Testimony

Written Testimony in Favor of HB 203:

"AN ACT establishing a committee to study school meal programs in New Hampshire's public schools and non-sectarian schools that accept public funds."

House Education Committee Rep. Timothy Horrigan (Strafford 6); March 2, 2021

HB 203 is exactly the same as HB 1681-FN which came before the House Education Committee last year. To be a little more accurate, it is the same as the bill as amended by the committee, and as passed on a voice vote with no floor debate by the full House. I was the one and only sponsor of HB 1681-FN, which in its original form would have cost money and was hence probably a non-starter. It became a study committee bill instead. I was pleased with that result.

HB 1681-FN (2020) as amended was referred to House Finance, and it was scheduled for a hearing on March 18, 2020. Thanks to the pandemic it didn't get heard till June 1. The bill passed the House Finance Committee, but it never made it to the floor of the House.

So, here it is again, a year later, as HB 203, this time with no "-FN" at the end.

Like everything else in public education, school meal programs have changed because of the pandemic— and changed in a way which makes these programs even more important now than before the pandemic. This subcommittee will only have a few months to meet, which is of course not enough time to study every aspect of all the many very complex issues related to school meal programs. But it's enough still more than time to do some good work.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

In the Year of Our Lord Two Thousand Twenty One

AN ACT

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establishing a committee to study school meal programs in New Hampshire's public schools and non-sectarian schools that accept public funds.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

- 1 Committee Established. There is established a committee to study school meal programs in 2 New Hampshire's public schools and non-sectarian schools that accept public funds.
 - 2 Membership and Compensation.
 - I. The members of the committee shall be as follows:
 - (a) Three members of the house of representatives, appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives.
 - (b) One member of the senate, appointed by the president of the senate.
 - II. Members of the committee shall receive mileage at the legislative rate when attending to the duties of the committee.
- 10 3 Duties. The committee shall:
 - I. Examine existing state and federal laws and regulations regarding school meal programs.
- II. Work with the department of education, to determine how school meal programs are being implemented in New Hampshire.
- III. Identify potential legislation intended to reduce student hunger among students whose families meet the federal income eligibility guidelines.
- 16 IV. Work with other state agencies, as needed.
 - 4 Chairperson; Quorum. The members of the study committee shall elect a chairperson from among the members. The first meeting of the committee shall be called by the first-named house member. The first meeting of the committee shall be held within 45 days of the effective date of this section. Three members of the committee shall constitute a quorum.
 - 5 Report. The committee shall report its findings and any recommendations for proposed legislation to the speaker of the house of representatives, the president of the senate, the house clerk, the senate clerk, the governor, and the state library on or before November 1, 2021.
 - 6 Effective Date. This act shall take effect upon its passage.
