ANALYSIS

This bill inserts definitions of small unmanned aircraft and small unmanned aircraft system into the New Hampshire Aeronautics Act and authorizes the commissioner of the department of transportation to regulate small unmanned aircraft systems.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

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1 New Paragraphs; New Hampshire Aeronautics Act; Definitions. Amend RSA 422:3 by inserting after paragraph XXVII the following new paragraphs:

XXVII-a. "Small unmanned aircraft" means an unmanned aircraft weighing less than 55 pounds, including everything onboard or attached to the aircraft, which can be flown without the possibility of direct human intervention from within or on the aircraft.

XXVII-b. "Small unmanned aircraft system" means a small unmanned aircraft and its associated elements, including communication links and the components that control the small unmanned aircraft, that are required for the safe and efficient operation of the small unmanned aircraft.

- 2 New Paragraph; New Hampshire Aeronautics Act; Definitions. Amend RSA 422:3 by inserting after paragraph XXIX the following new paragraph:
- XXX. "Unmanned aircraft" means an aircraft operated without the possibility of direct human intervention from within or on the aircraft.
- 3 New Hampshire Aeronautics Act; Duties of Commissioner. Amend RSA 422:4, VI to read as follows:
- VI. Effecting uniformity in the regulations pertaining to the operation of aircraft by adopting uniform rules consistent with federal regulations and making noncompliance with federal regulations a violation of state law, thereby enabling the law enforcement agencies of the state to enforce the laws regulating the operation of aircraft. For the purposes of this paragraph, aircraft shall include ultralight vehicles as defined in 14 C.F.R. part 103 and small unmanned aircraft systems as defined in 14 C.F.R. parts 101 and 107 and in RSA 422:3.
 - 4 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.

Bill Analysis: This bill inserts definitions of small unmanned aircraft and small unmanned aircraft system into the New Hampshire Aeronautics Act and authorizes the commissioner of the department of transportation to regulate small unmanned aircraft systems.

Summary of testimony presented:

Sen. Watters

- This bill was a request of the NHDOT.
- It provides definitions for small unmanned aircraft and small unmanned aircraft systems (drones). It includes these systems in the duties of the commissioner to effect uniformity and regulations.
- This bill catches NH up with regard to something that should be appropriately regulated and it gives the commissioner the authority to do that.

Patrick Herlihy and Tricia Lambert (NHDOT)

• Over the last few sessions there have been bills around drone usage and the department saw that those bills had different definitions of drones. They thought that the definitions should be spelled out clearly and this bill does that. They are taking the definitions from the FAA.

Sen. Hennessey asked why the definition in the bill says less than 55 pounds.

Ms. Lambert stated that is what the FAA has determined. The measurements are over half a pound up to 55 pounds. That measurement covers a large portion of drones being used in the state.

Sen. Hennessey asked if the drones over 55 pounds are already regulated.

Ms. Lambert answered that the drones that are over 55 pounds are mostly used by the military and the FAA and state do not regulate those types.

James Cloutier (Red Dog Aerial Media)

- Mr. Cloutier and his wife founded this company in 2013. As FAA regulations have changed, they put forth time into understanding them and working within that framework. They have worked with UNH to design a curriculum, and an unmanned aerial system (UAS) operator program.
- This bill is just one step in making UAS use in NH safer.
- Law enforcement needs to be coupled with education and communication to be successful. In many cases, general knowledge of UAS regulations is lacking. It is difficult to enforce what you do not know and communicating UAS regulations to the public is critical.
- There are 5,300 registered UAS hobbyists in NH; that number could triple if everyone who had a UAS knew the requirement to register. Many owners do not know about the requirement to register their UAS and if they do, many choose not to register them.
- A lot of social media information is out of date or simply wrong.
- Mr. Cloutier suggests that there be public service commercials, digital advertisements on social media sites, or a website dedicated to UAS education.

Sen. Hennessey asked how law enforcement knows if something has been registered.

Mr. Cloutier said he does not have that answer. Once someone registers their UAS, they are supposed to put a sticker on the drone. If they register as a hobbyist, they register themselves, and the registration applies to as many drones as they own. As a commercial operator, he explained that he registers each of his units and they all have an FAA registration number.

Sen. Hennessey asked if a citizen is on the ground and sees a drone being a nuisance, can that person find out to whom it is registered.

Mr. Cloutier explained that is a challenge for the general public and law enforcement, but there is technology being developed that would give that information.

Sen. Levesque asked what people use his drones for.

Mr. Cloutier said they educate people on how to fly a UAS, take real estate photos, do mapping for companies and stockpile measurements. There is a myriad of things a UAS can do.

Sen. Birdsell asked if the new technology being developed will help airports with issues with drones.

Mr. Cloutier said that it is one technology that might help but different agencies have been tasked with finding a solution to that problem.

Governor's Veto Message Regarding Senate Bill 218

By the authority vested in me, pursuant to part II, Article 44 of the New Hampshire Constitution, on July 10th, 2019, I have vetoed Senate Bill 218, relative to duties of the commissioner of transportation regarding air navigation facilities.

This bill is a well-intentioned attempt to establish NH Department of Transportation's regulatory authority over small drones. Unfortunately, we have heard technical concerns related to discrepancies between state and federal law. If we are making noncompliance with federal regulations a violation of state law, we should be certain that all technical issues are worked out. We should take more time to improve this bill and come back to it next year.

For the reasons stated above, I have vetoed Senate Bill 218.
