no method to determine how many charges would be brought as a result of the changes contained in this bill to determine the fiscal impact on expenditures. However, the entities impacted have provided the potential costs associated with these penalties below.

Summary of testimony presented in support: Senator Bradley

- There have been two gruesome murders in Wolfeboro that remain unsolved, which is a prime example for why this bill is necessary.
- This bill was requested by the Attorney General and it will fund two positions in the Attorney General's Office to pursue cold cases throughout the state.
- Cold case units have unearthed a lot of evidence across the country and people have been brought to justice through the use of new techniques like DNA.
- In regard to the two Wolfeboro cases, at the time they occurred there was not adequate staffing to keep up with the daily workload and these cold cases.

- The victims' families and the victims themselves deserve to have these cases pursued.
- The cost of \$225,000 is very manageable.

Attorney General Gordon MacDonald and Associate Attorney General Jeff Strezen (Attorney General's Office) (provided written testimony)

- The role of the Attorney General includes a specific charge to prosecute all persons accused of crimes punishable with life imprisonment or death.
- NH averages about 25 homicides a year, which are managed by five lead prosecutors in the homicide unit.
- When there is a suspected homicide, a lead attorney, an assistant, and a victim witness advocate deploy to address that crime.
- Those prosecutors will stay with the investigation through the appeals process; and the victim witness advocate will stay with family until the conclusion of the matter.
- It is inevitable that some cases go cold, which means 'when the original homicide investigation does not result in an arrest and due to a lack of viable or unexplored leads, the case has lost its initial momentum.'
- In 2012 is a dedicated cold case unit was formed in the Attorney General's Office and at the State Police largely by federal funds, which have since dried up.
- After the federal funding ran out, given the work load the homicide unit has, the Office has lost the dedicated focus for cold cases.
- There are 128 cold cases in NH and basically one cold case attorney.
- Cold cases exist across every corner of the State.
- These cases are extremely difficult due to memories fading, the lack of leads, the lack of forensic evidence, and the death of witnesses.
- However, a cold case unit can succeed due new forensics, new leads can develop, and relationships can change where witnesses come forward as allegiances can change with the passage of time.
- Funding this unit is necessary because there are dangerous offenders who are walking free, the victims deserve justice, the families deserve answers, and there is no statute of limitations on homicides.
- This bill will bring in two new attorneys who will work closely with the investigating agencies and make critical legal decisions as these investigations unfold.
- There are many victims in our State who deserve answers and who should expect us to do better in prosecuting these cases.
- Senator Chandley asked what the structure will be beyond these two attorneys.
 - The Unit has partners at State Police. However, not every murder in the State is investigated by State Police, so they also work with local agencies. The Attorney General's Office currently has one attorney that is basically assigned to cold cases. There is a need for additional resources to address these cases.
- Senator French asked how many cold cases have been solved in the last five years.
 - A handful of cases. These prosecutors will be able to examine the current cold cases to see which ones are no longer viable or ones that can be closed

since the perpetrator is deceased. This will result in separating the cases out, so that resources are targeted at cases that look viable for prosecution.

- Senator French asked how many have been prosecuted.
 - Associate Attorney General Strezen answered that he has done four in the past 18 years. These prosecutors are also handling various other cases that emerge including, active investigations, death investigations, missing persons, and officer involved shootings. The current prosecutors must squeeze in the time to work on these cold cases with the investigators who are dealing with the same time constraints.
- Senator French asked about the one attorney dedicated to cold cases.
 - That was done recently, but that attorney also has a current case load left over. All prosecutors in the Office attempt to work on cold cases if they can.
- Senator French asked if these two additional attorneys would exclusively be doing cold cases.
 - o Yes.
- Senator Levesque asked how the legislature will be kept appraised regarding the work these new prosecutors will be doing.
 - The Attorney General's Office tries to be as transparent as possible. The Office does release information when it is appropriate and there is a section on the Attorney General's website for the cold case unit.
- Senator Chandley asked how it was determined that two additional prosecutors should be hired.
 - When these cases go to trial they are staffed with at least two attorneys and the trial can take 2-4 weeks. With three dedicated prosecutors, one would still be free to move forward on other cases.
- Senator Hennessey asked if these two prosecutors would be solely to address the backlog or would they be indefinite additions to the staff.
 - Would recommend seeing so how far this investment goes over the next biennium and then come back with further recommendations.
- Senator Levesque asked if there is also a need for more detectives to investigate these cases.
 - Would defer to the Department of Safety but imagines that they could use additional dedicated cold case resources.
- Senator French asked if the prosecutor that is currently assigned to cold cases would continue to work in that unit if this bill passes.
 - The Office would continue to dedicate that resource to cold cases at their discretion. Would note that the Fiscal Note has a typo, that says these positions will work on 'solved' cases and it should say 'unsolved' cases.

Jessica Eskeland (NHCADSV) (provided written testimony)

- The NHCADSV worked with survivors of crime, advocates, and lawmakers to establish the cold case unit.
- This is an opportunity to bring justice to families.
- This is a public safety issue with 128 potential violent offenders walking free. Lisa and Charlie Post (provided written testimony)

- Shared the story of her sister Lynn's murder in 2010 and the impact that has had on the whole family.
- The harsh reality is that someone is out there walking around who has not been held accountable for her murder.
- It is hard to move forward when there are no answers.
- Lynn's case went cold in 2016 and they met with the cold case unit back in November and felt so much hope, but then another case came along, and the Unit had to focus on that.

• A resolution will bring peace and give these families the ability to move forward. Rick Page (provided written testimony)

- His father, Walter, was stabbed to death in 1995.
- He was a WWII war hero and a pillar in the community.
- His family has continued to solicit assistance from the Attorney General Office, but the lack of resources has stalled efforts.
- These additional attorneys will help to solve these crimes and bring these people to justice.
- Believes that his father's murderer is still alive and could be brought to justice.

Ken and Madeline Dionne (provided written testimony)

- His sister Roberta was murdered in her home in 2010.
- All victims have the right to representation.
- The cold case unit was funded in 2010 and those funds ran out in 2013 and then there was a part-time attorney until 2016.
- From 2016 until just recently there was no one to prosecute cold cases.
- The cold case division at State Police has two full time detectives and two parttime detectives.
- These detectives are not allowed to work overtime unless there are extenuating circumstances, like a major crime.
- His sister's case is on its fifth lead detective.
- Many of these detectives do not remain in the unit for very long since they cannot make enough money in that unit and they get promotions.
- There is a need more manpower, as the current workforce can never meet the demand.
- Understands that there is a budget surplus and would ask to amend the bill to get funding for more detectives.

Janet Gloddy Young and Leanne Beaubeducet (provided written testimony)

- Her sister Kathy was murdered in 1971.
- There are more than 100 families who are waiting to fight for justice.
- The Attorney General's Office needs more attorneys and more victim advocates to solve these cases.
- Franklin has never been same since Kathy's murder.
- Senator French applauded them for their efforts and for not giving up.

Major John Encarnacao and Lieutenant John Sonia (State Police)

- Personally, supports the bill and was one of the original members of the cold case unit.
- Manpower is the key, as there is not enough prosecutors or investigators.

- When a homicide occurs a lot of resources go forward, and many times the cold case investigators get pulled to those cases.
- Active cases are investigated by the entire unit, while cold case homicides are investigated by a single investigator and several part-time investigators.
- Would request dedicated funds for additional investigators into the cold case unit at State Police.
- These additional prosecutors are going to help, but there is a need for legs on the ground that are going to dig into the cases.
- When working on a cold case, as an investigator, one would start looking at the case and then an active case would pull them in.
- These cases are never forgotten, and officers are constantly trying to get back into them, but there are not enough resources.
- Senator Levesque asked if these two attorneys will make a dent in the cold cases or are more people needed.
 - Major Encarnacao answered that in his opinion it will certainly help but the real fix would be to also add more investigators.
 - Lt. Sonia added that these two positions are essential due to the uniqueness of cold cases.
- Senator Levesque asked about the make up of the cold case unit at State Police.
 - There are two full-time slots and two part-time slots. Also recently brought on a part-time analyst to bring the information on these cases together and assist with research. In the past they have had volunteers, but they found out that it was not actually allowed so ended up contracting them for scanning and filing reports.

Lieutenant Sean Ford (Concord Police Department)

- There is a need for extra people to run down these leads.
- These are enormous investigations and the State. has the greatest obligation to support these cases moving forward.
- Sometimes if there is no family and these investigators are the only ones advocating for these victims.

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Good morning, Senators. My name is Janet Gloddy Young. I am the sister of Kathy Gloddy. I last saw my sister alive on Sunday, November 21st 1971, when she left to go to the store in our hometown of Franklin New Hampshire. She never came home that night.

Kathy's body was found the next day in the woods off Chance Pond Road. She was beaten. She was repeatedly raped. And the people who did this to her then ran her over. Her case has never been solved, but I know in my heart that it still can be.

In 2009 I worked to pass a bill to create the State's 1st Cold Case Unit. I'm now back here, 10 years later, to ask you to expand this unit because there are more than 100 families like mine that are still waiting and fighting for justice.

The cold case unit desperately needs more attorneys, and it also needs more victim advocates to work with families like mine. More resources to solve these cases will guarantee that more of these cases are investigated and prosecuted.

I will never give up faith that the people who killed my sister will be brought to justice. I'm begging for your help to make this happen. Please vote to pass this bill to allow closure for our all of our families, and to bring to justice to those who have taken them from us.

Good Morning. My name is Lisa Post. I live in Lyndeborough New Hampshire. I am here today because my sister Lynne Melk Brennan was an innocent victim who was brutally murdered in her home in October 2010. Her case remains unsolved 9 years later. Lynne was in the final stage of her divorce when she moved into a Victorian home on River Road in Manchester to begin a new chapter in her life just weeks before she was killed.

I pray you will never know the pain and suffering our family has endured not knowing who killed Lynne and why along with the harsh reality that no one has been held accountable for taking her life. Our family is devastated, torn apart and our lives will never be the same again with the knowledge her killer remains out in the public and unaccountable for the crime of ending her life.

My sister Lynne was a devoted mother and wife who loved her children, family, friends and her life in Hudson, New Hampshire where she raised her family. She was an active member of her community and church. Lynne loved to make everything around her beautiful whether it was decorating her home, gardening or cooking. Lynne no longer celebrates birthdays, holidays and the milestones of her children with us. In the past 9 years since her murder, Lynne missed two of her children's college graduations and marriages. She was not by their side as they experienced these important moments without the love and support of their mother, and they did not get to experience her pride and joy at their accomplishments. She will never get to be a doting grandparent, which we always talked about and looked forward to.

Unsolved murders in New Hampshire tear at the fabric of our society. We lose confidence in the police as they stop following up on leads, push away our inquiries and walk away from actively pursuing justice because their case loads are high and funding is inadequate. The case goes cold along with the trust and confidence in our government.

The chief of police stated to the public in Lynne's case, as they often do, that there is no risk to the greater community. The message is, don't worry, this won't happen to you. Until it does!

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For the past several years, my sister's case sat in a box somewhere gathering dust while her murderer lives with the security that no one is pursuing them.

We began work with the Cold Case Unit in the fall of 2018 and felt someone cared again. They began to actively pursue her case and we felt hopeful and saw the possibility of resolution and peace, only to be told a couple months later that another case had taken precedence because there is not enough manpower to handle the case loads.

While it may be hard to find incremental funding for the many projects and services that compete for the same limited resources, a key reason that the public supports government is for safety and justice. When horrific crimes are committed the mandate of public safety is not met when murderers walk free after taking the lives of innocent people.

The Cold Case Unit continues to pursue justice but they are desperately in need of funding in order to hire additional personnel to handle the large backlog of New Hampshire's unsolved cases. No one should be able to get away with murder. The families of unsolved murder victims will never give up in the pursuit of justice.

I am counting on this committee to assure that the State has the same commitment to its citizens by funding the Cold Case Unit. You have the ability to take action to provide the necessary resources to solve cases which brings the hope of justice, resolution and peace to move forward for Lynne's family and the many families that are victims of unsolved cases.

My name is Rick Page.

Over 23 years ago on December 14, 1995, my father Walter H. Page was murdered in his Manchester home. My father was a WWII veteran and pillar of the community. My father was stabbed to death and then to cover up and hide any evidence of the brutal murder, his home of 45 years was set on fire and destroyed! They enormity of our loss has been immeasurable.

My family has continued over and over for the past 23 years to solicit assistance from the Attorney General's office to resolve this unsolved murder. Time and time again, lack of resources has stalled efforts to bring my father's murderer to justice.

On behalf of the Walter H Page family, I strongly urge the State to provide funding for additional staff. It is our hope that the individual or individuals involved in this extremely savage murder will finally be brought to justice and provide closure to my family.

My name is Ken Dionne

I would like to start by expressing my condolences to all the other families of victims that are here today.

My sister Roberta "Bobbie Miller " was murdered in her home on Oct 31st 2010. Bobbie was your average girl, one of my 5 sisters, never been in trouble in her life, always willing to go the extra mile to help a friend or neighbor.

I am here today with my mother and sisters to plead with you to please move this Senate bill 130 forward.

ALL Victims have the right to representation.

Most of you are probably not aware that right up until recent months, there has been no one to prosecute cold case homicides.

Some of you are probably thinking right this minute , That can't be true, this guy has got to be wrong.

Well I'm not wrong. Within the last few months, Assistant AG Susan Morrill has been assigned full time to the cold case unit. That being said, she still has other cases outside of cold case still on her schedule. In essence, we still don't have a full time prosecutor.

The cold case division was funded by a federal grant, that money ran out in 2013. From that point on we had a part time prosecutor until 2016, Then we had no prosecutor for over two years, now we have Susan, essentially part time.

We have two full time detectives and one part timer that aren't allowed to work overtime unless there are extenuating circumstances. (This is no different than having a car with no gas, it can't go anywhere)

At this time, Bobbies case is now on it's 5th lead detective. These guys all transferout of the dept because they can't make any money to support their own families. Why, no funding, no money. You have no idea how hard it is on a family member to be told the detective that they have bonded with and are so hopefully looking to for answers is no longer with them. I'm going to repeat what I just said a moment ago, "up until recent months there was NO ONE to prosecute cold cases" for at least two years "

I am asking you to please keep in mind when you cast your vote in favor of this bill, The present work force can Never meet the present volume of work. (money problem)

A single prosecutor will Never be able to handle the work load ahead of them. At this time, there are 126 cold cases. (once again, a money problem)

The state presently has a budget surplus, this must be made a priority, ALL victims have the right to representation.

The last thing I'm going to ask you is to please take a good look at my mother standing here besides me. She's going to be 89 years old in 3 weeks, she's been waiting patiently for answers for 8 years.

Please think of you own family and how you would feel if you were in our shoes. You can't possibly imagine the hardship that goes along with something like this.

Good morning Madam Chair, and members of the Committee,

For the record, my name is Jessica Eskeland and I am the Public Policy Specialist at the NH Coalition Against Domestic and Sexual Violence. The Coalition is the umbrella organization for 13 independent crisis centers located throughout the state. Last year, our crisis centers served over 15,000 victims of domestic and sexual violence, child abuse, human trafficking, and stalking. I am here today to testify in support of SB 130.

The Coalition worked with lawmakers, victims' families, and advocates to establish the Cold Case Unit at the Department of Justice in 2009. This was a critical development because when a case remains unsolved, it inevitably makes its way to storage as more cases come up—often left to languish unsolved for years due to lack of time and resources on behalf of law enforcement and investigators. Sadly, this leaves victims' loved ones still searching for answers, and the likelihood they'll ever get them seems more and more remote.

With the establishment of the Cold Case Unit, there was fresh hope brought to these unsolved cases, as a four-person team comprised of three detectives and a prosecutor took on the task of solving these cold cases.
