METHODOLOGY:

This bill requires the commissioner of the Department of Health and Human Services to establish a psychiatric residential treatment facility within the Sununu Youth Services Center and transfer juveniles from New Hampshire Hospital to the facility by January 1, 2020.

Based on an opening date of January 1, 2020, the Department estimates the following costs associated with construction of a 24-bed facility, as well as annual accreditation and operational expenses. The Department anticipates these costs will be partially offset by federal Medicaid and private insurance reimbursement, as shown below.

METHODOLOGY:

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This bill requires the commissioner of the Department of Health and Human Services to establish: a 60-bed forensic psychiatric hospital, 40 transitional housing beds for forensic patients, and a new treatment facility for children in need of acute inpatient psychiatric treatment, while repurposing the children's unit at New Hampshire Hospital for adult beds.

The Department assumes all construction and development costs will be paid for with state general funds; however, it is unable to provide operational costs for each facility without undergoing contract negotiations for facility operations. The Department has provided the following cost estimates associated with the requirements of the bill, resulting in a range of \$41 million to \$49 million in development and construction costs in FY 2020-21 and a minimum of \$33.5 million in annual operational costs once the respective facilities have been completed. Projected costs are as follows:

- \$27 million to \$35 million in FY 2020-21 for construction of a new forensic hospital, and an additional \$27 million to \$35 million in annual operational costs;
- \$5 million in FY 2020-21 for construction or renovation of 40 new transitional housing beds, with indeterminable operational costs;
- \$5 million in FY 2020-21 for a new children's treatment facility, with indeterminable

operational costs; and

• \$4 million in FY 2020-21 to repurpose the children's unit at NHH for adult beds, and total annual operational costs of \$17.5 million (\$6.5 million higher than the \$11 million in annual costs for the existing children's unit).

The Department states the payer breakdown for the existing children's unit is 19 percent private insurance, 46 percent Medicaid, and 35 percent uninsured/uncovered/general funds. It anticipates the repurposed adult beds will result in an indeterminable increase in state revenue, due to the change in population and an increase in the number of people served by the repurposed unit.

Bill Analysis: This bill directs the department of health and human services to establish a psychiatric residential treatment facility at the Sununu youth services center and to transfer juvenile patients from New Hampshire hospital to the new facility.

Who supports the bill: Senator Sharon Carson (District 14), Senator Jeb Bradley (District 3), Senator James Gray (District 6), Senator Martha Fuller Clark (District 21), Rep. David Danielson (Hillsborough District 7),

Who opposes the bill: Keith Kuenning (Waypoint), Andra Hall (New Hampshire Association of Special Education Administrators)

Who is neutral on the bill: John Williams (Department of Health and Human Services), Ken Norton (NAMI), Becky Whitley (New Futures), Michael Skibbie (Disability Rights Center),

Summary of testimony presented:

Senator Jeb Bradley, District 3

- When the legislature passed HB 400, there was a request to move 24 youths out of New Hampshire Hospital. Youths cannot be placed in a double room, and instead must be placed in their own room.
- The legislature needs to find a solution for the 24 kids at New Hampshire Hospital.
- Senator Bradley said that the Sununu Center may not be the best facility for them, but he put forward this legislation so that the Senate could have a conversation on the matter.

- The Commissioner has indicated that there may be a provider who is willing to house these 24 kids. Senator Bradley believes that that could be a better option if it becomes available.
- Senator Bradley recommends that the committee hold on to the bill until Governor Sununu releases his budget.
- Senator Sherman asked Senator Bradley if he will prepare an amendment to allow the kids to be moved to a
 facility other than the Sununu Center. Senator Bradley indicated that he would be supportive of that
 amendment.
- Senator Gray asked Senator Bradley why the language of the bill impacts people under 21, rather than 18. Senator Bradley said that Commissioner Meyers and John Williams may be able to provide more guidance on the issue.

John Williams, Department of Health and Human Services

- The psychiatric residential treatment facilities (PRTFs) allow children up to the age of 21 to be housed there. Therefor, the wording currently present in the bill is appropriate.
- Senator Gray indicated that there are restrictions on who can be served at the Sununu Center. Mr. Williams stated that he will provide Senator Gray with more information on that topic.
- Senator Sherman asked if there is room in the legislation for clinical judgement concerning the housing of 21year-old patients. Mr. Williams indicated that he did not have an answer to the question at this time. Mr. Williams further indicated that he will work to provide that information to Senator Sherman.

Ken Norton, NAMI (Provided written testimony)

- NAMI is neutral on this legislation.
- Mr. Norton believes that this legislation is helpful in the effort to continue the conversation concerning the best way to house children.
- Mr. Norton is concerned that housing young people with mental illness at the Sununu Center could potentially contribute to the stigma surrounding mental health.
- Mr. Norton concurred with Senator Bradley that the Governor's budget may provide some guidance on this issue.
- Senator Sherman asked Mr. Norton if the age limit is currently 18 at New Hampshire Hospital. Mr. Norton indicated that that is the case.
- Senator Sherman further asked if this is a matter of statute in New Hampshire. Mr. Norton said that he believes it is a clinical decision.

Becky Whitley, Children's Behavioral Health Policy Coordinator at New Futures (Provided written testimony)

- Under RSA 135-F, state law requires HHS and DOE to work together to provide a system of care for children.
- There is a need to build out community-based services for children in need.
- Mrs. Whitley agreed with Senator Bradley that it is very possible that the Sununu Center is not the proper facility to hold these children. Many of these children have experienced trauma and being at the Sununu Center could retraumatize them.
- The state may receive Medicaid reimbursement for children at New Hampshire Hospital.
- Mrs. Whitley believes that the committee should examine whether it is appropriate for 21-year-olds to potentially be housed with very young children.
- Senator Sherman asked what Mrs. Whitley believes would be an ideal facility for these children. Mrs. Whitley said that she believes the committee needs to continue the conversation about what the best option may be.

Michael Skibbie, Disability Rights Center

- Mr. Skibbie expressed caution about SB 291.
- The legislature should not take permanent steps before the outstanding questions on this legislation have been answered.
- Mr. Skibbie noted that if the state funded residential treatment centers, there may not be a need to refer these children to the Sununu Center.
- The Office of Inspector General reported last fall that 1/3 of children in New Hampshire foster care are on psychiatric medications. For many of these children, their treatment is not properly monitored.
- Mr. Skibbie suggested that the committee should consider that the 24-bed unit at New Hampshire Hospital can be refurbished to house people from the secure psychiatric unit.

Testimony

New Hampshire 10-Year Mental Health Plan

- Training and education efforts by NHH clinical staff and DHHS with the hospitals should be enhanced with funding to ensure that only those persons who need treatment though an involuntary inpatient admission are certified for that treatment.
- The regulatory authority of the Departments of Insurance and Health and Human Services should be used to the fullest extent to require that public and commercial payers are providing care coordinators in the state's hospitals to direct their insureds to the appropriate level of care and that all federal mental health rate requirements are demonstrated to be met.
- DHHS should file a new Section 1115 waiver request with the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS). One waiver is to access Medicaid reimbursement for mental health services provided to those adult patients diagnosed with Serious Mental Illness and children diagnosed with Serious Emotional Disturbance for inpatient stays of up to 30 days as provided under the new policy announced by CMS on November 13, 2018 by HHS Secretary Alex Azar.
- The Legislature should amend the statute authorizing the licensing of hospitals to allow DHHS to condition all current and future hospital licenses upon the implementation of hearings for IEA patients within the 72-hour limit now prescribed in RSA 135-C:31, I. DHHS should be required to promulgate rules implementing that new requirement.

II. Reallocation of Capacity at New Hampshire Hospital

The reallocation of existing capacity at NHH is critical to ensuring adequate inpatient bed capacity for the state. There are two options that should be fully explored in the coming legislative session.

- Option 1: Establish a Psychiatric Residential Treatment Facility at the Sununu Youth Services
 Center for the treatment of children now being served at NHH, which would both establish a
 more appropriate, non-hospital based treatment model for children and would allow the existing
 Philbrook Wing of NHH to be renovated for the addition of up to 48 new adult beds. This option
 would involve renovations to an existing 36-bed unit at SYSC in order to attain Joint Commission
 accreditation that is required, as well as staffing and operational costs regardless of whether the
 PRTF is operated by the state or a third party. This option would also entail renovation, staffing
 and operational costs of converting and repurposing the Philbrook Wing at NHH.
- Option 2: Relocate the approximately 30 forensic/justice involved patients out of NHH to a new
 forensic hospital, which would allow the use of those 30 beds for adult patients. This option
 would involve the cost of securing new forensic hospital services operated either by the state or
 a contacted vendor in a new or renovated facility. Under this option, the state would enter into a
 service contract with an owner/operator of a facility for services. The state could obtain an option
 to purchase the facility after a period of time.

The costs of Options 1 and 2 are now being estimated by both DHHS and Public Works and will be made available as early in the budget process as possible.

Dear Chairman Sherman and Honorable Members of the Committee:

The New Hampshire Children's Behavioral Health Collaborative ("CBHC") appreciates the opportunity to provide testimony on SB 291-FN, share some concerns with this proposal, and put it into a larger context. The CBHC is a diverse network of individuals and organizations who work in partnership to transform the way we support children with behavioral health needs.

The most pressing concern members of the CBHC have expressed is that any proposal involving this population of children must be discussed in the context of RSA 135-F. This state law directs the Departments of Education and Health and Human Services to work together to develop an integrated and comprehensive System of Care for children with behavioral health needs that is youth and family driven, culturally and linguistically competent, and community-based. A System of Care is a value- and evidence-based behavioral health framework for system reform that is designed to pull together disparate service entities into one organized, coherent response. Research shows that the System of Care approach is a smart investment that brings better outcomes for youth, as well as their families and communities.¹

There has been incredible progress towards building the System of Care in New Hampshire – which the CBHC has worked on for many years, alongside our State partners – including the creation and financing of a youth and family driven wraparound approach of intensive care coordination for children and youth with complex behavioral health challenges and their families. However as we all know, there remains an urgency for immediate enhancements to New Hampshire's service array for individuals with mental illness.

The research strongly supports that with the support of a comprehensive array of *home and community-based mental health services*, children with significant emotional, behavioral and mental health needs can successfully live in their own homes and communities and participate fully in family and community life rather than being served in restrictive settings like out-of-state and local residential treatment centers, group homes, and hospitals.

Increasing access to mobile crisis response and stabilization services is the logical next step in building a comprehensive System of Care, and is addressed this session in Senate Bill 14-FN, which this committee will hear next week. These services can play a key role in preventing emergency room use, acute psychiatric hospitalization, residential treatment, and placement disruptions among children and youth who are experiencing a behavioral health crisis.²

We undoubtably share the widespread concern about the large numbers of children, youth and adults waiting in hospital emergency departments for treatment, however believe the best approach is to focus on building evidence-based and cost-effective community-based services designed to reduce the need for inpatient hospitalization, which tend to erode the community and family connections.

The CBHC is also concerned with placing this level of care at a locked juvenile correctional facility with staff trained in correctional practices inappropriate and harmful for youth with complex mental health challenges and trauma. Further, the facility has a long history of inappropriate use of restraints and excessive use of force as investigated by the Disability Rights Center-NH.³

Dear Chairman Sherman:

My name is Ken Norton and I serve as the Executive Director of NAMI NH, the National Alliance on Mental Illness. I also have a family members with serious mental illness and co-occurring substance use disorder. On behalf of NAMI NH I am here today, to offer some brief testimony regarding concerns and questions NAMI NH has on SB 291. NAMI NH will not be taking a position on the bill.

I will start where I left off in my testimony before this committee on SB 11. I concluded that testimony by stating that while NAMI NH very much welcomes expediting efforts to address the emergency room boarding crisis, we are confused about why the first priority related to that isn't establishing statewide crisis and or mobile crisis response capacity for (adults and) children in a mental health crisis. Our first priority should be providing an array of services with an evidence base for safely and successfully diverting children and youth from the hospital.

That leads to the first of many questions regarding this Psychiatric Residential Treatment Facility (PRTF). Is it intended to be a "step up "facility to divert hospitalization, a step down facility to speed discharges from the current New Hampshire Hospital Philbrook Center- or both? Or is it to replace a hospital level of care for children entirely? A psychiatric residential treatment facility might be beneficial as part of a continuum in the system of care, but it is unclear how, or where this all fits.

In previous testimony before the legislature, NAMI NH has expressed serious concerns regarding the use of New Hampshire Hospital for children in a psychiatric crisis. Our concern is both with the physical layout of the units which were designed 30 years ago for adults and not children, and for the decision to co-locate children and youth in the same hospital as adults with severe mental illness. We have similar unease regarding the use of the Sununu Center. Having a locked "jail" type facility complete with razor wire is not an appropriate setting for youth in a mental health crisis. It is further stigmatizing and criminalizing an illness and adds to the already humiliating process being handcuffed and perhaps shackled when being transported to New Hampshire Hospital. For young children, the Sununu center as currently configured is not an appropriate setting.

One of the challenges which the current Philbrook Center faces is the blending of the wide range of developmental stages from young children to teens up to age 18. It would appear from this legislation that the PRTF would further extended to young adults up to age 21. Unless there were going to be complete separation from children and youth under age 18, and a separate unit for ages 18-21, this would be cause for serious concern.

It is unclear from the fiscal note whether the price includes the current budget to operate the Philbrook center or whether this is in addition to the current costs, Find Help, Find Hope
