While RSA 31:102-a does give cities and towns the right to license and regulate hawkers and peddlers, the majority of the committee does not find any need for the state of NH to grant to a local government the authority to control and regulate a child's lemonade stand. New Hampshire is a Dillon's rule state and thus NH defines what powers it will grant to local government. HB183 clearly states that a city or town MAY NOT claim that the RSA gives them the authority to demand licensing and regulations from some kids setting up a lemonade stand on their front lawn. 1 Amend the title of the bill by replacing it with the following:

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AN ACT prohibiting municipalities from requiring a license for a soft drink stand operated by a person under the age of 18.

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Amend the bill by replacing section 1 with the following:

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8 1 Hawkers, Peddlers, and Vendors; Exception. Amend the introductory paragraph of RSA 9 31:102-a to read as follows:

The governing board of a city, town or village district may adopt, by ordinance or regulation, provisions for the licensure and regulation of itinerant vendors, hawkers, peddlers, traders, farmers, merchants, or other persons who sell, offer to sell, or take orders for merchandise from temporary or transient sales locations within a town or who go from town to town or place to place within a town for such purposes. Any person who violates any provision of such ordinance or regulation shall be guilty of a class B misdemeanor, and each continuing day of violation after notice shall constitute a separate offense. A city, town, or village district shall be specifically prohibited, however, from licensing or regulating a candidate for public office in the process of obtaining signatures on nomination papers, who seeks to have the candidate's name placed on the ballot for the state general election by submitting nomination papers under RSA 655:40. Rep. Porter: Under the age of 18, I didn't want to pay the fee. Could I hire a person under 17 to sell lemonade? ANS: Yes, you could do that. Under the provisions of this bill, could it be shutdown at a balloon fair? ANS: Depends on your town.

Rep. Stavis: If I were a child, could I also have a bake sale? ANS: It is specific to lemonade.

Rep. MacDonald: Why to the age under 18? ANS: Because you are still a child being under 18. They (towns) would still be able to regulate Hawkens and Peddler Regulations.

Rep. Vann: Since cities and towns already have the authority, why do we have to regulate? ANS: In my opinion, there is a history of little kids selling up to 9 lemonade stands. This would stop cities and towns from charging fees. No instances in New Hampshire of anyone being fined.

Good afternoon. I would like to offer comment in opposition to HB 183, for which the Municipal and County Government Committee intends to hold an Executive Session today at 2:00pm.

This bill intends to prohibit New Hampshire municipalities from requiring a license for a lemonade stand operated by an underaged youth. However, the bill sponsor testified that this is not currently an issue or problem in our state.

If passed, this bill will further limit a municipality's current authority to pass ordinances or policies which the community determines is in the best interest of the health and safety of its residents or visitors. As there is no specific problem this bill seeks to solve, it may only serve to set a precedent for curtailing municipalities' authority on other issues which they currently have the authority to act upon should a local need arise or exist. For this reason I urge the committee to not pass HB 183.

Dear Chairman Dolan:

I write to express the Municipal Association's opposition to HB 183, which would prohibit a municipality from "licensing or regulating" a lemonade stand operated by a person under age 18.

On one hand, it seems unnecessary to spend time on this bill. City and town officials have more pressing matters than trying to license kids' lemonade stands—I know of no instance in which this has happened—and the legislature surely has more pressing matters as well. The bill addresses a problem that does not exist.

On the other hand, precisely because the bill does not address a real problem, it seems to have no purpose other than to rebuke local officials. This is not the first such bill we've seen this year. We believe the relationship between the state and municipalities should be one of cooperation, not of antagonism.

The bill could, in fact, have unfortunate consequences. While no town is going to try to "license" a six-year-old's lemonade stand, one can imagine situations in which children operating a lemonade stand—or anything—would need correction. If a stand is set up too close to a busy street, or near the first-base line during a baseball game, or if it blocks an entire city sidewalk, a police officer might politely ask that it be moved a few feet. Or if a few 17-year-olds decide to sell "hard" lemonade outside the high school—easy enough to imagine—the police might want to get involved as well. A state ban on "regulating" lemonade stands would prohibit this.

Further, the selectmen or council have the right to regulate any activity on town-owned property, whether conducted by adults or children. That right should not be restricted by a law prohibiting "regulation" of lemonade stands.

No municipality is looking to limit lemonade stands, but the rare occasion for a minor restriction may arise, and local officials have the good sense to deal with each situation in their discretion. A legislative decree that prohibits the exercise of that discretion is unwarranted.

I ask the committee to find HB 183 inexpedient to legislate.
