

Dear Rep. Griffin:

I write to express the New Hampshire Municipal Association's opposition to HB 127. The bill is bad policy with illogical consequences and will confuse candidates and public officials.

Under current law, political advertising may not be placed on public property, including highway rights-of-way, without the owner's consent. In the case of a municipality, this means the consent of the governing body—the selectmen, council, or mayor and aldermen, who are responsible for managing municipally owned property.

There are several reasons to prohibit political signs on public property. First, in the case of highway rights-of-way, the signs can present a safety hazard (as can the act of placing and removing the signs). Second, they are unsightly; once one sign goes up at an intersection, dozens more are likely to follow, and almost everyone considers them an eyesore. Third, political advertising on municipally owned property can give the impression that the government itself is endorsing a political candidate. Finally, many candidates do not bother to remove their signs when the election is over, and the signs become litter.

HB 127 would create the problems that current law avoids. Under the bill, allowance of political signs on public property would become the rule, rather than the exception. Consent to the placement of such signs would be presumed unless the property is posted with signs saying, "No Political Advertising." These signs would need to be posted "in the same manner as is prescribed in RSA 635:4," which means they must be posted not more than 100 yards apart to be effective.

There is some irony in requiring a town to post signs saying that signs are prohibited. Municipalities should not have to incur the expense, time, and hassle of sprinkling signs around their properties to prevent others from doing the same thing. The 100-yard requirement means that a town would need to place at least 18 signs for every mile of town road. The village green would need to be ringed with "no signs" signs, and dozens of such signs would need to be placed around town-owned

parks and athletic fields, unless the town wants to let those properties become encampments for candidate signs. If the town does not post the appropriate notices at the town hall, the police station, and the library, political signs could be affixed to those buildings.

Further, the bill is internally inconsistent, as it leaves in place the sentence in RSA 664:17 that states, "Political advertising placed or affixed to any public property may be removed by state, city, or town maintenance or law enforcement personnel." It is difficult to reconcile this with the provision that says consent to the placement of political advertising on public property will be presumed; this inconsistency will leave candidates and local officials confused.

This bill is full of problems, and we ask the committee to find it inexpedient to legislate.

Dear Candidates and Campaign Workers:

I am writing before the upcoming election to work with candidates and campaign workers in an effort to avoid potential issues with the placement of political signs. The Department recognizes the need for political signs as part of the election process, but highway safety remains paramount. We hope to work with you to balance these interests and remain vigilant for the sake of highway safety.

Placement of the signs in accordance with the law (RSA 236:1, RSA 236:73, RSA 664:17) and the Department's policies will allow for the best use of the Department's resources as well as campaign resources:

- The law prohibits placement of political signs on the interstate highways, including the entrance and exit ramps.
- The law prohibits placement of political signs on or affixed to utility poles or highway signs, including delineators.
- Signs that create a traffic hazard or obstruct the safe flow of traffic will be removed. Signs affixed to bridges create a traffic hazard and will be removed. And it is costly to remove signs that are attached to bridges and delineators.
- Signs will be removed to perform maintenance. This is prime mowing season, so it is best not to place signs in an area with long grass that is likely to be mowed in the near future.
- Placement of signs on private property requires permission from the landowner.
- Candidates are required to remove all political signs by the second Friday following the election, unless the election is a primary and the advertising concerns a winning candidate.

If candidates follow the parameters listed above, we can avoid expending valuable Department resources and wasting campaign resources with the removal of signs. In the event the Department needs to remove political signs for safety or maintenance, the signs will be held at the local patrol headquarters until one week after the election and then discarded. (RSA 664:17.)

NHDOT REMINDER TO CANDIDATES REGARDING PLACEMENT OF POLITICAL SIGNS HIGHWAY SAFETY IS PARAMOUNT

Another election year is upon us and the Department of Transportation is once again reminding candidates and their campaign workers about proper placement of political signs:

- The law prohibits placement of political signs on the interstate highways, including the entrance and exit ramps.
- The law prohibits placement of political signs on or affixed to utility poles or highway signs, including delineators.
- Signs that create a traffic hazard or obstruct the safe flow of traffic will be removed. Signs
 affixed to bridges create a traffic hazard and will be removed.
- Signs will be removed to perform maintenance. This is prime mowing season, so it is best not to place signs in an area with long grass that is likely to be mowed in the near future.
- Placement of signs on private property requires permission from the landowner.
- Signs on private property that obstruct traffic signs or signals, or restrict a motorist's field of view at an intersection, will be removed as a traffic hazard. (RSA 236:1, 236:73.)
- Candidates are required to remove all political signs by the second Friday following the election, unless the election is a primary and the advertising concerns a winning candidate. (RSA 664:17.)

In an effort to best use the Department's resources, NHDOT Commissioner Victoria F. Sheehan has written to the political party chairs and political candidate regarding placement of political signs. In the event the Department needs to remove political signs for safety or maintenance, the signs will be held at the local patrol headquarters until one week after the election and then discarded. (RSA 664:17.)

AN ACT

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relative to placement and removal of political advertising.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1 Placement and Removal of Political Advertising. Amend RSA 664:17 to read as follows:

664:17 Placement and Removal of Political Advertising. No political advertising shall be placed on or affixed to any [public property including highway rights-of-way or] private property without the owner's consent. All political advertising shall be removed by the candidate no later than the second Friday following the election unless the election is a primary and the advertising concerns a candidate who is a winner in the primary. Signs shall not be placed on or affixed to utility poles or highway signs. Political advertising may be placed within state-owned rights-of-way as long as the advertising does not obstruct the safe flow of traffic [and the advertising is placed with the consent of the owner of the land over which the right of way passes]. No person shall remove, deface, or knowingly destroy any political advertising which is placed on or affixed to public property or any private property except for removal by the owner of the property, persons authorized by the owner of the property, or a law enforcement officer removing improper advertising. Political advertising placed on or affixed to any public property may be removed by state, city, or town maintenance or law enforcement personnel. Political advertising removed prior to election day by state, city, or town maintenance or law enforcement personnel shall be kept until one week after the election at a place designated by the state, city, or town so that the candidate may retrieve the items. Consent to the placement of political advertising on public property, including state-owned property and highway rights-of-way, shall be presumed unless the property is posted with signs in the same manner as is prescribed in RSA 635:4 with the words "No Political Advertising."

2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.
