METHODOLOGY:

This bill requires the Department of Safety to establish a statewide, real-time threat notification system for the purpose of allowing school personnel to notify law enforcement officials directly in the event of a direct threat against a school community. The Department reports currently utilizing software that achieves some of the notification requirements of this bill. This Department software currently provides the ability for State Police Troopers to obtain notification of an active shooter event at a school and cost \$24,675 in FY 19. In estimating the cost of this bill, the Department assumes the following: nearly all 650 schools would participate in this state-funded, but voluntary, notification system at a cost of \$3,000 per each school added; it would cost \$35,000 to incorporate State Police into this system; a part time position would be needed to manage inquires and complaints and assist in the coordination of this system; and training would initially cost \$20,000 in FY 2020 and refresher training would be \$5,000 each year thereafter. The total estimated cost for this system is depicted in the table below:

Summary of testimony presented in support:

Senator Watters

- This bill is relative to the statewide deployment of a real-time threat notification system for
- The intent is to require a statewide system for threat notification for threats that occur within our schools.
- It describes how the proposals would come in and be selected.
- In the past the system was adopted by about 128 schools in the state with a grant given by Homeland Security. Some have had to give it up due to annual cost concerns.
- There is now a chance to open the process again and get this system truly state wide and integrated with police and schools for maximum notification.
- This bill will address the financial need by specifying that one million a year by the next biennium would help the remaining schools get the equipment and operational costs needed to implement the program.

- After two years, the maintenance of the system will cost \$1,000 or \$2,000 for small schools.
- Senator Starr asked what sort of threat would endanger every student in the state. Senator
 Watters responded that any school in the state could be threatened and this will let them
 coordinate the police response. Senator Starr asked if a threat really needs to be broadcast
 statewide. Senator Watters stated that it would only be broadcast to the school and
 personnel needed in the local school district to help coordinate the first responders.
- Senator Ward asked if they had a specific threat in mind. Senator Watters replied that the primary threat is the active shooter situation.
- Senator Kahn asked if this was currently in 128 schools. Senator Watters replied that it was.

Perry Plummer - Director of Homeland Security

- The Governor's Task Force on school preparedness published a report with 59 recommendations. This bill speaks to #42, which is a panic button or enhanced 911 system.
- In an emergency, early notifications and increased communications are vital, and this
 system would do both. It allows a teacher, student, or staff member to notify the police
 immediately which cuts down on response time. Active shooter incidents end in minutes.
- This bill also enhances the 911 system which will decrease the amount of time that
 notification of law enforcement happens. It also sends the emergency personnel, regardless
 of jurisdiction, right to the school.
- He supports this bill as amended.
- Senator Kahn asked if this system was already in place in 128 schools. Mr. Plummer stated that they had grants for 128 schools, but some have elected not to renew the program due to the annual cost. Currently it is in about 90 percent of those 128 schools.
- Senator Kahn asked if there was any continuing funding source for it. Mr. Plummer replied that there is not any funding going forward.
- Senator Morgan asked if it is public information which schools are integrated into this framework already. Mr. Plummer replied that yes, it is right now. They are looking at trying to protect that information if it is implemented in more schools.

Rick Trombly - NEA NH

 They strongly support this bill as it is incredibly important for the state's students and teachers.

Sean Lauziere

- His company provides critical communications software for schools and 911 services.
- They have statewide deployments of this specific system in multiple states.
- He is very supportive of this bill.
- Their system completes a 911 call.

- The only change he would like to see is that the system should be used for all emergencies.
- Medical emergencies are the majority of calls from schools to 911. Teachers are the first responders and need to be notified immediately when there is a medical emergency and not just a shooting incident.
- At the same time their system calls 911 it is sending a text message and email to all teachers and school officials. This gives the time needed to respond quickly and effectively for all emergency situations.

Mike Sielicki

- School shootings are a priority across the country and NH has worked very well to implement safety measures.
- Any system in place has to enhance 911 and its abilities to increase response time.
- HB 123 gives the ability to share floor plans with homeland security and to have everything in one place.
- The interoperability piece is very important, especially to have the response plan already given so emergency personnel immediately know which roads to block off, where reunification spots are going to be, etc.
- With this system, they can reverse communication back into the faculty and staff and know where the students are and who may still be at risk in a matter of minutes.
- Senator Kahn asked if the ongoing cost is about \$3,000. Mr. Sielicki answered that yes, that is an average amount depending on the size of the school.





S.B. 253-FN: Relative to statewide deployment of a real-time threat notification system for schools

Executive Summary

S.B. 253 would create a statewide system for school personnel to report threats to a K12 school, and purports to notify nearby law enforcement units of the incident underway. Rave supports the goals of SB 253, as all students should be protected when they attend school each day. With minor language adjustments, the state could protect against all emergencies that take place in a school, and do so in a cost effective manner.

Proposed Changes and Goals

- Fiscal cost: In examining the fiscal request attached to the bill, the annual recurring cost
 is associated with a program is too high. A \$1.2M allocation in year 1 and \$975,000
 recurring is needed to sustain the program on a statewide basis.
- Expanded public safety involvement: The current bill calls for "linking school personnel to law enforcement," and a system that, "determines the location of the nearest law enforcement officers, regardless of jurisdiction, and directly notifies them of the activation." The system should work for all emergencies, which would require notification capabilities for all first responder agencies; police, fire, and EMS, in recognition of the fact that the vast majority of emergencies and threats to a school involve a teacher or student in medical distress.
- The bill currently requires a system that does not account for long established protocols for emergency response by bypassing the integral step of a 9-1-1 call. Without dialing 9-1-1 first, the odds of a communication breakdown, increased casualties, and reduction in response efficiency are likely. This is based on information provided by the Department of Homeland Security, and multiple other federal, state, local agencies, and first responder groups. A school safety program must include a 9-1-1 call. The official DHS position on this process is that, "Self-dispatch, actually increases chaos at the incident scene and puts emergency responders at risk." We encourage the legislature to account for these best practices and safety procedures in the final bill.

School safety, like all safety, begins with a call to 9-1-1. State's program must allow all public safety agencies to communicate through a uniform network that feeds data to 9-1-1 in real time, and allows for this information to be pushed directly into the field to aid first responder agencies prior to their arrival on scene, and throughout the response process. We look forward to seeing a robust school safety system implemented in New Hampshire, and make the following proposed revisions to the existing bill to meet the needs of the teachers and students in New Hampshire's ~650 public schools.

Current Language: The department of safety shall deploy a statewide, real-time threat notification system for schools, the purpose of which shall be to link school personnel directly to law enforcement in the event of a direct threat against the school community.

Proposed Amendment: The department of safety shall deploy a statewide, real-time threat notification system for schools, the purpose of which shall be to link school personnel directly to first responders based on the location of the event, and type of incident underway.

Current Language: The department of safety shall solicit bids and select a vendor to implement the threat notification system based on the following criteria:(a) The system can be activated by authorized school staff personnel using classroom desktop computers, laptop computers, mobile phones, and fobs.(b) Upon activation, the system determines the location of the nearest law enforcement officers, regardless of jurisdiction, and directly notifies them of the activation

Proposed Amendment: The department of safety shall solicit bids and select a vendor to implement the threat notification system based on the following criteria:(a) The system can be activated by authorized school staff personnel using classroom desktop computers, laptop computers, mobile phones, fobs, or by dialing 9-1-1 from a landline or mobile phone from the school's property. (b) Upon activation, the system places a live voice call to 9-1-1, and provides notifications to all teachers, staff, administrators and stakeholders, as well as first responders, identifying the type of emergency underway, and providing other relevant information to 9-1-1.

In estimating the cost of this bill, the Department assumes the following: nearly all 650 schools would participate in this state-funded, but voluntary, notification system at a cost of \$1,500 per-school, and a total of \$975,000 annually; it would cost an additional \$225,000 in the program's first year to provide comprehensive training to all stakeholders and program participants.

Access for all stakeholders; Live and on demand training programs for all participants; 24/7/365 customer and technical support are provided throughout the program's duration, and all training materials will remain available in an on demand basis to any personnel authorized to use the system.
