Amendment to HB 456

1 Amend the bill by replacing all after the enacting clause with the following:

3 1 Vital Records Administration; Privacy. Amend RSA 5-C:4, II to read as follows:

4 II. In collecting information, prime consideration shall be given to the protection of the
5 privacy of the individuals about whom information is given. In accordance with the provisions of
6 this chapter, the secretary of state shall ensure that, when information is collected, the minimum of
7 data shall be collected to accomplish a specific purpose, that no information shall be available to
8 unauthorized personnel, that only the minimum be made available to authorized personnel, and that
9 no information that could possibly adversely affect an identified individual be made public. The
10 department of health and human services shall have access to vital records information in
11 accordance with the provisions of RSA 126:24-c. The New Hampshire retirement system shall have
12 access to a limited data set of vital records information in accordance with the provisions of RSA
13 100-A:14, XVI. ***The department of corrections shall have access to a limited set of vital***
14 ***records information in accordance with the provisions of RSA 21-H:8, XI-c.***

HB 456 relative to the disclosure of information from vital records. (11:20/11:40)

Rep. McGuire introduced the bill and spoke in favor.

She said this bill would give the Department of Corrections access to vital records in order to do its business; this establishes that that DOC has an interest in such records and to say that it would not violate privacy rights.

Helen Hanks, Department of Corrections Commissioner, spoke in favor.

An area of DOC less discussed is the collections unit and works with about 13,000 individuals who are in "collection only" status. The unit collects fees, fines and restitution. She has found that DOC does not have the data set to do an effective job. The law permits a MOU between DOC and the Secretary of State's office and the DOC is asking for a limited-data set only for people under collection.

David Scanlan, Deputy Secretary of State, spoke for information.

He said that Division of Vital Records is part of the Secretary of State's office. The data is confidential shared with the Dept. of HHS and, on a limited basis, with the NHRS. He said that this request was a first and up to the ED&A Committee to determine the policy.

If the Committee so chose, he suggested wording to limit the data shared. Committee questions centered on misuse of the data. **Mr. Scanlan answered** that he was confident that DOC would handle the data correctly. He pointed out that at present, data is shared for statistical purposes and that this would be a fundamental shift – to allow for collection from individuals. Is there any other way for DOC to get this data? Do other states share such information?

Public hearing adjourned at 11:40 a.m.

I am in support of HB 456 and thank the committee for their consideration in passing the proposed legislation. In my role as Commissioner, I have uncovered our need for clear data sets in order to invest state resources effectively, specifically, this legislation targets cleaning up our records as it pertains to collection of restitution and other fines associated with NH RSA 504-A:12,VI; NH RSA 504-A:13. We, at this time, have no ability nor legal authority to confirm the death of a person, change in name due to adjustment in marital status or other reportable events for cases we have under a collection only. This is important information that will serve to assist our agency in meeting our statutory obligations and focus on having current and relevant data and information. If this proposed legislation passed, we would be able to match our existing data in our electronic client record with the information from vital records for only those in our system that we use to monitor collections allowing us to use staff resources more effectively. Currently, we have 13,014 people we are focused on collections of fines, fees and other court order payments in review of the last 13 months (highlighted below):

We collected \$2,468,037.86 in 2020 and to date for fiscal year 2021 we have collected \$1,147,307.04 dollars from those who are in a collection status.

CHAPTER 504-A PROBATIONERS AND PAROLEES

Section 504-A:13

504-A:13 Supervision and Service Charges. –

I. The court shall establish a supervision fee for probationers, and the parole board shall establish a supervision fee for parolees. The fee shall not be less than \$40 a month, unless waived in whole or in part by the court, board or commissioner, and may be any greater amount as established by the court or board. This fee shall be considered a condition of release, and failure to satisfy this obligation shall be grounds for a violation hearing, unless the probationer or parolee has been found to be indigent and, for that reason, unable to pay the fee. Service charges for collection of fines and fees, other than supervision fees, shall be established at 10 percent of the funds collected.

II. Monthly supervision fees collected under this section shall be deposited as follows:

(a) \$5 to the state general fund to defray expenses of providing training to employees of the department of corrections.

(b) The balance to be credited to the general fund.

III. The court, for probationers, and the parole board, for parolees and those under the jurisdiction of the court, may assess fees for services as provided by the department of corrections, division of field services, not otherwise provided for by this chapter.

IV. (a) Any person under state probation or parole supervision who requests a transfer of supervision to another state shall submit such request on a form to be developed by the commissioner of the department of corrections along with an application fee not to exceed \$100. The commissioner may waive the fee as deemed appropriate under the circumstances. All fees collected under this subparagraph shall be deposited into the probation and parole receipts fund established in subparagraph (b).

(b) There is hereby established a probation and parole receipts fund in the department of corrections which shall be administered by the commissioner of the department of corrections. The fund shall be nonlapsing and continually appropriated to the department of corrections to offset the cost of annual dues and any extradition costs incurred by the department pursuant to the interstate compact for adult offender supervision under RSA 651-A:25 through RSA 651-A:38.

26 fees and control and supervision by the department pursuant to this chapter, RSA 504-A:12,VI, and
27 RSA 504-A:13, limited to name of person, date of birth, social security number, date of vital event,
28 place of vital event, cause of death, marital status, and name of spouse. The commissioner and the
29 secretary of state shall enter into a memorandum of understanding for the purposes of delineating
30 specific procedures and protections for access to this limited data set.

31 4 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.
