## Testimony

Dear Rep. Myler and Members of the House Education Committee,

I am writing to express concerns about HB 1435, an Act repealing the powers of the state board of education. As the parent of an adult son who benefited tremendously from the special education services he received in accordance with NH's special education rules, and as someone who strives to ensure that children with disabilities and their parents continue to have the same opportunities, rights and protections that my son and I had, this bill makes me <u>very</u> anxious.

HB 1435 repeals RSA 186:5: "Powers. – The state board shall have the same powers of management, supervision, and direction over all public schools in this state as the directors of a business corporation have over its business, except as otherwise limited by law. It may make all rules and regulations necessary for the management of its own business and for the conduct of its officers, employees, and agents, and to secure the efficient administration of the public schools and the administration of the work of Americanization, in teaching English to non-English-speaking adults and in furnishing instruction in the privileges, duties, and responsibilities of citizenship, which is hereby declared to be an essential part of public school education. It shall be the duty of school boards and employees of school districts to comply with the rules and regulations of the state board."

While the bill seems to have a fairly narrow focus, and doesn't actually mention special education at all, I worry about potential unintended consequences of HB 1435. One of the powers of the state board, according to RSA 186:5 is, "It may make all rules and regulations necessary for the management of its own business and for the conduct of its officers, employees, and agents, and to secure the efficient administration of the public schools". It also clarifies that "It shall be the duty of school boards and employees of school districts to comply with the rules and regulations of the state board". The power to make rules and regulations for public schools, and the requirement that school boards and school district employees follow those rules and regulations is very important. Instead of repealing RSA 186:5, I would suggest amending it to update the language and ensure that it is both clear and relevant.

Repealing RSA 186:5 would leave a gap; we would know what the powers of the state board are not, but what the state board's powers are, would be less clear. The powers, duties, roles and/or responsibilities of the state board are included in at least 35 different statutes [RSA 21-N, RSA 77-G, RSA 126-A, RSA 126-U, RSA 186, RSA 186-B, RSA 186-C, RSA 188-B, RSA 188-E, RSA 188-F, RSA 189, RSA 190, RSA 193, RSA 193-A, RSA 193-B, RSA 193-C, RSA 193-D, RSA 193-E, RSA 193-G, RSA 193-H, RSA 193-J, RSA 194-B, RSA 194-C, RSA 194-D, RSA 195-A, RSA 195-C, RSA 198, RSA 199, RSA 200, RSA 200-B, RSA 200-E, and RSA 200-F].

I suggest referencing these relevant statutes in RSA 186:5, while also maintaining and updating the most essential pieces of the current RSA 186:5. It could read something like, "The state board of education is responsible, in collaboration with the NH department of education, for making all of the rules and regulations necessary to secure the efficient administration of NH public schools, to ensure that all NH public schools comply with state and federal requirements, and to ensure that public schools provide an adequate education for NH public school children, and a free appropriate public education for all eligible children with disabilities. It shall be the duty of school boards and employees of school districts to comply with the rules and regulations of the state board." The state board of education also has the powers, duties, roles and responsibilities as set out in RSA 21-N, RSA 77-G, RSA 126-A, RSA 126-U, RSA 186, RSA 186-B, RSA 186-C, RSA 188-B, RSA 188-E, RSA 188-F, RSA 189, RSA 190, RSA 193, RSA 193-A, RSA 193-B, RSA 193-C, RSA 193-D, RSA 193-G, RSA 193-H, RSA 193-J, RSA 194-B, RSA 194-C, RSA 194-D, RSA 195, RSA 195-C, RSA 198, RSA 199, RSA 200, RSA 200-B, RSA 200-E, and RSA 200-F.

Safeguarding the role of the state board in the rulemaking process, and ensuring that that role is clearly understood by stakeholders is imperative. As one example, the duties of the State Board are imbedded in NH's special education law, RSA 186-C in multiple sections, specifically in RSA 186-C:16 Rulemaking, which reads, "The state board of education shall adopt rules, pursuant to RSA 541-A, and consistent with the provision of a free appropriate public education, relative to:

- I. Developing individualized education programs;
- II. Approving and monitoring special education programs;
- III. Reporting the number of children with disabilities in a school district;
- IV. Requesting administrative due process hearings and appealing a final administrative decision;
- V. Determining eligibility for participation in approved programs [includes the process and criteria for evaluating children for special education and determining eligibility for special education];
- VI. Appointing surrogate parents [including procedures for foster parents to become surrogate parents];
- VII. Determining the length of the school year for children with disabilities; and

VIII. Other matters related to complying with provisions of this chapter. [other sections of RSA 186-C assign responsibility to the state board of education for adopting rules relative to administering and distributing special education aid, determining eligibility for emergency assistance for special education costs, and with the commissioners of NH DOE & NH DHHS entering into an interagency agreement]".

NH's special education rules, Ed 1100, the NH Standards for the Education of Children with Disabilities have been developed and amended/updated when necessary, through the current rulemaking process. This process includes the State Department of Education and State Board of Education working together, with each playing a specific role, and with both providing extensive opportunities for public input. The NH Department of Education drafts an initial proposal, utilizing input from the public, including parents of children with disabilities. The State Board of Education then conducts formal public hearings (for at least the past several decades, they have always done parents and educators the courtesy of holding hearings in both the daytime and evening to maximize opportunities for public participation). Through this process, parents, educators and others have been welcomed as key partners in ensuring that NH's special education rules comply with Federal requirements, while also meeting the unique needs of NH's children with disabilities and their families, in accordance with NH's values.

This process provides important checks and balances. If the State Board of Education's authority in developing these rules were reduced or if the state board's role was marginalized because of unclear language in the statutes, it would weaken the process, dilute the role of the public, and upset the balance that is provided through the current process.

I encourage you either amend HB 1435 or recommend that it be inexpedient to legislate. Thank you in advance for your consideration of my input on this bill.

2 Education; Compliance with Federal Provisions. Amend RSA 186:6 to read as follows:

  - II. [Americanization. For the Americanization of immigrants, for the teaching of those 14 years of age and over to speak and read English and to appreciate and respect] Civics Education. Instruction of the civic and social institutions of the United States, and for instruction in the duties of citizenship.
    - 4 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.
