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Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

- 1 Short Title. This act shall be known as the "Low-Income Community Solar Act of 2019."
- 2 Net Energy Metering; Group Host; Community Solar. Amend RSA 362-A:9, XIV(c) to read as 2 . follows:
 - (c) Notwithstanding paragraph V, a group host shall be paid for its surplus generation at the end of each billing cycle at rates consistent with the credit the group host receives relative to its own net metering under either subparagraph IV(a) or (b) or alternative tariffs that may be applicable pursuant to paragraph XVI. [Each group member of] Alternatively, a group host [for a low moderate income community solar project, as defined in RSA 362 F:2, X-a,] may elect to receive credits on the customer electric bill for each member and the host[, provided that there shall be only one new project under this paragraph in each utility's service territory by December 31, 2019 with such projects available on a first-come, first served-basis] according to an amount or percentage specified for each member on PUC form 909.09 (Application to Register or Re-register as a Host), along with a 3 cent per kwh addition for low-moderate income community solar projects, as defined in RSA 362-F:2, X-a. The commission shall report on the costs and benefits of [such-projects] low-moderate income community solar projects, as defined in RSA 362-F:2, Xa on or before December 31, 2019. There shall be at least 3 new low-moderate income community solar projects each year in each utility's service territory beginning January 1, 2020. On an annual basis, for all group host systems except for residential systems with an interconnected capacity under 15 kilowatts, the electric distribution utility shall calculate a payment adjustment if the host's surplus generation for which it was paid is greater than the group's total electricity usage during the same time period. The adjustment shall be such that the resulting compensation to the host for the amount that exceeded the group's total usage shall be at the utility's avoided cost or its default service rate in accordance with subparagraph V(b) or paragraph VI or alternative tariffs that may be applicable pursuant to paragraph XVI. The utility shall pay or bill the host accordingly.
 - 3 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.

Summary of testimony presented in support:

Dan Feltes

NH Senate District 15

- NH's solar market should develop in a way that it benefits everyone.
- SB 165 builds off the successes of SB 129 (2017):
 - o SB 129 required no more than 15% of the Renewable Energy Fund (REF) be distributed on an annual basis to benefit low-moderate income residential customers.
 - o SB 129 inserted a consumer protection provision for projects involving net metering.

- o SB 129 also required one low-moderate income community solar project in each utility's service territory by December 31st, 2019. By all accounts, there are three successful community solar projects around the state.
- However, community solar still faces barriers. Therefore, SB 165 does the following:
 - o Allows the possibility of on-bill crediting for group customers.
 - o Incentive or an adder of \$0.03 cents for per kwh.
 - o Requires at least three new low-moderate income community solar projects each year in each utility's service territory beginning January 1st, 2020.
- Concerns with SB 165:
 - o PUC recommends changing the start date of the report on line 16 from December 31st, 2019 to July 1st, 2020. The three low income solar facilities that have been developed with grants from the REF are scheduled to file an annual report with the commission in February 2020. Changing the report date to July 1st, 2020 will allow PUC staff to provide a more meaningful report using actual data.
 - o Some smaller public utilities may argue that the requirement for at least three new low-moderate income community solar projects each year may be difficult for them to achieve. Rather than a general directive, the language could be altered to allow the PUC to facilitate the development of such projects.
 - o Offering on-bill crediting to the group member rather than the group host can be problematic for some utilities. The concerns regarding this issue are minimal compared to the benefits offered through low-moderate community solar projects.

Madeleine Mineau - provided written testimony Executive Director, Clean Energy NH

- SB 165 would go a long way in expanding low-moderate income community solar beyond the RPS's grant award program.
- On-bill crediting is important for low-income group members.
- While there are issues with utility billing systems, it is long past due that they upgrade their billing systems. There is a need for grid modernization, including modern billing and unique energy arrangements. The PUC has realized the importance of on-bill crediting.
- Offered a letter from Residential Owned Communities in support of SB 165.

Dan Weeks

Director of Market Development, ReVision Energy

• Reiterated supportive comments made by Senator Feltes and Ms. Mineau.

Summary of testimony presented in opposition:

Donna Gamache

Director of Government Affiars, Eversource

- Concern resides on management billing of net metering systems other companies in other states have had massive problems. It would require \$500,000 to upgrade Eversource's billing systems, or to hire three full time employees to manage it manually.
- Disputes between the group host and the group members are a constant issue for Eversource.
- Eversource is interested in exploring a pilot program to seek out ways to manage the billing for these projects.
- Eversource has submitted a pilot program to the PUC for their approval with regard to their low-moderate community solar project. Eversource is looking to work with the local Community Action Program (CAP) agency to make sure that community members get a credit on their bill. They also want to make their energy efficiency programs accessible for community members.
- Senator Watters asked if there are examples from other states that Eversource could look to in regards to their billing systems.
 - o Ms. Gamache said many other states have similar requirements to SB 165. Those systems are not going well for group members and the utilities. Eversource could look into other examples and see what works.

- Senator Bradley asked what Ms. Gamache would like the committee to change in SB 165.
 - o Ms. Gamache said lines 4 to 14 would need to be addressed. The language could be changed to require a pilot or a stakeholder forum with a deadline to better address the issue.
- Senator Fuller Clark summarized her understanding: Eversource would like to have an alternative billing process, but does not know what that billing process should look like.
 - o Ms. Gamache said Eversource would prefer to continue offering the net metering credits to the group host and let the group host figure out, according to their own contract, the credit distribution. The group host also knows who has moved in and out of an area. If the committee does not approve, Eversource would like to find a middle ground between this option and offering credits directly to the group member.
- Senator Feltes asked if offering the credits directly to the group member mitigates some of the
 disputes between the group host and the group member. Currently, the group host manages the
 credits, but Eversource still gets complaints from group members.
 - o Ms. Gamache said their program is bigger in Eversource and it is not working. Group members often move and do not notify the utility. Some group members believe they should get a bigger credit than what they get.
- Senator Bradley asked where the three low-moderate community solar projects, as a result of SB 129 (2017), currently stand in NH.
 - o Ms. Gamache said she was not sure of the specifics of each project. For Eversource, they are exploring a pilot program and waiting for approval from the PUC. Once approved, Eversource will offer a request for proposal (RFP) to find the right location and move forward.
- Senator Bradley asked if the group host will manage the bill credits in their new pilot program.
 - o Ms. Gamache said Eversource is doing it differently. Eversource would partner with the local CAP to make sure that the group members receive a credit. Eversource will also promote their energy efficiency programs with these communities.

Howell Montgomery

Manager, Government Affairs, Liberty Utilities

- There is a significant cost to implement the billing provisions of SB 165. It takes twenty minutes to process one group member's bill each month. Adding more group members will make the process more burdensome.
- The obligation to complete three new low-moderate income community solar projects every year
 would be difficult Liberty Utilities has about 45,000 customers. Eversource has ten times that
 number. There are different customer bases across the different public utilities.
- Liberty Utilities would welcome a proceeding at the PUC on how best to deploy low-moderate
 income community solar and what the best adder should be. SB 165 could be amended to spell
 out that process at the PUC.
- Senator Feltes asked if Mr. Montgomery was aware that there has already been a stakeholder process on community solar, including the discussion of a 3 cent per kwh adder.
 - o Mr. Montgomery said that was the case, but the deployment has not been fully vetted.
- Senator Feltes said the legislature and the PUC create new requirements every year for billing and the management of new systems. However, public utilities always oppose low-moderate income community solar projects. He asked why public utilities oppose efforts like SB 165.
 - o Mr. Montgomery said there were a lot of mechanisms to consider and public utilities are not yet equipped to handle certain billing schemes. For Liberty Utilities, Mr. Montgomery spent time with their customer service team. SB 165 is not workable. None of the states they operate in have on-bill crediting. Switching them over would be expensive. It is not something that could be done just for NH. Their entire IT system would need to be overhauled.
- Senator Fuller Clark asked what solution Liberty Utilities would recommend for on-bill crediting.
 - o Mr. Montgomery said it made sense for the group host to manage the bill crediting. They are more knowledgeable about the contract and know which group members are entering or leaving the system. They are contractually obligated to handle it.

- · Senator Fuller Clark asked if Mr. Montgomery was aware where that worked in other states.
 - o Mr. Montgomery said in most other states, it is left to the group host to administer it.

Neutral Information Presented:

Karen Cramton

Director, Sustainable Energy Division, New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission (PUC)

- Senator Feltes asked about the status of the three low-moderate community solar projects.
 - o Ms. Cramton said 2018 was the first year of the low-moderate income community solar program through the REF. The PUC determined the best way to manage that program was through a competitive RFP. The PUC received five proposals and selected three. All projects were approved by Governor and Council.
 - o All three projects are live and operational:
 - Mascoma Meadows in Lebanon, NH (Liberty Utilities): A 100 kw array helps
 roughly 50 manufactured homes. It is a complicated model, but customers
 receive a rent reduction through the proceeds they get. The PUC must be
 careful with how benefits are distributed it could increase a member's income
 and impact other benefits unrelated to their energy use.
 - Plymouth Area Renewable Energy Initiative in Plymouth, NH (NH Electric Co-Op): This model is similar to the one proposed under SB 165. Group members receive on-bill credits are given to twenty qualified low-moderate income residents. It is a subscription model residents are on the array for two years, learning about energy efficiency. Their shares could be passed onto another after two years.
 - Laconia Regional Community Development in Laconia, NH: The group host took over the electric bills of all group members and installed six rooftop solar arrays.
 The group host distributes all credits to the group members in the form of rent reduction.
 - o The PUC recently received, for its second year, new RFPs. The PUC will review them and announce them.
- Senator Feltes said there has to be consideration with how the benefits flow. He asked Ms. Cramton to speak to that, as well as the notion that on-bill crediting creates conflict.
 - o Ms. Cramton said the PUC learned that income-based benefits can be impacted if group members receive a check. On-bill credits help eliminate that problem and prevent it from being treated as income.
 - o As far as disputes, the PUC does not have virtual net metering. In regards to group net metering, the PUC does not receive a lot of complaints about it. Those agreements are outside of the PUC. It is up to the utility and the group host to manage.
- Senator Feltes asked if the three cent per kwh adder could be done, whether there is an on-bill credit election or not.
 - o Ms. Cramton said there could be tariff of three cents, if that was what was required.

To the Committee:

Public Utilities Commission staff thanks you for the opportunity to offer the following comments with regard to the bills that Senate Energy & Natural Resources will hear tomorrow, March 12.

SB72: The Public Utilities Commission intends to recommend that the net metering credit in RSA 362-F:6, II-a be revised rather than repealed. Specifically, the commission will recommend reducing the applicable capacity factor, which will have the effect of reducing the credit. Eliminating the credit would cause ratepayers to pay more for RPS compliance than would modifying the capacity factor even though many of the net-metered facilities upon which the credit is based have received rebates from the renewable energy fund (which is ultimately funded through higher rates). If the net metering credit remains in statute, the commission intends to adopt procedures that will make its calculation less administratively burdensome for utilities and commission staff.

SB124: Commission staff does not understand the calculations in the proposed amendment to RSA 362-F:3, I (b) (Lines 8-11 of the bill). We have tried running the numbers several ways but cannot reconcile the yearly increases with the overall increases by 2040. However, if we use the percentage increases specified in the bill, and treat Class I useful thermal as a "carve out" of Class I (as it is normally treated), we calculate a total for Class I of 28.5 percent and for Class I useful thermal of 5.6 percent. Consequently, we would recommend that you replace 31.5 percent with 28.5 percent and 5.2 percent with 5.6 percent on Line 11 of the bill.

SB165: Commission staff would recommend that you change the date of the report on line 16 of the bill from December 31, 2019 to July 1, 2020. The three low income solar facilities that have been developed using grants from the renewable energy fund are scheduled to file an annual report with the commission in February, 2020. Changing the report date to July 1, 2020 will allow commission staff to provide a more meaningful report using actual data.

SB168: Commission staff would recommend changing Lines 11 and 12 of the bill to read: "percent beginning in 2025. Classes III and IV shall remain at the same percentages from 2015 through 2025 except as provided in RSA 362-F:4, V-VI." This technical change is due because of the passage of time. The construction currently in the bill made sense prior to 2019 (see Line 9), but no longer does now that we are in the midst of that year.

Karen Cramton would like to speak to SB72 and SB124, as the commission's positions on those bills bear some explanation. With regard to SB165 and SB168, Karen will be at the hearings and available to answer questions should you have any.
