METHODOLOGY:

- providing an option for providers to increase the length of time a registry card must expire from one year to up to three years,
- · changing the reporting frequency from monthly to weekly, and
- repealing requirements related to photographs of the applicant's face for registration cards.

There may be an indeterminable fiscal impact to state revenue and expenditures to the extent providers extend the expiration date of registration cards. To the extent that there is a net administrative cost resulting from the changes in the bill, those costs would be included in the registration fees paid by the Alternative Treatment Centers. The Therapeutic Cannabis Program is self-funded through annual registration fees, currently set at \$50 per application. The Department assumes applications would decrease under this bill, resulting in annual registration fees increasing in order to produce sufficient revenue to self-fund the program.

Summary of testimony presented:

Senator Jay Kahn, District 10 and Michael Holt, Therapeutic Cannabis Program Director, DHHS

- Some of Senator Kahn's constituents have run into barriers getting access to therapeutic cannabis.
- This legislation will adjust the therapeutic cannabis statute in four ways.

- The bill would eliminate requirement for a 90-day doctor-patient relationship.
- The bill would eliminate the photo identification requirement for therapeutic cannabis patient ID cards. Currently, patients must use a CD or a flash drive to submit their photo to the department.
- The bill would allow patients to obtain a 3-year prescription for therapeutic cannabis.
- The bill would also require the Department of Health and Human Services to issue weekly reports on how many patients are enrolled in New Hampshire's therapeutic cannabis program.
- Currently, there is no equivalent 90-day requirement for the prescription of opioids.
- Senator Gray asked Senator Kahn for a citation concerning the need to use a CD to submit photo
 identification. Mr. Holt stepped forward to answer Senator Gray's question. The CD requirement is not
 spelled out in statute but is codified in department rules. For the department to put the photo on an ID card,
 they need a digital copy of it, the department accepts CDs, as well as flash drives.
- Senator Gray followed up by asking why department rules require the use of a CD to submit photos, when
 the medical marijuana statute in New Hampshire does not mention this requirement. Mr. Holt responded by
 indicated that the department's administrative rules require the applicant to submit a digital file of the
 photo.
- Mr. Holt further indicated that patients are required to show a second form of photo identification when they go to purchase medical cannabis at a dispensary.
- Senator Sherman stated that perhaps the statute can be amended to reflect current department practice.
- Senator Gray asked Senator Kahn about the page 2, lines 17-19 of the legislation. Specifically, whether the language was reflective of the Senator Kahn's legislative intent. Senator Kahn indicated that he believes that it is
- Senator Sherman asked Senator Kahn about allowing a 3-year certification. Senator Sherman indicated that
 some qualifying conditions may be treatable in well under 3 years. Specifically, Senator Sherman wanted to
 know if any of Senator Kahn's constituents have run into problems with the current renewal process. Senator
 Kahn indicated that he has only had one constituent who needed to apply for renewal of their prescription.
- Mr. Holt noted that many of the qualifying conditions are chronic medical conditions, and certifying medical
 providers reserve the right to terminate a prescription at any time. This legislation would provide more
 flexibility to providers who are treating patients with chronic medical conditions who currently must renew
 their certification annually.
- Senator Fuller Clark asked Mr. Holt if there is any delay between the current annual renewal period, and the
 expiration of the patient's certification. Mr. Holt indicated that patients may renew their certification thirty
 days before their card expires.
- Senator Chandley asked if it is the intent of the sponsor to eliminate the photo requirement entirely. Senator
 Kahn indicated that the intent of the bill is to allow the photo requirement to be dealt with in the
 department's administrative rules. Mr. Holt indicated that the department is not taking a position on the bill,
 but he understands the intent of the bill to be the removal of the requirement for a photo ID in New
 Hampshire statute.
- Senator Fuller Clark asked Mr. Holt if he remembered why a photo ID was required in the first place. Mr. Holt
 indicated that he did not know.
- Senator Gray asked if the legislation would allow somebody to purchase medical cannabis if they have the same name as a qualifying patient. Senator Kahn indicated that he has faith in the ability of dispensaries to regulate this. Mr. Holt also indicated that dispensaries are required to verify date of birth, among other data points.

Mike McLaughlin, Represents Sanctuary ATC

- Sanctuary ATC supports this legislation.
- Some of the original provisions in NH's medical marijuana were designed to be restrictive because the state had no experience on this issue. Now, the state has a better understanding of therapeutic cannabis.
- The provision requiring a 90-day waiting period can be cruel for patients with conditions that cause debilitating pain.

Sian Leininger, Temescal Wellness

- The two Temescal Weliness locations serve over 2,700 patients.
- Temescal Wellness is in favor of this legislation.

- Patients have expressed frustration over the process of getting their photo ID on to a CD.
- Patients have also expressed frustration over the 3-month waiting period.
- Some providers in New Hampshire still refuse to consider therapeutic cannabis as an option. Therefor, patients are often required to find alternative providers who will consider cannabis as an option. Once they find a new provider, they must wait 90 days until they can receive their certification for therapeutic cannabis.
- Patients who are dealing with chronic conditions will benefit from the provision allowing certifications to last up to three years. Many of these conditions are life long afflictions, and it is a burden on these patients to be required to renew their certification every year.

Rep. Susan Ford, Grafton District 3

- Rep. Ford received a call from a constituent whose loved one was diagnosed with an inoperable brain tumor.
 They were having a very difficult time obtaining a therapeutic cannabis card due to the 90-day requirement.
- Patients have run into problems when dealing with various state agencies as they try to gain certification for therapeutic cannabis.
- Rep. Ford's constituent was able to get his certification for medical marijuana and has since seen enormous progress concerning his symptoms.
- Senator Gray asked Rep. Ford why the current exemptions to the 90-day rule are insufficient. Rep. Ford
 indicated that her constituents have run into problems with the 90-day rule, even with the current
 exemptions outlined in the statute.

Rep. Wendy Thomas

- Rep. Thomas works at Prime Alternative Treatment Center (ATC) and is a therapeutic cannabis patient.
- Requiring patients to submit their photo ID on a CD is very outdated.
- Personnel at dispensaries are very familiar with their patients, and the odds of somebody being able to fraudulently purchase cannabis is very low.
- Patients who have documented qualifying medical conditions should not have to wait 90 days, especially
 when they can get a prescription to opioids immediately.
- Additionally, Rep. Thomas noted that many insurance companies will not cover doctor's visits if the patient is seeking to obtain certification for therapeutic cannabis.
- Most of the qualifying conditions in New Hampshire are life-long, chronic conditions. Patients with these
 conditions will benefit from allowing a prescription to last for three years.
- Senator Gray asked Rep. Thomas why the current exemptions to the 90-day rule are insufficient. Rep.
 Thomas indicated that many providers are wary of deviating from the 90-day rule, even with current
 exemptions outlined in statute.
- Senator Gray followed up by asking if there is anything in the law that prevents somebody from submitting a photo through means other than a CD. Rep. Thomas indicated that there is not, but administrative rules require the use of a CD or a flash drive.
- Senator Gray followed up by asking if there is anything in the statute that outlines an additional waiting period in addition to the 90-day rule. Mr. Holt stepped forward to answer the question. He indicated that the department has a maximum period of 20 days to process the application. However, processing the application may take longer than 20 days if the application is incomplete.
- Senator Gray asked if the 20-day period is in statute, or department rules? Mr. Holt indicated that it is outlined in statute.
- Senator Gray asked if it is possible for an application to be processed in a day. Mr. Holt indicated that the
 department does not have the necessary staffing to do so.
- Senator Bradley asked Mr. Holt if the department has a position on the three-month requirement. Mr. Holt indicated that the department is taking no position on the bill's provisions.

Governor's Veto Message Regarding Senate Bill 88

By the authority vested in me, pursuant to part II, Article 44 of the New Hampshire Constitution, on July 12th, 2019, I have vetoed Senate Bill 88, relative to registry identification cards under the use of cannabis for therapeutic purposes law.

Maintaining a strong patient-provider relationship is an important part of ensuring that our medical marijuana program is used successfully and responsibly. A doctor or other health care provider uses their knowledge and relationship with a patient to explore the right treatment options for that individual. The exemptions in the current statute allow for patients in need to obtain appropriate treatment while preserving responsible prescribing.

For the reasons stated above, I have vetoed Senate Bill 88.
