STATEMENT OF INTENT

This bill establishes retrospective legislative oversight over emergency orders from the commissioner of the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), issued under RSA 21-P. The bill also establishes legislative oversight over various powers under the public health and infectious disease laws. The critical part of this bill, and the only issue on which there was a difference of opinion, is on page. 2, line 32, which gives the Health and Human Services Oversight Committee the authority to rescind emergency orders by a two-thirds vote. The majority feels this measure is essential to restore the balance of power between the branches, but is sufficiently high to prevent its misuse. Current law was appropriately used to limit the distribution of hydroxychloroquine under the emergency order when there was a shortage. The bill clarifies that we did not grant the power to prevent the prescribing of a drug medical professionals have reason to believe might be effective. Existing law in RSA 21-P:53 V clearly states individuals have a right to refuse ordered treatment including vaccination. However the statutory reference calls that into doubt as it refers to a statute telling a justice of the peace to order treatment. The bill corrects the reference, clearly allowing individuals to refuse treatment and remain in quarantine. Legislative oversight over other emergency powers is also established through the Ethics Oversight Advisory Committee. This committee is in statute but had no members appointed; the Governor used the State Disaster Medical Advisory Committee to reconstitute this necessary committee to create the vaccine distribution plan. This committee would also review other emergency orders, and address ethical concerns with emergency orders. Amendment 2021-0161H does the following: It eliminates section 2 of the bill as drafted, which was determined to be unnecessary. It rewrites the charge to the Ethics Oversight Advisory Committee to be less burdensome and to use aggregate and de-identified data. Last, it undoes changes to the membership of HHS Oversight in last year's HB1245 on page 9. We do not believe those changes were intended to remove minority party input from HHS Oversight.

II. The committee shall:

- (a) Consider the ethical implications of any of the powers that may be exercised by the commissioner under the provisions of this chapter including, but not limited to, the confiscation, distribution, and rationing of anti-toxins, serums, vaccines, immunizing agents, antibiotics, and other pharmaceutical agents, and mechanical equipment; the issuance and enforcement of orders of isolation, quarantine, medical examination, and medical treatment; issues relative to information sharing and confidentiality; and the provisions for due process for orders issued pursuant to this chapter.
- (b) Review, at least annually, a report of investigations conducted pursuant to RSA 141-C:9 and orders issued under RSA 21-P:53, V and VI, and provide recommendations to the department. Any information furnished to the committee shall be aggregated and de-identified. The department shall not share any confidential information with the committee.
- (c) Consider the competing rights of disabled persons who might be unable to comply with certain orders, health care workers who are entitled to a safe workplace, and the need to protect the public from communicable disease, and may recommend modification of orders to address specific concerns.
- (d) Consider both the need to protect the most vulnerable members of society as well as the need for the most efficacious means to control a public health emergency when consulting with the commissioner pursuant to RSA 21-P:53, III-b in developing a plan for the distribution of a new treatment or vaccination.
 - III. The members of the committee shall be as follows:
- (a) Two members of the house or representatives, one of whom shall be from the minority party, appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives.
 - (b) One member of the senate, appointed by the senate president.
- (c) The director of the department of health and human services, division of public health services.
 - [(b)] (d) The state epidemiologist.
- [(e)] (e) The attorney general, or designee.
 - [(d)] (f) A representative of a public health network, appointed by the commissioner.

 - [(f) A chief of police or a police officer of a local police department, appointed by the New Hampshire Association of Chiefs of Police.

AMENDED ANALYSIS

This bill makes various changes to the powers of the commissioner of the department of health and human services during a public health emergency; authorizes the joint legislative oversight committee on health and human services to review, and rescind by a 2/3 vote, emergency orders issued by the commissioner; gives a person subject to a treatment order for a communicable disease a right to a hearing on the order; and amends the membership and duties of the ethics oversight advisory committee. The bill also amends the house membership on the health and human services oversight committee.

I write in support of HB 187. There must be legislative oversight of DHHS on behalf of the taxpayers.

During the pandemic NH DHHS admitted to implementing multiple policies more restrictive than those recommended by the CDC. Particularly those for schools, which DHHS set as far more restrictive than those set by CDC for high risk populations. For example, when it comes to managing confirmed false positive covid-19 results within educational systems, the NH DHHS liaison to education, has stated to schools, tax payers and parents that a "positive equals a positive", in terms of exclusion from school. That restrictive requirement for exclusion from school trickles down to any close contacts and applies to both students and school staff. The education liaison's office at DHHS has a self described "unadvertised" policy for testing out of a positive test, when one has two negative tests spaced exactly 24 hours apart. Logically, this type of oversimplified messaging, (" a positive equals a positive.") would give school districts, like it did mine, the false impression that students cannot test out of a false positive. Also, by not "advertising" the policy it likely precluded anyone from doing so since the policy followed a rigid process health care practitioners did not have communicated to them and obtaining that info took as much time to access and execute as the potentially unecessary exclusion from school.

When questioned on this policy, NH DHHS staff cited CDC guidance was in support of this policy. Those supportive references were requested, and promised by DHHS staff. After multiple failed follow up attempts, NH DHHS staff forwarded their own guidance in support of their guidance before external NH department commisioners had to be involved for DHHS staff to make good on their promise to provide referenced CDC support of their policy. Finally, the DHHS staff admitted that their policy was not based on CDC guidance as previously stated but was more "stringent". In fact, it is worth noting that CDC guidance for skilled nursing and long term care facilities (filled with high risk patients) does not impose this amount of restrictiveness, and follows a decision tree whereby one can test out of a false positive and it's communicated transparently to the medical community and public. Our state policies should be based on guidances from appropriate agencies and be the least restrictive. Policies by nature need to be transparent to the responsible parties they apply to. State agencies should not make false claims to taxpayers about federal agencies supporting their policies.

It is interesting to note that 2-1-1 covid information staff, (another dept DHHS manages) stated quickly and clearly that one can test out of false positive results. Sadly that is not communicated to schools by the education liaison branch of DHHS. NH DHHS should maintain consistent policy communication that does not unecessarily burden certain sectors without appropriate evidence.

Families from all over the country are moving out of their states to states with less restrictive policies, decreasing the overall revenue for their state. Education experts have acknowledged the limitations of remote education and yet policies like this undoubtedly have restricted untold numbers of community members, students and our economy. This policy applies to staff as well as students. This is important to note because throughout the pandemic parents of students,

particularly our most disadvantaged IEP students, have heard that free and appropriate public education services cannot be provided to their student due to staffing issues that don't relate to the district management but rather to Covid-19 restrictions.

This is only one example but for these compelling reasons, I think it is abundantly clear that oversight is needed, especially where so many areas of NH citizen's quality of life may be impacted by the policies of NH DHHS.

Thank you in advance for consideration of these things when you vote to pass HB 187 and hopefully similar bills extending oversight to DHHS in the future.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

- 1 Department of Safety; Public Health Emergency Management Powers. Amend RSA 21-P:53 to 2 read as follows:
 - 21-P:53 Public Health Powers and Duties. During the existence of a state of emergency under this chapter, the commissioner of health and human services shall have the following powers and duties, subject to the direction and control of the governor, which are in addition to those set forth in RSA 141-C; provided that such powers and duties shall be limited to the specific nature of the emergency, its geographic limits, and the conditions that brought it about, as specified in the declaration of the state of emergency:
 - I. The commissioner shall have the responsibility and authority to carry out all public health activities within the state in cooperation and collaboration with the division of homeland security and emergency management.
 - II. The commissioner may, without the approval of the [governor's] executive council or the legislative fiscal committee, and notwithstanding the provisions of RSA 4:45, 9:13-d, and 9:19, [and any other law to the contrary,] purchase and distribute anti-toxins, serums, vaccines, immunizing agents, antibiotics, and other pharmaceutical agents that the commissioner deems to be in the interest of public health.
 - III. If there is a statewide or regional shortage or threatened shortage of any anti-toxins, serums, vaccines, immunizing agents, antibiotics, and other pharmaceutical agents, the commissioner may control, [restrict] prioritize, and ration the use, sale, dispensing, distribution, or transportation of such products as necessary to best protect the health, safety, and welfare of the people of this state. In making rationing or other supply and distribution decisions, the commissioner shall determine high risk or critical need groups that shall receive priority for such products.
 - III-a. The commissioner shall have no power to restrict the ability of a licensed practitioner to prescribe pursuant to RSA 329 and RSA 326-B.
 - III-b. If during a public health emergency, a treatment or vaccination should become available which is anticipated to be in limited supply, the commissioner shall develop, in consultation with the ethics oversight advisory committee, established in RSA 141-C:27, a plan for its distribution.

IV. The commissioner may investigate any incident or imminent threat of any disease or health condition that may be caused by a natural disaster, radiation or chemical exposure, or the release of any microorganism, infectious substance, or naturally occurring or manufactured biological product, that poses a risk of a significant number of human fatalities or incidents of permanent or long-term disability. Such investigations may include requiring information from any health care provider or other person affected by, or having information related to, the incident or threat, inspections of buildings and conveyances and their contents, laboratory analysis of samples collected during the course of such inspections, and requiring a physical examination and the provision of specimens of body secretions, excretions, fluids, and discharges for laboratory examination of any person having a disease or health condition that necessitates an investigation under this paragraph.

V. The commissioner may order a person to undergo such medical care as may be necessary to treat or prevent an incident or threat of disease or other health condition prompting an investigation pursuant to paragraph IV. Such care may include immunization of individuals as necessary to prevent the spread of contagious disease, except that an individual may refuse treatment or immunization pursuant to the provisions of [RSA 141-C:15, VI] RSA 141-C:16 and RSA 141-C:20-c.

VI. Any order compelling an investigation, physical examination, the provision of specimens, medical treatment or care, or immunization, and any other order of the commissioner under this chapter, shall be subject to the due process requirements of RSA 141-C:14-a.

VII. The department of health and human services shall acquire and retain only the minimum amount of information, specimens, and samples relating to individuals necessary to carry out its obligations under this section. Any genetic testing of specimens and samples shall be limited to the viruses, bacteria, fungi, or other microorganisms therein. Personally identifiable information shall not be acquired or retained unless necessary for the department to carry out its responsibilities under this section, RSA 141-C, or any other provision of law. Such information shall not be retained beyond the duration of the state of emergency without the approval of the governor and executive council, which information shall be subject to the confidentiality provisions of RSA 141-C:10.

VIII. Any emergency order issued under this section shall be subject to review by the joint legislative oversight committee on health and human services, established in RSA 126-A:13, and may be rescinded by a 2/3 vote of that committee. The commissioner shall notify the ethics oversight advisory committee established in RSA 141-C:27 of any emergency order issued under this section, and the joint legislative oversight committee shall consider the input of the ethics committee, if provided, in any decision. If the emergency precludes either committee from meeting in person, they shall be authorized, notwithstanding any other provision of law, to meet remotely for this purpose.

VI.  - I. There is hereby established an ethics *oversight advisory* committee to offer advice to the commissioner relative to the ethical issues that may be identified in the course of planning for, and responding to, outbreaks of communicable disease that threaten to become epidemic or pandemic and to review and provide recommendations for investigations, orders, and treatment ordered by the commissioner.
 - II. The committee shall:

- (a) Consider the ethical implications of any of the powers that may be exercised by the commissioner under the provisions of this chapter including, but not limited to, the confiscation, distribution, and rationing of anti-toxins, serums, vaccines, immunizing agents, antibiotics, and other pharmaceutical agents, and mechanical equipment; the issuance and enforcement of orders of isolation, quarantine, medical examination, and medical treatment; issues relative to information sharing and confidentiality; and the provisions for due process for orders issued pursuant to this chapter.
- (b) Review investigations initiated pursuant to RSA 141-C:9, orders issued pursuant to RSA 141-C:12, and treatment ordered pursuant to RSA 141-C:15.
- (c) Review orders issued by the commissioner pursuant to RSA 141-C:16-a and RSA 141-C:16-b not appealed to the superior court. If the committee should determine any such orders to be inappropriate, they may by majority vote direct the commissioner to rescind the order. When meeting for this purpose, and when discussing protected health information obtained for public health purposes pursuant to 45 C.F.R. 164.512(b)(1)(i), as provided by RSA 91-A:5 IV, the committee's proceedings shall be exempt from RSA 91-A.
